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This volume attempts to provide a description of federal programs and services available to Indian people. The material does not deal with national programs of universal application to which Indian people have access in the same manner and conditions as other Canadian citizens, such as unemployment insurance, family allowance, etc. In addition, financial expenditure information, where available, is provided for each program. In the tables a zero entry refers to nil expenditure while a 'blank' means that information is not available. Totals may not add due to rounding.

At this stage, the material is not as complete as might be desirable and as such will be the subject of on-going review and modification. Similar volumes are now available for all other provinces in Canada.

This volume was prepared from the combined inputs of regional office and headquarters staff of the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development. The work was co-ordinated by Intergovernmental Affairs Branch in Ottawa and any questions, comments, or additional information concerning of this volume or other provincial volumes is welcomed and should be directed to the following address:

A. Social Services

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Program: Social Services

Sub-program: Social Assistance

Province: Nova Scotia

Services Available: Assistance in cash or in kind to meet the costs of food, clothing, shelter, fuel, utilities, household and personal supplies, items incidental to carrying on a trade or other employment and other items of special need.

Eligibility: Indian persons in need, namely persons who by reason of inability to obtain employment, loss of principal breadwinner, illness, disability, age or other cause are unable to provide adequately for themselves, or for their dependents.

Eligibility is based on a needs test which measures a person's budgetary requirements and the income and/or resources available to meet these. Certain non-Indians on-reserve may also be eligible.

Mode of Delivery: On-reserve - by DIAND or by band staff.

Off-reserve - by municipal government with reimbursement of full costs by DIAND on behalf of Indian persons who have not met provincial requirements for legal residence. - by the provincial government without reimbursement for those persons eligible for provincial social assistance under the Family Benefits Act. Indians living either on or off-reserve receive provincial social assistance if they qualify for assistance under the Provincial Social Assistance Regulations.

Responsibility
for Delivery:

On-reserve - DIAND.
Off-reserve - the province.

Indian Input:

The program authorized by Treasury Board is based on the rates and practices of the Nova Scotia provincial program so that Indian people have little input other than that provided by reason of delivery by bands. Bands are also expected to meet certain conditions in accounting for funds, eligibility criteria, etc.

Variations from
Established Policy:

The provincial requirement of legal residence of an Indian applicant for social assistance is, in our opinion, contrary to clause (d) of sub-section (2) of section 6 of the Canada Assistance Plan under which Nova Scotia receives from Canada 50% of the costs of welfare assistance and services provided to other residents.

Authority:

Appropriations Act - Vote 5 - "... contributions and special payments for general assistance to Indians and Inuit including such payments in respect of social assistance to non-Indians residing on Indian reserves...".

Program: Social Services

Sub-program: Rehabilitation

Province: Nova Scotia

Services Available: The services available are essentially those directed at the prevention and treatment of abuse of alcohol and other drugs and rehabilitation of persons with problems related to the abuse of alcohol. Specific services include education programs to provide information about the effects of alcohol abuse and ways to prevent it, detoxification, in-patient treatment centres and counselling. In the Maritimes the three provinces operate separately; most projects emphasize education and counselling services.

Eligibility: In order to receive funding under the program a project must be directed at one or more of the aspects of prevention, treatment and rehabilitation and must be designed and operated by Indian people. The services are directed primarily at persons on-reserve and the projects themselves define the eligibility of persons for service.

Mode of Delivery: As the program is funded on a 50/50 basis by DIAND and NHW, the program is operated jointly by the two departments by means of national and regional boards on which both departments, as well as the Indian associations are represented. Provinces are also represented on the regional boards. Services are delivered to individual clients by projects staff (as noted projects are designed and directed by Indian people).

Responsibility for Delivery: DIAND and NHW and by individual projects where these have been approved and funded by the two departments.

Indian Input: As noted the major native organizations are represented on the national and regional boards and projects are designed and operated by Indian people.

Variations from Established Policy: None known

Authority: On December 31, 1974, the Social Policy Committee of Cabinet approved the program for a three-year trial period ending March 31, 1978.

Participation by Other Agencies: NHW, Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Boards of directors of projects (in some cases they are chiefs and councils).

Other Comments: The program has been evaluated and a submission concerning its future will be made before the end of December.

Availability of Documents: The Evaluation Report and the discussion paper on the future of the program are available at headquarters.

History: Established in 1975 and intended to be for a three-year period; funded jointly by National Health and Welfare and DIAND.

