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

P R E F A C E

This report on Dominion Penitentiaries is part of the Decennial Census of 1931 and covers all prisoners present in these institutions on June 1, 1931, as well as prisoners released during 1930.

Penitentiaries only are included in this report. Statistics on Reformative and Corrective Institutions appear in a separate bulletin.

Detailed information concerning individual prisoners was collected for adults and for juveniles (under 18 years of age) present in all seven penitentiaries on June 1, 1931, as also for prisoners released during 1930. In addition to these data the report presents statistics covering personnel of administrative staffs, receipts and expenditures.

Five schedules were used in this Census of which three had reference to characteristics of inmates, one to administrative staff and one financial. The schedules were filled in by the superintendent or officers of each institution and forwarded to the Bureau of Statistics. The purpose of the Census was to obtain the fullest information concerning inmates in Penal Institutions and to show the prevailing characteristics of those who make up our penal population.

The fundamental need of complete and up-to-date statistics in this important field is evidenced by public interest in penal statistics. The development of correctional and training schools for youthful offenders, the search for causative factors for crime and its reduction, the extent and value of parole procedure, after-care, and similar important questions are all part of the present day problem. The statistics show the extent and character of our penitentiary population, the penal policies adopted for the various classes of offenders, the extent of recidivism and the efficiency of law enforcement machinery.

The survey included sex, age, race, country of birth, offence, sentence, term of commitment, number of times imprisoned, constitutional defects, anti-social tendencies, interval of time between date on which the offence was committed and the date of admission, time served and other data that have a value for all engaged in studying the criminal mind and in seeking the improvement of this class of the population.

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PENITENTIARIES

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INTRODUCTION

Table 1 shows the number of Adult and Juvenile inmates of penitentiaries on June 1, 1931, as also the number released during 1930. There were present on June 1, 1931, in all penitentiaries 3,748 prisoners of whom 3,704 were males and 44 were females. Among this number were 95 juvenile prisoners, of whom 93 were males and 2 females. St. Vincent de Paul had the largest inmate population with 904 and Collin's Bay the smallest with 198. The number of prisoners released from penitentiaries during 1930 was 1,136.

Table 2 shows the age groups of all prisoners reported. 55.7 per cent were between the ages of 18 and 30.9 years and 68.7 per cent of all prisoners reported were between the ages of 18 and 35.9. It is interesting to note that the group age 22 to 25.9 shows the largest percentage, closely followed by the group 26 to 30.9 years.

Table 3 shows nature of offence for all prisoners reported. The list of offences here used, differs from the lists as appear in the Report of Criminal Statistics, Judicial Statistics Branch, in that it is primarily a list of specified offences, but it follows the usual classification, as Offences Against the Person, Against Property, etc. It will be noticed that "Crimes Against Property" is by far the largest group, comprising 69.1 per cent of total offences. In Crimes Against Public Order and Peace, Breaches of the Drug Act is the chief crime. The inmates for this offence in the British Columbia Penitentiary constitute 67.3 per cent of the total offenders of the Drug Act. This is due to the fact that the Chinese population in British Columbia are the chief violators as 79 out of 99 Drug Act offenders in the British Columbia penitentiary were Chinese.

COUNTRY OF BIRTH.

Table 4 gives the country of birth of all prisoners reported. It will be noted that 68.6 per cent were Canadian born, 11.9 per cent British born, 19.2 per cent Foreign born and .3 per cent unascertained.

PLACE OF BIRTH AND MAJOR CRIMES.

In Table 5 (Place of Birth and Major Crimes) the place of birth is not designated as a definite country, but shown in geographical or racial areas as Canadian, British, Northern European, Asiatic, etc. Using these groupings the table shows the distribution of Major Crimes.

RACIAL ORIGIN.

