

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SIGNIFICANT RESULTS OF THE 1951 CENSUS

1. Growth of Population in Canada

The ten years that elapsed between the 1941 and the 1951 Censuses witnessed the largest growth in population in Canada of any decade in Canadian history. The 1951 figure of 14,009,429 was 2,502,774 or 21.8 p.c. greater than the 1941 Census population count of 11,506,655. Newfoundland's entry into Confederation during this decade accounted for 361,416 of this increase. Excluding Newfoundland, the population of Canada on June 1, 1951, was 13,648,013, an increase of 2,141,358 or 18.6 p.c. over the 1941 population.

Between the 1951 Census and June of this year the population of Canada increased by 772,000 or 5.5 p.c. At the present rate of growth the population in 1961 would be in the range of 17,500,000 to 18,000,000, an increase of from 25 to 28.5 p.c. or from 3,500,000 to 4,000,000 in the ten-year period. Such an increase would be much the largest in a single decade in Canada.

Natural increase amounted to 1,972,394, or 92.1 p.c. of the 2,141,358 population increase in Canada, not including Newfoundland, between 1941 and 1951. The balance, amounting to 168,964, represents the estimated excess of immigration over emigration over this period. Total immigration to Canada between the 1941 and 1951 Censuses was 547,882, hence, "apparent" emigration from Canada to other countries over this decade was 378,918.

Marked interprovincial shifts in population between 1941 and 1951 are reflected in the sharp differences between provinces in rate of population growth over this period. For example, while the population of British Columbia increased by 347,349 persons or 42 p.c. during this ten-year period, there was a decline in population in Saskatchewan of 64,264 persons, or of 7.2 p.c. The population of the Maritime Provinces increased by 126,300 or 11.2 p.c. to a total of 1,256,710, Prince Edward Island showing a small increase of 3.6 p.c., while Nova Scotia and New Brunswick recorded moderate increases of 11.2 p.c. and 12.7 p.c., respectively. The rate of growth in Ontario and Quebec was about the same, at just over 21 p.c., the large net inflow of population into Ontario offsetting the considerably greater natural increase in the province of Quebec. Manitoba's population increased by only 6.4 p.c. between 1941 and 1951, while Alberta's population grew by 18 p.c. or about at the same rate as shown for Canada, exclusive of Newfoundland.

2. Rural and Urban Population

So rapid was the movement from rural to urban during the decade ending in 1951 that the proportion of the total population living in urban areas of

Canada (exclusive of Newfoundland) in June, 1951, was 62.1 p.c., while only 37.9 p.c. resided in rural areas. In 1941 the proportion of the population residing in urban areas was 56.5 p.c., and in rural areas 43.5 p.c. The gain in population in urban areas of Canada between 1941 and 1951 was 30.3 p.c., while the increase in rural areas was only 3.4 p.c. The rural farm population decreased by almost 300,000 or 10 p.c. since 1941 while the rural non-farm population increased by 436,000 or about one-fifth over this period.

The comparative rural-urban growth since 1941 by regions was as follows: Maritimes—rural 4.2 p.c., urban 20.5 p.c.; Quebec—rural 6.5 p.c., urban 31.1 p.c.; Ontario—rural 12.6 p.c., urban 25.5 p.c.; Prairies—rural 12.4 p.c. (decline), urban 39.7 p.c.; and British Columbia—rural 38.4 p.c., and urban 44.5 p.c.

An increasing percentage of the urban population has tended to reside in the largest cities. The percentage of the urban population in cities of 100,000 and over has risen from 25.9 in 1891 to 41.6 in 1951.

The population in the metropolitan areas of cities of 100,000 and over in 1951 was 4,683,939 or 54.4 p.c. of the total urban population of Canada, or about one-third of the total population rural and urban combined. The combined suburban parts of cities 100,000 and over in 1941 recorded an increase in population of 86.5 p.c. between 1941 and 1951, as compared with only a 12.4 p.c. increase within the cities proper.