Program: Social Services

Sub-program: Child Welfare

Province: Nova Scotia

Services Available: The main service available is the protection of children from neglect and abuse by parents, guardians or other persons in whose charge they may be. Complaints are investigated and, if in the opinion of the child welfare agency, neglect or abuse or potential neglect or abuse exists, then a number of courses of action are possible, namely: (a) counselling of parents and/or provision of other support such as homemakers services to the family to help it improve the situation, (b) removal of the child for a temporary period with the consent of the parents and, (c) removal of the child with or without the consent of the parents. If the last named action is taken then within a specified period the child must be brought before a judge of the Family Court and evidence presented as to the abuse or neglect. If the judge finds that the child is in fact abused or neglected, he/she may then be made a ward of the Children's Aid Society (or the Minister of Social Services as the case may be) for a temporary period, or until the child reaches the age of majority. The child will remain in the care of the Society until the parents are able to provide a suitable home for him/her. During the period of wardship, the Society (or the director of Child Welfare) exercises all the powers of legal guardian. Where a child has been removed from his/her home, then alternative care must be provided; this may be foster home, group home, or institutional care.

Children may be placed for adoption without the consent of their parents. Thus the finding of adoption homes and supervision of adoption placements are among the services available as are counselling of unmarried parents with related services. In brief, services available are: family services, guardianship and placement of children, roster and adoption home finding and counselling of unmarried parents.

Eligibility:

Basically children in their own homes who are in need of protection and children in care for whom placements must be found and supervised. Neglect is defined in the Child Welfare Act and a child is defined as a person under the age of 16 years. Unmarried parents, foster parents and adoptive parents are eligible for service. Natural parents are also provided services while their children are in the care of the Children's Aid Society.

Mode of Delivery:

Each of the Indian communities within the geographic area served by the child caring agencies established, under the Child Welfare Legislation of Nova Scotia receives a full range of Child Welfare services from the agency in whose area it is situated by reason of a Canada/provincial agreement, be it verbal or written.

Responsibility for Delivery:

The provinces, by virtue of Section 92 (7) of the BNA Act. Because of Section 91 (24) of the BNA Act, however, the provinces consider Canada to have responsibility and, notwithstanding Section 88 of the Indian Act, will extend services only if special cost-sharing arrangements are developed.

Indian Input: Based on provincial rates and practices.

Authority: Appropriations Act - Vote 5.

Participation by Other Agencies: As indicated, the province and the Children's Aid societies are involved. Medical Services Branch of NHW meets some needs of medical care of children placed by Child Care agencies and the province.

Program: Social Services

Sub-program: Adult Care

Province: Nova Scotia

Objective and Services Available: The objective of the program is to assist in the maintenance and care of dependent adults in adult care facilities providing personal care, intermediate care and private hospital nursing home care. Financial assistance is granted if income or categorical allowances are insufficient to pay the costs involved in the Adult Care Placement. In addition, the following services are provided: counselling, referral, alternative arrangement services, placement services, provision of comfort, clothing and allowances.

Eligibility: Entitlement for subsidy is based on need in accordance with departmental directives.

Applicants must be on-reserve residents.

Mode of Delivery: On-reserve, by DIAND or by band staff.

Responsibility for Delivery: DIAND

Program: Social Services

Sub-program: Community Action Projects

Province: Nova Scotia

Services Available: Provides money to Indian associations to carry out community development work:

Popular Education Program (Nova Scotia) An experimental program in community social action.

Eligibility: At the present time Indians on reserve, although the associations could provide services to Indians off reserve if they chose.

Mode of Delivery: The program is financed by the department, jointly planned by the department and associations and delivered by associations.

Responsibility for Delivery: The department has the responsibility for delivery.

Indian Input: When the program started in 1965 it was developed and delivered by the department or the provinces with no Indian input. This is no longer the case and the Indian input is substantial in the planning and delivery of the program.

Start Date: T.B. Minute 644945, December 1, 1965 authorized department to enter in community development agreements with provinces and T.B. Minute 693084, August 27, 1970 gave department authority to enter into an agreement with the Union of Nova Scotia Indians.

History: Nine people are employed under this program. The program could be cancelled at anytime and these people would lose their jobs. The program has received a positive response from band councils/band members. DPAL consultants have recommended it be continued for three years with an assessment at the end of that period, to determine if it should continue and the form it should take.

Expiry Date: On-going on year-to-year basis as agreement signed.

B. Band Government

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Program: Band Government

Sub-program: Core Funding

Province: Nova Scotia

Services Available: Provision of grants to band councils or district councils to help defray costs incurred for band council business such as honoraria and travel for chiefs and councillors, operation and maintenance of council offices and professional services.

Eligibility: Band councils, district councils duly constituted, delegated and supported under provisions of Program Circular D3, Local Government Authorities.

Mode of Delivery: Allocations made according to per capita formula adjusted for high cost isolated areas by the department. They are then administered by recipient council.

Responsibility for Delivery: DIAND usually as part of district level budget; administered by recipient as a grant.

Indian Input: Program Circular D3, Local Government governs core funding. All program circulars have a clause that invites suggestions for modification on a continuous basis.

