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This volume attempts to provide a description of federal programs and services available to Indian people. The material does not deal with national programs of universal application to which Indian people have access in the same manner and conditions as other Canadian citizens, such as unemployment insurance, family allowances, etc. In addition, financial expenditure information, where available, is provided for each program. In the tables a zero entry refers to nil expenditure, while a "blank" means that information is not available. Totals may not add due to rounding.

At this stage, the material is not as complete as might be desirable and as such will be the subject of on-going review and modification. Similar volumes are now available for all other provinces in Canada.

This volume was prepared from the combined inputs of regional office and headquarters staff of the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development. Families or persons who are in need are assisted financially or in kind in the form of general assistance to cover the cost of food, clothing, shelter, utilities, fuel, household and personal supplies. Special assistance is granted for cost of travel and vocational training, funerals, supplementary aid to meet the cost of extraordinary needs, care in nursing home and the services of visiting homemakers or visiting nurses.

Eligibility: "Persons in need" are people who by reason of inability to obtain regular employment, lack of principal family provider, disability, or old age have budgetary requirements that exceed their income in accordance with the regulations under General Welfare Assistance Act.

Mode of Delivery: The bands in Ontario can opt for the provincial Social Assistance Program under the authority of the Memorandum of Agreement Respecting Welfare Programs for Indians. Currently 86 bands are approved to operate welfare programs under this agreement. In accordance with this system approved bands administer social assistance programs under the supervision of the Ministry of Community and Social Services (COMSOC).

> Indian Affairs districts with the help of welfare aides administer the programs of those bands who have not opted for the welfare program under the federalprovincial welfare agreement.

> > A2

All off-reserve Indians receive services from their respective municipalities or COMSOC district offices with cost reimbursed to the province for the first 12 months off-reserve. The province is reimbursed about 95% of the cost of social assistance for approved bands.

Due to the fact that bands have to formally apply for approval to COMSOC to operate under the welfare agreement, it is assumed that bands considered all the pros and cons of the provincial system of delivery.

The provincial requirement of legal residence of an Indian applicant for social assistance is, in our opinion, contrary to clause (d) of Sub-section (2) of Section 6 of the Canada Assistance Plan under which Ontario receives from Canada 50% of the costs of welfare assistance and services provided to other residents.

These services are designed to essentially prevent and treat alcoholism and other forms of drug abuse, and to rehabilitate persons with problems resulting from the abuse of alcohol. Specific services include educational programs to provide information about the effects of alcohol abuse and ways to prevent it, detoxification, in-patient treatment centres and counselling. In Ontario there are 15 projects serving Indian communities. Most projects emphasize education and counselling services.

In order to receive funding under the Eligibility: program a project must be directed at one or more of the aspects of prevention, treatment and rehabilitation and must be designed and operated by Indian people. The services are directed primarily at persons on-reserve and the projects themselves define the eligibility of persons for service.

> As the program is funded 50/50 by DIAND and NH&W (Department of National Health and Welfare), the program is operated jointly by the two departments by means of national and regional boards on which both departments, as well as the Indian associations, are represented. The province is also represented on the regional boards. Services are delivered to individual clients by projects staff as noted projects are designed and directed by Indian people.

Child welfare services are provided to Indian bands by the provincial Ministry of Community and Social Services (Children's Services Division) through agreements with 51 children's aid societies of Ontario. Under the Child Welfare Act and Regulations, societies have both authority and responsibility to perform services including child protection and adoption, services to families and unmarried parents, counselling and prevention, and supportive measures.

- difficulty caring for their children, or
- a child who is out of control.

Mode of Delivery: Children's Aid Societies (CAS) with the help of their professional social workers are responsible for child-care and protection services to Indian bands located within their geographical jurisdictions in Ontario.

> St. Regis band - Since the boundary of St. Regis band falls in the province of Quebec, the child-care services are administered under the authority of service agreements with Centre de Sociaux Valleyfield (P.Q.) to provide help to workers for processing child welfare cases under the Youth Protection Act of the province of Quebec. The band employs two child care workers for this program.

Elderly persons requiring residential or nursing care due to old age or health reasons are assisted and maintained in homes for the aged, or approved nursing homes. Few bands have organized domiciliary hostels to provide care to their elderly within their own communities.

