Size of New Springhill Institution for Young Offenders to be Doubled

The Canadian Penitentiary Service's new Institution for Young Offenders, to be located at Springhill, Nova Scotia, will be planned to accommodate 450 inmates instead of the 225-inmate accommodation which had originally been planned.

Honourable Donald M. Fleming, Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada, announcing the expansion, said the decision to double the capacity of the institution arose from the Federal Government's concern with the problem of juvenile delinquency, and its recognition of the need for providing adequate accommodation and training facilities for the rehabilitation of young offenders.

Designs for the new institution, which will be the first of its kind in Canada, are well under way. It will combine medium security with special emphasis on extensive training facilities geared to the rehabilitation needs of the young offender.

The total estimated cost of the site and the construction of the new institution is approximately

\$3,820,000. Mr. Fleming said. Of this total, expenditure of more than \$2,700,000 is to be provided for during the 1963-64 fiscal year, with the balance of the estimated total cost to be provided for in the 1964-65 fiscal year.

Commenting on Mr. Fleming's announcement, Robert C. Coates, M.P. for the constituency of Cumberland, in which the Springhill institution will be located, said that the enlarged institution would be of great economic assistance to the Springhill area. He said that the staff of approximately 175 would mean an annual payroll of almost one million dollars, which combined with local purchases and services would bring new economic vigour to the area.

Construction of the Springhill institution for juvenile offenders will begin as soon as plans are finalized. It is expected that a start will be made in early 1963, with the completion target date set for August 1964.

Parole Topic Featured By "Close-Up"

The subject of parole was the topic of a recent national television network program when it was presented on the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation's "Close-Up" show. The program included discussions on parole aspects from many points of view, with those appearing on the program including a magistrate, a former police officer, a psychiatrist, a parole officer and a parolee.

Kingston Institutions Exhibit at Royal

In addition to participating in the Central Canada Exhibition at Ottawa in August, as reported in the August-September issue of "Federal Corrections," the Kingston area institutions of the Canadian Penitentiary Service co-ordinated their presentation of an industrial, vocational and hobbycraft exhibit at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair in Toronto, November 9-17. The general public showed keen interest in the display, and all comments were favourable.

Provincial, Federal Officers Exchange Visits

An effective system of exchange visits by officers of the Federal Penitentiary Service's British Columbia Penitentiary and the B. C. Government's Haney Correctional Institution is in operation. The exchange visits are designed to give officers of each institution an insight into the functions and operations of the other.

Periodically, the Provincial service holds training courses for its staff members at Haney, and one period of these training courses is a tour of the Federal penitentiary. Similarly, the Federal institution's in-service training courses include a tour of the provincial establishment at Haney.

Rotary Luncheon at Collin's Bay

An unusual setting for a Rotary Club luncheon meeting was provided recently when members of the Kingston Rotary Club held their regular meeting in Collin's Bay Penitentiary. Arrangements for the meeting were made by Warden-Rotarian Fred Smith, and the function was held in the Officers' Mess, with white-jacketed inmates serving as waiters.

The event marked the Kingston Club's participation in Rotary International's "Million Dollar Dinner" campaign, launched to raise one million dollars through Rotary meetings around the world for the Rotary Foundation Fund. Earnings from the fund are used to provide scholarships for an exchange of graduate students of six continents for a year of graduate study in another country.

Following the luncheon, Warden Smith addressed his fellow-Rotarians on the operation of the Institution, and answered questions regarding it. A film on Collin's Bay, which was produced by inmates, was also shown. The President of the Kingston Club, Rev. Canon Minto Swan later expressed the Club's appreciation for the opportunity to hold their meeting at Collin's Bay.

Carabine Lectures on Criminology

W.F. Carabine, Supervisor of the National Parole Service's central section, recently was a guest lecturer on criminology as part of a sociology course for students of St. Patrick's College in Ottawa. It marked the second occasion on which Mr. Carabine was among the sociology course lecturers at St. Patrick's.

"The efforts that are being made to rehabilitate inmates, and the good results that are hoped for from our parole system, are to no avail if the Canadian public does not support the program and give inmates a fair chance to prove their worth," Miss Lynch said.

More Women Fail When Placed on Parole

In 1961, only 115 prisoners out of Canada's penitentiary population of 6,790 were women, and of that small number, there were about twice as many parole failures as there were among men, Miss Mary Louise Lynch, a Member of the National Parole Board, told a Women's Canadian Club meeting in Hamilton recently.

