AWARDS FOR GRADUATE STUDY AND RESEARCH, 1960 SUPPLEMENT

During the course of githering material for a revision of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics publication University Entrance Awards, a good deal of information on Canadian graduate awards, not included in Awards for Graduate Study and Research, 1959, was gathered. Although that publication is usually revised every second year, it was decided to issue this supplement so that the new data would be made available at an earlier date. It will be revised and incorporated into the 1961 edition.

The reader should refer to Awards for Graduate Study and Research, 1959, for greater details with regard to making application for awards, and for further source material. The following information indicates the organization of the entries that follow, and gives general notes on the awards listed.

Method of listing awards

The awards are listed in five general sections:
(I) Two or more areas of study. (II) Humanities,
(III) Social Sciences, (IV) Natural and Applied
Sciences, and (V) Medical Sciences. The sections
are in turn subdivided into groupings of sources by
countries of award which include (A) Canada, (B)
the United States, (C) the United Kingdom, and (D)
other countries.

The following is a guide to the division of the fields of study in sections II to V. When an award is tenable in two or more fields in different sections, it is listed in section I. While the fields below may not include all those represented, they should serve as a guide in following the presentation used.

SECTION II - HUMANITIES: Art, Classical Studies, Dance, Drama, Fine Arts (excluding Architecture), Graphic Arts, Languages, Literature, Mediaval Studies, Music, Painting, Philosophy, Sculpture, Theology.

SECTION III - SOCIAL SCIENCES: Accounting, Actuarial Science, Anthropology, Archaeology, Business, Business Administration, Commerce, Counselling, Demography, Economics, Education, Ethnology, Government, History, Home Economics, Human Relations, Industrial Relations, Journalism, Labour Relations, Law, Library Science, Physical Education, Political Science, Population, Psychology, Public Administration, Religious Education, Safety Education, Social Work, Sociology, Speech, Speech Pathology, Vocational Guidance.

SECTION IV - NATURAL AND APPLIED SCIENCES: Agriculture, Architecture, Engineering, Forestry, Geography, Mathematics, Pure Sciences, Statistics. SECTION W - MEDICAL SCIENCES: Medicine, Nursing, Occupational Therapy, Pharmacy, Physiotherapy, Psychiatry, Recreational Therapy, Veterinary Science.

FOR A COMPLETE PICTURE OF WHAT IS AVAILABLE IN ANY PARTICULAR FIELD, SECTION I (AWARDS TENABLE IN TWO OR MORE AREAS OF STUDY) SHOULD THEREFORE BE CONSULTED AS WELL AS THE SPECIFIC SECTION IN WHICH INFORMATION IS SOUGHT. As far as possible, sciences relating to medicine have been included in section V, but as in some cases they may be considered as natural or applied sciences, section IV should be checked. The reverse would apply to some of the natural and applied sciences, which could be included in section V. Persons interested in education should consult section III, and should also consult the section containing information regarding awards in the particular subject in which they are interested.

Two indexes appear in this publication. The first lists the awards by the five general sections, subdivided by country of origin. The second index is designed to facilitate the location of information when only the name of the award, the name of the awarding agency, or the institution where the award is tenable, is known.

A definite cut-off date for inclusion of entries in the main body of the publication was established. Information received after this dealine is included in an addendum which appears at the back of the volume. Where possible, such awards are included in the second index.

Canadian awards open to students from other countries

To assist in determining quickly by whom Canadian awards may be held, one of the following code numbers is used after the name of the award if the requisite information is available.

- The award is open only to Canadian citizens or to those who are landed immigrants in Canada;
- (2) The award is open to Canadian citizens, to residents of Canada, and to graduates from, and/or students at, Canadian universities.
 - (3) The award is open to all British subjects;
- (4) The award is open to graduates of any university.

Any exceptions are noted in the paragraph on "Conditions" for each award. Generally, for awards open to graduates of any university, the prospective recipient must meet all Canadian immigration requirements. Graduates of Canadian universities who are not Canadian citizens may in some cases have to undertake to remain in Canada for a certain period after the completion of the tenure of the award.

General notes on awards listed

Unless otherwise stated, the values of the awards listed from sources other than Canadian are in the currency of the country of origin.

Candidates for awards should, unless mention is made to the contrary, have a working knowledge of the language of the country in which they plan to study.

It should be borne in mind that many of the awards from sources outside Canada, unless specifically stated as being open only to Canadian students, are open to nationals of the country of award as well as to those of other countries, and hence the total number of awards offered is not necessarily the number reserved for Canadian applicants.

An attempt has been made to indicate whether instruction is offered to the Master's of Doctor's level. If such information was provided, it is given in the description of awards for individual institutions.

The closing date for receipt of applications means the date by which completed application forms, transcripts of marks, and all other supporting documents must be in the hands of the awarding bodies Such being the case, initial contact should be made as early as possible before the final deadline in order to allow a sufficient interval for the exchange of correspondence and for the collection and forwarding of the necessary documents. As in most cases no personal interview is possible prior to the granting of the award, the application and supporting documents should be as complete as possible.

AWARDS IN TWO OR MORE AREAS OF STUDY

A. CANADA

1. BRITISH COLUMBIA ELECTRIC COMPANY LIMITED GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS (4)

Field of study: Arts and Science, Commerce, Law and Social Work.

 $\frac{\text{Value}}{\$1,250}$. Total value \$1,000; may be increased to

Number: Usually 5 at \$200 each. At discretion of Dean of Scholarships these can be increased to maximum of \$250 each for out-of-town scholarship winners.