Table 6 (Racial Origin of all Prisoners) shows that 41.4 per cent of all prisoners reported were of British stock; 27.5 per cent French; 21.4 per cent of Foreign Racial Origin; 1.5 per cent North American Indian and 8.2 per cent not given. This table should be studied with Table 7, which compares the total male prisoners reported with the total male population of Canada 15 years of age and over.

PARENTAGE OF PRISONERS.

Table 8 in giving the parentage of the prisoners, permits of a more minute analysis of nationalities, in that it shows both the paternal and maternal origin of the prisoners. Prisoners having the same origin, that is, whose parents are of the same birth, namely, both Canadian, both British or both Foreign born comprise 83.1 per cent. Those of mixed parentage comprise 8.7 per cent and those not given 8.2 per cent.

EMPLOYMENT PRIOR TO COMMISSION OF CRIME.

Table 9 shows the number of adult inmates on June 1, 1931, who were employed or unemployed prior to the commission of the crime for which they were committed and table 10 shows the duration of employment for those who were employed at the time of commission of crime. Table 9 shows that 60.7 per cent were employed; 33.2 per cent were unemployed and 6.1 per cent unascertained.

Table 10 deals with the adult inmates who were employed prior to commission of crime (2,218 inmates) and shows the duration of employment. It will be noted that 56.8 per cent were employed 5 years or less.

CITIZENSHIP AND TIME IN CANADA.

Table 11 shows the citizenship of all prisoners reported. 3,345 or 68.5 per cent were born in Canada. Of the total British born 67 had residence in Canada less than 5 years and 498 more than 5 years. 265 or 5.4 per cent of the alien born were naturalized and of the aliens not naturalized 478 or 9.8 per cent were in Canada 5 years or more, 135 or 2.7 per cent less than 5 years and 57 or 1.2 per cent not given.

Table 12 shows the time in Canada before commitment for all prisoners born outside Canada. Of these 6.1 per cent British born, 7.0 per cent United States born and 4.9 per cent other foreign born lived in Canada less than 5 years, before commitment; 4.1 per cent British born, 1.2 per cent United States born and 3.8 per cent other foreign born lived in Canada 5 to 9 years; 3.9 per cent British born, 1.5 per cent United States born and 3.3 per cent other foreign born lived in Canada 9 to 15 years; while 23.5 per cent British born, 8.2 per cent United States born and 25.3 per cent other foreign born lived in Canada 15 years and over before commitment to penitentiaries.

EDUCATIONAL STATUS.

The information under educational status (Table 13) was collected under three headings (1) None, (2) Reads only and (3) Reads and Writes, with the following instructions: "If a person can read in any language the question will be answered in the proper column by writing "yes" and by "no" if unable to read. If a person can write in any language the question will be answered in the proper column by "yes" and by "no" if unable to write."

It will be seen from table 13 that 7.9 per cent of all prisoners reported were illiterate, 0.4 per cent could read only, 91.3 per cent could read and write and 0.4 per cent were unascertained.

According to the 1921 Census the number of illiterates in Canada 21 years and over (Indians not included) was 261,579 or 5.49 per cent of the total population 21 years and over. As the improvement in the educational status of the general population over the last 20 years is indicated by a decrease in the percentage of illiterates from decade to decade, it is safe to say that, when the figures for the 1931 Census are available the number of illiterates in Canada 21 years and over will show a decrease from 1921.

We are basing the following comparison on the figures for the 1921 Census. We find that out of a total population of 2,449,160 males 21 years and over, the number of illiterates for 1921 was 156,602 or 6,267 per 100,000 of the total male population 21 years and over. Comparing the number of male penitentiary prisoners (4,824) for 1930 and 1931 on this basis we find that 8,230 per 100,000 are illiterate. From another point of view using the 1921 Census figures we find that 193 of every 100,000 of the total male population of Canada 21 years and over were penitentiary prisoners during 1930 and 1931 and that 253.5 of every 100,000 male illiterates 21 years and over and 187.8 of every 100,000 male literates 21 years and over, were penitentiary prisoners.