Variations from Established Policy: The program circulars are flexible guidelines in many areas. This leads to slight variations in procedures, used in the different regions.

Authority: Appropriations Act.

History:

The only change in the program since it began in 1974 was to use the total membership as bases of funding instead of on-reserve population (T.B. Minute 734786, April 1, 1975). Problem area is that funding has not been available to increase allowances based on cost of living index. T.B. approval was received in 1972 to provide bands with a supplementary administration contribution to assist chiefs and councillors in conducting council business. This was superseded by the present core-funding formula in 1975.

Program: Band Government

Sub-program: Recreation

Province: Nova Scotia

Services Available: Provision is made in this sub-program for payments to band on a per capita basis to cover the costs of recreation supplies for use by the community.

Eligibility: Band councils, district councils and local government authorities duly constituted, delegated and supported by the band council under the provisions of program Circular D2.

Mode of Delivery: DIAND, usually as part of district budget, however, in some regions all contributions are approved by regional director general.

Responsibility for Delivery: DIAND, as part of Local Government Services functionary field unit, subsequently administered by recipient as contribution.

Indian Input: Council initiates request supported by budget within provisions of on-reserve per capita formula.

Variations from Established Policy: Due to insufficient budgets, some regions have been unable to meet the levels of contributions authorized in the T.B. Minutes.

Program: Band Government

Sub-program: Overhead

Province: Nova Scotia

Services Available: Provision of funds to meet administrative overhead costs as described in Program Circular D4 includes salaries, benefits and travel costs of personnel who supply general support to program personnel, as well as costs of stationery and supplies, facilities and services such as bank and bonding costs, communications, utilities, janitorial and audit services.

Eligibility: Band councils, district councils and local government authorities duly constituted, delegated and supported under provisions of Program Circular D2.

Mode of Delivery: Departmental staff, usually at the district level, negotiate overhead costs with councils.

Other Comments:

The current housing policy for Indians on reserves was approved by Cabinet on August 8, 1977.

One of the major sources of funding for house construction projects under this new policy was to have been the labour assistance component provided by Canada Employment and Immigration Commission. We have now been advised that house construction projects on Indian reserves will no longer be eligible for CEIC funding under the Canada Works Program or, after April 1, 1980, the Local Employment Assistance Program (LEAP).

To assist us in reaching our housing objectives, the department is currently preparing a Cabinet memorandum requests an increase in the current subsidy for new units; additional capital to provide for the repair and renovation of more units; and a replacement within DIAND appropriations for the labour assistance component previously provided by CEIC.

Other Issues Currently being Addressed:

A submission to the minister has been prepared that if approved, would give the assistant deputy minister the authority to guarantee repayment of all loans made to Indians whether by CMHC or approved lenders.

An agreement whereby the ministerial guarantee could be given to and accepted by approved lenders is currently being prepared by our Legal Division.

Program Circulars are being reviewed and rewritten in an effort to promote a clearer understanding of departmental policy and procedures by our field officials and Indian bands.

- b. providing guidance and advice to the applicants on the selection of a lot or a house;
- c. approving the loan made in accordance with the Indian Off-reserve and Inuit Housing Regulations and forgiving the annual instalments providing certain conditions are met;
- d. Providing CMHC each September with an estimate of funds required for the Off-reserve Housing Program.

If DIAND is to have the first and only mortgage, it is their responsibility. If DIAND is the 2nd mortgager, it is a joint responsibility. CMHC will always ask DIAND for the 2nd mortgage or first mortgage funds whenever they are required. DIAND will forward the required funds to CMHC upon demand. CMHC will notify DIAND of the name of the solicitor acting for the applicant.

In the early seventies various Métis and non-status Indian groups across Canada began pressing the federal government to respond to the deplorable housing conditions of native peoples. In September 1973, the Native Council of Canada presented a brief to the Minister of State for Urban Affairs asking for an immediate commitment to build 30 000 to 40 000 new homes in the next five years.

CMHC established a policy group to develop a housing program using the existing legislation and adapting it to meet the needs of rural Canada. CMHC channelled funds through NHA, Part V, grants to various native groups to study their housing needs. A "Winter Warmth" program was funded as the first step toward improving housing for native people.

This activity culminated in March 1974, with a Cabinet commitment to build and rehabilitate 50 000 units over a five-year period and to establish a responsibility centre in CMHC - The Rural and Native Housing Division.

(The Rural and Native Housing Program was approved by the Federal Cabinet on February 21, 1974.)

D. Education

Programs have developed into a service to individuals in response to their needs and the identified needs of their communities. These include functional literary, skill development, cultural activities, community libraries and a wide range of topics in support of basic community development organizations.