She explained that more than half of the female offenders who are federal penitentiary inmates were drug addicts, which was the major reason that few of them were successful parolees. They tend to go back on drugs as soon as they are left unsupervised, she said.

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
Joyceville's Dentist on Dental Executive

Wide Range of Penitentiary Administration Topics Under Discussion at Annual Wardens' Conference

All aspects of penitentiary operation and administration came under discussion at the Canadian Penitentiary Service's Annual Wardens' Conference, held at St. Vincent de Paul, Quebec, November 18-24.

Conference topics included regional organization of the federal penitentiary service, progress and problems in parole services, correctional work, inmate training, staff training, and industrial operations carried on in the various institutions across Canada.

Opening the conference, Allen J. MacLeod, Q.C., Commissioner of Penitentiaries, spoke on overall plans for expansion and improvement of the service, pointing out that new approaches undertaken and new institutions completed in recent years, together with other institutional plans now being implemented, were all part of a master plan of penal reform.

Later in the conference, liaison architects from the Department of Public Works and members of the Penitentiary Service's Headquarters staff gave the wardens detailed explanations of plans for new institutions, and a discussion session studied questions of what to do with old and outdated institutions after more modern ones are in use.

Deputy Commissioner J. R. Stone presented an outline of the regional plan of operation for penitentiaries, including reference to the regions already established. Also discussed were the relationships between wardens and regional directors, and those between regional directors and headquarters, and the advantages of grouping and co-ordinating programs and facilities on a regional basis.

In an outline of parole operations, National Parole Board Chairman T. George Street, Q.C., expressed some concern regarding the relatively small number of paroles being granted, and asked for more detailed information from the institutions to enable the Board to consider more cases.

A detailed policy statement on inmate training was presented to the wardens at the conference, and members of the Headquarters staff also reported to the wardens on studies now being conducted by a consulting firm on improvements in the organization and operation of industrial facilities in the institutions.

Administrative systems and procedures, improved staff training programs, and studies of future staff requirements were among other items on the conference's agenda.

Fourth Suggestion Award for Printing Instructor

Keeping a sharp eye out for improvements has been paying off for A. E. (Ted) Jones, Instructor Printer-Bookbinder at Saskatchewan Penitentiary, who recently received a Suggestion Award for the fourth time.

Mr. Jones' most recent award-winning suggestion was one for a new procedure in the printing of inmates' letterheads, which will result in a saving of approximately \$550 annually in the cost of this item.

At a special ceremony held recently at the institution, Mr. Jones received a Certificate of Award and a \$50 cheque, presented by Warden F. C. B. Cummins. Noting that this was Mr. Jones' fourth such award, Warden Cummins urged other staff members to follow this officer's example in seeking more economical and efficient methods of carrying on their work.

Two B.C. Inmates Awarded Electrical Certificates

Two British Columbia Penitentiary inmates who recently successfully completed an electrical house wiring course were awarded Class "C" electrical certificates at a graduation ceremony held at the institution in November. The ceremony was also attended by 10 other trainees from the electrical department.

Chairman of the ceremony was Chief Vocational Officer H. I. Grest, and guest speaker was Electrical Inspector L. Robson of the British Columbia Government's Electrical Energy Inspection Division, who also presented the certificates. Penitentiary officials present included Assistant Deputy Warden (Custody) J. Norfield, Educational Supervisor W. Fleck, Classification Supervisor A. Truno, and Electrical Instructors Constantineau and Smith.

A total of 18 trainees from the electrical house wiring course have now received Class "C" Certificates issued by the Province for successful completion of the course.

Penitentiaries Provide New Aids for Physical Fitness In Schools

A growing new industry in Canada's federal penitentiaries is playing an increasingly important role in providing greater development of physical fitness programs for school children across the nation.

The industry — manufacturing athletic, gymnasium and physical education equipment — owed its development to two main factors. The primary one was the Penitentiary Service's search for industrial programs which would have a strong rehabilitative effect on inmates, in which it was found that inmates generally became enthusiastic about doing things to help children, and were therefore more receptive to this type of project.

The second factor which determined the project's choice was the fact that almost all such equipment which had been available to Canadian schools and similar establishments was imported, and the price of such products was at levels which prevented many schools from acquiring an adequate range of them.

