REPORT OF THE DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT GENERAL

SIR, - I have the honour to submit the report of the Department of Indian Affairs for the year ended March 31, 1931.

In the following pages will be found a brief outline of the more important administrative activities of the department during the period under review.

As was inevitable, the Indians, in common with other members of the community, are suffering from the present depression with its attendant unemployment and low prices for agricultural and other products. On the whole, however, it may be said that the change for the worse in their economic position is relatively less marked than among the white population, as they live for the most part on reserves in isolated communities, and are free from taxation. In the majority of cases, moreover, Indians own their habitations free from encumbrance and do not pay rent. Education and medical attendance are provided for them by the Government. Thus their absolutely necessary expenses are practically reduced to food and clothing.

The reaction of the Indians to economic changes varies with their geographical situation and vocation. Administrative control of the Indian problem, however, is central and unified for all the Indians of the Dominion. This department performs for the Indians all services which, in white communities are performed by the municipalities and the province. The department is in the same position with respect to destitution and sickness among the Indians throughout the Dominion as that occupied by the municipalities in white communities. An amount estimated to be sufficient to provide relief for Indians is voted by Parliament each fiscal year. The amount thus voted for the current fiscal year, 1931 - 32, was \$866,300. This shows an increase of \$85,500 as compared with the previous year.

In the long settled parts of the country, such as the Maritime Provinces and older Ontario and Quebec, the Indians on the reserves are in close contact with the community at large, many of them earning their living as mechanics, labourers, industrial employees, and so on. Lack of employment has affected this class of Indian severely, and the department is obliged to provide for many of them by direct relief. Wherever opportunity offers, however, the department provides work for such Indians in connection with road repairs, ditch digging, building operations and other necessary activities on reserves.

Ever since Confederation it has been the definite aim of the Government to make the Indians self-supporting. This policy has met with remarkable success, particularly in the Prairie Provinces. Following the disappearance of the buffalo, upwards of half a century ago, these Indians were destitute and dependent upon the Government for their maintenance. To-day they are self-supporting as a people and the percentage of destitution among them is very low. This has been accomplished by an intensive plan of agricultural assistance and instruction. Even in the present year reports indicate that these Indians are in good circumstances, and indeed better off than many of their white neighbours. Unlike many white farmers, the Indians have no taxes to pay, and furthermore, they have received generous help by way of implements, breeding stock, etc., which have been supplied to them by the Government.

In British Columbia the Indian population is largely engaged in fishing, and the lag in the fishing industry has deprived many of them of their means of livelihood. The problem of the hunting and fishing Indians dwelling in more remote districts, particularly in northern Ontario and northern Quebec, is one of the most serious which confronts the department. Lack of employment in other fields has driven the white man in increasing numbers into Indian territory. Only recently we have had reports of white trappers being landed by aeroplane in northern Ontario and Quebec in hunting grounds formerly used by Indians only. Add to this that fur is scarce and prices are low, and that there is less employment guiding sportsmen than in former seasons, and it will be seen that the position of these Indians is precarious. The department, however, is taking special measures this fall on their behalf, with a view to restoring them to their former economic independence. A special emergency hunting ration is being issued to them, consisting of ammunition, twine for nets and snares, and certain staple foods. This ration is given to the Indians with the understanding that they must go back into the bush and hunt and not loiter about the posts and railway lines looking for charity.

Many Indians throughout the Dominion in past years have made a comfortable living from the sale of native wares, such as baskets and moccasins, also lacrosse sticks, hockey sticks, axe handles, etc., and other articles in the making of which they are adept. The market for all these things at the present time is particularly bad, thus adding another group of formerly self-supporting Indians to the department's relief list.

By methods such as have been outlined above the department is endeavouring to carry the Indians through the period of depression with as little indigency as possible, but is prepared to give direct relief wherever that course is necessary to prevent actual distress.

INDIAN HEALTH SUPERVISION

The year under review has not been marked by any substantial extension of health activities, nor by any unusual occurrences, except in the field of eye disease. There has been no epidemic of major communicable disease. Officers in the field are becoming commendably prompt in reporting outbreaks and in enforcing quarantine and other measures for the suppression of outbreaks before they reach the epidemic stage. A thoroughgoing campaign of vaccination gainst smallpox is being carried on in Indian schools, and it is anticipated that the rising generation of Indians will be effectively protected against this disease.

TRACHOMA

In the summer of 1930 a survey of eye diseases among the Indians of the Prairie Provinces and British Columbia was carried out at the department's request by a specialist of more than ordinary experience along this line. The intention was to ascertain whether the Indians of these areas were affected by trachoma, and if so, to what extent. Widely varying opinions on the matter had been recorded, and it was desired to secure definite and accurate information. The specialist's report was disturbing. Trachoma is prevalent among the Indians of Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia, and exists to some extent in Manitoba. It is a chronic, communicable disease of the eye, probably favoured in its course by poor living conditions, shows no tendency toward self-cure, and leads to blindness in a substantial proportion of its victims. It is prevalent in Europe, and its presence in a candidate for immigration to Canada is sufficient to cause his absolute rejection. It exists to some extent among the foreign born populations of Western Canada and the provincial governments are taking measures to combat it among white residents.