Services Available: Training is provided to leaders and staff of Indian bands and Inuit settlements to foster the development and growth of local government. In providing this service there are four major sub-goals:

1. To assist the bands in the development of a band definition of local government;
2. To assist the bands in the identification of features and elements of local government;
3. To assist the bands in the identification of the skills required in the development of local government components;
4. To assist the bands in the identification, implementation and evaluation of appropriate training in the process of skill development required in 1, 2, and 3.

Eligibility: Chiefs and band councils; chairmen of Inuit community councils; members of band or community councils; members of recognized authorized committees therein; and, band or community employees.

Mode of Delivery: The administration of the Band Training Program was decentralized to the regions effective April 1, 1977. All regions have a functioning

Regional Training Committee or are in the process of organizing the same. These committees, under direction from the regional directors general, have responsibility for assessing regional training needs and sponsoring band training activities accordingly. Headquarters is responsible for providing monitoring and professional support services.

Management advisory services are available to assist Indian people in the successful operation of their businesses.

There are five principal features to the Indian Economic Development Fund:

- Direct Loans
- Guaranteed Loans
- Grants
- Contributions
- Management Advisory Services

Eligibility: Individual Indians, groups of Indians, Indian bands.

Mode of Delivery:

The fund is a segment of the program administered by the director general, through the director responsible for the economic development function at the district and regional levels. The Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development has established regional and district units to assist with the operation of the program. Each region has the operational function of managing the program within its area of responsibility.

A director is located at the region and is responsible for the functions performed by the loan manager (region), district superintendents and their staff of field officers - CO-1 (business services officers). These officers are responsible to establish close relationships with all Indian businessmen and related institutions, financial or governmental, and to encourage basic confidence and mutual understanding.

They assist Indian business persons to prepare submissions for funding and provide post-funding counselling and training as well as monitoring of results.

An advisory board, composed of persons appointed by the regional director general, including representation from the Indian business community is located in each region. It is this board's responsibility to advise, assist and make recommendations to the regional director general on the loan, guarantee, grant and contribution applications.

Overseas (CESO)

Objective and
Services Available: CESO services cover a wide spectrum of situations in the economic development field, including advisory services to the band; developing authorities, and new and existing businesses, feasibility studies, planning, project appraisal, financing, post-loan counselling, management assistance and other business aspects, as well as needs emanating from the expansion of Indian involvement in local government and education matters. The department provides on contract with the Canadian Executive Services Overseas (CESO) organization technical support and advice to Indian businesses, community programs and educational programs.

Eligibility: Indian bands, corporations, groups of Indians and individual Indians are eligible applicants for CESO services.

Mode of Delivery: Services are delivered by CESO Volunteers, available through CESO regional co-ordinators from the inventory cross-referenced by expertise or from the consolidated inventory maintained at CESO headquarters, Montreal, Quebec. The volunteers are mainly retired Canadian businessmen representing a very broad base of experience in every business area.

The relationship between DIAND and CESO is formalized by the signed master contract.

Responsibility

That responsibility rests with CESO. The regional CESO co-ordinator maintains a direct overview of the CESO volunteers in the region. The district officers monitor the activities of the volunteers and their relationship with the Indians.

Headquarters provides liaison with the CESO headquarters and participates in annual regional meetings of CESO volunteers.

CESO is a non-profit corporation that recruits retired business people to serve as volunteers in the provision of advisory services to developing countries as part of Canada's foreign aid program.

In 1969 DIAND approached CESO to extend its services to help Indian people by providing technical support and advice to Indian businesses, community programs and educational programs.

T.B. Minute 702206, March 4, 1971 approved a five-year master contract with CESO at a total expenditure level of \$1 027 000.

The contract has been renewed annually; an amount of \$1 200 000 was authorized for 1979-80 (T.B. Minute 763038, March 29, 1979) which brought the total of the master contract to \$5 million over nine years.

Some 255 CESO volunteers were active in 1979-80 in providing field services to bands and Indian organizations.

Average cost per advisory day was \$75 which compared very favourably to consultant services purchased elsewhere.

Program: Economic Development

Sub-program: University of Western Ontario (UWO)
Indian Business Assistance

Province: Nova Scotia

Objective and Services Available: The overall objective of this sub-program is to provide current assistance to Indian business enterprises by dealing with problems that lead to immediate and long term impact on productivity, profits and management capabilities.

In order to achieve this objective, the students enrolled in a Masters of Business Administration program are being utilized during the summer months to make consulting help available to Indian bands and business enterprises. The help, according to the need, may cover marketing, operations, management, financial matters, planning, accounting and control systems as well as feasibility studies and business assessment.

These services have been available, and have been well received since 1973.

Eligibility: Any Indian, Indian group, band or Indian enterprise carrying on a business activity may apply for the assistance of an M.B.A. student to the district office to which such a student is assigned.