MARITAL CONDITION.

Table 14 shows that 3,046 or 62.4 per cent of all prisoners were single; 1,582 or 32.4 per cent were married; 4.1 per cent were widowed; 0.8 per cent were separated and divorced and 0.3 per cent whose marital condition was unascertained. A notable difference is seen in the per cent distribution with respect to the marital condition of males and females. Of the resident males 62.9 per cent were single, 32.0 per cent married and 4.0 per cent widowed; while of the female inmates 16.6 per cent were single, 60.0 per cent were married and 18.3 per cent widowed.

ENVIRONMENT.

Table 15 gives environment before commitment of inmates present in penitentiaries on June 1, 1931. Urban is defined as that of any community over 1,000 in population. It will be noted that 80.2 per cent are from urban centres and only 14.2 per cent from rural districts. The number of prisoners from rural districts varies with different sections of the country. The Maritime and Prairie provinces show a greater percentage of rural prisoners than Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia.

PREVIOUS OCCUPATIONS.

Table 16 gives the previous occupations of all prisoners reported. Laborers, expert workers (Trade) and those engaged in commercial pursuits represent 57.7 per cent of all prisoners reported. An interesting fact is that only 4.5 per cent had no previous occupation prior to commitment.

WEEKLY EARNINGS WHEN LAST EMPLOYED.

Table 17 shows weekly earnings in last employment of 2,868 adult prisoners, who were in employment prior to commitment. 100 were earning under \$10; 880, \$10 to \$20; 1,015, \$20 to \$30; 478, \$30 to \$40; 395 over \$40. Information under the above head was not available for 785 inmates.

AGE GROUPS AND OFFENCE.

Table 18 shows admission by age groups and major crimes for all prisoners reported. 840 or 17.2 per cent were under 22 years of age; 1,017 or 20.8 per cent were between 22 and 25.9 years; 1,608 or 32.9 per cent between 26 and 35.9; 809 or 16.6 per cent between 36 and 45.9 and 12.1 per cent 46 years of age or over. 70.9 per cent of all prisoners reported were under 36 years of age.

Robbery, burglary and theft lead all other crimes and comprise 56.2 per cent of all offences. 79.6 per cent of crimes of burglary and 75.3 per cent of crimes of theft were committed by prisoners between 18 and 36.0 years of age. 89.5 per cent of breaches of the Drug Act were committed by prisoners over 25.9 years of age. Of 143 violations of the Drug Act 2.8 per cent were committed by prisoners between 18 and 21.9 years of age; 7.0 per cent by prisoners between 22 and 25.9 years; 25.9 per cent by prisoners between 26 and 35.9 years; 39.1 per cent by prisoners between 36 and 45.9 years and 24.5 per cent by prisoners 46 years of age or over.

The total number of females reported were 60, of whom 16 were released during 1930, leaving 44 women prisoners in penitentiaries on June 1, 1931. Of this number 2 were under 18 years of age. Comparing the adult prisoners (over 18) in penitentiaries on June 1, 1931 with the general population for the same ages we find that on June 1, 1931 there were 133 male adult prisoners in penitentiaries and 1.5 female adult prisoners per 100,000 of the general population over 18 years of age.

FIRST OFFENDERS AND RECIDIVISTS.

Table 19 deals with first offenders and recidivists in penitentiaries and throws much light upon the problem of recidivism among the penitentiary population. The presence of a large recidivistic class in our penitentiaries and the importance of the problem it presents is made apparent by a study of Tables 19 and 20. The story of recidivism as here disclosed will indicate the magnitude of the problem involved not only in methods for treatment of recidivists but from the point of view of public expense.

Of 4,884 prisoners reported 1,851 or 37.9 per cent were first offenders; 2,870 or 58.7 per cent were recidivists and 3.4 per cent whose previous history was unascertained. It will be noticed that the largest percentage of recidivists were in the class "Fourth offence and over."