One of the more serious aspects of this situation is that trachoma is prevalent in some of the Department's residential schools, several of which recruit pupils from wide areas. There is a definite danger that children from reserves where trachoma does not exist may contract it and take it back to their homes.

The average physician is not familiar with trachoma, either as to diagnosis or treatment. Many Canadian eye specialists do not profess to be skilled in it. The problem is one of exceptional importance, both to Indians and the white population. The department cannot see an immediate satisfactory solution of it. Instructions are being issued for preventive treatment of residential school pupils, but it is recognized that much more vigorous measures are require. At the very least one travelling high clinic should be set up to instruct local health personnel in the prevention and treatment of this disease. The situation cannot be expected to improve of its own accord, but rather to grow more difficult and the final solution more costly.

TUBERCULOSIS

As time passes and experience accumulates it appears to the department that there are two fairly distinct classes of Indians, from the standpoint of tuberculosis. In the first place there are the bands in agricultural and industrial districts, living in a white environment, comparatively well fed and housed, and so far as the younger people at least are concerned, possessed of a fair degree of education. Many of these bands are showing a very definite increase in resistance to the disease, and the most healthy of them are not remarkably more tuberculous than the population at large. It would not be impossible to practically stamp out tuberculosis on several reserves, and the measures required to this end would not be unduly costly. In the second class fall the more remote Indians, and those living where economic conditions are unfavourable. These people are comparatively, and in many instances positively, undernourished, ill-housed and uninstructed. Their mode of life is precarious, and involves a good deal of hardship and exposure. Their means of subsistence has diminished of late years, owing to the scarcity and low price of furs and lessened opportunity for casual labour. Increased relief tends to lessen their dependence on themselves, and school education may by no means make them more fitted to earn a living in the only way open to them. In this group are included practically all of the Indians north of the railways, in British Columbia the greater part of the Indians of the interior, and in Ontario all those living in the area north of the Great Lakes. These bands are not showing any satisfactory tendency towards increased resistance to tuberculosis, and their location and manner of life makes it difficult, if not impossible, for the Department to give them effective aid in this respect.

It is more than possible that many of the northern districts are now overpopulated. In the first quarter of this century fur prices were high; the department and the various missionary societies rapidly extended philanthropic effort among the Indians, health work was promoted, and as a consequence the Indians increased quite rapidly. During the past few years fur has become scarce, the price has fallen, the forest has been invaded by white trappers, and the increased populations are quite probably more than the country can support at any reasonable level of life. It would appear that, for a time at least, there is not much hope of improvement in their condition. Perhaps the most useful measures towards their relief, from the standpoint of health, are those directed towards conserving for their use the greatest possible areas of trapping country, and toward teaching them to live on such products as the districts in which they live can be made to provide. It may be that an actual decrease is these bands in inevitable, and some of them may be reduced to remnants of their present numbers.

Maintenance of one patient in sanatorium for one year costs approximately \$1,000. It is estimated that there are 5,000 Indians in Canada suffering from active tuberculosis, and capable of transmitting the disease to other people. It is apparent that an appropriation of less than \$150,000 cannot be expected to have much effect on the problem at large, if expended for the usual purpose of isolating active cases in hospitals and sanatoria. The department has plans prepared for attacking this disease more effectively, but has not at present the financial means to carry them into effect. The remedy is in the hands of the public, which, in the last analysis, has to suffer the menace of tuberculous groups within its more healthy communities.

The expenditure on Indian health during the year under review amounted roughly to \$1,000,000, or to just under \$10 for each Indian. Out of these funds the department provided the salaries and fees of 340 physicians, surgeons and specialists, and of about 40 nurses; the whole maintenance of seven departmental hospitals, and the maintenance of Indian patients in about 200 local hospitals and sanatoria; the control of communicable disease; drug and surgical supplies for the use of practically every band; maintenance of insane Indians; provision of special food for tuberculous Indians at home; transportation of patients to hospital; some dental attention, and, in some degree every other health service which white people are accustomed to provide for themselves or to have provided at the public charge, at a cost estimated at \$311,000,000 per annum in Canada, or an average of about \$31 for each person. Allowing for all additions to expenditure from band funds, and for the private expenditures of Indians on their health, it is obvious that the health service is administered with economy.

The service is administered by an office staff of five persons, receiving total salaries amounting to about \$11,000. The administrative cost is therefore just over one per cent of the amount paid for actual services.

BUILDINGS

Nurses' residences have been provided at the Lady Willingdon Hospital, near Brantford, Ont., and at the Blackfoot Hospital, Gleichen, Alta. A small nursing station has been erected at the Hobbema Agency in Alberta. Assistance has been given toward the building of a hospital in northern British Columbia, operated by a Church Mission, and accommodating many Indian patients, and to a similar hospital in northern Manitoba. Hospital properties in all cases have been maintained, and in some instances improved by the addition of equipment.