Mode of Delivery:

The students work through the district offices and extend their services to the Indian business projects according to the general directives from the district officials.

In the London, Ontario area School of Business Administration, UWO in co-operation with local district(s), becomes directly involved in the promotion and planning of the consulting activities.

Responsibility for Delivery:

Two UWO professors act as advisors, supervisors and co-ordinators of the consulting services provided by the M.B.A. students.

The district offices monitor activities of the M.B.A. students assigned to them.

After the close of the season, the UWO provides the DIAND headquarters with a review of the consulting activities, observations made by the consultants and the recommendations based on experience gained.

Indian Input:

The needed number of M.B.A. students is selected by the University of Western Ontario and other universities involved, and the representatives of DIAND. The Indian representatives have not been involved in the selection process.

They are, however, as former clients of the program in previous years, involved in the orientation program organized for the newly selected students. The orientation program provides information on and a conceptual framework for understanding another culture.

History: Indian Business Assistance Program commenced in 1974 to provide aid to native businessmen in a broad spectrum of ventures. Student consultants followed by back-up assistance by university faculty have provided assistance in bookkeeping and control systems, in financing, general management, legal matters, marketing, operation control and in project evaluation. Nineteen students are allocated annually on a national basis. The program will be decentralized in 1981.

Sub-program: Band Economic Development Committee (BEDC)

Province: Nova Scotia

Services Available: This program will provide band councils with financial assistance for the administration of a band development committee. A supporting program will be co-ordinated with this activity to provide essential requirements for economic planning, technical advice and educational training for committee members, band councils and band members.

Eligibility: Band councils are eligible and will request authority through a band council resolution for the funding of a BEDC.

Mode of Delivery: District staff.

Responsibility for Delivery: Responsibility for the delivery of the program is the band councils who establish broad objectives and delegate authorities and responsibilities to the committee.

The regional director general is responsible for ensuring that the proposed purpose for which funds are requested are valid and that the necessary support funds, training and staff are available to assure a reasonably successful committee operation.

To ensure this responsibility is carried out, the region provides guidance and continued contact with the district offices. District staff attend meetings, guide in the training and budgeting areas of endeavor, sponsor ideas developed for further action by economic development.

Indian Input: Through their annual evaluation, Indian people are encouraged to improve the content of the program.

Sub-program: Band Work Process (BWP)

Province: Nova Scotia

Services Available: This program was established in April 1977. Band Work Process supports bands in the development of socio-economic strategies that utilize all available resources in the creation of employment opportunities. A development fund is available to bands to assist in planning, to provide seed money, and to meet funding shortfalls in implementing community employment plans. The department assists bands in negotiating agreements for employment development action with other federal departments and agencies (e.g., CEIC). The Work Opportunity Program, a segment of Band Work Process, focuses on short-term employment creation, utilizing existing resources (e.g., housing capital subsidy), plus a per capita contribution from the development fund.

There is a provision for social assistance funds, saved as a result of band work and work opportunity projects, to be transferred to the work projects to meet labour or material costs.

Eligibility: Registered Indians on reserve or designated settlements.

Mode of Delivery: The program is delivered in the field through regional co-ordinators. The projects funded under this program are administered by the bands.

Responsibility
for Delivery:

DIAND has the responsibility for delivery of these services.

Indian Input:

Within the Atlantic Region the two provincial Indian associations (Union of Nova Scotia Indians and Union of New Brunswick Indians) are represented on the regional Band Work Review Committee which assesses band proposals submitted for assistance from the development fund and recommends funding levels to the regional director general.

In October 1976, the minister, CEIC, announced a five-year federal employment strategy which included large direct job creation programs such as Canada Works. At the same time, Cabinet asked that an Inter-departmental Committee on Employment Development (ICED) be established at the deputy minister level to review the strategy on a year-to-year basis and provide feedback along with recommendations for the following year's program mix.

Although this process tends to be manipulated by CEIC, the co-ordinating department, with their programs receiving virtually all of the attention, Band Work was included in the 1978-79 recommendations. It is an excellent forum for both influencing approaches used by other departments in the delivery of services to Indian people and for negotiating a share of overall resources committed by Cabinet for employment purposes.

The major federal responsibility and the bulk of resources rests with the Canada Employment and Immigration Commission. There has, however, been considerable concern expressed by Indian leaders in various representations to the minister about the effectiveness of the CEIC programs and the role of DIAND in the field of employment services. Manpower developed a Native Employment Policy in 1978. Six national native associations have participated in the elaboration of this policy through the Task Force Advisory Council.

