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## Hon. Donald M. Fleming, Q.C., Appointed as New Federal Minister of Justice

The appointment of Donald Methuen Fleming, Q.C., as Canada's Minister of Justice was announced recently by Prime Minister John G. Diefenbaker. Mr. Fleming was Minister of Finance from 1957 until his appointment to the Justice portfolio.

As Head of the Department of Justice, Mr. Fleming succeeds Hon. E. Davie Fulton, who has been appointed Minister of Public Works. The appointments were among a number announced by Mr. Diefenbaker in an extensive realignment of Federal Cabinet posts.

A prominent Toronto barrister and a veteran parliamentarian, Mr. Fleming was first elected to the House of Commons for the constituency of Toronto-Eglinton in the 1945 general election. He has represented Eglinton continuously since that time, having been re-elected in 1949, 1953, 1957, 1958 and 1962.

Following the 1957 general election, Mr. Fleming was sworn in as Federal Minister of Finance and Receiver-General of Canada. Shortly afterwards, he was also appointed as a Governor of the International Bank, International Monetary Fund and International Finance Corporation for a five-year term, and in 1960 was also named a Governor of the International Development Agency. In June, 1962, he was re-appointed to the latter four posts for a further five-year term.

He was sworn in as Federal Minister of Justice and Attorney-General of Canada on August 9, 1962.

Born at Exeter, Ontario, in 1905, Mr. Fleming attended public schools and collegiate at Galt, where his graduation from Galt Collegiate Institute in 1921 with the first Carter Scholarship for Waterloo County marked the beginning of an outstanding scholastic record.

Entering the University of Toronto at 16 years of age, he graduated in 1925 with the Governor-General's Gold Medal for General Proficiency, the highest award in the Faculty of Arts, and the Breuls Gold Medal for Political Science. He was also awarded the first Alexander MacKenzie Scholarship in the Second Year (1923) and the first Alexander MacKenzie Scholarship in the Third Year (1924) in the Political Science Course.

Attending Osgoode Hall Law School, he was awarded scholarships there in 1926 and 1927, and graduated in 1928 with a Silver Medal and the Christopher Robinson Memorial Scholarship. In addition, he obtained the degree of Bachelor of Laws from the University of Toronto in 1930. He was a member of the University of Toronto Senate from 1945 to 1948.

Called to the Ontario Bar in 1928, following graduation from Osgoode Hall, he practised continuously in Toronto as a member of the firm of Kingsmill, Mills, Price and Fleming until 1957. He was created a King's Counsel in 1944.

A leader in community and welfare work in Toronto, he served as a school trustee in 1938, and as a Toronto alderman from 1939 to 1944. While on

## Trailer Camp Base For Joyceville Inmates

Under the supervision of two correctional officers, ten inmates from Joyceville Institution are being housed in trailers at the Dominion Experimental Farm at Smithfield while being engaged in special work projects at the Farm.

The group lives at the trailer camp at Smithfield from Monday morning to Friday evening each week, returning to Joyceville for the weekends. During their five-day work week at Smithfield, the inmates are employed in harvesting fruit crops and on other work projects in connection with Experimental Farm operations, under the direction of the Superintendent.

The camp consists of five trailers, two of which are used as dormitories for the inmates, one for the officers, one for kitchen, and one for washroom facilities.

## Assistant Personnel Director Appointed

Appointment of Frederick Norman Pope as Assistant Director of Personnel Services for the Canadian Penitentiary Service at its Ottawa Headquarters was announced recently by Allen J. MacLeod, Q.C., Commissioner of Penitentiaries. Prior to his recent appointment, Mr. Pope was head of a section at Canadian Army Headquarters in charge of all administrative matters relating to employment, postings, promotion and release for 45,000 soldiers.

Born in England, Mr. Pope came to Canada before the Second World War, graduating from McGill University in 1938 with a B.Sc. degree in agriculture. He joined the Canadian Army in 1939, and since that time has held various senior army staff appointments in Ottawa, the United Kingdom and the United Nations Headquarters in New York, where he served as Military Advisor to Canada's External Affairs Minister at the time of the Suez crisis.

## New Maximum Security, Fireproof Institution Designed For Freedomite Doukhobor Inmates

A new prison, especially designed to hold Sons of Freedom Doukhobors sentenced to penitentiary terms is now in operation. It is located approximately five miles north of Agassiz, British Columbia.

Because of the fact that most of the convicted Freedomites constitute a potential fire hazard, design and construction of the new maximum security prison has been made as fireproof as possible.

Fireproof even to the paint, the new prison — which has been officially named Mountain Prison — has highly restrictive security features.

To virtually eliminate any chance of fire or other property damage, the dormitory buildings have been constructed of metal, with concrete floors. Light fixtures are high in the ceilings and are covered with wire mesh. Windows are also grilled with heavy wire.