3. Age

There has been a considerable change in the age structure of the population since 1881—the earliest census for which age statistics are available. At that census the percentage of the total population under 20 years of age was approximately 50 p.c. of the total population, as compared with 37.6 p.c. in 1951 for Canada, exclusive of Newfoundland. On the other hand, in the working age period 20-59 years, there has been a marked increase in relative proportion of the population since 1881. At the earlier census only 43.8 p.c. of the total population were between these ages, while in 1951 the percentage was 50.9. The percentage in the age group 60 and over was 6.4 in 1881, as compared with a percentage of 11.4 in 1951.

The number of children under 10 years of age in Canada, exclusive of Newfoundland, in 1951, was 3,015,000, or over 915,000 more than in 1941, an outstanding increase of about 44 p.c. since the 1941 Census. Between 1931 and 1941 there was an actual decline of about 109,862 in this youngest age group. The number of children between 10-14 years of age

was 1,095,000 in 1951, actually slightly less than the number in this age group in 1941, while the number of young people between 15-19 years of age also declined by about 92,000 to 1,028,000 in 1951.

The population of Canada in the working age group 20-59 years was 6,951,698 in 1951, an increase of 15.6 p.c. since 1941. The population 20-44 increased by 17.2 p.c. or at about the same rate as the total population at all ages, but the age group, 45-59, showed only an 11.8 p.c. increase. The proportion of the total population between 20-59 years dropped from 52.3 p.c. to 50.9 p.c. over this period. The population, 60 years and over, was 1,559,419 in 1951, an increase of 32.7 p.c. since 1941. Percentage increases in the populations, 65 years and over, and 70 years and over, between 1941 and 1951 were 38.4 and 38.7, respectively. Including Newfoundland, the population of Canada on June 1, 1951 under 10 years of age was 3,119,934; 10-19 years, 2,188,755; 20-59 years, 7,108,315; and 60 years and over, 1,592,425.

4. Marital Status

The number and proportions of the population 15 years of age and over who were married increased from 4,736,585 or 57 per cent in 1941, to 6,261,578 or 64.2 per cent in 1951. Males 15 to 44 years of age, married, increased from 44.6 p.c. of the total in 1941 to 55.5 p.c. in 1951, and females from 53.9 to 64.3 p.c. for the same period.

The single population 15 years of age and over numbered 2,821,788 in 1951. In rural areas there were 1,051,865 single persons, of whom 695,180 were males and 356,685 were females. In urban areas, 1,769,923 persons 15 years of age and over were single, 884,171 of whom were males and 885,752 were females.

Widowed males numbered 186,595 in 1951, and widowed females 456,753. In rural areas 75,418 or 4.0 p.c. of males 15 years of age and over were widowed as compared with 131,111 or 8.2 p.c. of the females in this age group. Corresponding figures for urban areas were 111,177 or 3.6 p.c. for males and 325,642 or 10 p.c. for females.

Due to difficulties of obtaining an exact enumeration of divorced persons, the figure of 31,998 from the 1951 Census was probably incomplete. However, annual data on dissolutions of marriages would indicate that, after allowing for remarriage of divorced persons, the actual number of divorced in 1951 was probably considerably greater than at the 1941 Census.

Of a total of 815,627 males, 60 years of age and over in 1951, 574,078 or 70.4 p.c. were married, 143,952 or 17.6 p.c. were widowed, and 95,301 or 11.7 p.c. were single. Females 60 years and over numbered 776,398, of whom 380,751 or 49.0 p.c. were married, 315,274 or 40.6 p.c. were widowed, and 79,497 or 10.2 p.c. were single.

