The material does not deal with National programs of universal application to which Indian people have access in the same way as other Canadian citizens, such as unemployment insurance, family allowance, etc.

At this stage, the material is not as complete as might be desirable and as such will be the subject of on-going review and modification. Similar volumes are now available for all other provinces in Canada.

This volume was prepared from the combined inputs of Regional office and Headquarters staff of the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development. In Ontario the attendance of Indian children at provincial schools is arranged through a general tuition agreement and addendum for special services between the Department of Education in Ontario and this Department. This general agreement provides for tuition fee payments only. Other agreements exist between the Department and school boards in Ontario which involve the cost-sharing of the construction of school accommodation in provincial schools attended by Indian children.

Elementary and Secondary Education

The program provides for basic elementary and secondary education with arrangements for curriculum adaptation designed to make the school program relevant to the background of the Indian pupils.

In October 1976, the Minister, CEIC, announced a five-year Federal employment strategy which included large direct job creation programs such as Canada Works. The Federal contribution to any one project is limited to \$200,000 annually, unless further approval is sought from Treasury Board on an individual project basis. Proposals for projects may originate from within the Department or from community organizations, groups, agencies, or individuals. A formal agreement is entered into between the Department and the project sponsor and calls for periodic and scheduled payments upon satisfactory compliance with the terms of the agreement. Agreements may be renegotiated at any time and are generally of one year's duration subject to renewal on an annual basis. Project activity is managed by the sponsoring group, with the Department monitoring the operational and financial activities.

> Payments are made to project sponsors only, based on actual past and estimated future expenditures necessary to successful project operation.

The Community Employment Strategy in its developmental phase is intended to explore and develop means of opening job opportunities to those who experience particular or continuing difficulty finding or keeping employment by involving communities in defining needs and solutions using the existing range of federal and provincial programs.

CES is operated jointly with the Mode of Delivery: provinces. Three communities have been selected in Ontario community employment, and overall responsibility in each province rests with a body of senior federal and provincial officials. When communities have identified needs and existing federal and/or provincial programs to respond to those needs, each government will endeavour to apply programs in those communities. On the federal side, where lack of existing program funds would prevent the application of a program so identified. CES could act as a catalyst for this purpose. Responsibility for management of such programs in CES communities would continue to rest with the program in question. It is envisaged that both Manpower programs and the programs of other federal departments would be involved in this way.

Description: LEAP is a program designed to provide funds to be disbursed primarily as wages for projects that promise to create worthwhile employment opportunities for those people who would probably remain unemployed despite normal labour market activity.

Mode of Delivery: The LEAP program is financed entirely by the federal government although provincial and municipal governments may assist a project through capital contributions, cost-sharing or the provision of support services. Federal funds are used primarily for wages and employee benefits. Overhead or administrative costs may not exceed twenty-five per cent of the amount expended on gross wages, and an additional twenty per cent of gross wages and overhead may be provided for special costs such as expert supervision, training or counselling. Funding will not cover any costs which the Federal Government now shares nor capital or construction charges. Projects may not receive a federal government contribution or more than \$200,000 annually.

> Proposals for projects may originate from non-profit organizations, community or citizen groups, voluntary agencies or individuals. A formal contract is entered into by the Department and the project sponsor which call for periodic and scheduled payments upon satisfactory compliance with the terms of the contract. Federal-Provincial Agricultural Manpower Agreements

The purpose of this program is that Canada and the Provinces will carry out a joint agricultural manpower program in respect of the recruitment and movement of agricultural manpower, research and promotion of improvements in working and living conditions and other measures related to the development and utilization of agricultural manpower.

Costs under the Agricultural Manpower Agreements are shared equally between the Governments of Canada and the respective provinces. Activities are carried out in cooperation between the provincial Departments of Agriculture and the Regional Offices and Canada Manpower Centres of the Canada Employment and Immigration Commission.