Eligibility:

Residential Care

An elderly person over 60 years and in need of care, who cannot live alone in his own home, is eligible to receive residential care in homes for the aged.

Extended Care In order to be eligible for extended care insured services, an applicant must meet three requirements:

- Applicant must be a resident of Ontario for at least one year before making application for extended care insured service.
- Applicant must be a member in good standing of OHIP (Ontario Hospital Insurance Plan).
- 3. Applicant must be medically eligible; that is, in need of at least one and a half hours of nursing care a day. This need must be assessed by an Ontario physician.

Mode of Delivery: Wikwemikong and Six Nations reserves operate their own nursing homes approved under the Nursing Homes Act. Elderly persons requiring care from other areas are referred by a physician and by a DIAND nurse or welfare administrator for admission in a nearby nursing home for the aged. All off-reserve Indians receive services from their respective municipal homes for the aged, or nursing homes financially assisted by the province. Ontario

23 bands in Ontario are licensed by the Day Nurseries Branch of the Ministry of Community and Social Services to operate day-care centres to provide a regular program of activities and give children care, guidance, and recreation during all or part of the day. A day-care centre is designed not only to provide opportunity for mothers to work but also to promote the mental well-being and sound personality development of children. Α carefully planned program of indoor and outdoor activities helps develop a child's physical, intellectual and social capabilities.

Normal children under 10 years of age.

Under 18 years of age in the case of a day nursery for retarded children (none on-reserve).

Licensed day nurseries on-reserve administered by the band provide services to eligible children. These day-care centres are mostly staffed by Indian teachers and supervisors and maintain standards in accordance with Day Nurseries Act of the province of Ontario. Cost is shared under the Memorandum of Agreement Respecting Welfare Services for Indians.

The current housing policy for Indians on reserves was approved by Cabinet on August 8, 1977.

One of the major sources of funding for house construction projects under this new policy was to have been the labour assistance component provided by the Canada Employment and Immigration Commission. However, house construction projects on Indian reserves will no longer be eligible for CEIC funding under the Canada Works Program or, after April 1, 1980, the Local Employment Assistance Program (LEAP).

To assist in reaching the housing objectives, DIAND is currently preparing a Cabinet memorandum that requests an increase in the current subsidy for new units; additional capital to provide for the repair and renovation of more units; and a replacement within DIAND appropriations for the labour assistance component previously provided by CEIC.

Other Issues Currently Being Addressed:

A submission to the minister has been prepared, which, if approved, would give the assistant deputy minister the authority to guarantee repayment of all loans made to Indians whether by CMHC or approved lenders.

An agreement whereby the ministerial guarantee could be given to and accepted by approved lenders is currently being prepared by the Legal Division of DIAND. Program circulars are being reviewed and rewritten in an effort to promote a clearer understanding of departmental policy and procedures by field officials and Indian bands.

In the early seventies various Métis and Non-status Indian groups across Canada began pressing the federal government to respond to the deplorable housing conditions of native peoples. In September 1973, the Native Council of Canada presented a brief to the Minister of State for Urban Affairs asking for an immediate commitment to build 30 000 to 40 000 new homes in the next five years.

CMHC established a policy group to develop a housing program using the existing legislation and adapting it to meet the needs of rural Canada. CMHC channelled funds through National Housing Act, Part V, grants to various native groups to study their housing needs. A "winter warmth" program was funded as the first step toward improving housing for native people.

This activity culminated in March 1974 with a Cabinet commitment to build and rehabilitate 50 000 units over a fiveyear period and the establishment of a responsibility centre in CMHC - The Rural and Native Housing Division.

These services are provided in federal schools, band-operated schools funded by DIAND and in provincial and private schools through contractual arrangements between the department and provincial and private school Agreements exist between authorities. the department and school boards in Ontario that involve the cost-sharing of the construction of school accommodation in provincial schools attended by Indian children.

The program provides for basic elementary and secondary education with arrangements for curriculum adaptation designed to make the school program relevent to the background of Indian pupils.

Children of Indians residing on-reserves or Crown land and certain specified categories of non-Indian children living on-reserves are eligible. These specified categories are defined in the department's education assistance policy paper (1971), a copy of which is available from the Education Branch.

