COUNT OF RATION BOOK NUMBER 4 AS AN INDICATION OF POST_CENSAL MIGRATION

Herewith is presented a statement of the issue of Ration Book No. 4. as obtained by a count of the turn-in cards from Book No. 3. The turn-in cards were forwarded to the Bureau of Statistics by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board in an arrangement designed to make use of the Bureau's facilities.

Distribution of the successive ration books has provided opportunity to make counts of the population of Canada by small areas. These counts have been the only important measure for the civilian population of the very heavy internal migration which the War has occasioned. Notwithstanding the fact that ration book issue is carried out differently from Census enumeration, a useful though not perfect basis of comparison is afforded. The main differences are as follows:-

- (1) The Census allocates persons to their place of legal residence, whereas individuals entitled to ration cards may apply at any place of issue that happens to be convenient. In counting Ration Book No. 4 an attempt was made to allocate all cards back to the county or Census division of permanent residence as stated on the card, but it is possible that there were cases in which the stated place of residence was not the legal residence as defined in the more precise procedure of the Census.
- (2) In particular, the Census allocates members of the armed forces to their place of legal residence. The ration card count did not include any members of the armed services. Exact comparability is, therefore, impossible. Persons in the armed forces have been removed from the Census population but there remain in the 1941 civilian figures those persons who joined the forces between 1941 and 1944.
- (3) The natural increase in the period 1941-44 amounted to some 445,000. This element of the comparison is about 30,000 short of the increase in the armed forces, and operates in the opposite direction.
- (4) Certain areas of Canada are not under the rationing scheme, and no surrender cards, therefore, were received for such parts. An indication of the numerical importance of these areas is included in

The count of the ration cards was made by a short-cut weighing process at a cost of between one-fifth and one-tenth that of counting all of the cards. A few cards were counted out in groups of three thousand and a weight constructed which represented 3,000 average cards. After the weight had been made, the main task of counting consisted of (1) sampling between one-tenth and one-twentieth of the cards, depending on the size of the county; (2) weighing the remaining nine-tenths or more; (3) weighing the sample cards and counting them by hand; The count per unit of weight as obtained in (3) was then applied to the total weight for the county. The variation between counties in the proportion sampled was employed to secure a greater degree of accuracy in smaller counties than would have been the case had the same proportion been used throughout. The accuracy attained was approximately as follows:-

> For a county of 10,000 persons a maximum likely error of $l_2^{\frac{1}{2}}$ per cent, or 150 persons.

> For a county of 50,000 persons a maximum likely error of $\frac{3}{4}$ of 1 per cent, or about 400 persons.

For a county of 500,000 persons, a maximum likely error of 3/10 of 1 per cent, or 1,500 persons.



For the country as a whole, a maximum likely error of 1/10 of 1 per cent, or 10,000 persons.

These levels of error were established theoretically for the process at the outset and later verified by the duplication of the process in about a dozen counties.

In respect of population changes since the Census, the variation among provinces and counties is striking. Making very crudely the allocation of armed forces to place of legal residence and comparing the result with the Census, we find indication that Montreal and Jesus Islands. Quebec, York County, Ontario and British Columbia, Division 4, have each gained by civilian movement to the extent of 50,000 persons. Halifax, Chicoutimi, Carleton, Essex, Wentworth, Manitoba Division 6 (containing Winnipeg), and Alberta Division 11 (containing Edmonton), have increased by 10,000 to 25,000 persons. The gains of counties containing cities of 100,000 persons or more are reflected as losses in the counties which are primarily rural.

The following table shows provincial changes after adjusting the Ration Book count for natural increase and estimated numbers of persons in the armed forces with legal residence in each province. It will be seen that though for the country as a whole the net change is very small Ontario had a gain of 58,000 and British Columbia 90,000, while Saskatchewan lost 86,000 and Manitoba lost 25,000.