The Provinces submit claims to the Senior Assistant Deputy Minister (Manpower) upon completion of program activities, usually on a quarterly basis. Where federal direct expenditures are involved, such as the provision of transport warrants and other travel costs, the provincial account is charged for fifty per cent of the amount paid out. Upon receipt of expenditure claims from the provinces, a cheque payable to the Province is issued by the Department to cover fifty per cent of costs incurred by the Province under the terms of the Agreements.

Consultation and revision necessary for the program is carried on throughout the year by correspondence and recommendations are tabled by delegates to the annual meeting of the Canada Agriculture Manpower Committee. Authority:

<u>Description</u>: The basic objective of the program is to stimulate the Canadian economy by encouraging employers to initiate and improve their employee training programs to increase productivity and encourage employment.

Mode of Delivery: This program is funded and administered by the federal government. There is no municipal involvement; the provinces, however, are responsible for the expertise in the field of industry-based occupational training. Provinces are reimbursed for their services on a fee for service basis.

> Direct training costs may be reimbursed to the employer for the off-the-job elements of training. These may include part of:

- instructor's wages;
- instructor's travelling and living expenses;
- training aids such as textbooks and expendable tools;
- rental of premises and training equipment from third parties;
- course fees where part of the training takes place in an institution.

For each approved training program, the Department may also reimburse up to 40% of the earnings of an employed trainee: up to 60% of the earnings of a trainee recruited from among the unemployed or about to be laid off; and up to 85% of the earnings of a trainee with special needs. The maximum reimbursable for

weekly wages under this program is stipulated in the Adult Occupational Training Act.

Because the provinces are responsible for the pedagogical side of all training programs submitted by the employees, their approval of the training plan is a requisite to CEIC authorization of the training contract.

This program is designed to provide occupational training that will increase an adult's capacity or opportunity for employment. The institutional training portion of the program is composed of the following elements:

In addition, allowances are paid to individuals enrolled in full-time training courses.

General policy for the program is set by Federal-Provincial Manpower Needs Committees. The Provinces provide Canada with curriculum outlines, courses of study, training schedules, information on proposed changes and other materials relevant to evaluating training courses. Trainees are selected by local Canada Manpower Centres and attend courses given by Provincial and Municipal training institutions.

Each month, installment payments are made by the Federal Government on the basis of the volume of training planned for that month. The Agreements provide for regular consultation and revision of the program to suit it to current conditions.

Local Initiatives Program (LIP)

LIP is directed to alleviating high seasonal unemployment by enabling individuals and groups to implement projects which will create jobs and benefit their communities.

There are three types of projects:

- LIP Financial support may be given to municipalities, organizations, groups, private individuals or Indian bands for project related to community improvements. These projects must employ a minimum of 60 man-weeks of employment.
- 2. Canada Works In this year-round program funds are primarily allocated to areas of high unemployment by Advisory Boards reviewed and recommended by Advisory Boards in constituencies within the framework of broad priority areas established by the provincial and federal governments. Projects can encompass large community undertakings (ex. sewer and water) and may last up to 12 months.
- 3. Young Canada Works This is a student employment program of 14 weeks duration. Emphasis is placed on doing something of solid community value while gaining in personal development. (i.e. fire prevention, environmental improvement and community development).

Description: This program is designed to assist unemployed workers (especially those with family responsibilities) to travel to communities where their skills are needed and to pay for normal services to clients at the Canada Manpower Centres. There are 6 different grants available:

- Exploratory grant to explore job opportunities outside the recipient's area.
- Relocation grant to help pay for relocation of the recipient (and family) who has obtained employment in the nearest area where suitable jobs are available.
- 3. Travel grant to temporary employment - to travel to temporary jobs of at least 8 weeks duration in a locality outside their residence (also offered to students who move to a summer job of at least 6 weeks duration).
- 4. Travel grant to Seasonal Agricultural Work - to pay return travel costs plus meals and accommodation enroute to accept seasonal agricultural jobs outside their local area. Workers must remain until the job is terminated to benefit from this grant.