These two facts made it clear that Canada's penitentiaries could undertake an effective industrial

program for such equipment, which would provide valuable rehabilitation training for inmates and much-needed equipment for the nation's schools, without encroaching upon or adversely affecting existing private industry in Canada.

As a result, the Canadian Penitentiary Service's Industrial Division launched its program to manufacture this equipment, for sale to tax-supported educational and other similar non-profit public institutions. The articles are being made by inmates whose skills in woodworking and metalworking have been developed through vocational training programs in the penitentiaries.

Already, a considerable variety of articles of gymnasium and sports equipment is being produced, with some of these including metal track hurdles, standard hockey goals, prefabricated portable sports huts, dolly-type trucks for moving gymnasium mats and other equipment, and nylon tote bags for carrying sports equipment.

Other items now in the planning and design stage, but not yet in production, include gymnasium balance beams, adjustable horizontal high bars, side horses, parallel bars, vaulting or box horses, and pole vault and high jump stands.

However, the first and one of the most significant products — and the one which to date has been placed in more schools than any of the other pieces of equipment — is the Canadian Foldaway Climber. This piece of gymnasium equipment, which provides for an almost inexhaustible range of climbing facilities on bars and ladders, was developed by the Industrial Division in co-operation with the Canadian Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

This versatile climber is manufactured by inmates employed in the gymnasium equipment shop at Joyceville Institution, at Kingston, Ontario, as part of the institution's rehabilitation program. Available in two different basic models — for high or low-ceilinged gymnasiums — it can be assembled in many different combinations to suit the physical education needs of youngsters or adults.

Its frames include rungs, horizontal bars and rope ladders, and it is designed in such a way that it can be installed near a wall of the gymnasium, and when not in use can be folded compactly against the wall, moving it out of the way to provide clear space for other gymnasium activities.

Industrial Council Group Tours Collin's Bay Shops

Members of the Ontario Industrial Education Council visited Collin's Bay Penitentiary during their annual meeting at Kingston in November. Divided into six groups, the 135 delegates were given a conducted tour through six of the institution's eight vocational shops — motor vehicle repair, electrical, bricklaying, sheet metal, machine and welding. The other two shops are carpentry and plumbing and heating.

The visitors learned that full-time courses of nine months or 1,000 hours are provided in each of the trades, with the shops having a training capacity of 95 inmates on a full-time basis.

After the tour, members held a panel discussion in the institution's new Exercise Hall, School and Library Building on the topic: "After the Advanced Technical Program — What?" Following the meeting, they had an opportunity to purchase inmate hobbycraft items which were on display.

Collin's Bay's Chief Vocational Officer, D. L. Hornbeck, is a member of the local chapter of O.I.E.C., which represents labour, management, personnel and educational organizations.

The first of these foldaway climber units was developed and produced in 1961, and since that time, units have been purchased and are in use by schools, teachers' colleges, municipal recreation groups, and parent-teacher associations in various parts of Canada.

As is true of all the penitentiary-produced physical education equipment, the Canadian Foldaway Climber is not offered for sale in the general commercial market, but can only be purchased by any Canadian tax-supported municipal organization or non-profit agency.

Delivery of the climbers normally is made two to three months after the order is placed, and units are shipped knocked-down but with detailed instructions for assembling. Orders being filled are also accompanied by primary instructions for the climber's use.

Despite the fact that it has not yet reached large-scale production, evidence of the foldaway climber's acceptability, and the demand for it, is already apparent in orders which have been filled. To date, units have been ordered and installed by many Boards of Education in Ontario, including Toronto, Kingston, Hamilton, St. Catharines, Brantford, North York, Etobicoke, Guelph and Sault Ste. Marie, and by Public School Boards at Oakville and Sudbury.

The Canadian Foldaway Climber has also already reached into some schools on the Canadian prairies, with units having been purchased by one of Winnipeg's school divisions, and by the School District of Brandon, Manitoba.

Other units have been purchased by the Ontario Department of Education for use at the Teachers' College at Hamilton, and by the Hamilton Kiwanis Boys' Club.

Already, the Canadian Penitentiary Service has received numerous letters from satisfied users — the school children themselves — as well as from the school boards which have made the purchases for them.