SCHOOL HEALTH ACTIVITIES

The care of the health of pupils in Indian residential schools has been carried on as usual and there has been a definite expansion in the efforts made toward improving the condition of pupils in day schools. The removal of defective tonsils, examination of eyes, and other measures designed to assist these children in getting benefit from their school opportunities have been carried out insofar as funds were available. This is very profitable work.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING

This important division of the department's health program is still in process of development. Two Public Health nurses are employed in Ontario and Quebec, one in New Brunswick, one in Nova Scotia, two in the Prairie Provinces, and one in British Columbia. Four of these nurses are university graduates in public health. In addition many nurses are employed in departmental hospitals, nursing stations, residential schools, and in co-operation with mission stations,

the provincial governments and the Victorian Order of Nurses. The department looks upon this service as of first-rate importance, and considers its personnel to be of as good quality as any in the country. The service is being developed slowly and cautiously with a view to maintaining it at a high standard.

EDUCATION

The educational work of the department is increasingly important. There were in operation during the year 80 residential and 272 day schools; or 2 more residential schools than the previous year, and the same number of day schools. The enrolment increased from 15,743 to 16,415, and the average attendance, which is the important figure, from 11,579 to 12,231, an increase in one year 5.63 per cent. Further, pupils were more regular in attendance during 1930 - 31, the figure being 74.51 per cent of the enrolment as compared with 73.55 per cent for the previous year.

It may be of interest to briefly review the progress in Indian education during the past fifty years. The following table, with percentage increases for each decennial period, indicates the increasing importance of the work and shows that a very satisfactory step forward has been taken during the past ten years: -

Particularly gratifying is the improvement in the attendance regularity during the past decade. From 64.29 per cent to 74.51 per cent shows a remarkable awakening on the part of Indian communities and parents. In 1920, compulsory education of Indian children was provided by statute, and the Act is enforced, particularly when supported by the opinion of the most progressive Indians on a reserve. However, the main reason for improvement in attendance at Indian schools is a growing conviction on the part of our wards that their children must be better fitted for the future. Fewer and fewer natives are finding it possible to live by the chase and they are turning towards education to prepare themselves for encroaching civilization.

Those somewhat familiar with the educational work of the department and the churches may argue that the rapid increase in residential school attendance, which is naturally quite regular, is largely responsible for this improvement. It should be stated that the residential school percentages of attendance have always been good and that practically the entire credit is with the pupils of day schools, who come so largely under the influence of their parents. The following tables show the residential and day schools separately for the past forty years. Earlier figures, distinguishing between the two types of school, are not available and are not so valuable for purposes of comparison, as the work was hardly well established. As far as the residential schools are concerned, the figures for 1901 are really the first that should be considered. It will be noted that the percentage of attendance at residential schools has been quite constant for 30 years and that the improvement lies entirely with the day schools. In fact, for the past 10 years, the percentage of attendance for day schools has increased from 50.56 to 61.90 - a greater improvement than that of all schools taken together.

The percentage of attendance at rural and village public schools in Canada is approximately 69. At Indian day schools, the figure is nearly 62, which, while encouraging, leaves much room for improvement. However, it should be remembered that the department's wards are among the most nomadic of Canadians.

It may be of interest to analyze the attendance to show the figures for those provinces where there are a sufficient number of day schools to permit comparison. Residential schools are not included in this table. The figures show the gain in average attendance during the past ten years and the increase in percentage of attendance or regularity for the same period. In the provinces not mentioned, there are only two or three day schools and comparisons would not be of value.

During the year, there was a change made in the compulsory education clause in the Indian Act. It is now possible to compel the attendance of every physically fit Indian child between the full ages of 7 and 16 years, and, in very special cases, the Superintendent General may direct that a pupil be kept in school until he has reached the full age of 18 years. The usual practice at Indian residential schools is to encourage pupils to remain until they are 17 or 18.

In Part II of this report will be found tabular statements, showing the location, naming those in charge and indicating the enrolment and attendance at all Indian schools. Day schools on reserves, where our wards are permanently settled, quite properly are becoming increasingly important. Special efforts have been made during the year to increase the efficiency at those day schools where there is a large average attendance. Better qualified teachers are being engaged and modern texts and other instruments of instruction are being placed in their hands.

Generally speaking, residential schools enjoyed a particularly successful y on vocational training, religious	ear. At these institutions, emphasis is placed

instruction and the care of health. The various churches, as shown hereunder, co-operate with the department in the residential school activity, to the advantage of all concerned.

Indian schools follow the provincial curricula, but special emphasis is placed on language, reading, domestic science, manual training and agriculture. Frequent inspections are made by officers of the department. In addition, public and separate school inspectors visit all classrooms, except in the provinces of New Brunswick and British Columbia, where there are special Indian school inspectors.

During the year new main buildings were completed at four residential schools - Brandon, Man. (Brandon); Punnichy, Sask. (Gordon's); Gleichen, Alta. (Old Suns); and Grouard, Alta. (St. Bruno's). The buildings at the Birtle Indian Residential School in Manitoba; the Muscowequan Indian Residential School in Saskatchewan, and the Blue Quills Indian Residential School in Alberta had outlived their usefulness, and reconstruction was commenced during the year. There was also started a new main building at the Beauval Indian Residential School in Saskatchewan, the old buildings of which had been destroyed by fire in 1927. Grants were given to the church authorities towards the cost of important improvements at the Albany Indian Residential School, on James bay, and the Providence Indian Residential School in the Northwest Territories. Minor improvements were undertaken at several other residential schools, and new classrooms were erected at a few day schools, where the work was well established.