Conditions: Available to candidates in the above fields who are proceeding to further work in any of these fields at the University of British Columbia. Recipients will be chosen from recommendations submitted by departments, schools, or faculties concerned. Selection will be made on the basis of scholastic standing and ability in research. There is no restriction as to nationality of the student concerned and competition is open to students from outside Canada.

Where tenable: University of British Columbia.

2. THE BRITISH COLUMBIA SUGAR REFTRING COMPANY LIMITED SCHOLARSHIPS (4)

<u>Field of study</u>: Agriculture, Bacteriology, Botany and Biology, Chemistry, Fisheries, Home Economics, and Zoology.

Value: Variable (total \$2,500).

Number: Variable.

Duration: l year.

Conditions: For graduate study and research in the above fields or in special cases, for senior undergraduate study in these fields. Winners are selected from students who are or have been in attendance at the University of British Columbia. The Scholarships are open to students from all countries. Awards are made on the basis of academic standing and research ability.

Where tenable: The University of British Columbia.
Apply: The Dean of Administrative and InterFaculty Affairs, University of British Columbia,
Vancouver, B.C., before March 15th.
Awarding agency: The University.

3-13. THE CANADA COUNCIL AWARDS

NOTE - Unless otherwise specified, the following material applies to the following ten categories of Canada Council awards. The initial application for forms should include reference to the particular category (by both number and title) in which the applicant is interested.

Field of study: The objectives of the Council are "to foster and promote the study and enjoyment

of, and the production of works in, the arts, humanities and social sciences." For the time being, at least, these objectives are taken as not including social work, theology, pedagogy, applied mathematics and, generally, studies at professional schools. The "arts" are defined in The Canada Council Act as follows: "architecture, the arts of the theatre, literature, music, painting, sculpture, the graphic arts and other similar creative and interpretative activities".

<u>Value</u>: Awards may be granted for either the full amount or part of the amount indicated, in accordance with the nature or duration of the programme proposed. In most cases, the sums mentioned are averages, and may be adjusted to take into account marital status, place of study, unusual costs such as higher than average fees, etc. Travel grants

will normally be provided.

Conditions: The awards are open to both men and women and will be awarded on merit. The award must be taken up for the period specified in the application and may not be postponed to the following year. All applicants, with the exception of those for the non-resident fellowships (category 8) must have their ordinary place of residence in Canada or be Canadians temporarily living abroad. Candidates who have accepted teaching engagements which would not permit a full year's study concurrently may not hold a Canada Council scholarship or fellowship.

Awarding agency: The Canada Council through funds initially supplied by the Government of Canada,

3. THE CANADA COUNCIL - CATEGORY 1 - PRE-MASTER'S DEGREE SCHOLARSHIPS (2)

<u>Field of study</u>: As above. <u>Value</u>: Average \$1,500.

Number: Not specified, 88 awarded for 1959-60.

Duration: 1 year, renewable for 1 further year by re-entering the competition with the new applicants for the year in question.

Conditions: At the time of taking up the award, candidates must hold an appropriate Bachelor's degree and must have been admitted to graduate study. The first instalment of the award will be paid after candidates have furnished the Council with evidence that they have in fact taken the required degree and have been admitted to the graduate school of their choice.

Where tenable: The graduate school of any Canadian university (except scholarships for degrees in Architecture, which may be tenable abroad.)

Apply: The Canada Council, 140 Wellington Street, Ottawa, Ontario, by November 15, 1959 (for 1960-61 awards).

 THE CANADA COUNCIL - CATEGORY 2 - PRE-DOCTOR'S DEGREE FELLOWSHIPS (2)

Field of study: As above.

Value: Average \$2,000 (plus allowance for necessary travel by the fellow).

Number: Not specified, 110 awarded for 1959-60. Duration: 1 year, or a shorter period, renewable upon re-entering competition.

Conditions: Available for study and research leading to a Doctor's degree.

Where tenable: Canada or abroad.

Apply: The Canada Council, 140 Wellington Street, Ottawa, Ontario, by January 10, 1960 (for 1960-61 awards).

5. THE CANADA COUNCIL - CATEGORY 3a - SENIOR RESEARCH FELLOWSHIPS (2)

Field of study: Humanities and Social Sciences, as defined above.

Value: Average \$4,500 for a married fellow, plus travel costs for the fellow, plus two-thirds travel costs for the fellow's wife, and an average of \$4,000 plus travel costs for an unmarried fellow. Employers will be expected to make appropriate salary allowances to successful candidates.

Number: Not specified, 24 awarded for 1959-60.

Duration: 1 year.

Conditions: Available usually for post-doctoral

Where tenable: Canada or abroad.

Apply: By letter (6 copies) to The Canada Council, 140 Wellington Street, Ottawa, Ontario by November 15, 1959 (for 1960-61 awards).

6. THE CANADA COUNCIL - CATEGORY 3b - SENIOR ARTS FELLOWSHIPS (2)

Field of study: Arts, as defined above.

Value: Same as for Category 3a awards.
Number: Not specified, 27 awarded for 1959-60.

Duration: 1 year.

It is expected that when the Plan is in full operation over 1,000 awards (including Canadian) will be available. Of these, 500 will be tenable in the United Kingdom and the balance in other Commonwealth countries. A smaller number will be available for 1960-61.

Applications will also be considered from such persons without a degree or similar qualification who wish to take a first course of study, provided they are normally resident in a country where no university or college offers courses in the subjects of their choice. Applications will not be considered unless they are made through the appropriate agency in the country of a candidate's normal residence. Applicants should not have reached their 35th birthday by October 1, 1960 for 1960-61 awards. Scholars are expected to return to their own countries at the conclusion of their studies. In all cases the candidate should indicate in what country he wishes to study so that appropriate application forms may be sent.