In the dormitories, beds are double-decker steel bunks, and stools are also of steel. Mattresses and bedding are made of flameproof material. And, to provide additional protection, oversize fire hydrants are located at strategic points around the prison area — outside the fences, so that inmates will not be able to tamper with the water supply in any emergency.

#### **Concerts Presented At Leclerc**

Concerts and recitals have been featured recently at Leclerc Institution at St. Vincent de Paul, P.Q. Among the highlights were:

An appearance by the Regional Harmony of Quebec Penal Institutions, a recently-organized group composed of officers from the three Institutions and the Farm Camp in the St. Vincent area. The same program also included an appearance by a small band of young German boys, providing an extensive and varied evening of entertainment for inmates and guests.

A two-hour program of singing and recital of poetry by the pupils of Pasteur School, a very popular group which has previously presented concerts at the Institution.

Continuing activity by the Inmates' Orchestra, which has acquired additional instruments, and is planning to stage an extensive musical program in the early Fall.

the prisoners will be under maximum security control. As a maximum security establishment, the prison has towers staffed with armed guards. Inmates will be allowed only minimum privileges — a half-hour visit once a month from members of their immediate families, and permission to write only one letter a month.

Explaining the highly restrictive nature of the \$300,000 Mountain Prison, Allen J. MacLeod, Q.C., Federal Commissioner of Penitentiaries, said that it was due to the nature of the Freedomite acts of violence.

"In other institutions, we emphasize a work program for inmates", Mr. MacLeod said. "Remembering past experiences, no such program has been planned here".

He pointed out that inmates who work are granted such privileges as watching television, listening to radio, playing cards, writing letters, playing baseball and other sports, reading, and attending shows. Since past experience has shown that the Freedomites refuse to do any work while in prison they will receive only minimum privileges.

However, Mr. MacLeod said, if individuals or the group as a whole ask to be allowed to participate in a work program, and show a genuine willingness to co-operate, consideration will be given to individual transfers to the B.C. Penitentiary, or to establishment of a work program at Mountain Prison itself.

Mountain Prison is on a 168-acre site, and has accommodation for 250 men and 150 women, with a fence separating male and female compounds. In cases where a husband and wife are both inmates, they will have their half-hour monthly visit in the public visiting area.

The Freedomites will sleep 40 to a dormitory. They will cut their own firewood for their heating and cooking needs, and will do their own cooking. They will also maintain their own living quarters and do their own laundry.

First inmates of Mountain Prison will be 49 convicted Freedomites to be transferred from the British Columbia federal penitentiary at New Westminster. These will be followed by another 46 to be moved in from other institutions in the province.

Mountain Prison comes under the jurisdiction of Warden T. H. Hall of B.C. Penitentiary. In charge at the new prison itself will be Superintendent Raymond A. Wilson, who has been with the Penitentiary Service for 23 years, mostly in Saskatchewan. Under him will be a staff of 22 men and 11 women.



## Parole Board Chairman Clarifies Parole Policies, Procedures, Problems for Officials and Inmates

Discussions with magistrates, provincial legal and correctional officials, representatives of after-care agencies, and prison authorities and inmates provided a heavy agenda for Mr. T. George Street, Chairman of the National Parole Board, during a recent Western tour. Purpose of the tour was to clarify parole requirements and procedures for all those involved in any aspect of the Board's work.

Mr. Street's trip, covering the period June 12-29, included visits to Vancouver, Kelowna, Haney, Vic-

toria, William Head, Agassiz, Oakalla prison and B.C. Penitentiary in British Columbia; Edmonton, Alberta; and Prince Albert and Regina, Saskatchewan. In addition to attending numerous meetings, the Parole Board Chairman was interviewed by press, radio and television representatives at most of the centers visited.

Starting his tour in Vancouver, June 12, Mr. Street met with the staff of the Board's Vancouver office for discussions on parole procedures and problems. He also talked briefly with a drug addict who was on parole and Mr. Street reported he was favourably impressed with this parolee's attitude toward this opportunity and his responsibilities.

On June 13, Mr. Street attended a Magistrates' Conference at Kelowna, where he spoke to approximately 125 magistrates and their guests, who included probation officers and others in the correctional field. In addition to covering the Board's overall policies and procedures, he discussed special problems regarding criminals with long records. In his opinion, he said, there was a need for longer sentences in such cases, as short sentences did not provide incentive or opportunity for reform.

While at Kelowna he also held informal discussions with Attorney-General Robert Bonner of British Columbia and senior officials of the Attorney-General's Department.

Reasons for refusal of parole, as well as special problems encountered with Doukhobor inmates, were among topics discussed with prison officials when Mr. Street visited Haney Correctional Institution June 14. While at Haney he also met with a group of inmates, providing them with an opportunity to ask questions and present their opinions regarding parole.