Other Comments:

The ADM asked, in his Employment Program memorandum of March 29, 1977, that the practice of transferring funds from employment services to meet other deficits be discontinued and that funds allocated for employment be used for that purpose. Funds are now allocated to Employment Program but employment services funds are still part of discretionary funds. Headquarters are developing an action plan in order to expand on-the-job training authorities in light of recommendations from an evaluation that was conducted in 1979.

Program: Employment

Sub-program: Indian and Inuit Recruitment and Development (IIRD)

Province: Nova Scotia

Services Available: The program's 50 person-years and salary dollars are utilized to create training positions for status Indians and Inuit in the public service, especially the Department of Indian and Northern Affairs, and native organizations. Selected individuals undergo training for a year or more in junior and middle management positions in the Administrative and Foreign Service, Technical and Scientific and Professional categories. At the end of the training periods participants are placed in regular positions for which they have been trained.

Eligibility: Managers may request utilization of an IIRD person-year. They must submit a proposal including a job description, training plan and a commitment for placement of the trainee on completion of the plan. Participants must be status Indian or Inuit and meet the basic requirements of the training position.

Mode of Delivery: On approval of a proposal, an indeterminate training position is seconded to the requesting manager. The position is filled through open competition and the trainee, who is appointed indeterminate, is subject to the same conditions and enjoys the same benefits as a regular employee. Staffing of the IIRD positions is carried out by the relevant personnel

divisions in consultation with native employment officers. Salaries are charged to the IIRD budget which is maintained at headquarters.

- approves proposals and initiates classification action for IIRDP positions;

- report to NEPD on all matters pertaining to IIRDP.

Indian/Inuit Input:

History: On October 15, 1968, the then ADM, Mr. R.R. Battle wrote to Russell Steward, departmental Personnel Advisor of the time requesting that "a definite and active recruiting campaign -- be undertaken" to increase the number of employees of Indian ancestry in the department.

A T.B. Submission was prepared dated January 7, 1969, requesting some \$366 000 including 50 training positions and \$300 000. Meanwhile, on April 1, 1969, the D.M., Mr. J.A. MacDonald, wrote to Mr. J.J. Carson, Chairman of the PSC requesting delegation to appoint 50 summer students, which was approved by telephone (A.R.K. Anderson Russell Steward, April 9, 1969.)

On May 22, 1969, Sylvain Cloutier Asst. Secretary, T.B. advised Mr. MacDonald that the board felt that the additional resources could not be made available and "expressed the wish that the department -- continue in its efforts to develop an effective training plan within the approved manpower and budgetary ceilings".

Mr. I.S. Harlock, A/dept'l Personnel Advisor advised by way of a memo dated October 27, 1969, that the "program "had" been given twenty-five positions" for Indian and Eskimo trainees as a result of the approval of the department's submission for relief from the "freeze" to Treasury Board.

At a meeting held November 10, 1969, representatives of the PSC suggested that the department obtain "exclusion from section 10 of the Act for the 25 man-years, -- allotted to the IERD Program." (Memo of Nov. 17, 1969 from J.D. Leask, Hd., IERD to I.S. Harlock refers) P.C. 1970-120 dated 21 Jan 1970 approved the exclusion of the 25 positions from the operation of section 10 of the PSEA for the period Jan 21 1970 to March 31, 1971. CP 1971-603 dated 30 March 1971, provided for the same exclusion for the period April 1, 1971 to March 31, 1972.

It should be noted that the 25 positions were established from resources within the IEA Program (man-years and salary dollars) and excluded by Order-in-Council from section 10 of the PSE Act. (Memo from J.B. Ciaccia, ADM, I&EA Prog. to A.D. Hunt, ADM Northern Dev. Prog. of February 17, 1972) This exclusion was not, however, renewed for 1972-73 fiscal year. It was thus agreed that the IERD Program would continue to operate however, recruitment would then have to be made by the PSC. In effect, referrals would be made by the PSC for these positions as for any other position in the federal public service.

Since 1972, the IERD Program has remained relatively unchanged. An increase of man-years (from 25 to 50) was approved in 1976 as a result of a reallocation within the IEA Program. However, IERD has continued to recruit registered Indians (according to the Indian Act) to fill these trainee positions, provide them with on-the-job training for approximately one year while they remain term employees, have the trainees compete for permanent positions and subsequently appoint them as a result of competitions to CFT positions in the regular stream.

The Canada Works Program is designed to utilize the expertise of local organizations in the development and management of projects that will create new short-term employment opportunities. The objectives of the program is to get needed work done and public benefits produced by people whose talents are temporarily surplus to private sector needs. The federal government through this program provides a contribution to employee wages and other project costs.

Eligibility:

Any established organization, partnership or corporation may submit an application to sponsor a project.