The practice of assisting the most promising and industrious graduates of Indian schools was continued. Approximately 260 young Indian men and women were helped to continue their studies or to establish homes. Except in those Indian communities where successful farming is found, the school graduate presents a problem which is very difficult of solution. The department and the churches interested are trying new schemes and searching for better methods of helping the young people to establish themselves.

The expenditure for Indian education for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1931, amounting to \$2,754,395.47, is analyzed in the following table. In addition to this amount, there was expended for educational purposes from a special appropriation for British Columbia Indians the sum of \$14,527.03. This last amount was used for technical training at British Columbia Indian schools and in assisting promising graduates to continue their studies.

LANDS AND TIMBER

LANDS

The general depression which existed during the fiscal year ended March 31, 1931, had a very noticeable effect upon the sales of Indian lands and the collections of payments on account of previous sales. The Indian lands in Western Canada were particularly adversely affected, and it was impossible, except in a few instances, to collect instalments as they fell due. The sales of surrendered Indian lands were similarly affected, and comparatively few new sales were made.

PETROLEUM AND NATURAL GAS

During the year considerable interest continued to be shown in prospective development on the Blood reserve, in the province of Alberta. Owing to business and financial depression a number of lessees relinquished their leases, being unwilling to make further rental payments, but one of the larger lessees continued active investigational and exploratory work, and it is expected that a deep test well will probably be drilled some time during the ensuing year. There has been very little interest exhibited during the year in prospective development on either the Stony or the Sarcee reserves, and the leases issued during the last year or two, covering portions of these reserves, have been permitted to lapse.

LEASES

Under the provisions of section 11 of the Regulations for the Disposal of Indian Lands leases were issued to white men at the request of Indian locatees to the number of 119, and on March 31 last there were 1,325 leases current.

LOCATION TICKETS

Location tickets, granting title under the provisions of the Indian Act, to individual owners for lands on the reserves were issued during the past year to the number of 181, and on March 31 last there were current 2,747 location tickets.

ENFRANCHISEMENT

Under the provisions of section 114 of the Indian Act there were carried out during the past fiscal year twenty enfranchisements, the total number of men, women and children enfranchised being 53.

LAND PATENTS

During the fiscal year 1930 - 31 there were issued 268 patents to Indian lands purchased and paid for in full.

TIMBER

The quantity of timber cut for sale from Indian reserves in the Dominion during the 1930 - 31 season was considerably less than during the previous year. Depressed market conditions precluded profitable logging, but the necessity for winter employment prompted the department to waive collection of dues in many cases as a measure of relief. The kinds and quantities of timber cut were as follows: -

There were 21 timber licences current on April 30, 1931, being 2 less than the previous year, 2 having been

relinquished, 2 cancelled and 2 new licences having been issued.

Owing to the unusual dry season last year, no less than 26 forest fires were reported, and the sum of \$5,569.72 was expended in extinguishing the same. Loss of timber by fire did not, however, exceed in value the sum of \$1,600.

BRIDGES, DRAINAGE SYSTEMS, ELECTRIC LIGHTING PLANTS, ROADS, SEWERAGE SYSTEMS, WATER WORK SYSTEMS, AND WHARVES

The following engineering works have been carried out on the various reserves throughout Canada by the department during the current fiscal year: -

BRIDGES

Repairs were made for the maintenance of bridges on the following reserves: Wikwemikong and Cape Croker, Ont., Casca, B.C., Brokenhead and Rolling River, Man.

DRAINAGE SYSTEMS

Drainage systems for the improving of farm land were installed on the following reserves: Rama, Moravian, Walpole Island, Oneida, and Chippewa, Ont.; Ouiatchouan, P.Q.; and Sydney, N.S.

ELECTRIC LIGHTING PLANTS

Extension of an electric lighting system was installed on the Abenakis Indian reserve, P.Q., and a complete electric lighting plant was installed at Metlakatla reserve, No. 2, B.C.

IRRIGATION SYSTEMS

Irrigation systems were installed and put in a state of repair on the following reserves in British Columbia to improve farming operations which are yearly increasing: Cold Water, Cayuse Creek No. 2, Tahltan, Lytton No. 3, Columbia

Lake, Alkali Lake, Canim No. 1, Fountain No. 3, Botani Lake, Ashcroft No. 1, Cook's Ferry, and Cayuse Creek No. 1.

ROADS

Highways have been constructed under the direct management of the department or in co-operation with the provincial Department of Highways and main roads.have been improved on the following reserves: -

Ontario. - Chippewa, Rice Lake, Manitoulin Island, Tyendinaga, Cape Croker, Alnwick, West Bay, Saugeen, Rama, Shawinaga, Cockburn Island, Nipissing, Six Nations, New Credit, Muncey, Oneida, Golden Lake, Pic River, Walpole Island, Kettle and Stony Point, Sarnia, Fort William, Wikwemikong, Sheshegwaning.

Quebec. - St. Regis, Abenakis, Restigouche, Oka, Bersimis, Maniwaki, Caughnawaga, Doncaster, Ouiatchouan, Seven Island.