One boy, from a Toronto public school, wrote to say that he liked the ropes and bars best, and added that he could swing on the ropes, climb the ladder, go across on the bars, slide down and climb up again. Another — a girl — said she liked the ropes because she could "swing like Tarzan." Another Grade Six girl said the equipment was "good for the muscles that were not in use through the lazy winter."

Following its successful introduction of the foldaway climber, the Penitentiary Service's Industrial Division turned its attention to the development of other lines of equipment, which it felt would prove equally useful to school physical education programs.

One of its next projects was the development of a metal track hurdle which, although meeting inter-

national specifications, features an adjustable weight bar to replace the customary removable cast iron weights. The weight bar is adjusted by a telescoping construction on the base, and when not in use the hurdle can be folded for storage — another advantage where gymnasium space is not extensive.

Also placed in production were standard hockey goals, complete with nets, which are now available in two models of one-inch steel pipe framing, either all-welded for rigid construction or collapsible for easy storage.

Meeting another outdoor recreational need, the Division now produces prefabricated portable sports huts, for use for summer or winter activities. These huts are of painted fir plywood, feature bolted construction for ease in dismantling, and can be supplied insulated if required. They have three sections, with boys' and girls' dressing rooms at the ends separated by a supervisor's room in the centre.

Penitentiary Magazines Subject of News Feature

An article featuring the various publications produced by inmates of Canada's penitentiaries, and the editors and staffs who work on them, was carried in the August issue of "Canada Month," a Canadian newsmagazine.

The article pointed out that the magazines vary a great deal, ranging from the tabloid "Pathfinder" at Saskatchewan Penitentiary and the mimeographed "Beacon" from Dorchester to magazine formats such as Kingston's "Telescope" and St. Vincent de Paul's "Pen-O-Rama."

Although some have virtually nothing but penitentiary circulation, others are edited primarily for outsiders, but each receive an annual dollar-a-prisoner grant from the Department of Justice to pay for the magazines' free circulation in their own prisons.

The article also sketched the backgrounds of the magazines' editors, many of whom had never been in the writing field before entering penitentiary. Today, the magazines give these inmates the opportunity for training and practice in writing, opening the way to future development.

Highlights of American Congress of Corrections

Provided by Chairman of Canada's Parole Board

A number of the highlights among parole topics of the American Congress of Corrections, held in Philadelphia September 16-21, were outlined recently for "Federal Corrections" by T. George Street, Q.C., Chairman of Canada's National Parole Board.

Mr. Street, one of several Canadian delegates who attended the Congress, was elected to the Executive Committee of the Association of Paroling Authorities, during the sessions. The A.P.A. is one of the three major organizations among the Congress' approximately 30 affiliate agencies. The other main groups are the American Correctional Association and the American National Council on Crime and Delinquency.

Increased attention to training for correctional and parole workers was emphasized during the Congress. One speaker reported on the establishment of a Centre for the Study of Crime and Corrections at Southern Illinois University, designed to provide a training program for correctional workers and establish research and workshop facilities. In another development, the Association of Paroling Authorities decided to establish institutes for training and development of parole board members and staffs, working with the National Committee on Crime and Delinquency.

The proposed parole staff institutes would be held at colleges having adequate facilities and indicating interest in participating. Tentative plans call for the first such institutes to be held early in 1963, with approximately 20 parole board members to be enrolled in each course.

During the Congress, Ralph Pheleps of the Pennsylvania Board of Parole spoke on the topic, "The Dangerous Offender," urging that this type of offender should be diagnosed more accurately. He said that early identification of dangerous offenders might enable more of them to be checked before they actually committed violent crimes.

In a talk on "The Narcotic Offender," a New York representative said there were very wide-ranging views regarding treatment and disposition of drug addiction cases, depending on whether authorities

considered drug addiction a crime or a disease, or both. He suggested the problems should be dealt with by people with specialized knowledge in this field.

A California representative, speaking on "The Aggressive Sex Offender", said this type of offender was also often released without adequate diagnosis. He said knowledge in this field should be broadened, and that specialized parole supervision was needed for adequate control in cases where such offenders were paroled.

At another session, the Association of Correctional Psychologists, the Committee on Classification and Treatment, and the International Prisoners Aid Association discussed "The Use of Power and Authority in Treatment". One of the speakers was Keith Couse of the John Howard Society of Ontario, who spoke on the private agency point of view in Canada, where he said pre-release and after-care services had been integrated closely with the work of the correctional institutions and parole authorities.

