Dear Reader: February, 1971.

The need for a comprehensive inventory of programs and services available to Canada's Indian people has been recognized and efforts are underway to satisfy this need.

This is a large task and the initial phase has been to determine and pursue information needs about the programs and services available to Indian people through the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development. The second and third phases will be to expand and refine the material obtained in the initial phase and to secure information on programs and services provided by other agencies both public and private, federal and provincial.

The information obtained so far has been produced in a series of three basic reports - one for each of the Department's activities in Community Affairs, Economic Development and Education. There are seven sets of three - one for each Region. Each report, in its final form, will form a source of information on all relevant programs and services available to native people. Inside the Department it could form a link to communicate policy, procedures and operational variations. It would also provide a useful body of information required in briefing and training of staff. The information will also be used as basic data for public presentations.

This report presents the results of initial efforts to satisfy the above-mentioned information needs derived from discussions with activity specialists. The information is not final, complete, or up-to-date. Before using any of the information for public purposes, it is being distributed to our staff to obtain their suggestions for changes. Any resulting amendments will be forwarded as revisions, which can be inserted with ease because of the loose-leaf format.

Your comments are invited at any time; however, any information received by July 1, 1971, could be included in the material made available for public purposes.

	After 1871, most Indian treaties contained a commitment "to maintain schools for instruction on the reservewhenever the Indians of the reserve shall desire it" or "to make such provision as may from time to time be deemed adviseable for the education of the Indian children". As a result of such provisions and their interpretation, until the end of the second World War education for the Indian was, in effect, education in isolation.					
	During this period, schools and hostles for Indian children were established, but scant attention was paid to developing a curriculum geare to either their language difficulties or their sociological needs. A few Indian bands established schools for their children on the reserves, but the majority of them had neither the financial nor leadership resources to establish and operate their own schools. Provincial governments were too preoccupied with their own priorities to become involved in Indian education. Missionaries provided a modicum of services, but their 'noble savage' philosophy e fectively

B.1.a. History (Cont'd)  A librarian was hired from 1960-1964, to take books to various Indian communities. In 1967/68 an expanded program of library development was launched. With the cooperation of provincial library agencies and officials, arrangements were made for Indian bands to be included in regional public library systems in the Maritimes, Quebec, Ontario and Saskatchewan. In each case, the band was required to take the initiative in requesting library service, and to contribute a minimum of 10 cents per capita per annum towards this service. The Department, on application, provided a grant of \$1.00 per capita to the band from the Grants to Bend Fund (Development Directorate) and these combined funds enabled the Indian band to join the regional or county library in its area, similar to other communities.  In the summer of 1967, a pilot project was launched in which five Indian, university students were employed in on-the-job training programs at regional and provincial libraries to give them an opportunity to explore careers in library services and to carry out field work with Indian bands. The program was expanded the following year, and 20-30 Indian, university students were employed in public libraries where their Indian backgrounds were an asset in the development of services to their own people.  One band in Ontario and five bands in Saskatchewan had contracted for library services from regional libraries by 1968, and several other contracts were under negotiation. Changes were also being considered in provincial legislation in Manitoba, Alberta and British Columbia so that library services might be made available to Indian Bands.
