

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ALBERTA

There were 100,000 persons unemployed in Alberta in December, 1990, 14,000 more than in December 1989. Edmonton's unemployment rate rose by 1.2% and 1.4% in Calgary during the same one year period. Alberta's rate was 7.6% versus 6.6% one year previously.

The All-Items Consumer Price Index for Alberta fell by 0.1% between November and December to a level of 120.5 (1986 = 100). The year - over - year increase in the CPI between December 1989 and December 1990 was 5.9%.

The 1990 annual change in the Consumer Price Index for Alberta was 5.8%, 5.4% in Edmonton and 6.2% in Calgary.

The New Housing Price index for Calgary is up 7.0% over last year, while Edmonton is up 13.7%.

Alberta Housing Starts, through the first eleven months of 1990, showed an increase of 22.0% over the previous year, while Canada decreased by 15.9%.

SASKATCHEWAN

The Consumer Price Index for the year 1990 has now been released. Following are the data for the province and major cities showing the percentage change by major category:

MANITOBA


The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in Manitoba continued to climb in December reaching 8.1%, up from 7.4% in November. Employment in the province dropped to 487,000, down 9,000 from last month but at the same level as last December. Employment gains over last year were noted in the Services sector with an increase of 3,000 workers while the Goods Producing sector employed 3,000 less workers. Manufacturing employment now stands at 55,000. Nationally, employment is down 131,000 persons from last December with all the decline concentrated in Quebec and Ontario.




The Consumer Price Index in Winnipeg rose by 0.3% on a monthly basis and 5.2% on an annual basis in December. Higher prices for gasoline, air transportation and cigarettes, personal care supplies and women's wear were principal factors in the increase. Increased mortgage interest costs and rental accommodation costs were also observed. Some dampening effects were noted from lower prices for household furnishings and equipment and traveller accommodation.

The 1990 average annual Consumer Price Index for Winnipeg was also released with the December figures. Listed below are the annual averages:







New from Statistics Canada






Perspectives on Labour and Income Winter 1990 (Catalogue 75-001B, \$13.25)

This new edition of Statistics Canada's quartely journal on labour and income issues features studies on registered retirement saving plans, training needs in the work force. recent wage trends, results from the literacy survey, international labour force comparisons, and taxes and transfers by subprovincial regions.

Bach quarter, Perspectives on Labour and Income uses results from several data sources to examine and offer insights on emerging issues. Articles trace recent labour market developments as well as current income and wealth issues.



DEFINITIONS

Labour Force - that portion of the civilian non-institutional population 15 years of age and over who, during the reference week were employed or unemployed

Employed - persons who, during the reference week, did any work at all or had a job but were not at work due to: (1) own illness or disability (2) personal or family responsibilities (3) bad weather (4) labour dispute (5) vacation (6) other reason not specified above (excluding persons on layoff and persons whose job attachment was to a job to start at a definite date in the future)

Unemployed - persons who, during the reference week, were without work and were available for work, had been on layoff, or had a new job to start in four weeks or less from the reference week

Unemployment Rate - represents the number of unemployed persons expressed as a per cent of the labour force

Participation Rate - represents the labour force expressed as a percentage of the population 15 years of age and over

Employment/Population Ratio - represents the number of persons employed expressed as a percentage of the population 15 years of age and over

SA (Seasonally Adjusted) - A seasonally adjusted series is one from which seasonal movements have been eliminated. Seasonal movements are defined as those which are caused by regular annual events such as climate, crop cycles, holidays and vacation periods. It should be noted that the seasonally-adjusted series contains irregular as well as longer-term cyclical fluctuations.

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