At a session on "Guides for Parole Selection and Revocations," speakers discussed such factors as the offender's background, nature of delinquency, character and personality, physical and mental attitudes, progress of offenders in institutions, and family and community situations. Importance of pre-sentence reports and detailed documentation in institutions as essential information in assessing the question of parole was emphasized.

Mr. Street spoke on Canada's Correctional System at a joint meeting of the Association of Correctional Administrators and the Association of Paroling Authorities. Another topic at this session was "A Correctional System with an Independent Paroling Authority," which most of the representatives present favoured over the California system, in which the parole staff is under the direct control of the correctional authorities.

R. Allaby Named Deputy Warden at Dorchester

Allen J. MacLeod, Q.C., Federal Commissioner of Penitentiaries, has announced the appointment of Robert Keith Allaby, 51, as Deputy Warden of Dorchester Penitentiary in New Brunswick.

Mr. Allaby, who had been Chief Vocational Officer at Dorchester since 1949, was named to the deputy warden's post to succeed former Deputy Warden Hazen F. Smith. Mr. Smith's appointment as Warden of the institution was announced in September.

"As a native of New Brunswick and a member of the staff of Dorchester for over 12 years, Mr. Allaby is thoroughly familiar with the needs and problems of the institution and its inmates," Mr. MacLeod said in announcing the appointment.

"His many years of experience as an instructor in vocational training will be particularly useful in the Penitentiary Service's continuing emphasis on inmate training. This is one of the key programs in helping inmates to accept greater community responsibility on their eventual return to society."

Mr. MacLeod also noted that, with the new appointment, the Federal maximum security institution serving New Brunswick would have "native sons" in both of its top administrative posts. Warden Smith is also New Brunswick-born, and has had 22 years of service on the Dorchester staff.

Mr. Allaby was born at Saint John, New Brunswick, in January 1911, and attended public and high schools there. A graduate of the Technical Teachers' College at Hamilton, Ontario, he has also taken courses in educational psychology at Mount Allison University in New Brunswick.

In the years before the Second World War, he gained extensive practical trades experience, having been employed as a journeyman machinist from 1928 to 1940.

During the War, he served with the Royal Canadian Air Force as an instructor under the British Empire War Emergency Training Program from 1940 to 1945. Later, he was supervisor of vocational education with the Canadian Vocational Training Program in New Brunswick for the Federal Department of Labour. He served in that capacity from 1946 to 1949, when he joined the Dorchester Penitentiary staff as Chief Vocational Officer.

Since 1950, he has served as a special instructor for penitentiary officers' training courses on trades

Superintendent Named for Blue Mountain

Allen J. MacLeod, Q.C., Federal Commissioner of Penitentiaries recently announced the appointment of Benjamin C. Hamilton as Superintendent of the Blue Mountain Correctional Institution in New Brunswick.

The institution, now under construction in the Gagetown area, is similar to a number of other minimum security installations which have been established by the Canadian Penitentiary Service in recent years at various locations in Canada. Those already in operation are Agassiz Correctional Camp in British Columbia; Beaver Creek, near Gravenhurst, Ontario; Landry Crossing, near Petawawa, Ontario; and Gatineau Camp in Quebec.

Mr. MacLeod said the Blue Mountain institution is expected to be completed and ready for occupancy early in 1963. It will provide accommodation for approximately 80 inmates.

Mr. Hamilton has been employed at the Penitentiary Service's Ottawa headquarters, in the Inmate Training Division, since he joined the service in January, 1960. His experience in the field dates back to 1934, when he began working in a Borstal institution in the United Kingdom.

Since that time, he has also served in prison administration in the British Crown Colony of Mauritius, and after coming to Canada following the Second World War he served for a time as Executive Secretary of the John Howard Society of Quebec.

Born in Sussex, England, in 1910, Mr. Hamilton was educated at King's School, Canterbury and the Nautical College at Pangbourne. After seven years as a cadet and officer in the Merchant Navy, he served in various Borstal institutions and prisons until 1940, then returned to sea in the Royal Naval Reserve. Joining the Royal Canadian Navy during the Korean War, he retired in December 1960 with the rank of Lieutenant Commander.

Also active in youth training in the community of Dorchester, he is at the present time Adjutant of 685th Squadron RCAF Cadets, Dorchester.