Moving to Victoria June 15, Mr. Street visited William Head for meetings with staff and inmates. He also discussed parole questions with Inspector H. F. Price of the R.C.M. Police, and with officials of the John Howard Society. Talks with the latter group centered on questions of the future role of the after-care agencies, and methods of having inmates make greater use of the services of these agencies after their release.

On June 16, Mr. Street went to Agassiz, where he visited the work camp and also the new Mountain Prison for Doukhobors, and again discussed the prin-

### *Inmates Make Effective Use of Fire Fighting Training*

Provision of training for correctional camp inmates in forest fire fighting techniques paid off recently in the Bracebridge, Ontario, area, when an inmate fire-fighting crew from Beaver Creek Correctional Camp was able to effectively assist Ontario Lands and Forest Department personnel in bringing a local bush fire under control.

The practical proof of the value of this training came on June 16, when the camp's Officer K. Knister received a telephone call from the Forest Ranger's office at Bracebridge requesting assistance in extinguishing a local bush fire.

Mr. Knister selected four inmates who had successfully completed a fire-fighting course conducted earlier at the camp, and went with them to the Santa's Village area. After receiving instructions, the officer and four inmates fought the fire for approximately seven hours alongside one employee of the Department of Lands and Forests and two civilians, using equipment provided by the Provincial Government.

For their labour, the inmates were paid by the Provincial Government at \$1.00 per hour. Their cheques were received by the Accountant at Collin's Bay Penitentiary, the Camp's parent institution, and deposited in the inmates' Trust Fund Accounts.

In recognition of their efforts, Chief Ranger Elliott later telephoned Camp Superintendent D.J. Halfhide to express the Department's appreciation. Ranger Elliott congratulated Supt. Halfhide on the inmates' behaviour, and on the skill they showed in organizing and in fighting the fire. He made particular mention of their use of fire hoes, and their knowledge of the correct use of fire-fighting hand tools.

cipal aspects of parole with staff and inmate groups. On June 18 he met with members of the British Columbia Court of Appeal and British Columbia parole officials, and later addressed a representative meeting of all groups involved in corrections in British Columbia — including after-care agencies, probation and parole services, correctional institutions, public agencies and police.

British Columbia Penitentiary was next on Mr. Street's agenda, and on June 19, he held meetings there with Warden T. Hall and senior staff and also with groups of inmates, including one group of Doukhobor inmates. That evening he was a guest on Vancouver radio station CKLG's "Voice of Vancouver" program, an audience participation show in which listeners telephone to ask speakers questions relating to their field, with the complete conversation broadcast.

Mr. Street held meetings with the Warden and senior staff officers of Oakalla Prison on June 20, and also met with groups of male and female inmates of that institution. Main topics discussed were again conditions of parole, reasons for refusal of paroles, and problems of paroling drug addicts.

On June 21, Mr. Street visited the Narcotic Addict Foundation residence and met with a planning committee working on special problems and procedures in cases where drug addicts were paroled.

He also met members of the Foundation's Board of Directors, which includes a number of prominent Vancouver business and community leaders, and later held a press conference and was interviewed by Vancouver radio and television stations.

He visited Harrison, B.C. June 22, where he was one of several speakers who addressed a meeting of the British Columbia Bar Association, with the various speakers covering such related topics as sentencing practices, prison administration, and Mr. Street also had informal discussions with many Vancouver lawyers and a number of British Columbia judges.

During most of his British Columbia tour, Mr. Street was accompanied by Mr. Kyle Stevenson of the Parole Board's Vancouver office, and Warden T. Hall of British Columbia Penitentiary was also present on a number of occasions.

Moving to Edmonton, Mr. Street met with the Alberta Government's Inspector of Prisons, Mr. E. E. Buchanan, and later with Deputy Attorney-General John Hart and senior Alberta probation officials. He also discussed parole questions with senior police officers of the R.C.M. Police and the City of Edmonton. During his visit he met with Basil Dean, publisher of the Edmonton Journal and was later interviewed by the Journal; appeared in television programs on Stations CFRN and CBXT; and did a radio interview for Station CKCA.

## Leclerc's "Contact" Gains in Size and Circulation

For its fourth issue, "Contact", Leclerc's young inmate publication, has increased its number of pages from 40 to 48. It has also doubled the figure for its outside circulation over the past three months, and has ambitions to switch to a monthly schedule early in 1963.

Since most of the inmates' relatives subscribe to the magazine, one of the aims of "Contact" is to provide wives and parents with an outline of the instructional and other rehabilitative activities in which their husbands or sons engage in the institution. Another objective is to enable inmates to express constructive views for the benefit of the general public and penal authorities, while a third aim is to provide inmates themselves with information on what is going on in the institution.

To date, "Contact" is meeting all these objectives very successfully, according to J.G.L. Gosselin, Assistant Warden Organization and Administration.