Applications from individuals or newly formed groups will be considered for funding if local circumstances are such that insufficient acceptable applications have been received from any established organization and therefore not available to sponsor the project. Hiring of employees is done through the Canada Employment Centre (CEC) Persons referred to a project must have major labour force attachment, be unemployed and registered with the CEC as actively seeking work. Preference is given to those whose personal circumstances, through the judgement of the CEC show them to be most in need of the employment opportunity. All persons working on a project must be Canadian citizens or permanent residents legally entitled to work in Canada.

Mode of Delivery: When a Canada Works project is approved, a formal agreement is signed between the government of Canada and the sponsor. The sponsor then becomes an employer with full employer's responsibilities.

Responsibility for Delivery: CEIC is charged with the financial responsibility for program services. Regional offices promote program, where a project officer selects, develops and monitors each project.

Sub-program: Young Canada Works

Province: Nova Scotia

Services Available: Young Canada Works is a federal government program designed to fund local community projects that provide work experience and skill development for students during the summer. The program stresses the creation of employment that will enable students to contribute to community needs and that will facilitate their future access to the labour market by enabling them to test possible career interests.

Eligibility: Sponsors are defined as established organizations, partnerships or corporations. In exceptional cases or in isolated areas, agreements may be made with individuals. Municipalities and other primarily tax-supported groups are eligible but no federal or provincial government department. It must be established that the proposed activities would not be undertaken as a result of normal or planned expenditures.

All persons working on a project must be students who are Canadian citizens or permanent residents legally entitled to work in Canada. For the purposes of the Young Canada Works Program, a student is someone who was registered full time at a secondary, post-secondary, or vocational school during the preceding year. Unemployed youth may be hired in exceptional cases, in rural areas or on Indian reserves where suitable participants may not otherwise be available; or as a project manager, if no suitably qualified student is available in the community.

Mode of Delivery: Administrative arrangement used to deliver the services is an agreement between the Canada Employment and Immigration Commission and the sponsor for up to \$25 000.

The CEIC subsidizes employers at a rate of up to 50% of the hourly wage paid, up to \$1.50 per hour, to a maximum of \$1 560. Employers are also provided with an opportunity to assess these young people as potential permanent employees after the wage subsidy period has ended. Employers enter into an agreement with the federal government to provide 26 weeks of actual work experience in a newly created position.

Mode of Delivery: There are three delivery options:

Under Option I, the CEIC utilizes the services of sponsors to administer the program. Sponsors include chambers of commerce, boards of trade or other community organizations. The sponsor conducts all aspects of the program on behalf of CEIC with the exception of participant identification and pre-employment orientation. The sponsor is entitled to a contribution of \$60 per placement to cover its administrative costs.

Under Option II, the sponsor helps the CEIC to deliver the program and is awarded a contribution of \$35 per placement to cover its administrative costs.

Under Option III, the Canada Employment Centre assumes total responsibility for delivery of the program.

Sub-program: Indian Minerals Resources (oil and gas, mining, sand and gravel, groundwater and forestry)

Provinces: Each province controls activities related to its mining, oil and gas. Groundwater is a new responsibility; sand and gravel activity is administered in collaboration with the district offices. Forest matters are under the regional and district administrations with H.Q. Senior Resources Advisor in an advisory role.

Services Available: Complete management or assistance to Indian bands in the management and development of minerals underlying Indian lands, from disposal of the mineral rights by permit or lease through exploration, drilling, production, documentation, monitoring and collection of revenues. Minerals are disposed by public tender or direct negotiation between the band council and the developer. The Indian Minerals Branch assists in the selection of treaty rights lands to obtain land with best mineral potential. Assistance is provided in Indian employment and Indian involvement in the industry regardless of mineral ownership. The sub-program is generally concerned with obtaining the best returns for Indian people from the development of their minerals.

Timber development is administered by the regional and district offices with the Senior Resources Advisor at headquarters in an advisory role. The timber is disposed of by public tender for surrendered timber or with the consent of the band council on reserve lands without a surrender.

Eligibility:

The sub-program applies to all Indian reserves. Nova Scotia allows all revenues to go to the bands.

Mode of Delivery:

Two deployed headquarters offices in Toronto and Calgary are responsible for all mineral activities in eastern and western Canada respectively. Before disposal, all minerals must be made available by band referendum (surrender). Surrenders may be specific or general and no subsequent disposal may be made without the approval of the band council. Working closely with the band council, the Indian Minerals Branch provides technical, professional and management services as necessary. Due to high capital requirements and high risk factor, nearly all development has been by third party interests. Bands may obtain benefits through bonuses, rents, royalties, percentage of profits, employment and involvement. Provision is made for total development by band or band entity. Due to lack of appropriate federal laws in certain phases of development, the Indian Mineral Regulations require all operators to observe applicable provincial laws. This requirement holds true for timber development also.