The program is a highly decentralized one but the method of delivery in each region is similar in every region. The department directly operates a federal school program in Ontario and under contractual arrangements with band councils and provincial/private school authorities provides services for Indian students. Such schooling is historically based in the British North America Act, 1867, and mentioned in most of the numbered treaties. In Treaty No. 9, while not listed as a part of the treaty a section refers to DIAND school assistance in Biscotasing, Ontario, as early as July 20, 1906. This will continue in perpetuity or until legislation is passed terminating this service.

Historically, Indian Education in Ontario has progressed from church schools in the latter part of the 19th century to federal day schools in the 1920s peaking in 1950 after World War II. Indian students involvement in provincial schools reached a plateau in the 1960s.

In 1972, the National Indian Brotherhood's policy statement on Indian control of Indian education was agreed to by the minister of DIAND and has formed the basis of continuing program development to date - 1980.

As of April 1980, DIAND Education Branch, Ontario region is providing services to 13 995 students grade kindergarten to grade 13. Some 1 500 adults are involved in continuing, post secondary and occupational skill training programs.

Adult education is a communityoriented service initiated by Indian people to assist them in improving their standard and quality of life and to achieve their aspirations in obtaining prerequisites for admission to occupational skill training or apprenticeship programs. It is a process through which adults may acquire new skills allowing them to make efficient adaptations to their rapidly changing socio-economic environment, thereby enabling them to participate more effectively in their community. Programs have developed into a service to individuals in response to their needs and the identified needs of their communities. These needs include functional literacy, skill development, cultural activities, community libraries and activities in support of basic community development organizations.

Administrative practices vary between regions with programs being administered directly by DIAND staff or by Indian bands through provincial and private agencies. Recent trends suggest a much greater involvement at the band level.

The service consists of one trip from home to the centre at the beginning of September, a return trip home at Christmas, and a trip home at the end of June.

Children of Indians resident on reserves or Crown land and certain specified categories of non-Indian children living on reserves are eligible. These specified categories are defined in the DIAND's Education Assistance Policy Paper (1971), a copy of which is available from the Education Branch.

The daily transportation program is almost exclusively delivered by Indian bands through agreement with DIAND. Some private individuals and school divisions, through agreements, do deliver students to school.

The Daily and seasonal Transportation Program is conducted through licensed commercial carriers.

Consequently, they are expecting the Band Training Program to be able to meet their increasing training needs.

CESO is a non-profit corporation that recruits retired business people to serve as volunteers to provide advisory services to developing countries as part of Canada's foreign aid program.

In 1969 DIAND approached CESO to extend its services to help Indian people by providing technical support and advice to Indian businesses, community programs and educational programs.

T.B. Minute 702206, March 4, 1971, approved a five-year master contract with CESO at a total expenditure level of \$1 027 000.

The contract has been renewed annually; an amount of \$1 200 000 was authorized for 1979-80 (T.B. Minute 763038 March 29, 1979) which brought the total of the master contract to \$5 milion over nine years.

Some 255 CESO volunteers are active in 1979-80 in providing field services to bands and Indian organizations.

Average cost per advisory day is \$75, which compares favourably to consultant services purchased elsewhere.

The overall objective of this sub-program is to provide qualified assistance to Indian businesses to improve specific aspects of their operations.

Students enrolled in their second year of studies towards a master in business administration work directly with Indian businesses during the summer months. The assignments are related to the needs of the businesses and the special skills of particular students. The students selected usually have prior business or industrial experience.

Any Indian, Indian group, band or Indian enterprise carrying on a business activity.

Suitable students are selected for specific assignments by the department's regional staff (after input from districts). In Ontario, students are selected from the University of Western Ontario, Queen's University and McMaster University. The UWO provides an orientation program for all students. Students also go to other provinces.

The students work directly with the Indian businesses and report to superintendents in the Economic Development Program. University professors keep contact with, and visit, the students and businesses. The students are paid by the university. The university contracts with Ottawa to provide services. The program has operated since 1974. Currently there are seven students in Ontario region each year.

Although funded by DIAND (national basis), operational management is by UWO.

The requirement for assistance is discussed between Indian businesses and district offices and forms the basis for selection of students.

The Indian business people have input into departmental evaluation of results of the program each summer. Indian business people give portions of the orientation program held at the University of Western Ontario.