Canadian Clubs Hear Parole Board Member

Miss Mary Louise Lynch, a Member of the National Parole Board, recently completed a tour of Canadian Clubs in Western Ontario communities, during which as guest speaker she outlined the operations of the Parole Board.

Miss Lynch's speaking tour began with an address to the Hamilton Women's Canadian Club October 22, at a luncheon meeting attended by approximately 360 members. The following day, Miss Lynch spoke to 375 members of the Women's Canadian Club at London, and the same evening she addressed 140 members of the St. Thomas Canadian Club. On October 24 she spoke to 250 members at a meeting of the Canadian Club of Oxford County at Woodstock, on October 25 to 240 members of the Canadian Club of Sarnia, and on October 26 to 195 members of the Brantford Canadian Club.

With the exception of her Brantford talk, where her topic was "The Female Offender," Miss Lynch spoke on "Prisoners, Parole and the Public" at all her Western Ontario meetings.

During the course of her tour, she also appeared as a guest on local television programs in Hamilton and London.

Parole Pays!

National Parole Board statistics show that, between January 1, 1959 and November 30, 1962, a total of 8,190 inmates of penal institutions in Canada had been released on parole.

Of this number, a total of 754 subsequently had their paroles revoked or forfeited, giving an average failure-on-parole rate of approximately 9.2 percent. By coincidence, exactly half of these—or 377—were revocations (for misbehaviour or minor offences) and the other 377 were forfeitures (for committing indictable offences).

On the other side of the picture, the remaining 7,436 who had been granted parole completed their parole successfully — an average success rate of 90.8 percent.

"Crime may not pay, but it seems obvious from the success rate that parole does," F. Ward Cook, Assistant Executive Director of the National Parole Service, said in commenting on the statistics.

Retirement Function Held For Ex-Warden

Marking the retirement of Oren A. Earl from the post of Warden of Joyceville Institution, the Joyceville Officers' Club entertained approximately 140 staff members and escorts at a dance and retirement function on October 19.

On behalf of the officers of Joyceville, Deputy Warden John H. Meers presented Mr. Earl with an automatic control movie camera and a gift certificate for accessories. Mrs. Earl received a bouquet of roses from the staff, and a gift from her husband marking her birthday, which coincided with the event.

Allen J. MacLeod, Q.C., Commissioner of Penitentiaries, presented Mr. Earl with an illuminated scroll marking his 42 years of service, signed by the Minister of Justice. Other guests from Headquarters of the Canadian Penitentiary Service, Ottawa, were F. Waugh, Director of Financial Services, and J.C.A. LaFerriere, Director of Inmate Training. Also in attendance were David M. MacLean, Regional Director of Penitentiaries for Ontario, and Warden Fred Smith of Collin's Bay Penitentiary.

In a farewell message to his former associates, Mr. Earl recalled entering the Service as a Guard at Kingston Penitentiary in November 1920, and said that the most satisfying period of his service had been his four years as Warden at Joyceville Institution, "seeing it grow from a small accommodation building housing 48 inmates and supervised by 25 officers to the completion of the major building now occupied by 440 inmates and supervised by a staff of 175 officers."

Mr. Earl added: "The service of Joyceville cannot yet be determined, but we look with pride on its achievement to date, when it is known that many of the new and progressive measures now covered by regulations and in force throughout the Service were pioneered at Joyceville during the past few years.

"You, as officers of the Institution, made this possible because of your willingness to reach for a high standard", he said, so that Joyceville today "is well and favourably known throughout Canada as well as many countries of the world."

Two days before the retirement function at Joyceville, Mr. Earl was honoured by a number of his former associates in the Kingston area at the Ontario Correctional Staff College at Calderwood, when he was presented with a set of luggage. Among the 50 guests present on that occasion were Wardens V.S.J. Richmond of Kingston Penitentiary, Fred Smith of Collin's Bay Penitentiary, Ontario Regional Penitentiaries Director David M. MacLean, and James A. McLaughlin, Director of Industries at the Canadian Penitentiary Service's Ottawa headquarters.

Retiring Staff Members Honoured By Manitoba

Approximately 160 officers, their wives and friends gathered at the Stony Mountain school auditorium recently to honour Accountant Harold W. Kidd and Keeper Alex L. McBean on their retirement from the staff of Manitoba Penitentiary.