Nova Scotia. - Eskasoni, Bear River, Milbrook, Scarsdale, Shubenacadie and Middle River.

New Brunswick. - Tobique, North Devon, Burnt Church.

Manitoba. - Brokenhead and Dog Creek.

British Columbia. - Lillooet, Lytton - Completion of new road on west bank of Fraser river. Stony Creek, Stellaquo, Tachi, Cheslatla, and Fraser Lake.

SEWERAGE SYSTEMS

Abenakis Reserve. - Extension of sewerage system.

North Devon. - Construction of complete sewerage system throughout new Indian village.

WATER WORKS SYSTEMS

Water supply systems were constructed or improved in the following Indian villages for domestic purposes and fire protection: Chekwelp No. 26, Matlakatla, B.C.

A complete water supply system was constructed in the Indian village of North Devon, N.B.

WHARVES

A wharf was constructed on the Walpole Island reserve and repairs were made to a dock at Markosis, B.C.

SURVEYS

During the season of 1930 a great many roadways affecting the Indian reserves throughout the several provinces were established and plans recorded; also a large number of the reserves were affected by power lines, telephone lines and power development.

OUEBEC

A survey was made of the school and church lands at Pierreville and contours established.

The boundaries of the Temiscamingue Indian reserve were re-established.

ONTARIO

The limits of the boarding school lands at Kenora were re-established and posted.

A detailed survey was made of the limits of the Pointe Grondin Indian reserve.

The limits between the Parry Island Indian reserve and lands of the Canadian National Railway were run and posted.

A subdivision was made of Location 34, Rama Indian reserve.

Subdivision of lot 11, Chemong Indian reserve and investigation of ownership of flooded lands at Rice Lake were

made.

A survey to locate the rice beds and a re-subdivision of part of Hiawatha village site, Rice Lake Indian reserve, were made.

Lot 12, concession 4, township of Alnwick, was surveyed for confirmation of title.

A re-subdivision was made of lot 18, concession 2, Alnwick.

Hickory island and three other islands in the Trent river were surveyed.

An investigation, including a survey, was made to determine the lands intended to be covered by Location tickets in lot 26, concession A, Tyendinaga.

The lines between the surrendered and unsurrendered portions of Kettle Point and Stony Point Indian reserves were run and posted.

An investigation and valuation of the lands in the Gibson Indian reserve to be flooded by the Hydro-Power development was made.

In the Walpole Island reserve, lots 124, 129 and 109 Block D; lots 96 and 80, Block C; lot 117, Block E; lots 292, 301 and 290, Block H, were subdivided for Indian occupation.

ALBERTA

A large subdivision was made in the Blood Indian reserve, including township 7, ranges 21, 22 and 23; township 8, ranges 22, 23, 24 and 25; township 9, ranges 22, 23 and 24.

An addition was made to Janvier Indian reserve.

Clear Hills Indian reserve No. 162C was surveyed.

BRITISH COLUMBIA

The west limit of Casa Indian reserve was rectified and an addition made on the North side of the reserve to include Indian houses.

An Indian graveyard was surveyed at Morchuea as lot 5971.

An Indian reserve of 40 acres at Kluachon Lake was surveyed as lot 5972.

An Indian reserve of 141 acres at Spatsizi River was surveyed as lot 5973.

An Indian reserve of 640 acres at Cariboo Hide was surveyed as lot 5975.

An Indian reserve of 1 square mile was laid out at Morchuea Lake as lot 5976.

An Indian reserve of 53 acres was laid out at Hyland's Ranch as lot 5977.

A detailed survey, including a subdivision, was made on the Capilano Indian reserve.

YUKON

Reserves were surveyed at Teslin Post and Nisutlin.

SUMMARY OF INDIAN AFFAIRS BY PROVINCES AND TERRITORIES

The local administration of Indian lands, on the reserves scattered throughout the Dominion, is conducted through the department's agencies, of which there are in all 116. The number of bands included in an agency varies from one to more than thirty. The staff of an agency usually includes various officers, in addition to the agent, such as the medical officer, clerk, farm instructor, field matron, nurse, constable, stockman, etc., according to the special requirements of

the agency in question. At many of the smaller agencies in the older provinces, where the Indians are more advanced, the work is comparatively light, requiring only the services of an agent. The work of the agencies is supervised by the departments inspectors. There are Indian commissioners at Regina and Victoria, acting in a supervisory capacity for the Prairie Provinces and British Columbia respectively.

ONTARIO

Agencies. - The Indian Agency offices in Ontario are located as follows: Brantford, Cape Croker, Chapleau, Chippewa Hill (Saugeen), Christian Island, Deseronto, Fenella (Alnwick), Fort Frances, Gore Bay, Hagersville, Highgate,

Kenora, Longford Mills, Manitowaning, Moose Factory, Muncey, Parry Sound, Peterborough (Rice and Mud lakes), Port Arthur, Port Perry (Scugog), Ruby (Golden Lake), Sarnia, Sault Ste. Marie, Sutton West (Georgina and Snake Island), Sturgeon Falls, Thessalon, and Walpole Island.