The Indian Business Assistance Program commenced in 1974 to provide aid to native business people in a broad spectrum of ventures. Student consultants followed by backup assistance by university faculty have provided assistance in bookkeeping and control systems, in financing, general management, legal matters, marketing, operation control and project evaluation. Nineteen students are allocated annually on a national basis. The program will be decentralized in 1981.

The program's 50 person-years and salary dollars are utilized to create training positions for status Indians and Inuit in the public service, especially the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development, and native organizations. Selected individuals undergo training for a year or more in junior and middle management positions in the Administrative and Foreign Service, Technical and Scientific and Professional categories. At the end of the training periods participants are placed in regular positions for which they have been trained.

Any manager may request utilization of an IIRD person-year, but must submit a proposal including a job description, training plan and a commitment for placement of the trainee on completion of the plan. Participants must be status Indian or Inuit and meet the basic requirements of the training position.

On approval of a proposal, an indeterminate training position is seconded to the requesting manager. The position is filled through open competition and the trainee, who is appointed on an indeterminate basis, is subject to the same conditions and enjoys the same benefits as a regular employee. Staffing of the IIRD positions is carried out by the relevant personnel divisions in consultation with native employment officers. Salaries are charged to the IIRD budget, which is maintained at H.Q.

Summer IIRD evaluation, DIAND 1978

January 1969.

On October 15, 1968, the then ADM R.F. Battle wrote to Russell Steward, Departmental Personnel Advisor, requesting that "a definite and active recruiting campaign ... be undertaken" to increase the number of employees of Indian ancestry in the department.

A T.B. submission was prepared dated January 7, 1969, requesting some \$366 000, including 50 training positions and \$300 000. Meanwhile, on April 1, 1969, the Deputy Minister, J.A. MacDonald, wrote to J.J. Carson, Chairman of the PSC, requesting delegation to appoint 50 summer students; this was approved by telephone (A.R.K. Anderson/Russell Steward, April 9, 1969).

On May 22, 1969, Sylvain Cloutier Assistant Secretary, Treasury Board, advised Mr. Macdonald that the board felt that the additional resources could not be made available and "expressed the wish that the Department ... continue in its efforts to develop an effective training plan within the approved manpower and budgetary ceilings." Mr. I.S. Harlock, Assistant Departmental Personnel Advisor, advised by way of a memo dated October 27, 1969, that the "program has been given twenty-five positions" for Indian and Eskimo trainees as a result of the approval of the department's submission for relief from the "freeze" to Treasury Board.

At a meeting held November 10, 1969, representatives of the PSC suggested that the department obtain "exclusion from section 10 of the Act for the 25 man-years ... allotted to the IERD Program." (Memo of November 17, 1969 from J.D. Leask, Head, IERD, to I.S. Harlock.) Order-in-Council P.C. 1970-120, dated January 21, 1970, approved the exclusion of the 25 positions from the operation of Section 10 of the Public Service Exclusions (PSE) Act for the period January 21, 1970, to March 31, 1971. Order-in-Council P.C. 1971-603, dated March 30, 1971, provided for the same exclusion for the period April 1, 1971, to March 31, 1972.

Note that the 25 positions were established from resources within the Indian and Eskimo Affairs (I&EA) Program (man-years and salary dollars) and excluded by Order-in- Council from section 10 of the PSE Act. (Memo from J.B. Ciaccia, ADM, I&EA program to A.D. Hunt, ADM Northern Development Program, of February 17, 1972.) This exclusion was not, however, renewed for the 1972-73 fiscal year. It was thus agreed that the IERD program would continue to operate; however, recruitment would then have to be made by the PSC. In effect, referrals would be made by the PSC for these positions as for any other position in the federal public service.

Since 1972, the IERD program has remained relatively unchanged. An increase of man-years (from 25 to 50) was approved in 1976 as a result of a reallocation within the I&EA program. However, IERD has continued to recruit registered Indians (according to the Indian Act) to fill these trainee positions, provide them with on-the-job training for approximately one year while they remain term employees, have the trainees compete for permanent positions and subsequently appoint them as a result of competitions to continuing full-time positions in the regular stream.