Mr. McBean, who had a total of almost 33 years of service, first entered the service in February 1930 as a guard. He became a Guard Grade 2 in 1948, and was promoted to Keeper in June, 1954. Mr. Kidd entered the service in October 1931, so had completed more than 31½ years of service. Beginning as a guard, he had been promoted to clerk to the Chief Keeper in 1935, and became Assistant Accountant in 1938, and the Institution's Accountant in 1947.

Mr. Kidd was a veteran of army service in the First World War, serving from 1916 to 1918, while Mr. McBean was a Second World War veteran, serving from September 1939 to March 1946.

At the retirement ceremony, Warden F.S. Harris presented Mr. Kidd with a scroll, signed by the Minister of Justice, in recognition of long service. Mr. McBean was not present at the ceremony, due to illness, but a similar scroll was sent to him. A. Wood, President of the Stony Mountain local council of the Civil Service Association of Canada, presented a cheque to Mr. Kidd from his fellow-workers, and a similar cheque was sent to Mr. McBean.

Leclerc's Revue Visits Federal Training Centre

A Musical Revue, organized by the inmates of Leclerc Institution, became a road show recently when it troupe visited the Federal Training Centre to stage a special performance.

The revue was first presented at Leclerc earlier in the fall of 1962, and included 14 acts, featuring magic, folk songs, harmonica, comedy acts, and song and dance routines. At that time, its performance was attended by nearly 200 officers, wives and friends, and over 400 inmates.

A suggestion to repeat the performance at the Federal Training Centre was accepted by the Centre's Director, L. St-Pierre, and arrangements were made for the trip, which marked the first time in the area for inmate entertainment to be taken from one institution to another.

New Parole Service Appointments Made

The appointment of a new section supervisor and two parole analysts in the National Parole Service was announced recently by T. George Street, Chairman of the National Parole Board.

The new section supervisor is Real Jubinville, who had been appointed Supervisor of the Eastern Section, succeeding G. Frigon, who left the Service in August of this year. Mr. Jubinville, who holds a Master's degree in Education from Ottawa University, has had many years of experience in the parole field, with his service dating back to the former Remission Service which was the predecessor of the present Parole Board.

One of the new parole analysts is Kenneth A. Holt, who comes to the Service from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, where he worked in the judicial section in Ottawa. In this position, he was engaged in the compilation and analysis of penitentiary and parole statistics. Before joining DBS, Mr. Holt was employed in the parole field in British Columbia, where he was on the staff of that province's Corrections Branch.

The other recently appointed parole analyst is Roger Cornut of Quebec. Mr. Cornut also has had extensive experience in the parole field, and prior to his appointment in the Service had been acting executive secretary of Service Readaptation Sociale in Quebec City, an agency active in rehabilitation work with former inmates.

Noting that these recent appointments would help to strengthen the work of the Parole Service, Mr. Street said other vacancies in the Service's establishment were also being advertised, and added that it was hoped that other parole staff positions in several areas would be filled shortly, particularly at Vancouver, Edmonton, Prince Albert, Toronto and Montreal.

The revue appeared at the Training Centre in October, when Leclerc's Assistant Deputy Warden for Security and five keepers moved the 26 inmates who were members of the troupe from Leclerc to the Centre in private cars.

The show was considered an unqualified success, with some of the visiting acts called back for as many as four encores.

Variety Show Presents Program at Collin's Bay

The Joe Woodhouse Variety Show, featuring artists from Ottawa, Cornwall and Napanee, recently presented a two-hour variety program for inmates of Collin's Bay Penitentiary.

The variety show, which included rock 'n roll, solos and comedy routines, was highlighted by performances by Rich Little of Ottawa, who has appeared on CBC programs, and Lloyd McQuiggin, ventriloquist.

Following the concert, the visiting artists were guests of the institution at a coffee party in the officers' mess.

Members of the Joe Woodhouse group, whose

director has made previous appearances at Collin's Bay, included: Mr. Woodhouse, who served as master of ceremonies; Mac McVeigh and his band; vocalist Joan Groves, Alfred Mohr with his piano accordion; Margaret Rendell, pianist and vocalist; comedian Bob Carl; and the Rock 'n Rollers, under the direction of Billy Joslin.

Members of the Ottawa entertainers' group which also took part in the variety show included Bill Luxton, comedian and singer; the Champ Champagne trio; vocalist Jean Price; impersonator Rich Little; ventriloquist Lloyd McQuiggin; and Sammy Sayles, featuring Negro songs.