The headquarters office, (the Senior Resources Advisor) is a policy making body and monitoring agent for the activities of the Indian Minerals Branch (Toronto and Calgary) and the forestry aspects handled by the regional and district offices.

Headquarters is responsible for studying federal and provincial policy and legislation regarding resource development and in determining the effects that these may have on Indian rights. This includes the formulation of policy and recommendations relating to such matters as the applicability of provincial codes on mining projects on Indian reserves.

Responsibility for Delivery:

Responsibility rests with DIAND through the Reserves and Trusts Group and thence through Indian Minerals for mineral matters and the regions and districts for forestry matters.

Indian Input:

The regulations (Indian Oil and Gas Act, Indian Oil and Gas Regulations, Indian Mining Regulations) and program policies require approval of band council for many steps in the management and development procedure from the initial disposal to final surrender by the developer.

Objective and Services Available:

The program was planned and implemented with the objective of reducing the communication barrier that exists between native people and those who represent the legal system by educating native people within the legal system. It became evident after two years of operation that an equally effective approach to the same basic objective would be to sensitize or educate those who represent the legal system (judges, police, and the legal profession) to the problems distinct to native people. The revised criteria provide for an extension of the classes of recipients and broaden the base of the program while retaining the original philosophy.

The projects funded would fall under three categories:

- 1) conferences, meetings or workshops between native people and those involved in the administration of justice;
- 2) educational or informational projects designed to increase the understanding of native people with respect to the law, its administration and enforcement;
- 3) sensitization projects for judges, magistrates and other officials of the legal system designed to increase their awareness of problems distinct to native people.

The program lapsed at the end of the 1977-78 fiscal year. The new preventive thrust under the Native Courtworker Program will absorb this program by promoting a better understanding between the native people and those who administer the legal system; this will be done on a cost-shared basis with the provinces and/or territories where the need has been identified, and an agreement has been drawn up and signed by those concerned.

The grant application form (gaf) is then forwarded to headquarters where the Native Citizens Directorate will review and either agree or disagree with the region's recommendations. Regions have a commitment authority for grants up to \$10 000. Grants totalling \$10 000 and over must be reviewed by the Native Citizens Directorate, and by a Senior Management Committee. The Secretary of State has final signing authority on all grants.

Objective and Services Available: The objective of the Native Involvement Program is to encourage the participation of native people with Parks Canada through: (1) indirect employment (short-term contract work) (2) the promotion of native entrepreneurial activities and (3) the involvement of native cultural artifacts within Parks Canada facilities.

Eligibility: All native peoples, associations and organizations.

Mode of delivery: Funding for contract work is allocated to the region. Individual managers are responsible for projects in their region. Support is given to native entrepreneurial activity in the parks by requiring all stores to allocate a proportion of their inventory to authentic handicrafts. The cultural component is developed by contracting bands in nearby communities and negotiating with them to participate in the different Parks programs through displays, exhibits, etc.

Indian/Inuit Input: Native people can be involved in the planning, design and the operation stages of the different Parks projects.

Eligibility: Indian bands, BED committees, and individual Indians living on reserves.

Responsibility for Delivery: Regional Planning staff, DIAND

Mode of Delivery: Attendance at meetings, preparation of plans, charts, discussions. The results are often put in a planning report, describing soil, existing conditions, existing and future population characteristics, future need for various land uses, cost estimates, etc. In order to improve band participation in the planning of the community, the report is "translated" into a slide show.

The text is spoken by the chief and one or two councillors, background music is, where possible, provided by a band member or a local group.

This method has been very successful, not only in informing the band members of the planning program in their community, but also to show other bands, service groups, classes, Indian training groups, etc. the planning done by a particular band.

Indian Input:

On certain reserves, a planning committee is formed to work with the planner. Mostly, the process is carried out with chief, council and band manager.

Through DIAND with support available for bands who want to manage their own service, through the Engineering and Architecture Unit. The Engineering and Architecture Unit provides direct service, or arranges for the provision of engineering and architecture service through other federal and provincial departments, such as, the: Department of Public Works, Department of the Environment, Department of Labour, Fire Marshal (provincial and federal)

Consultant contracts are also arranged and funded, by the department, with band participation in the arrangement.

Responsibility for Delivery:

DIAND provides or arranges for the services, or assists bands in acquiring services from outside agents.

Indian Input:

The level and type of input varies significantly between bands. Generally, bands directly manage housing and minor construction work with technical direction from DIAND. Where bands directly manage major construction work, technical terms and conditions are agreed with DIAND. Bands manage most of the technical operation of infrastructure, with DIAND support.

Participation by
Other Agencies:

Department of Public Works provides design and construction supervision services for some select projects.

The Department of the Environment assists with groundwater investigation studies and environmental assessment studies; provides reviews of wastewater treatment system; designs documents and carries out limited monitoring of wastewater plants.