On the following day, June 26, Mr. Street met with Hon. E.C. Manning, Alberta's Premier and Attorney-General, for discussions on probation and parole programs. During his Edmonton visit he also met officials of the John Howard Society, Chief Justice Bruce Smith, and several judges of the Alberta Supreme Court and Court of Appeal.

Lyle Howarth, the Parole Board's regional representative in Edmonton, accompanied Mr. Street on his Alberta visits.

Arriving in Prince Albert, Mr. Street addressed a meeting of the John Howard Society there on the evening of June 26 and on June 27 visited the Saskatchewan Penitentiary for discussions with the Warden and senior officers, and with groups of inmates. He also visited the Prince Albert farm camp and later the Prince Albert provincial prison, where he had discussions on parole aspects with senior staff and talked with a group of inmates.

Mr. Street's next stop was Regina, where he attended a John Howard Society function, met Chief Justice E. M. Hall, and judges of the Court of Appeal, Queen's Bench, and District Court, and toured the provincial gaol at Regina with Saskatchewan Director of Corrections Jack Mather. Before leaving Regina, he also had meetings with Attorney-General Robert Walker and his deputy, R.S. Meldrum, and with J.S. White, Deputy Minister of Social Welfare; Regina Magistrate E.L. Elliott; Regina Police Chief Arthur Cookson; and the President and Directors of the Regina John Howard Society. During his visit he was interviewed by the Regina Leader Post and by television station CKCK TV.

## Two New Regional Directors In Charge of All Ontario, Quebec Institutions

Two new Regional Directorships were established in the Federal Penitentiary Service June 1, covering all federal penal institutions in Ontario and Quebec, according to a recent announcement by Hon. E. Davie Fulton, Minister of Justice. The new organizational pattern also included a major realignment of senior penitentiary staff in these two provinces.

Mr. Fulton also announced changes in the Penitentiary Service's Headquarters in Ottawa, involving senior administrative staff.

All the changes announced were in line with recommendations made earlier for the improvement of administration as part of the overall penal reform program, Mr. Fulton said.

The two new Regional Directors are:

*\*David M. McLean*, formerly Warden of Kingston Penitentiary, who as Director of all federal institutions in Ontario will now be responsible for not only Kingston Penitentiary but also Collin's Bay Penitentiary, Joyceville Institution, the Farm Camps at Collin's Bay and Joyceville, Beaver Creek and Landry Crossing Work Camps, and the Prison for Women at Kingston.

*\*J.R. Gregoire Surprenant*, formerly Warden of St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary, P.Q., who as Regional Director for Quebec will direct activities not only at St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary, but also at

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### Four Officers At Dorchester Had 147 Years Total Service

Four retired Dorchester officers recently received long-service scrolls in recognition of their careers in the penitentiary service, which totalled 147 years. The scrolls were presented June 13 by Warden C.E. DesRosiers, on behalf of Hon. E. Davie Fulton, Federal Minister of Justice.

One of the four, Harold Russell Thompson, retired recently as Guard Herdsman after completing 46 years of service, dating back to June 23, 1914.

Frank Lawrence Dobson, who began his service September 15, 1919, retired as Instructor Quarryman after 43 years of service.

Clarence T. Douglas, who joined the service May 1, 1930, retired as Assistant Farm Manager after 31 years.

Charles William Crandall, who retired from the post of Deputy Warden at Dorchester due to ill health, had recorded 27 years of service, which began February 9, 1933.

All four officers began their penitentiary service careers as guards.

Mr. McLean joined the Penitentiary Service in 1932 and has held various posts including Deputy Warden of Collin's Bay Penitentiary, Warden of Dorchester Penitentiary and Warden of Kingston Penitentiary.

In 1955 he transferred to the Canadian Provost Corps and was appointed Command Provost Marshal, Quebec Command. He remained in this post until joining the Penitentiary Service.

*\*R.E. March*, formerly Director of the Organization and Administration Division, who has been named Director of Research at the Ottawa Headquarters. This is a new post created to compile statistics and other research material so that a closer study can be made of procedures and methods in the Penitentiary Service.

*\*Walter Johnstone*, formerly Director of Staff Training and a former Warden of Kingston Penitentiary, who has been named Director of Organization and Administration succeeding Mr. March.

*\*J.P.A.M. Lavery*, formerly Deputy Director of Inmate Training at Federal Training Centre, Montreal, who succeeds Mr. Johnstone as Director of Staff Training at Headquarters.

*\*V.S.J. Richmond*, formerly Warden of Collin's Bay Penitentiary, who has been promoted to the position of Warden of Kingston Penitentiary to succeed Mr. McLean.

*\*Michel LeCorre*, formerly Deputy Warden of Leclerc Institution, who has been named Warden of St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary to succeed Mr. Surprenant.