Tribal Origin. - The great majority of the Indians of Ontario are Ojibwas, and are of Algonkin stock. The Oneidas of the Thames, the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte, the Mohawks of the Parry Sound district, and the Six Nations of the Grand River, are of Iroquoian stock. There is a band of Pottawattamies at Walpole Island, and Delawares at the Carodoc (Muncey) agency; these are of Algonkin stock.

Occupations. - The Indians in the south-western and central parts of Ontario engage largely in farming. The reserves generally are well suited to this purpose and the activity of the department's field agents has resulted in a steady improvement both in the methods of operation and the results achieved. The success achieved by the returned soldiers of this province has been especially creditable and they are rapidly developing prosperous communities.

During the summer months Indians find a profitable source of income as guides and canoe-men. Many are employed at various industries and trades, while railway and navigation companies employ a large number. As a rule they are excellent bushmen and many find employment in the various lumber camps. There is still an excellent market for snowshoes, canoes, and moccasins, and these are usually manufactured by the older members of the community.

The women also have many sources of income; some are employed as domestics; others support themselves by making baskets and fancy work. In certain districts berry-picking is an important item and furnishes considerable income.

Dwellings. - The great majority of the Ontario Indians have comfortable farmhouses which compare very favourably with those of their white neighbours. Many own houses of brick and stone, although in the outlying and more remote districts the old log houses are in the majority. In the more settled districts the Indians have followed the examples of the whites and both houses and farm buildings are comfortable and of excellent construction.

New Ontario. - In the remote parts of Ontario hunting and fishing are still the chief sources of livelihood. Acting as guides and canoe-men during the summer months adds considerably to their income. While agriculture is not carried on to any extent, most of the bands grow considerable crops of potatoes and vegetables. They are, of necessity, more or less nomadic and consequently live in tents most of the year. This condition will greatly change as civilization progresses.

QUEBEC

Agencies. - The following agencies are included in the province of Quebec: Becancour, Bersimis, Caughnawaga, Gaspe, Lake St. John, Lorette, Maria, Mingan, Oka, River Desert, Restigouche, Seven Islands, St. Augustine, St. Regis, St. Francis, Temiskaming and Viger.

Tribal Origin. - The principal tribes found in Quebec are: Iroquois at Caughnawaga, Lake of the Two Mountains, and St. Regis; the Hurons of Lorette are also of Iroquoian stock; the Montagnais, who are of Algonkin stock, at Bersimis, Mingan, Lake St. John, Seven Islands; the Abenakis, also of Algonkin stock, at Becancour and St. Francis; the Micmacs, also of Algonkin stock, at Maria and Restigouche; and the Malecites, also of Algonkin stock, at Viger.

NOTE - The remarks under the heading "Occupation" for the various provinces apply to normal times and do not indicate conditions during the present year.

Occupations. - In the agricultural districts of the province the Indians are developing a keener interest in farming operations and are making decided progress. In the Gaspe peninsula the Indians find employment in the lumber camps and mills, but on the north shore of the gulf, fishing, hunting and trapping are still the principal sources of income. In the northern part of the province lumbering is the chief pursuit. One of the principal industries of the Indians of Quebec is making baskets, and many of the Indians spend the summer months at the resorts in order to dispose of the baskets, lacrosse sticks, racquets, moccasins, etc., to the tourists. Some of them, particularly in the Saguenay district, act as guides and canoe-men.

Dwellings. - In the older settled districts of the province the Indians own many excellent stone and brick houses. Generally speaking, the buildings are almost all of good construction, comfortable and sanitary. In the more remote districts, where hunting and trapping are still the principal occupations, the Indians necessarily live in tents during the greater part of the year.

The North Shore. - Along the north shore of the gulf of St. Lawrence, the Indians have been taking a marked interest in the fishing industry. At Mingan, Natashkwan, Romaine, St. Augustine and Moisie, the fishing is under departmental supervision. Salmon and cod are the principal marketable fish, and are a source of considerable income to the Indians. The land is not suitable for extensive cultivation, but many of the Indians have very creditable gardens.

NEW BRUNSWICK

Agencies. - There are three agencies in the province of New Brunswick, the Northeastern, located at Richibucto, the Northern located at Perth, and the Southwestern located at Fredericton.

Tribal Origin. - The majority of the Indians of New Brunswick belong to the Micmac race, which is of Algonkin stock. In addition to these there are some bands of Malecites, also of Algonkin stock.

Occupations. - In the Northeast division the Indians are mostly engaged in fishing, hunting and trapping. Some farming is carried on, and the Indians have rather tended to increase their interest in this regard.

The lumbering industry employs quite a large number and the Indians all through the eastern provinces have become very proficient in the lumber camps, on the river drives and in the mills. In the northern division there is less farming carried on, and the Indians during the summer months find employment generally as day labourers. In the Southern division they support themselves chiefly by the manufacture and sale of Indian wares.

NOVA SCOTIA

Agencies. - There are eighteen Indian agencies in the province of Nova Scotia, namely; Yarmouth, Digby, Shelburne, Lunenburg, Annapolis, Kings, Windsor, Shubenacadie, Halifax, Cumberland, Colchester, Pictou, Antigonish, Guysboro, Richmond, Inverness, Victoria, Sydney and Eskasoni.