Contribution funds are made available to individuals, groups or organizations for the purpose of increasing the selfsufficiency of workers who are unable to compete for regular employment and are chronically unemployed due to personal disadvantage or to structural deficiencies in the labour market. This objective will be accomplished by either:

- a. providing the chronically unemployed with the work skills and integrational abilities necessary for them to find, fill and retain jobs in the regular labour force (preparation projects); or
- b. creating long-term jobs that they will fill (retention projects); or
- c. supporting other employment creation in native communities that will substantially improve the labour market position of chronically unemployed individuals.

Chronically unemployed people due to personal disadvantage or structural deficiencies in the labour market are eligible. This group includes natives, disadvantaged women, disadvantaged youth, mentally/physically handicapped, ex-offenders, chronic welfare recipients, and individuals with a history of drug or alchohol problems.

The Canada Works Program is designed to utilize the expertise of local organizations in the development and management of projects that will create new short-term employment opportunities. The objectives of the program are to get needed work done and to benefit the public by employing people whose talents are temporarily surplus to private sector needs. The federal government through this program provides a contribution to employee wages and other project costs.

Any established organization, partnership or corporation may submit an application to sponsor a project.

Applications from individuals or newly formed groups will be considered for funding if local circumstances are such that insufficient acceptable applications have been received from established organizations available to sponsor the project. Hiring of employees is done through the Canada Employment Centre (CEC). Persons referred to a project must have major labour force attachment, be unemployed and registered with the CEC as actively seeking work. Preference is given to those whose personal circumstances, through the judgement of the CEC show them to be most in need of the employment opportunity. All persons working on a project must be Canadian citizens or permanent residents legally entitled to work in Canada.

When a Canada Works project is approved, a formal agreement is signed between the government of Canada and sponsors. The sponsor then becomes an employer with full employer's responsibilities. Responsibility for Delivery:

The Canada Employment and Immigration Commission is charged with the financial responsibility for program services. The regional offices promote the program and a project officer solicits, develops and monitors each project.

Young Canada Works

Ontario

Young Canada Works is a federal government program designed to fund projects at the local community level that provide work experience and skill development for student during the summer. The program stresses the creation of employment that will enable students to contribute to community needs and that will facilitate their future access to the labour market by enabling them to test possible career interests.

Sponsors are defined as established organizations, partnerships or corporations. In exceptional cases or in isolated areas, agreements may be made with individuals. Municipalities and other primarily tax-supported groups are eligible, but not federal and provincial government departments. It must be established that the proposed activities would not be undertaken as a result of normal or planned expenditures.

All persons working on a project must be students who are Canadian citizens or permanent residents legally entitled to work in Canada. For the purposes of the Young Canada Works Program, a student is someone who was registered full-time at a secondary, post-secondary, or vocational school during the preceding year. The Canada Employment and Immigration Commission (CEIC) subsidizes employers at a rate of up to 50% of the hourly wage paid, up to \$1.50 per hour, to a maximum of \$1 560. Employers are also provided with an opportunity to assess these young people as potential permanent employees after the wage subsidy period has ended. Employers enter into an agreement with the federal government to provide 26 weeks of actual work experience in a newly created position. Local chambers of commerce and boards of trade participate actively and in some localities provide the basic management for the program.

There are three delivery options:

Under Option I, the CEIC utilizes the services of sponsors to administer the program. Sponsors include chambers of commerce, boards of trade or other community organizations. The sponsor conducts all aspects of the program on behalf of the CEIC with the exception of participant identification and pre-employment orientation. The sponsor is entitled to a contribution of \$60 per placement to cover its administrative costs.

Under Option II, the sponsor assists the CEIC in delivering the program and is awarded a contribution of \$35 per placement to cover its administrative costs.

Under Option III, the CEIC assumes total responsibility for delivery of the program.



All provinces control activities related to mining and oil and gas. Groundwater is a new responsibility; sand and gravel is administered in collaboration with the district offices. Forest matters are under the regional and district administrations with headquarters senior resources advisor in an advisory role. Oil and gas development in Alberta produces annual revenues, not including bonuses, of the order of \$150 million.

Complete management or assistance to Indian bands in the management and development of minerals underlying Indian lands, from disposal of the mineral rights by permit or lease through exploration, drilling, production, documentation, monitoring and collection of revenues are available. Minerals are disposed by public tender or direct negotiation between the band council and the developer. The Indian Minerals Branch, DIAND, assists in the selection of treaty rights lands to obtain land with best mineral potential. Assistance is provided the areas of in Indian employment and Indian involvement in the industry regardless of mineral ownership. The sub-program is generally concerned with obtaining the best returns for Indian people from development of their minerals.