Special Travel Grant - pays for return transportation, meals and accommodation while travelling, living allowance up to 2 days for CMC clients who require manpower services which are not available on the area in which they live (for example counselling, interviews, testing).

5. Trainee Travel Grant - assists in travel costs for people attending Manpower Training courses at schools outside their home areas. It pays for return transportation or a community allowance when trainees cannot relocate temporarily.

Sub-Program: Federal Labor Intensive Program - FLIP

Ontario Province:

Services Available: The FLIP Program is designed as a Labor Intensive Program intended to create jobs while providing maximum community benefits. Minimum wage is established and based on a 40 hour work week. Costs of materials should not exceed 50% of total submission and the program is designed to operate during periods of high unemployment and reflect a decrease in Social Assistance Payments. Individual Programs are designed by Bands or Associations and hiring is done directly at the Reserve level.

Activities are co-ordinated by Mode of Delivery: Department Staff but administration is the responsibility of the individual Band of Association. Hiring is done directly by Band or Association when funds are authorized.

There is little or no input into the Indian Input: formulation of the basic program at this time. Individual Bands or Associations, however, have the responsibility of developing the program within the established guideline at their level for application and maximum impact.

Wages are reimbursed to a maximum of \$1.50 per hour to the employer to create an incentive to hire these employees.

The program is divided into two phases -Summer and Winter. The winter program is handled by Canada Manpower, however the Summer phase is jointly funded by CMC Chamber of Commerce and the Province.

Y: The Program is administered by Canada Manpower in all areas but concentrated in areas of high unemployment. Native input is limited, however there is a certain amount of the Budget guaranteed for Native involvement. The funds for this program are derived from the Summer Student Program.

Grants for the Promotion of Better Understanding Between Native People and those who Represent the Legal System (formerly the Programme of Grants for the Education of Native People in the Legal System)

Province: Ontario

Services Available: The programme was planned and implemented in the 1974-75 fiscal year with the objective of reducing the communication barrier which exists between Native People and those who represent the legal system by educating Native people within the legal system. It becomes evident after two years of operation that an equally effective approach to the same basic objective would be to sensitize or educate those who represent the legal system (judges, police, and the legal profession) to the problems distinct to Native people. The revised criteria provide for an extension of the classes of recipients and broaden the base of the programme while retaining the original philosophy.

The projects that are funded would fall under three categories:

- Conferences, meetings or workshops between Native people and those involved in the administration of justice.
- Educational or informational projects designed to increase the understanding of Native people with respect to the law, its administration and enforcement.
- 3) Sensitization projects for judges, magistrates and other officials of the legal system designed to increase their awareness of problems distinct to Native people.

The programme will lapse at the end of the 1977-78 fiscal year. The new

preventive thrust under the Native Courtworker Programme will absorb this programme by promoting to administer the legal system on a cost-shared basis with the provinces and/or territories where the need has been identified, and an agreement has been drawn up and signed by those concerned. Services Available: The concept of Native courtworker services was initially developed by the Indian and Metis Friendship Centres which came into existence in the late 1950s and are still growing in numbers across Canada. The major concern of the friendship centres was to assist Native people migrating into urban areas from rural and isolated communities. It became evident to the friendship centre personnel that migrating Native people needed immediate assistance in understanding their legal rights in a foreign environment. With that in mind, the friendship centre personnel did the best they could to assist Native people in conflict with the law who came to them for assistance.

The Native Courtworker

The Department of Justice took over responsibility of the programme during the 1973-74 fiscal year. The Department of Indian and Northern Affairs felt that the mandate of the Department of Justice was better suited to sponsor the programme.

The courtworker service will include the following:

- a) assisting Native people in understanding their rights when charged with a criminal offence.
- b) obtaining legal counsel when required.
- c) explaining court procedures.
- d) explaining the role of the judge, magistrate, prosecutor, etc.
- e) providing related services to the family of the accused.

f) Recently a preventive thrust was added on an experimental basis.

