THE CONSULTATION PROCESS

Because of the importance of <u>consultation</u> in the evaluation process in the context of the <u>partnership</u> policy, special consultative mechanisms have been established for each of the following evaluation projects. Typically they take the form of Evaluation Steering/Advisory Committees which have collective responsibility for:

- 1) describing and approving Terms of Reference;
- 2) approving choice of evaluator;
- 3) approving research design;
- 4) monitoring progress and ensuring field strategy consistent with Terms of Reference;
- 5) receiving and judging critically reports.

Evaluation Steering/Advisory Committees are composed of all interested parties to an evaluation and in all cases include Indians. The level of this Indian participation depends on the nature and scope of the activity under scrutiny. In most cases Provincial Associations participate in this process, although the Chief or Band Manager may be more appropriate in a 'casestudy' approach.

In addition, all evaluation research designs incorporate Indian consultative process before the implementation of a field strategy to collect data. In some cases, the Ontario Social Services Review being the best example, a continuing and comprehensive evaluation/planning Indian consultative process is built into the research design. In the Ontario project, representatives from each of the four Provincial Indian associations spearhead a continuing process of involvement of Indian organizations concerned with the delivery of social services (e.g. Society of Indian Welfare Administrators).

In many projects, representatives from other Federal Departments (e.g. Health and Welfare Canada) and Provincial bodies (e.g. Department of Education, Ministry of Community and Social Services) also sit on Evaluation Steering/Advisory Committees. This facilitates the necessary cooperation and access to data in activity areas normally under Provincial jurisdiction.