Timber development is administered by the regional and district offices with the senior resources advisor in headquarters in an advisory role. The timber is disposed of by public tender for surrendered timber or with the consent of the band council on reserve lands without a surrender.

The sub-program applies to all Indian reserves. Problems exist within some of the provinces respecting ownership of minerals. Ontario claims 50% of the revenues from all minerals.

Two deployed headquarters offices in Toronto and Calgary are responsible for all mineral activities in eastern and western Canada, respectively. Before disposal, all minerals must be made available by band referendum (surrender). Surrenders may be specific or general and no subsequent disposal may be made without the approval of the band council. Working closely with the band council, the Indian Minerals Branch provides technical, professional and management services as necessary. Due to high capital requirements and the high risk factor, nearly all development has been by third-party interests. Bands may obtain benefits through bonuses, rents, royalties, percentage of profits, employment and involvement. Provision is made for total development by band or band entity. Due to lack of appropriate federal laws in certain phases of development, the Indian Mineral Regulations require all operators to observe applicable provincial laws. This requirement holds true for timber development also.

The headquarters office (the senior resources advisor) is a policy-making body and monitoring agent for the activities of the Indian Minerals Branch (Toronto and Calgary) and the forestry aspects handled by the regional and district offices.

Headquarters is responsible for studying federal and provincial policy and legislation regarding resource

development in determining the effects that these may have on Indian rights. This includes the formulation of policy and recommendations relating to such matters as the applicability of provincial codes on mining projects on Indian reserves. Responsibility rests with DIAND through Responsibility the Reserves and Trusts group and thence for Delivery: through Indian Minerals for mineral matters and the regions and districts for forestry matters. 



Grants for the Promotion of Better Understanding Between Native People and Those Who Represent the Legal System (formerly the Program of Grants for the Education of Native People in the Legal System)

Ontario

The program was planned and implemented in the 1974-75 fiscal year with the objective of reducing the communication barrier existing between native people and those who represent the legal system, by educating native people within the legal system. It became evident after two years of operation that an equally effective approach to the same basic objective would be to sensitize or educate those who represent the legal system (judges, police, and the legal profession) to the problems distinct to native people. The revised criteria provide for an extension of the classes of recipients and broaden the base of the program while retaining the original philosophy.

The projects to be funded would fall under three categories:

- conferences, meetings or workshops between native people and those involved in the administration of justice;
- educational or informational projects designed to increase the understanding of native people with respect to the law, its administration, and enforcement; and
- 3) sensitization projects for judges, magistrates and other officials of the legal system designed to increase their awareness of problems distinct to native people.

The program lapsed at the end of the 1977-78 fiscal year. The new preventive thrust under the Native Courtworker Program will absorb this program by promoting a better understanding between the native people and those who administer the legal system; this will be done on a cost-shared basis with the provinces and/or territories, where the need has been identified, and an agreement has been drawn up and signed by those concerned.

The concept of native courtworker services was initially developed by the Indian and Métis friendship centres, which came into existence in the late 1950s and are still growing in numbers across Canada. The major concern of the friendship centres was to assist native people migrating into urban areas from rural and isolated communities. It became evident to the friendship centre personnel that migrating native people needed immediate assistance in understanding their legal rights in a foreign environment. With that in mind, the friendship centre personnel did the best they could to assist native people in conflict with the law who came to them for assistance.

The Department of Justice took over responsibility of the program during the 1973-74 fiscal year. The Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development felt that the mandate of the Department of Justice was better suited to sponsor the program.

Circular 1977-50. With the exception of \$325 000 allocated to the Newspapers Program, all core funds take the form of Contributions.

The grant support to status Indian organizations of the Secretary of State (Citizenship) arose out of the ARDA-DREE agreements, which were established in 1967 and transferred to the Secretary of State as of April 1, 1971. Federal funds were paid to the native associations through the provinces. On July 29, 1971, Cabinet approved direct funding to the native associations (Cabinet Document 907-71). At the same time, approval was given to provide federal support for Métis and non-status Indian associations.
