Average Weekly Earnings (Incl. Overtime) of all Employees by Industry, According to the 1970 SIC, All Survey Units, Ottawa-Hull



Also included in the same issue are the revised data for January to March 1987. Statistics are derived from a monthly sample survey of firms, institutions and organizations of all sizes for all provinces and territories and covers all industries except agriculture, fishing, trapping, private household services, religious organizations and military services. Data for the latest month are available approximately 55 days after the reference period and are subject to revision some 30 days later. NEW FROM STATISTICS CANADA

Focus on Canada Series - 1986 Census

Trends in Occupation and Industry (98-135, \$10) documents changes in the number and types of jobs held by Canadians between 1971 and 1986 and looks at the industries in which those jobs were found. By analysing data from three censuses the study reveals major shifts in the demographic characteristics of Canadian workers. The study also touches on regional differences by looking at changes in the distribution of workers in Canada's three largest labour markets - Toronto, Montreal and Vancouver.

Canada's Youth (98-124, \$10) analyzes changes in the demographic, social and economic characteristics of Canadians aged 15 to 24. The study combines information from the 1981 and 1986 Censuses of Population and Housing.

The Individual Canadian Inventor - 1978-1983

This new publication (85-510, \$43) presents a profile, identifying the inventor's socio-demographic characteristics and examining the inventive process in terms of its nature and the time and resources devoted to invention and patenting. It also examines the extent to which the invention is commercialized, the forms of commercialization and the success rate.

1986 Metropolitan Atlas Series

As a reference document and an analytical tool, the collection of maps in the Metropolitan Atlas Series provide a picture of socio-economic trends for such key information as housing, education, population and income from the 1986 Census.

Attractively bound, the 12 urban atlases visually present the latest information about the cities we work in and the neighbourhoods we live in (e.g. 98-105, Ottawa-Hull, \$24).


Public Use Microdata Files - 1986 Census

The 1986 Census Public Use Microdata Files Program consists of three files: one providing data on individuals, a second providing data on households and housing, and a third providing data on families.

The Individual File is now available at a price of \$4,000. It is a 2% sample of the population of Canada and contains approximately 500,000 records. The sample includes data from each province and from selected census metropolitan areas. It provides extensive demographic, social and economic data.

The Household and Housing File has been available since April 1989, at a price of \$2,000. The Family File will be released in January 1990.