The Department of Justice believes it is important to encourage students of Native ancestry to enter the legal profession. It therefore planned and implemented the Native Law Students Programme in 1973.

The Native Law Students Programme

The Native Law Students Programme of the Department of Justice is designed to provide:

- grants to or on behalf of non-status Native students pursuing undergraduate studies in law in a Canadian university; and
- grants to Canadian universities which conduct a special orientation or tutorial programme to encourage native people to enter the legal profession.

Student applicants are required to submit the following as a minimum requirement for funding:

- a completed personal information form, including information on income of the applicant or other assistance received by him or her;
- b) official confirmation of acceptance in a Canadian law school (conditional or not);
- c) permission from the student authorizing Justice to obtain the official results of the Law School Admission Test (LSAT) or other tests better adapted to Natives' background whenever applicable; and
- d) native students who have not been previously funded by the Department of Justice, but who have successfully completed their first

year of law studies in a Canadian university, may also qualify for assistance on the basis of need and in accordance with items a), b) and c) above.

Canadian universities running special orientation or tutorial programmes to encourage Native people to enter or continue studies for the legal profession will be required to submit an application to the Department which will include:

- a) a detailed plan of assistance;
- b) a proposed budget;

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- c) details of availability of qualified and interested instructors; and
- d) a firm commitment to administer the programme within a specified time frame and to submit a report on its effectiveness.

It is also proposed to use part of this grant allotment to fund Canadian law school projects organized in addition, and possibly as an alternative, to the pre-law summer orientation course run by the University of Saskatchewan since 1973.

Responsibility DIAND for Delivery:

Indian Input: Provided exclusively by Band Council and general Band membership. Planner assists in social dynamics, social development concepts and principle.

Sub-Program: Environmental Planning

Province: Ontario

Service Available: The District Planners will provide reserve specific environmental monitoring, and keep region briefed on possible major concern areas. The Regional Environmental Unit will deal with issues of broad concern or with on/off reserve impact.

Eligibility: Bands in the Province of Ontario.

<u>Mode of Delivery</u>: Environmental evaluation monitoring and resource management - on reserve through district planners as part of comprehensive planning.

> Significant areas of impact and major resource issues affecting general areas of Ontario will be dealt with at Region with input from bands and Districts.

Indian Input:

No independent work will occur without full Indian Involvement and committment. The band will be responsible for their resource Management with the district planners in an advisory role.

2. Project Development Division

Developes capital projects from the concept or feasibility stage, through design to the implementation stage.

3. <u>Contract Services and</u> <u>Procurement Division</u>

> Provides a Branch tender and contract service function for construction, operating and maintenance. Material acquisition and financial reporting are the other responsibilities of this Division.

4. <u>Construction and Maintenance</u> <u>Division</u>

> Responsible for the implementation, maintenance of buildings and works throughout the Region. A further responsibility is the reserve fire prevention organization and construction safety measures.

Mode of Delivery:

All Bands on Reserves in the Atlantic Region.

Through DIAND with support available for Bands that want to manage their own service, through the Engineering and Architecture unit. The Engineering and Architecture unit provides direct service, or arranges for the provision of Engineering and Architecture service through other Federal and Provincial Departments, such as, the:

> Department of Public Works Department of the Environment Department of Labour Fire Marshal (Provincial and Federal)

Consultant contracts are also arranged and funded, by the Department, with Band participation in the arrangement.

Responsibility for Delivery:

Indian Input:

DIAND provides or arranges for the services.

The level and type of input varies significantly between Bands. Generally, Bands directly manage minor construction work with technical direction from DIAND. Bands manage most of the technical operation of infrastructure, with DIAND support.

Participation by Other Agencies:

Department of Public Works of Canada provides design service and project management for some select projects.

Department of Environment completes groundwater investigation studies and Environmental Assessment studies.
