Abstract of Report on Criminal Statistics for the year ended September 30th, 1922.

In compiling the criminal statistics for 1922 a departure from the former method has been made, by keeping the figures relating to juvenile delinquents separate from those relating to adults. The wide-spread interest that has developed in late years in child welfare nd in the treatment of juvenile delinquents has suggested a change in the method of recording the statistics. It is considered that a child is not capable of committing an "indictable" offence, and that transgressions of the law by children cannot properly be classed as "crimes", nor the transgressors "criminals". Therefore statistics of juvenile offenders will in future be tabulated and classified independently. The terms "indictable" and inon-indictable" offences in this and all subsequent reports will refer to adults only.

The classification of juvenile offences is not changed materially from that of the adults but consists of two divisions designated as "major" and "minor" offences. The classification is somewhat arbitrary but is based on that used for adults and therefore comparability with former years will not be seriously interfered with.

The new system of collecting the returns is not yet complete in some provinces, but the indications are that all returns will be sent in on the proper forms next year.

In the following tables the figures for 1921 have been adjusted so that comparison may be made with those of 1922.

As in former years those under the age of 16 years are counted as juveniles and those over 16 adults.

The total number of offences tried by the various criminal courts in Canada was 163,929 as compared with 182,720 in 1921, being a decrease of 18,791 or 10.28 per cent. The convictions decreased from 177,173 to 158,339, a diminution of 18.834 or 10.52 per cent. The acquittals of indictable and major effences increased from 5.547 to 5,590 during the year. Non-indictable and minor cases dismissed are not, and never have been recorded in these tables.

With respect to the variations in convictions for indictable offences shown above, the greatest percentage in decrease appears in British Columbia with 21.68 Alberta decreased 7.36 and Ontario 6.98 per cent. Saskatchewan increased 14.02 and Quebec 8.74 per cent. The variation in the other provinces was comparatively light.

Respecting summary convictions or non-indictable offences, the decrease in Quebec of 13,601 or 30.2 per cent is the greatest change. This decrease is made up principally in the reduction of offences against Municipal Acts and By-laws (chiefly in the traffic regulations) by 9,585; in drunkenness by 2,841; in Vagrancy by 574; and in Offences against Liquor Acts by 430. British Columbia decreased by 2,740 or nearly 19 per cent. Nova Scotia by 1,307 or 28 per cent. Increases are shown only in Saskatchewan and the Yukon.

Respecting the juvenile delinquents the figures shown for 1921 are more or less approximate as they could be extracted with exactitude from the general returns in which they were included, which fact must be recognized when making comparisons.

The following table shows the number of convictions by provinces of drunkenness, breeches of liquor acts, illicit stills and offences against the opium and narcotic drug act for 1921 and 1922.

The above figures show a general decrease in drunkenness. The greatest decrease was 54.6 per cent in British Columbia. Nova Scotia is next with a decrease of 30.8 per cent. Ontario is next with 30.6 per cent, then Quebec with 28.4 per cent. New Brunswick decreased 13.8 and Alberta 12.5 per cent. The other provinces; Prince Edward Island, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and the Yukon show increases. The decrease for Canada being 26.8 per cent. Offences against Liquor Acts decreased in Canada by 18.5 per cent. Manitoba and the provinces castward all show decreases with increases west of Manitoba. Illicit stills increased in every province except British Columbia which remained unchanged in this respect and Prince Edward Island and the Yukon, where there were none. Ontario leads with an increase of over 300 per cent from 59 to 245. Offences against the Opium and Narcotic Drug Act remained about the same for the whole of Canada but decreased in the western provinces and increased in Quebec and Ontario as shown above.