Table 20 shows distribution of prisoners by age groups and previous commitments to Penitentiaries, Reformatories and Gaols. Out of 4,884 prisoners reported 1,851 or 37.9 per cent were first offenders. The percentages of first offenders in each age group are given in the table. The smallest percentage of first offenders is in the 26 to 35.9 year group. The age groups that contribute most to recidivism are 22 to 25.9 and 26 to 35.9. 2,870 recidivists show at least 1,544 previous Penitentiary sentences, 1,630 Reformatory and 3,553 Gaol commitments, a minimum total of 6,727 previous commitments, or a minimum average of three previous commitments for each and every recidivist. The percentage of total previous commitments were: Penitentiaries 23 per cent; Reformatories 24.2 per cent and Gaols 52.8 per cent.

PRISONERS WHO WERE PREVIOUSLY INMATES IN NON-PENAL INSTITUTIONS.

Table 21 shows prisoners who were previously inmates in non-penal institutions. This information was required to ascertain not only the number of prisoners who were previously in benevolent and charitable institutions, but the bearing of institutional life, if any, on criminal action. 91 per cent of all inmates were at no time previous inmates of a non-penal institution; 3.4 per cent were previously in non-penal institutions and 5.8 per cent not given. Of the 121 who were known to be previously in non-penal institutions 31.4 per cent were in Insane Asylums and Institutions for the Feeble-minded.

SOCIAL HABITS AND CRIMES.

Table 22 shows social habits of all inmates over 18 years of age present in penitentiaries June 1, 1931. In taking this census every effort was made to ascertain the alcoholic and drug habits of prisoners admitted to penitentiaries in order to determine as far as possible the extent to which alcohol and drugs were factors in the causation of crime. Prisoners were classified with respect to their use of alcohol in three groups - abstinent, temperate and intemperate. Abstinent were those who did not use alcohol as a beverage; temperate, those who used alcohol to some degree, but not intemperately; intemperate, those who had become repeatedly intoxicated or deteriorated or afflicted by disease from the use of alcohol.

On June 1, 1931 of 3,653 inmates in penitentiaries over 18 years of age, 716 or 19.6 per cent were abstinent; 2,225 or 60.9 per cent were temperate; 548 or 15 per cent were intemperate and 164 or 4.5 per cent were unascertained. There were 143 Drug Addicts in Penitentiaries on June 1, 1931, of whom 142 were male and 1 female.

Table 23 classifies admissions by crimes and social habits. Table 24 shows per cent distribution of abstinent, temperate and intemperate, in relation to nature of offence and Table 25 classifies Drug Addicts by offences committed.

TERM OF SENTENCE.

Table 26 shows that out of 4,884 prisoners reported 1,741 or 35.7 per cent received sentences of less than 3 years; 1,017 or 20.8 per cent 3 to 3.9 years; 271 or 5.6 per cent 4 to 4.9 years; 534 or 11.0 per cent 5 to 5.9 years; 337 or 6.9 per cent 6 to 9.9 years; 237 or 4.9 per cent 10 to 14.9 years; 83 or 1.7 per cent 15 to 19.9 years; 51 or 1.0 per cent 20 years and over; 144 or 2.9 per cent Life sentence and 467 or 9.6 per cent not recorded.

ADMISSION BY SENTENCE AND OFFENCE.

Statistics concerning nature of offence and length of sentence imposed as shown in Table 27 are useful for showing trends in penal methods. Two principal kinds of sentence are imposed - the definite sentence, which has a minimum or lower limit and also a maximum or upper. All prisoners committed to penitentiaries are given definite sentences. A definite sentence does not preclude a prisoner being released before expiration of sentence, either through parole or otherwise. See Table 33 on Method of Release and Time Served.

Those committed for crimes of Robbery, Burglary and Theft show the largest percentage in almost every sentence group.