Commissioner MacLeod In Panel Discussions

In the course of a recent visit to Saskatchewan Penitentiary at Prince Albert, Allen J. MacLeod, Q.C., Commissioner of Penitentiaries, took part in two panel discussions dealing with correctional institutions.

At the first panel session, held in the Saskatchewan Power Corporation auditorium under the sponsorship of the John Howard Society, Mr. MacLeod gave an unqualified "yes" as the answer to the general topic of discussion: "Minimum Security — Does it Work?" The Commissioner stated that some 30 percent of the men received in Federal institutions were qualified for minimum security, and that the trend in the future would be towards the establishment of more minimum security installations.

The effect of correctional institutions on a community was the topic of the second panel discussion in which the Commissioner participated, and which was presented by Station CKBI-TV, Prince Albert. The financial benefits accruing to a community were discussed by a representative of the National Employment Service, who stated that the combined payrolls of the Federal and Provincial institutions at Prince Albert would create retail sales estimated at \$2,500,000.

Commissioner MacLeod said the community derived many other benefits as well, as the employees of correctional institutions made worthwhile contributions to the social and cultural life of a community. He said he knew of no community that had regretted having a Federal Correctional Institution.

Alcoholics Anonymous At 12th Anniversary

The "Open Door" Group of Alcoholics Anonymous at British Columbia Penitentiary recently observed its 12th anniversary when an enthusiastic gathering of more than 100, including Open Door members and members of visiting groups, met in the institution's Protestant Chapel.

The visitors included approximately 50 men and women members of New Westminster, Vancouver and other lower mainland A.A. groups, along with members of the Penitentiary staff and their wives as guests.

Deputy Warden John Grant opened the activities, welcoming the visitors and expressing the appreciation of the administration and inmates for the faithful weekly attendance for many years of many of the outside members who by so doing had brought encouragement and assistance to inmate members. Mr. Grant's remarks were emphasized by the fact that one of the guest speakers for the 12th anniversary observance had, 12 years earlier, been one of the founding members of the Open Door group, as an inmate.

Addresses by members of the Open Door and visiting groups were followed by a buffet luncheon in the Officers' Mess. The entire program for the evening was planned, paid for and carried out by members of the Open Door group, providing a further indication of their sincerity and interest in their A.A. program in the institution.

Saskatchewan Inmates Helping Anti-T.B. Fund

Inmates of Saskatchewan Penitentiary at Prince Albert recently participated for the twelfth year in a province-wide drive for funds to fight tuberculosis in Saskatchewan. The drive takes the form of radio amateur shows, in which radio listeners mark their support of contestants by pledging donations to a tuberculosis prevention fund.

Sponsor of the drive is the Associated Canadian Travellers, with broadcasts carried by various co-operating radio stations in the province, which send members of their studio staffs to points at which local shows are arranged.

The twelfth annual A.C.T. — CKBI Amateur Hour to be held in Saskatchewan Penitentiary took place Saturday, November 24, with Radio Station CKBI, Prince Albert, carrying the broadcast from 9 p.m. until midnight. More than 700 outside guests filled the penitentiary auditorium, and the event was termed a complete success by the show's sponsors.

All the numbers on the program were conceived and produced by inmates of the institution, who have been responsible for raising more than \$8,000 for the tuberculosis prevention fund since they took part in their first such Amateur Hour in 1952.

Treatment of Addicts Apparently Working

In British Columbia, 11 long-term penitentiary inmates, now on parole, are providing a demonstration of the effectiveness of efforts to treat and rehabilitate drug addicts. The men all underwent extensive treatment in the British Columbia Penitentiary prior to their release.

According to Dr. Robert Halliday, director of the B.C. Narcotic Addiction Foundation, some of the men have been out for as long as eight months, and so far none of them has shown any serious tendency to slide back into addiction.

Describing the experiment at the B.C. Corrections Association's recent fall institute, Dr. Halliday said a two-man treatment team worked with the inmates while they were in the penitentiary. On their release, a full-time parole officer was assigned to them.

A precaution taken to make sure that the men do keep away from the habit during their parole is one of the provisions of their parole, which requires them to submit to spot checks of their condition at any time. In the tests, they are given injections of a drug called lorfan. If they have been taking narcotics, the drug produces withdrawal symptoms, but has no effect if they have not.