5. School Attendance and Years of Schooling

There were 1,961,054 children 5 to 14 years of age and 480,363 persons aged 15-24 in attendance at school during the 1950-51 scholastic year. Newfoundland's entry into Confederation during the decade accounted for 64,366 children in the former age group and 12,267 in age group 15 to 24. Excluding Newfoundland, there were 161,042 more children 5-14 years of age in attendance at school in 1951 than ten years earlier—an increase of 9.3 p.c. over the 1941 total of 1,735,646. The number of persons 15 to 24 years of age attending school increased by 33,580 or 7.7 p.c. over the 1941 total of 434,516. Considered in relation to their total populations, 77.6 p.c. of the population 5 to 14 and 22.4 p.c. of the population 15 to 24 years were in attendance in 1951. Comparative percentages for 1941 were 80.9 p.c. and 20.2 p.c.

While the population 20-24 years of age increased by 2.85 p.c. (excluding Newfoundland) between 1941 and 1951, the percentage in this age group at ~~college or university~~^{school} was about 38 p.c. greater in 1951 than 10 years earlier.

Approximately 46 p.c. of the population 15 years and over not attending school in 1951 had reached high school, compared with 40.9 p.c. in 1941, while 8.4 p.c. of this group had progressed to the university level against 6.3 p.c. a decade earlier.

The 1951 median years of schooling for the population of Canada no longer attending school was 7.7 years, compared with 7.4 years in 1941. Considerably higher median years of schooling was recorded in urban than rural areas (9.3 years compared with 7.0 years). In general, years of schooling was greater on the average for the younger than the older members of the population, i.e., age 15 to 29—9.2 years; age 30 to 44—9.1 years; age 45 to 59—7.3 years; age 60 years and over—6.9 years.

6. 1941-51 Immigrants

The 1951 Census shows 424,293 residents who immigrated to this country between 1941 and 1951. These recent arrivals who constituted approximately 17 p.c. of Canada's 2,502,774 population increase in the decade including Nfld. (or 19.8 p.c. excluding Nfld.), were distributed regionally as follows: Atlantic Provinces—3.6 p.c.; Quebec—14.8 p.c.; Ontario—53.6 p.c.; Prairie Provinces—17.2 p.c.; British Columbia—10.7 p.c. Approximately 75 p.c. of the 1941-51 immigrants resided in urban areas and close to 40 p.c. in urban centres of 100,000+. The remaining one-quarter of the recent immigrants were about evenly distributed between rural farm and rural non-farm areas.

The 1941-51 immigrants were distributed by age as follows: 0 to 14 years—94,065 or 22.2 p.c.; 15 to 19 years—22,687 or 5.3 p.c.; 20 to 44 years—250,886 or 59.1 p.c.; 45 to 59 years—43,272 or 10.2 p.c.; 60 years and over—13,383 or 3.2 p.c. Close to 9 and

30 p.c. of the total population increase between 1941 and 1951 for the age groups 0 to 14, and 20 to 44, may be attributed to immigration while this factor was responsible for 17.7 and 3.2 p.c. of the increases recorded by age groups 45 to 59 and 60+ respectively.

Close to 39 p.c. of the recent arrivals were of British Isles origins while 58.8 p.c. and 1.3 p.c. were of Continental European and Asiatic origins respectively. Polish and Netherlands were the principal European origins reported (in each case being 8.6 p.c. of all 1941-51 immigrants), closely followed by Italian and Ukrainian origins which comprised 5.9 and 5.4 p.c. of all recent arrivals.

The 1941-51 immigrants were distributed by "country of allegiance" as follows: Canada, 89,906 (21.2 p.c.); Other British Commonwealth countries, 88,350 (20.8 p.c.); United States, 28,408 (6.7 p.c.); European countries, 198,262 (46.7 p.c.); Asiatic countries, 4,460 (1.1 p.c.) and Other, 14,907 (3.5 p.c.). The most frequently reported European nationality was Polish (47,847 persons or 11.3 p.c. of the total 1941-51 immigrants) while 39,146 or 9.2 p.c. owed allegiance to Russia; 30,992 or 7.3 p.c. to the Netherlands and 21,506 or 5.1 p.c. to Italy.