*\*F. Smith*, formerly Deputy Warden of Collin's Bay Penitentiary, who has been appointed Warden of that institution. He has served for many years in various posts at Collin's Bay Penitentiary.



\**Maurice Gauthier*, formerly Supervisor of Classification of Psychological Services at St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary, who has been appointed Deputy Warden at Leclerc Institution, succeeding Mr. LeCorre.

\**U. Belanger*, formerly Classification Officer at Manitoba Penitentiary, who becomes Deputy Warden at Collin's Bay Penitentiary, succeeding Mr. Smith.

\**L.J.P. Jourdain*, formerly Assistant Director in Charge of Organization and Administration at Federal Training Centre, who has been named Deputy Director of that institution, succeeding Mr. Lavery.

According to Mr. Fulton, the appointments are a good example of the new Penitentiary Service career plan whereby correctional officers will be moved throughout the Service. Under the new plan, those entering the Penitentiary Service are assured of promotional opportunities as they occur.

## Value of Trade Training Proven for Two Parolees

Two inmates from Collin's Bay Penitentiary who had completed vocational training school courses at the institution successfully passed their respective trade tests prior to their recent release on parole. Their completion of these tests will make them eligible for employment in the fields concerned.

One of the former inmates, who completed an automotive course in the penitentiary over a year ago, has now been trade-tested by the Ontario Department of Labour, and has been granted three years credit towards his apprenticeship in the Motor Vehicle Repair Branch A (mechanical trade).

The other inmate, who completed a welding course over a year ago, was also trade-tested and was approved as a welder in the oxy-acetylene process.

## Group of 10 Magistrates Takes Dorchester Tour

Ten New Brunswick county magistrates, accompanied by Mr. L. D'Arcy of the provincial Attorney-General's Department in Fredericton, were conducted on a tour of Dorchester Penitentiary on June 8. The tour marked the first time that magistrates of New Brunswick have visited the penitentiary in a group of this size.

The magistrates were welcomed by Warden C.E. DesRosiers, with whom they discussed points of mutual interest in the penitentiaries and correctional fields. The tour was conducted by Deputy Warden H.F. Smith and Assistant Warden R.H. Duff.

Purpose of the visit was to acquaint the magistrates with the facilities and training available for inmates at the institution. The tour included visits to the cell blocks, training shops, vocational building, new farm camp and farm buildings. Warden DesRosiers reported that several of the magistrates renewed acquaintances with inmates they had met previously.

## FTC Catholic Chaplain Rev. Fr. Clermont Dies

Staff and inmates of the Federal Training Centre at St. Vincent de Paul, P.Q., were shocked to learn of the death May 16 of their Roman Catholic Chaplain, Rev. Father J.A.L. Clermont. Death was attributed to a heart attack.

In recognition of Father Clermont's services to the institution, his body was placed in the centre's mortuary chapel on the night of May 17-18, and inmates were permitted, on an hourly basis, to pay a last tribute and pray for their late chaplain in the chapel.

Funeral services were held May 19, with full military honours accorded by the Quebec Command of the Canadian Army. In addition to army representatives, the funeral was attended by the Penitentiaries' Regional Band, a platoon of Federal Training Centre officers trained for the occasion, and a large number of penitentiary service officers. The officiating prelate was Cardinal Emile Léger, who also delivered the funeral oration.

During the Second World War, Father Clermont served overseas as an army padre, with the rank of Major, and was a holder of the Military Cross. The citation he received with the Military Cross credited him with saving several lives during a bombardment in France.

# New Food Processing Plant at Joyceville To Supply Penitentiaries From Manitoba to the Maritimes

A new Food Processing Plant commenced operations at Joyceville Institution at Kingston at the end of May, replacing a smaller cannery which had been operated at Kingston Penitentiary since 1945.

The plant is engaged in processing and canning various vegetables as well as some varieties of fruit and some jams. Products from the Joyceville cannery are distributed to Federal Penitentiaries in Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Most of the vegetable produce is grown on two Institutional Farms in this area. A considerable amount of produce such as strawberries, apples and tomatoes is received from the Dominion Experimental Farm at Smithfield, Ontario, while plums are purchased in the Niagara district.

Only one size of can is used in the canning operation — the 105 fluid ounce can, commonly known as a gallon can.

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## Inmates at Dorchester Can Gain Trade Cards

Marking what is believed to be the first program of its kind in Canada, inmates at Dorchester Penitentiary can now become eligible as journeymen in various trades, with New Brunswick certification, while they are still serving their sentences.

Through the co-operation of the Apprenticeship Branch of the New Brunswick Department of Labour, Dorchester now has a training program in effect whereby inmates who can meet apprenticeship standards and pass the provincial Apprenticeship Selection Board may be indentured in such trades as brick-laying, carpentry, plumbing, sheet metal, machinist, motor vehicle repair-body work or mechanical, and painting and decorating.

