Department store sales and stocks

August 2001

Department store sales totalled \$1.68 billion (seasonally adjusted) in August, down 2.9% from July. This decline is the first in six months. While lower in August, department store sales were still at a near-record level, the second highest after July's record \$1.73 billion.

Despite the drop in August, the upward movement of department store sales that began in the spring of 2000 is continuing. Previously, sales had been declining since September 1999, following a period of increases that lasted more than a year.

Department store sales, unadjusted for seasonality, advanced 10.4% in August compared with August 2000. Sales were up in all provinces. The group formed by Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island reported the largest year-over-year increase (+22.9%); part of the increase was attributable to the opening of new stores in the spring of 2001. The region formed by British Columbia, Yukon, the Northwest Territories and Nunavut (+12.6%) and Alberta (+12.5%) followed with large annual increases. The other provinces reported year-over-year increases of at least 7.0% in August.

Canada/Mexico/United States merchandise trade reconciliation

1998 to 1999

When countries produce statistics on their merchandise trade with the rest of the world, that data often differs with those published by their trading partners. These differences reflect both legitimate conceptual differences between import and export statistics and possible errors. Agencies from Canada, Mexico and the United States have done a reconciliation study to identify and quantify the causes of the differences in trade between the three The results of this study do not constitute revisions to any country's official statistics: however. they do help improve the understanding of the three countries' trade statistics.

The participants in the project were: the International Trade Division of Statistics Canada; the Mexican Working Group on Foreign Trade Statistics, which comprises the Secretariat of Treasury and Public Credit, the Bank of Mexico, the Secretariat of Commerce and Industrial Development, and the National Institute of Statistics, Geography and Informatics (INEGI); the U.S. Customs Service and the Foreign Trade Division of the U.S. Bureau of the Census. Statistics Canada, INEGI and the U.S. Bureau of Census have collaborated both to develop the reconciliation estimates and prepare this report.

Canada and the United States participated in a data exchange, in which the export statistics of each country are derived from the counterpart import data; therefore, there are no unexplained differences in their trade statistics. However, differences in the official trade statistics of Canada and Mexico and of the United States and Mexico are sizeable. Discrepancies between Canadian and Mexican statistics were significant. In 1998, Mexico's import trade statistics exceeded Canada's exports by \$1.9 billion and \$2.7 billion in 1999. The difference in northbound trade between Mexican exports and Canadian imports was \$5.4 billion in 1998 and \$6.0 billion in 1999.

The reconciliation study found that indirect trade was the main source of discrepancy between Canada and Mexico in both directions of trade.

Steel pipe and tubing

July 2001

Steel pipe and tubing production totalled 185 245 metric tonnes in July, a 17.6% increase from 157 502 tonnes in July 2000.

Year-to-date production to the end of July totalled 1 517 729 tonnes, down 3.7% from 1 576 138 tonnes during the same period in 2000.

The Social policy simulation database and model

1997

The Social policy simulation database and model (SPSD/M), Version 9.0, based on 1997 microdata, is now available. The SPSD/M is a static microsimulation model. It comprises a database, a series of tax/transfer algorithms and models, analytical software and user documentation. The SPSD/M has been produced as an occasional product since 1985. It has been in wide use by policy analysts in Canada studying virtually every change to the tax and transfer system since that time.

The SPSD/M is a tool designed to analyze the financial interactions of governments and individuals or families in Canada. It allows estimation of the income redistributive effects or cost implications of changes in the personal taxation and cash transfer system. The SPSD/M helps researchers examine the potential impacts of changes in taxes, earnings, demographic trends and many other factors. It can be used to study federal and provincial tax and transfer changes from 1988 through 2005.

The SPSD/M allows us to answer "what-if" questions. What if there were a change to the

taxes Canadians paid or transfers they received—who would gain and who would lose? Would single-parent households in a particular province be better off? By how much? How much extra money would federal or provincial governments collect or pay out?

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