In sentences from 2 to 2.9 years 60.1 per cent were committed for crimes of Robbery, Burglary or Theft. The percentages for the other sentence groups are as follows: 3 to 3.9 years, 61.3 per cent; 4 to 4.9 years, 61.6 per cent; 5 to 5.9 years, 58 per cent; 6 to 6.9 years 58.2 per cent; 10 to 14.9 years, 52.3 per cent; 15 to 19.9 years, 43.4 per cent and 20 years or over 27.4 per cent.

TIME SERVED BY PRISONERS RELEASED DURING 1930.

The time served is the length of imprisonment for discharged prisoners during 1930. Tables 28, 29, 30 and 31 are important in the study of penal policies as they serve to show the relation between the term of sentence, the actual time served in the Penal Institution and the Nature of the Offence.

Table 29 shows the time served according to the nature of the offence committed. It will be noted that the periods of time served 1.1 to 1.9 years and 2 to 2.9 years are the largest groups. Prisoners committed for Robbery, Burglary and Theft comprise 48.8 per cent of the total prisoners released.

Table 30 compares the Time Served with the corresponding Term of Sentence for all prisoners released during 1930. This table shows the time served for each definite Term of Sentence group.

Table 31 is based upon the terms of sentence and the periods of time served, by prisoners released during 1930. The averages are compiled from the records of 831 prisoners for whom the required information is given. The average term of sentence is 3.23 years and the average time served by the same prisoners is 2.20 years which is 1.03 years less than the average Term of Sentence. This information is further substantiated by Tables 32 and 33 Method of Release and Term of Sentence and Method of Release and Time Served.

METHOD OF RELEASE AND TERM OF SENTENCE.

Table 32 not only shows the Method of Release for all prisoners released during 1930, but also gives the Term of Sentence to which the prisoners under each group were committed. This table should be compared with Table 33 - Method of Release and Time Served.

Out of 1,136 prisoners discharged during 1930, 638 or 56.2 per cent were discharged at expiration of sentence; 46 or 4.0 per cent were pardoned; 402 or 35.4 per cent were paroled; 9 or 0.8 per cent died; 25 or 2.2 per cent otherwise discharged. The method of discharge for 3 prisoners was not reported. 13 were transferred to asylums, hospitals, sanatoriums, etc.

METHOD OF RELEASE AND TIME SERVED.

Table 33 is based upon the same Method of Release grouping as Table 32 showing distribution of time served by all prisoners released, during 1930.

PHYSICAL DEFECTS AND NATURE OF OFFENCE.

Table 34 gives the number of prisoners with physical defects and Table 35 classifies them in connection with nature of offence committed. One of the problems of prison administration is to find work suitable for all prisoners and a knowledge of their physical disabilities is necessary in order that they may be properly employed during their term in prison.

The facts laid bare by this investigation serve to show that by far the larger part of our penitentiary population is not handicapped in the race of life by physical disabilities and the physical health of those committed to penitentiaries is remarkably good. (See Table 32 showing number of deaths in penitentiaries during 1930).

The number of prisoners in penitentiaries on June 1, 1931 with physical defects was 669 or 17.8 per cent of the total inmate population. Defective eyesight, bodily deformity and other physical defects which include hernia, varicose veins, diseases of neck glands, heart trouble, syphilis, tuberculosis, etc., were the three largest groups.

Table 35 is of particular interest in the study of influences in the causation of crime. Using the same physical defects groups as in Table 34 the nature of the offences by the inmates are compiled under the major crimes groups. It will be noted that the percentage of the total offences committed by physical defectives is 17.8 per cent and that Murder and Attempt at Murder (27 per cent) Sex Offences other than Rape (29.4 per cent) and Forgery, Fraud and False Pretences (53.8 per cent) groups are the most strikingly above the average for this class.

MENTAL CLASSIFICATION OF PRISONERS.