Inmates will be given trade credits from courses or work training experiences, and will be provided with specialized related or academic training to meet provincial apprenticeship standards. As a result it will be possible for an inmate to be released as a certified journeyman in the trade of his choice, or released with whatever credits he has been awarded towards his eventual certification as a journeyman.

The program was developed by Dorchester's Chief Vocational Officer, R.K. Allaby, in collaboration with E.O. Allain, Field Supervisor of the New Brunswick Labour Department's Apprenticeship Branch. Negotiations are now under way with the other Maritime Provinces to have inmates from those provinces given the same recognition regarding this training as has been provided by New Brunswick.

Even though this will be its first operating season, the plant will have a fairly busy operation this year. Products slated to be processed, and the allotments of each for this season, will include:

Rhubarb, 289 cases; wax beans, 790 cases; green beans, 739 cases; whole tomatoes, 5,435 cases; tomato juice, 1,911 cases; plums, 820 cases; solid pack apples, 1,056 cases; apple jelly, 10,000 pounds; and apple-strawberry jam, 40,000 pounds.

Strawberries are frozen during the season and held until apples are available later in the fall, and then are processed into a compound apple-strawberry jam. The amount manufactured depends upon the crop of strawberries.

Other products processed are sauerkraut, celery and some pickles. These products depend on whether there is a surplus of these vegetables.

The possibility of new lines is also being considered, some of which may include corn, peas, and orange-lemon marmalade.

The new Joyceville canning plant is of modern design, bright and airy. The canning room is 105 feet long and 39 feet wide with a row of rooms along the south side consisting of a locker and washrooms, two lavatories, office, laboratory, dry storage for sugar, salt etc., and a machinery parts room.

The cookroom, 50 feet by 26 feet, has eight retorts, six of these being pressure retorts and two open process. Four of the six pressure retorts are operated automatically, the other two manually. The cookroom also has a storage area for empty retort crates.

The warehouse is 75 feet by 50 feet and will be used for storing canned goods and empty cans. A large door at the end of the warehouse will be used for loading and unloading trucks. On the opposite end of the building is a receiving platform, 50 feet by 28 feet, for receiving the produce to be processed in the plant.

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## Andre Lavery Holds New Position

Mr. André Lavery, formerly on the staff of the Federal Training Centre at St. Vincent de Paul, P. Q., was recently promoted to the position of Assistant Director of Organization and Administration (Staff Training) at Penitentiary Service Headquarters in Ottawa.

Mr. Lavery added other new responsibilities in May of this year, when he was elected to the presidency of the Canadian Industrial Trainers Association for the 1962-63 term of office. He has been an active member of the CITA for several years.



## Training Program For Inmates Effective

As part of an extensive inmate rehabilitation program, the Canadian Penitentiary Service is providing vocational training opportunities, through its Inmate Training Division, for interested inmates at various Federal institutions. Some indications of the success of this program are evident in the following excerpts from letters:

*\*From an ex-vocational trainee (barber) at the Federal Training Centre, to his instructor (translation from French):*

"I am writing to thank you for all you have done to help me. Today I realize how much patience it cost you to deal with me. I spent eight months at the Centre, and you are my best memory of that place, as you showed me kind heart, sincerity, honesty and knowledge of life.

"I do not regret my transfer (to the Gatineau Camp). I am very well treated here, and my morale is much better than in the past. I still work as a barber and am steadily progressing in skill. I am studying by correspondence and get good results.

"Once more I thank you for all you have done. You really know how to help inmates, and you give to inmates more than just earning your keep."

*\*From a John Howard Society post-release report, regarding an ex-vocational trainee (electrical):*

"He was successful in obtaining employment with an electrical repair shop in Toronto area. He has now completed the trial period and has been accepted as a permanent member of the staff. He is presently receiving \$1.50 per hour but his employer has indicated that he will soon receive a substantial raise.

"This particular job involves motor winding and the repair of various electrical motors and other equipment, and capitalizes fully upon the trade training received at Collin's Bay Penitentiary."

*\*From an ex-vocational trainee (machinist) to his instructor:*

"I have a couple of jobs at the present time, and work fourteen to sixteen hours each day.

"The first job I had on reaching town was a real pip. There were ten men working there when I started, and the boss fired them all during the first month, even the foreman. He kept me and raised my pay 50 cents an hour. Now I work all day as a painter, and weld for him at night.

"I put in an 80-hour week. This week I earned \$150. Each week I bank as much money as possible. Once I have bought all the things I need it will be possible for me to save quite a bit of money.

"Everyone is well pleased with the work I am doing for them. The first few weeks were really hard on me, but the thought of ever returning to a jail made me stick it out until the work became easier to do. When I look back on the past it is hard to believe that a man could give away so much of his life for so little in return. The money I am earning now might not come so easy, but when I am passed my pay I feel real good about having worked for it.