Tribal Origin. - The Indians of Nova Scotia are of Algonkin stock, and bear the distinctive name of Micmac.

Occupations. - They follow various occupations, but, as a rule, do not confine themselves to any particular one. Many of them cultivate the land with indifferent success, but as there are exceptions in almost every case, so it is with our Indians; a few of them are succeeding very well as farmers. The majority of those living near industrial centres usually work as day labourers. Hunting, trapping, and acting as guides for sportsmen are favourite occupations, more especially with Indians of middle age. Basket-making and the

manufacture of fancy moccasins, etc., are confined mostly to women. A profitable employment among Indians in a few sections of Nova Scotia is the manufacture of hockey sticks.

Dwellings. - With very few exceptions, Indians in Nova Scotia occupy houses of frame construction, well finished on the outside, but unfinished inside. Every settlement, however, has a few comfortable dwellings well finished throughout. Other buildings owned by Indians - barns and storehouses - are mostly of frame construction also.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Agency. - One agency is sufficient for the purposes of the department in this province, as the total Indian population is only 295.

Tribal Origin. - The Indians of this province all belong to the Micmac tribe, which is of Algonkin stock.

Occupations. - But few of the Indians of Prince Edward Island are farmers. The principal industries are basket-making and fishing.

MANITOBA

Agencies. - The following agencies are included in the province of Manitoba: Birtle, Clandeboye, Fisher River, Griswold, Manitowapah, Norway House, Pas, and Portage la Prairie.

Tribal Origin. - The majority of the Indians of Manitoba belong to the Ojibwa race, which is of Algonkin stock. Bands of Swampy Crees are found at the Norway House and Fisher River agencies and in the York Factory district; these are also of Algonkin stock. The Indians located at the Griswold agency are Sioux; there are also Sioux at the Birtle and Portage la Prairie agencies. There is a band of Chipewyans at Fort Churchill; this tribe is of Athapascan stock.

Occupations. - The reserves in Manitoba suitable for extensive agriculture are mainly within the Birtle, Griswold and Portage la Prairie agencies, and generally speaking progress has been satisfactory in recent years.

In the northern agencies the chief occupations are hunting, trapping and fishing. All of the northern Indians are expert guides and canoe-men, and many find employment in this way or with the transport or fur companies.

In the southern and more settled districts many of the younger people seek employment as day labourers, and owing to the high wages, have been fairly prosperous. The Indian women make needle-work, baskets, etc., for which there is a ready market.

Dwellings. - In recent years the Indians have adopted more sanitary methods of living. Their houses are more comfortably furnished and of better construction than formerly. In the north the nomadic life of the Indians does not permit of other than the old-fashioned log house, but even these are being greatly improved and in some cases are being replaced by suitable frame dwellings.

SASKATCHEWAN

Agencies. - The following agencies are included in the province of Saskatchewan: Assiniboine, Battleford, Carlton, Crooked Lake, Duck Lake, File Hills, Ile à la Crosse, Moose Mountain, Onion Lake, Pelly, Qu'Appelle, and Touchwood Hills.

Tribal Origin. - The most numerous tribes among the Saskatchewan Indians are the Ojibwas, Swampy Crees, and Plain Crees, which all belong to the great Algonkin stock. In addition to these, Sioux Indians are found at the Assini -

boine, Moose Mountain, Qu'Appelle and Carlton agencies, and on the Moose Woods reserve. In the Onion Lake agency there is a band of Chipewyans, who are of Athapascan stock. There are also a few Chipewyan Indians in the Ile à la Crosse district.

The principal occupation of the Indians of Saskatchewan is mixed farming and stock-raising. The close supervision which the department has had over these Indians has greatly improved their methods of farming. Most of the Indians are well provided with machinery of good quality. As a rule they have good stock and suitable houses. In the outlying districts, however, hunting and trapping are still the main sources of income and will so remain until civilization encroaches upon the hunting grounds.

Dwellings. - The dwellings of the Indians on the reserves where farming is carried on are now mostly of frame construction. The outbuildings, however, are generally of logs, but even there has been some improvement.

ALBERTA

Agencies. - The following agencies are included in the Province of Alberta: Blackfoot, Blood, Edmonton, Hobbema, Peigan, Saddle Lake, Sarcee, Stony and Lesser Slave Lake.

Tribal Origin. - The Alberta Indians are of Algonkin stock, with the exception of the Sarcees near Calgary and the Beavers and Slaves in the Lesser Slave Lake agency, who are Athapascan; the Paul's band in the Edmonton agency, who are Iroquoian; and the Stonies, who are of Siouan stock. The Algonkin Indians of Alberta are subdivided into Blackfoot nation, comprising the Indians of the Blackfoot, Blood and Peigan agencies; Plain Crees found in the Lesser Slave Lake, Saddle Lake, and Hobbema agencies, and a band of Ojibwas at Moberly Lake, in the Lesser Slave Lake agency.

The principal occupations of the Indians of Alberta are farming and stock-raising. Almost all the reserves in the settled districts of the province have large herds of horses and cattle.