There were 336,212 recently arrived immigrants 5 years of age and over who had not attended school during the 1950-51 scholastic year. Of these, 42,733 or 12.7 p.c. had under 5 years of schooling; 119,479 or 35.5 p.c.—5 to 8 years; 129,998 or 38.7 p.c.—9 to 12 years; 33,396 or 9.9 p.c.—13 to 16 years, and 10,606 or 3.2 p.c.—17 years and over.

7. Labour Force

The labour force increased in size from 4,713,000 (3,725,000 males and 988,000 females) in June 1941 to 5,300,000 (4,131,000 males and 1,169,000 females) in June 1951. Of this total, the armed services accounted for about 300,000 males in 1941 and 70,000 in 1951, and the inclusion of Newfoundland added about 90,000 males and 17,000 females.

The agricultural labour force, at 827,000 in 1951, was considerably below the 1941 figure of 1,219,000. There was a notable increase in the civilian non-agricultural labour force from 3,198,000 in 1941 to 4,388,000 (4,286,000 excluding Newfoundland) in 1951. For males the largest increases have been about 210,000 or 38 p.c. in Manufacturing and Mechanical Occupations; 100,000 or 50 p.c. in Construction Occupations; 150,000 or 54 p.c. in Transportation and Communication Occupations; 100,000 or 33 p.c. in Trade and Finance Occupations; and about 125,000 or 40 p.c. in Service Occupations, which includes the professional group. In the case of females, important increases included 50,000 or 36 p.c. in Manufacturing and Mechanical Occupations; 50,000 or 71 p.c. in Trade and Finance Oc-

cupations; and 150,000 or 104 p.c. in the clerical group. (The above increases are approximate since they include the influence of the shift from gainfully occupied to labour force definitions).

Other significant changes in the decade as shown by census data were:

A reduction of about 20,000 in the number of male civilians, 14-19 years gainfully occupied, which was more than counterbalanced by an increase of 40,000 in the number of females. This rise in the number of young females gainfully occupied occurred in spite of a reduction in the total population 14-19 years of age.

An increase in the number of older workers (60 years of age and over) from 411,000 in 1941 to 462,000 in 1951, due mainly to a rise of 41,000 for males, the increase for females being about 10,000. It should be noted, however, that the proportion of the total population, 60 years and over, in the labour force was lower in 1951 than in 1941.

A fourfold increase in the number of married women in the labour force; from 86,000 in 1941 to 349,000 in 1951. The Monthly Labour Force Survey estimates that some 390,000 married women had jobs at the beginning of June, 1953.

A significant rise in annual earnings of wage and salary workers. The 1951 distribution of earnings was as follows, with the corresponding 1941 figure in brackets: less than \$500, 12 p.c. (34 p.c.); \$500-\$999, 11 p.c. (29 p.c.); \$1,000-\$1,999, 33 p.c. (30 p.c.); \$2,000-\$2,999, 31 p.c. (5 p.c.); \$3,000-\$3,999, 9 p.c. (1 p.c.); \$4,000 and over, 4 p.c. (1 p.c.).

8. The Canadian Family

The number of families in Canada at the 1951 Census was 3,287,384. This represents a 30 p.c. increase over 1941, but excluding Newfoundland the increase was 27 p.c. The average size of family decreased from 3.9 to 3.7 persons over the same period. The average size of rural farm families was 4.4 persons, rural non-farm 3.9 persons, and urban 3.5 persons. In the census only husband and wife, and unmarried children are included in the family group.

In about 90 p.c. of all families, the family head was also head of the household. Some 320,645 families, or about 10 p.c., were living as relatives or lodgers in the households of other persons.

There were 2,961,685 families in Canada at the 1951 Census in which the husband and wife were both living at home. The balance (325,699), or about 10 p.c. consisted of 216,641 families with father or mother absent due to widowhood, and 109,058 with one parent absent due to divorce, or separation for social or economic reasons.