"I told my boss when he hired me that I would be one of the hardest workers he ever hired, and so far this has proven true. Some nights my hands are so sore I am unable to open them, but I feel wonderful every night I go to bed.

"I wish to thank you and the others for being so much of a help to me during my stay there."

*\*From an ex-vocational trainee (machinist) to his instructor:*

"As you know, when I left I went to Toronto to find work. Well, now I am in . . . working in a tool and die shop. I have been there for three weeks, working 10 hours a day, six days a week.

"I am only making \$1.25 an hour, which isn't the best as far as pay goes, but I am learning quite a bit. I am not doing layout, but working only on the machines, mills, grinders, etc. This shop does a lot of automotive dies, and from what I have seen so far, it's not quite what I am looking for. But I intend to stick it out for at least six months for the experience only. Then I will be looking for a shop in the general machining.

"When I found this job it was the eleventh shop I had applied at. I laid it right on the line as to where I worked last. He just asked what I could do, and when I told him, he hired me right on the spot."

## Parole Board Chairman On Western Tour

During July, National Parole Board Chairman T. George Street undertook an extensive tour of the Western provinces which included stopovers at Winnipeg, Calgary, Trail and Vancouver. Mr. Street also attended the Ninth Annual Institute on Crime and Delinquency, held in Seattle, Wash., July 23-24.

It was Mr. Street's second trip to the west in recent weeks. From June 12 to June 21 he had visited most of the penal institutions in British Columbia, held conferences with aftercare agencies in that province and with Regional Office Staff, participated in the "Voice of Vancouver" radio program on Station CKLG, and addressed the Magistrates' Conference at Kelowna.



## Gradual Release Proves Effective at Joyceville

Gradual release — a form of temporary parole designed to enable prison inmates to readjust themselves to the outside world through brief contacts before their final release on parole — has been actively and effectively employed at Joyceville institution recently.

Since the beginning of the fiscal year, a total of eight inmates have been successfully assisted through gradual release procedures. The most significant of this group, an inmate who had served well in excess of 15 years on a life sentence, is described by Joyceville officials as a "textbook example" of what can be achieved through team work by custodial, instructional, recreational, religious, hobbycraft, classification and administrative officers.

When transferred to Joyceville from another institution, they report, this man was very tense and withdrawn, unable to identify himself with or accept direction from any authority, and completely lacking in self-confidence.

Through the general environment at Joyceville, combined with objective efforts by all staff, the inmate developed from the poorest of parole prospects to a reasonably mature person, capable of accepting direction. After discussions with the National Parole Service, Warden O.A. Earl made arrangements to place the inmate on a farm for a 60-day period. His adjustment during this period was sufficiently satisfactory to prompt the National Parole Board to authorize his release on parole only a few weeks after the termination of the original temporary parole.

## Penitentiary Service's Purchasing Agent Retires

Lt. Col. Arthur T. Field, who had served as Purchasing Agent for the Canadian Penitentiary Service since May, 1950, retired from the service on July 26. At a presentation ceremony in the Justice Building at Ottawa, Col. Field was presented with a set of luggage by Col. J.R. Stone, Deputy Commissioner of Penitentiaries, on behalf of all members of the Headquarters staff.

Prior to joining the Penitentiaries Service, Col. Field had served with the Federal Department of Veterans Affairs at Montreal. A veteran of two World Wars, he served overseas with the 58th Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force, and after being

wounded was discharged in 1919, having attained the rank of Captain (Acting Major) at the age of 21.

On the outbreak of the Second World War, he joined McGill C.O.T.C. as an instructor, and in August 1940 was appointed Officer Commanding McGill Reserve Training Battalion as a Major. In March 1942 he went overseas with Canadian Base Workshops as a Major, second in command, in charge of administration. He was promoted to lieutenant-colonel in 1943, and discharged in June 1946.

Lt. Col. Field is the holder of the Military Cross and two Bars, having been awarded the Military Cross at Passchendaele in October 1917, the first Bar in May 1918, and the second Bar in August 1918.

## 12 Inmates at Leclerc Get First Aid Certificates

Twelve inmates of Leclerc Institution at St. Vincent de Paul, P.Q., recently received St. John Ambulance Association first aid certificates from Judge Redmond Roche, President of the St. John Council for Quebec. The awards were presented at a ceremony held at the institution.

First aid instruction is a part of the rehabilitation program, which has been undertaken by Federal penitentiary authorities. Instructor for the course at Leclerc was Mr. Gustave J. Diseur, an official St. John instructor.

In presenting the certificates, Judge Roche pointed out the value of the knowledge acquired, which would serve the certificate holders in helping others in the future. Michel LeCorre, who was then deputy warden at Leclerc but has since been named warden at St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary, said inmates were fortunate to have this type of instruction available even while in prison.

Replying, the inmates' spokesman expressed their appreciation and thanked the authorities for providing the opportunity for them to learn first aid techniques.