In the northern parts of the province hunting and trapping are still almost the sole source of income; there is practically no farming carried on and the construction of steamers on the Peace and Athabasca rivers, and of the railways to Peace River Crossing and Fort McMurray, have greatly lessened the wages of the Indians with the trading companies and transports.

Dwellings. - In the southern part of the province the dwellings and farm buildings are of excellent construction and quality. Almost all the reserves where extensive farming is carried on boast of up-to-date modern dwellings, comfortable and well constructed. In the northern parts of the province the majority of the Indians continue to follow their primitive nomadic mode of life, and many of them still live in tents and tepees during the greater part of the year.

BRITISH COLUMBIA

Agencies. - The following agencies are included in the Province of British Columbia: Babine, and Upper Skeena, Bella Coola, Cowichan, Kamloops, Kootenay, Kwawkewlth, Lytton, New Westminster, Nicola, Okanagan, Queen Charlotte, Skeena, Stikine, Stuart Lake, Vancouver, West Coast, and Williams Lake.

Tribal Origin. - The Indians of the Bella Coola, Cowichan, Kamloops, Lytton, New Westminster, Vancouver, and Okanagan agencies belong to the Salish tribes. The Kootenay tribe is located in the agency of the same name. The Kwakiutl-Nootka tribe is located at the Kwawkewlth and West Coast agencies; the Haidas, in the Queen Charlotte islands; the Tlingits, in the Stikine; and the Tsimshians in the Skeena agency. The Indians of the Babine, Stuart Lake and Williams Lake agencies belong to the Athapacsan race.

In addition to these there are about 2,500 nomadic Indians in the province who cannot be correctly classified according to linguistic stock or tribal origin.

Occupations. - The occupations of the Indians of British Columbia vary with their habitat. The Indians situated along the coast earn their livelihood principally by fishing. In many instances they own their own motor launches, nets and gear, while others are supplied by the various canneries. Many of the women are also employed in the canneries or in the hop fields, and earn a steady income.

In the inland parts of the province some farming operations are carried on, and particularly in the irrigated districts grain, fruits of all kinds, and vegetables have been raised with success. These Indians have been making marked progress in this regard and are now well equipped with modern machinery.

The Kootenay, Kamloops, Okanagan and New Westminster Indians own large herds of horses and cattle. While the Indians in the northern and remote parts of the province still depend upon hunting and trapping for their livelihood, the agents report a marked improvement in their manner of living.

Dwellings. - Except in the more remote districts, the Indians of British Columbia have built comfortable and modern dwellings and outbuildings. Their progress in this respect has been rapid.

NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

Agencies. - The department has now three agencies in the Northwest Territories, namely, Fort Simpson, Fort Smith, and Fort Resolution.

Tribal Origin. - The principal tribes found in the Far North are the Slave, Hares, Loucheux, Sicannies, Dogribs, Yellow-knives, Chipewyans and Caribou Eaters. All these tribes are of Athapascan stock. There are a few Crees in the neighbourhood of Chipewyan. These are of Algonkin stock. The most northerly tribes are the Takudah, who extend to the Mackenzie Delta; and the Copper Mines, who are located along the Coppermine river. The territory occupied by these two last-named tribes is contiguous to that inhabited by the Eskimos.

These Indians depend entirely upon hunting and trapping for a livelihood.

Occupations. - A few have been induced to raise small plots of potatoes. They own no horses or cattle, transportation being almost entirely by canoe along the great waterways, or by dogs in winter. They catch and preserve large quantities of whitefish for their own use and for consumption by their dog-trains in winter.

YUKON

Tribal Origin. - The Forty-Mile, Blackstone, and Moosehide bands belong to the Takudah tribe. There is a band of Slavies at Lancing Creek who migrated from Fort Good Hope on the Mackenzie river; another band of Slavies, called Nahanies, is located at the headwaters of the Pelly river. All these Indians are of Athapascan stock. At Mayo, Selkirk, Little Salmon and Carmacks there are bands belonging to the tribe known as Stick Indians. Bands belonging to the Tlingit tribe are found at Whitehorse, Teslin Lake, Champagne Landing, and Carcross.

Occupation. - Hunting, trapping and fishing are the chief occupations of the Yukon Indians, and they have been fairly successful during the past year, The women also derive some revenue from the sale of moccasins and curios of various kinds, while the men are expert at making toboggans and snowshoes, Practically no farming is carried on owing to climatic conditions, but some of the Indians cultivate patches of potatoes and other vegetables.

FINANCIAL

At the close of the twelve months ended March 31, 1931, capital of the Indian Trust Fund, which at the end of the preceding year amounted to \$13,856,521.04, had decreased to \$13,764,581.06.

The amounts expended from the Consolidated Revenue Fund were as follows: Voted by Parliament for the purposes of the department, \$4,644,076.26, and annuities by statute, \$22,143.

On March 31, 1931, the balance to the credit of the Indian Savings Account for the funding of the annuities and earnings of pupils at industrial schools was \$217,752.59. Deposits and interest during the twelve months aggregated \$44,613.44, and withdrawals \$46,831.27.

GENERAL

The principal outstanding on account of Indian lands sold amounted to \$1,592,385.39, a considerable portion of which has not yet become due.