Of the total families in 1951, there were 913,767, or 28 p.c. whose heads were under 35 years of age. In the 35-44 age group, there were 822,829 (25 p.c.); in the 45-64 age group, there were 1,124,570 (34 p.c.); while the remaining 426,218 (13 p.c.) were 65 years of age and over.

In 1951 there were 2,737,620 families (or 83 p.c. of all families) with gainfully occupied male heads. Almost 20 p.c. of these heads were engaged in manufacturing occupations; 18 p.c. in agricultural occupations; about 17 p.c. in proprietary and professional occupations; almost 11 p.c. in clerical and commercial occupations; 6 p.c. in unskilled labouring occupations; and the remainder in other occupations.

Only 16 p.c. of all wage-earner heads of families in which husband and wife were both living at home earned less than \$1,500 in 1951, as compared with 69 p.c. in 1941. In the \$3,000 and over earnings group, there were 24 p.c. in 1951, as compared with 4 p.c. in 1941. In the 65 years of age and over group, 36 p.c. earned less than \$1,500 in 1951 as compared with 80 p.c. in 1941, while about 13 p.c. earned \$3,000 or more in 1951, as compared with 4 p.c. in 1941.

Of the children at home in the 15-24 age group, 32 p.c. were at school in 1951, as compared with 27 p.c. in 1941, while 54 p.c. were in the labour force in 1951 as compared with 49 p.c. in 1941.

9. Housing in Canada

There were 3,409,295 occupied dwellings in Canada in 1951, of which 2,275,615 were single houses and 885,565 apartments and flats. This represented a 32 p.c. increase in all dwellings since 1941 — or 29.7 p.c. if Newfoundland be excluded. The percentage of owner-occupied dwellings increased from 57 p.c. in 1941 to 65 p.c. in 1951.

The average number of persons per dwelling in 1951 was 4.07 persons, as compared with 4.47 in 1941. This continues a downward trend going back at least to 1881 when the average was 5.76.

Of the 3,409,295 heads of households in Canada in 1951, 837,215 were 60 years of age or older. About 77 p.c. of these were home owners, compared with 62 p.c. in the case of household heads under 60.

Approximately 421,000 persons, or 3 p.c. of the population, were living in hotels (exclusive of transients), large lodging houses, various types of institutions, or camps at the time of the 1951 Census.

Of the 833,000 rented dwellings in urban Canada in 1941, 44.3 p.c. reported a monthly rent of less than \$20, while only 6.0 p.c. reported a rent of \$50 or higher. Corresponding figures for the 945,000 such dwellings in 1951 were 14.7 and 26.5 p.c. respectively.

In urban Canada, 385,185 heads of households, or 26.3 p.c. of the total wage and salary earner

heads, reported earnings of less than \$2,000, whereas 398,155, or 27.2 p.c. reported earnings of \$3,000 or higher.

For census purposes, a dwelling is considered crowded if the number of persons exceeds the number of rooms. Based on this standard, almost one-third of Canada's population were living in crowded dwellings in 1951, and were occupying about one-fifth of the total number of dwellings.

In 1951, 6.7 p.c. of the households in Canada contained two or more families. Among the cities of 100,000 population, 10.5 p.c. of the households were of this type.

A rising standard of living during the 1941-51 decade is indicated by housing statistics. In urban Canada, the percentage of dwellings in need of major repair fell from 20 in 1941 to 9.5 in 1951. The percentage of households with various conveniences increased sharply; for example, those with electric or gas refrigerators rose from 31.2 p.c. in 1941 to 59.4 p.c. in 1951. A considerable improvement in the provision of indoor plumbing facilities during 1941-51 is also indicated. The percentage of homes in 1951 with such facilities was as follows (1941 figures in brackets): (a) inside running water—75 (60); (b) flush toilet—69 (56); (c) installed bathtub or shower—62 (49).

In 1951, 49 per cent of Canada's homes were furnace-heated, compared with 39 per cent in 1941. The number of homes using wood as the principal fuel dropped from 1,185,000 in 1941 to 921,000 in 1951, whereas the number relying on fuel oil increased sharply from 67,000 to 768,000. Homes heated by gas showed a more moderate increase from 87,000 to 163,000. The proportion of coal-heated homes remained constant over the decade.