Other guests at the presentation included: E.L. Mignault, Provincial Commissioner, St. John Ambulance Brigade; Joffre Prud'homme of St. John Provincial Headquarters; Major Maurice Nantel of Montreal; and Mr. Diseur, the course instructor.





## Leclerc Inmates Win Debate With "Jaycees"

A recent debating course conducted for inmates at Leclerc Institution showed dramatic results recently when a debating team of inmates was judged the winner in a debate with a team from the Montreal Junior Board of Trade.

For a period of 10 weeks, a number of inmates had taken the Public Debating course, which was conducted at the Institution by Mr. Gerald T. Rayner of the John Howard Society. The debate with the Montreal Junior Board of Trade members followed completion of the course.

Topic of the debate was that "A Separate Quebec State would Enlighten and Benefit its Citizens", with the Visiting team upholding the affirmative and the inmates the negative.

To enable the inmates who took the course to keep in practice, a series of discussions on Current Events has also been held at Leclerc. Another opportunity was arranged through a session of "mock Parliament" in the Leclerc gymnasium, in which debating team inmates and other inmates participated.

Warden P. Desgroseilliers and a number of staff members attended the parliamentary session, and appreciation was expressed to the inmates and to Mr. Rayner, whose interest made these public speaking projects possible.

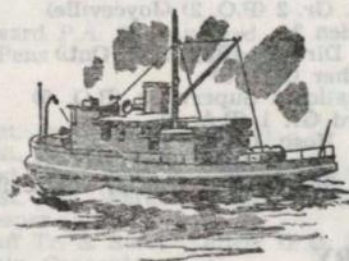
## Penitentiaries Set Up Exhibition Displays

city council, he was chairman of the Civic Property Committee in 1944, and was a member of the City Planning Board from 1942 to 1944.

In 1941, Mr. Fleming was a member of the board of directors of the Canadian National Exhibition, and in 1944-45, he was a director of the United Welfare Chest. He was also active in the establishment of a standing civic committee on public welfare in Toronto in 1942.

On the international scene, Mr. Fleming has served as a Canadian delegate to Commonwealth Parliamentary Conferences in London in 1948, Ottawa in 1952, and Nairobi, Kenya, in 1954. He was chairman of the Commonwealth Finance Ministers' Conference held at Mont Tremblant, Quebec, in 1957, and of the Commonwealth Trade and Economic Conference in Montreal in 1958. He also led the Canadian delegation to sessions of the Commonwealth Economic Consultative Council in London in 1959 and 1960, at Accra, Ghana in 1961, and at Washington in 1962.

Mr. Fleming led a delegation of Canadian Ministers at meetings of the Continuing United States-Canada Joint Trade and Economic Committee in Washington in 1957, 1960 and 1961, and was chairman of meetings of the committee in Ottawa in 1959 and 1962.

He served as a Canadian delegate to the 1957 NATO Conference of Heads of Government in Paris, and later was a Canadian delegate to NATO ministerial meetings in Paris in 1958, 1959 and 1961. He also headed the Canadian delegation to the founding of the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development in Paris in 1960, was elected first Chairman of the Ministerial Council of O.E.C.D. in 1961, and re-elected in 1962.

Mr. Fleming was named a Chevalier de la Societe du Bon Parler Francais of Montreal in 1948;

was decorated by King Paul of Greece with the Greek Red Cross Medal in 1953; and was named an honorary member of the Canadian Legion in 1956. He holds an Honorary Doctor of Civil Law degree from Bishop's University (1960), and in 1962 was named Honorary President and awarded an Honorary Life Membership in the Canadian Bar Association. This year he was also named an Honorary Benchler of the Law Society of Upper Canada, and an Honorary Member of the Officers' Mess of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

Active in all branches of sports, Mr. Fleming is still a long-distance swimmer and tennis player, and is an honorary life member of the North Toronto Baseball Association. He is also a member of a number of clubs, including the Canadian Club, Empire Club, National Club, Albany Club, and Royal Canadian Institute in Toronto and the Rideau and Country clubs in Ottawa.

Taking a prominent part in youth guidance work, he was president of the North Toronto Y.M.C.A. from 1944 to 1949, and has also served as a member of the executive committee of the National Council of the Y.M.C.A. He is an active member of Bloor Street United Church, Toronto, and has been president of the Toronto Business Men's Noonday Bible Club for the past 25 years.

In the course of his duties as Federal Finance Minister, from 1957 to the present time, Mr. Fleming was closely involved in the authorization of expenditures for extensive improvements and additions to Federal penitentiaries and other correctional institutions which have been carried out across Canada in recent years.

On behalf of all Federal agencies involved in implementing the present federal correctional program, "Federal Corrections" welcomes Mr. Fleming to his new positions as Minister of Justice and Attorney-General of Canada.