As the study of criminology embraces problems due to mental characteristics and as the diagnoses and treatment of the criminal is a highly technical, medical and sociological problem, the following questionnaires were included in the Census of Institutions:

- (a) Do prisoners receive on admission a medical, psychological or psychiatric examination? State which.....

(b) State whether prisoner is normal or sub-normal.....

(c) If inmates have been classified by psychiatrist, state if idiot, imbecile, moron, epileptic.....

Table 36 shows that 95.9 per cent of the prisoners in penitentiaries on June 1, 1931 were reported as normal and less than 5.0 per cent as sub-normal. Three inmates were classified as idiots, four as imbeciles and two as epileptics.

MONTHS DURING WHICH CRIMES WERE COMMITTED.

The seasonal variations in the occurrence of crimes for prisoners are shown in table 37.

Due to the fact that in tables 37 and 38 a large percentage of the information was not reported, we base the following percentages on totals, omitting the not reported figures.

In Table 37 we find that the lowest average per month 6.9 per cent occurs during the summer months of June, July and August and the highest average 9.6 per cent during the winter months of October, November, December and January.

Table 38 shows time elapsed between date of crime and date of admission. These periods of time elapsed include the action of arrest, trial and commitment. From the information reported we find that 89.8 per cent were admitted to the penitentiaries within 6 months after the commission of crime.

PRISONERS WITH OVERSEAS SERVICE.

Table 39 shows the number of prisoners on June 1, 1931, who served Overseas, during the Great War in the Army or in the Navy. 3,243 or 88.8 per cent had no Overseas Service, 410 or 11.2 per cent of the total prisoners saw Overseas Service, of whom 399 were in the Army service and 11 in the Navy.

The total number of Canadians who saw service in all theatres of war was 422,405.

JUVENILE DELINQUENTS IN PENITENTIARIES.

Table 40 shows relatives or others with whom living at time of commitment. The object of this table is to show to what extent previous environment and home conditions bear on juvenile delinquency and should be studied in conjunction with table 41. It will be noticed that 54.7 per cent of the juvenile delinquents lived with both parents; 12.6 per cent with the mother only; 10.6 per cent with father only, or 82.1 per cent lived with immediate relatives of the family circle. Turning to table 41 we note that 68.4 per cent came from homes the conditions of which were described as good or fair.

Table 41 shows previous environment and home conditions of juvenile delinquents. It will be noted that 68.4 per cent of juvenile delinquents in penitentiaries came from homes the conditions of which were described as good or fair.

Table 42 shows that 25.3 per cent of juvenile delinquents in penitentiaries used liquor to a greater or less degree; 90.5 per cent used cigarettes; 6.3 per cent neither drank nor smoked and for 3.2 per cent the information was unascertained.

From Table 43 we note that of those who had left school prior to commitment 79.0 per cent had been out of school for one year or more. Also in table 44 we note that 69.4 per cent of the juveniles were not working at the time of their commitment.

Table 44 shows previous occupation of juvenile delinquents present in penitentiaries on June 1, 1931. Out of a total of 95 juvenile delinquents 92 or 96.8 per cent had left school, 74 or 77.9 per cent had been employed at some time previously, 18 or 18.9 per cent had never been employed, 26 or 27.4 per cent were working at time of commitment, 66 or 69.4 per cent were not at work and 3 or 3.2 per cent were not recorded.

ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF.

Tables 45 and 46 deal with administrative staff of penitentiaries as at June 1, 1931. Total officers and employees number 725 of whom keepers, guards and other disciplinary officers numbered 494 or 68.1 per cent.

Table 46 shows number of inmates to physicians, teachers, guards, etc. We find the average number of inmates to total staff for all penitentiaries is 5.2 and that all penitentiaries differ but slightly from this figure.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

Table 47 shows the total expenditures for the maintenance and operation of all Canadian penitentiaries, during the year ending March 31, 1931; also the value of assets and produce and the acreage of land owned by the penitentiaries and under cultivation.