10. Population Projections—1961-1971

According to recent DBS population projections, the population of Canada will reach 17,500,000 to 18,500,000 by 1961, provided current immigration and birth rates are maintained. Taking the mid-point figure of 18,000,000 as a total, about 7,000,000 or 39 p.c. would be under 20, 8,800,000 or 49 p.c., 20-59 years of age, and 2,200,000 or 12 p.c., over 60 years of age. The corresponding total for 1971 will be 21,000,000 to 24,000,000, divided into the same age groups in proportions of 39 p.c., 49 p.c. and 12 p.c. At the 1951 Census the population was divided 38 p.c., 51 p.c. and 11 p.c.

In total this means a greater increase of population than has been recorded in recent times, and can be attained only if conditions remain favourable. However, even under less favourable conditions, a population of only half a million fewer than the lower figures above can be expected. The notable feature about the composition is the increase in the proportion of persons over 60, due to the long-term decline in the death rate.


Chart 9 - Percentage distributions for males and females each add to 100 p.c.

CANADA. 1901-1951



GROWTH OF POPULATION AND NATURAL INCREASE, 1941-1951, BY PROVINCES, BASED ON 1941 POPULATIONS









PERCENTAGE OF POPULATION RURAL FARM, RURAL NON-FARM AND URBAN, BY PROVINCES, 1951




**PERCENTAGE INCREASE IN RURAL FARM,

CANADA AND PROVINCES, 1951



CANADA, 1901-1951



IN SELECTED AGE GROUPS, CANADA, 1941-1951






INCREASE OR DECREASE IN THE POPULATION OF CANADA BY QUINQUENNIAL AGE GROUPS 1941-1951




PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION OF THE POPULATION
BY MARITAL STATUS AND SEX, CANADA, 1951




PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION OF THE POPULATION

CANADA, 1891, 1911-1951




PERCENTAGE OF THE POPULATION

CANADA 1871-1951




**PERCENTAGE OF THE POPULATION

CANADA, RURAL AND URBAN, 1951




MEDIAN YEARS OF SCHOOLING

CANADA AND PROVINCES, 1951




PERCENTAGE OF IMMIGRANTS BY BIRTHPLACE




**PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION BY PROVINCES

BY BIRTHPLACE**




PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION OF MALE AND FEMALE LABOUR FORCE
IN CERTAIN OCCUPATION GROUPS, CANADA, 1901-1951




ESTIMATES OF THE CANADIAN LABOUR FORCE 14 YEARS AND OVER,
AND MAIN COMPONENTS, JUNE 1, 1921-1953




HOUSEHOLDS AND FAMILIES BY AGE OF HEAD,

RURAL NON-FARM AND URBAN, 1951**




**PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION OF FAMILIES BY NUMBER

RURAL NON-FARM AND URBAN, 1951**




**PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION OF CHILDREN 15-24 YEARS OF AGE

CANADA, 1941-1951**






**PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION OF OCCUPIED

 AND CENSUS METROPOLITAN AREAS, 1951



AND LIVING CONVENiences, CANADA, 1941 AND 1951



PERCENT DISTRIBUTION OF ESTIMATED TOTAL EXPENDITURES* BY TYPE OF SERVICE



AVERAGE DAYS OF ILLNESS PER PERSON PER YEAR



AND POPULATION OF CHILDREN 7 TO 16 YEARS OF AGE



SEASONAL TRENDS IN JUVENILE DELINQUENCY



AVERAGE BIRTHS PER 1,000 OF POPULATION FOR CANADA






AVERAGE MARRIAGES PER 1,000 OF POPULATION FOR CANADA

FOR CANADA, BY AGE GROUPS




FAMILY ALLOWANCES, NUMBER OF CHILDREN IN PAY
