Residential construction investment

Third quarter 2001

The total value of investment in the housing sector was \$12.3 billion in the third quarter, up 4.9% from the third quarter of 2000. All three components of residential construction investment—new housing, renovations and acquisition costs—showed increases.

The drop in mortgage rates, the low number of vacant multi-family dwelling units and steadily rising prices for new housing are some of the factors that contributed to the rise in residential construction investment.

New housing construction rose 5.6% from the third quarter of 2000; it was the component showing the greatest increase in dollar terms. Total investment for this component reached \$6.4 billion in the third quarter. The growth in new housing was largely the result of higher investment in new apartment projects (+24.5% to \$992 million), many of which were started in the previous quarters. The value of investment for construction of new single-family dwellings was also up (+3.1% to \$4.2 billion).

Renovations to the housing stock reached \$4.7 billion in the third quarter, up 3.5% from the third quarter of 2000. Acquisition costs rose 6.5% to \$1.2 billion.

Among the provinces, Quebec posted the largest increase (in dollars) in residential construction investment (+17.9% to \$2.6 billion), and British Columbia came in second (+9.5% to \$1.6 billion). The

marked increase for both these provinces was the result of growth in all three components.

Rises in new housing (+6.5%), renovations (+3.5%) and acquisition costs (+8.4%) pushed up the cumulative value of residential construction investment for the first three quarters to \$32.4 billion, up 5.4% compared with the first three quarters of 2000.

Note: Residential construction investment is divided into three main components. The first is new housing construction, which includes single dwellings, semi-detached dwellings, row housing and apartments, cottages, mobile homes and additional housing units created from non-residential buildings or other types of residential structures (conversions). The second component of residential construction investment, renovations, includes alterations and improvements in existing dwellings. The third component is acquisition costs, which refers to the value of services relating to the sale of new dwellings. These costs include sales tax, land development and service charges, as well as record-processing fees for mortgage insurance and the associated premiums.

Third quarter 2001

Production and disposition of tobacco products

October 2001

Tobacco product manufacturers substantially increased production of cigarettes in October. Sales grew to a lesser extent, and cigarette inventories expanded; production was well ahead of shipments.

Manufacturers boosted cigarette production 16% in October to a volume of 4.4 billion cigarettes. However, October's production, was 7% short of that in October 2000.

Year-to-date production to the end of October was 37.5 billion cigarettes, down 3% from the same period in 2000.

October sales totalled 3.8 billion cigarettes, up 9% from September and up 4% from October 2000. Year-to-date sales to the end of October were 36.8 billion cigarettes, down 3% from the same period in 2000.

Inventories were 4.6 billion cigarettes at the end of October, up 8% from the end of September. October's closing inventories were also 11% larger than those of October 2000.

Cereals and oilseeds review

September 2001

During October, Winnipeg oilseed futures prices edged down as a result of spillover weakness from the Chicago Board of Trade soybean complex (the prices of soybeans and their products—meal and oil) and low export and domestic crush demand. Factors limiting large declines included a lower exchange rate, tight supply prospects and slow farmer deliveries. Canola futures decreased by about \$7 per metric tonne until China purchased 100 000 tonnes late in the month. China, the leading importer of Canadian canola last year, had been absent from the Canadian market earlier in the crop year. Canadian feed barley futures prices remained relatively steady in the face of the lower Chicago prices and sizeable imports of U.S. barley and corn.

In the United States, Chicago corn and soybean futures declined following the mid-October release of government reports showing higher 2001 production estimates. A stronger-than-expected U.S. dollar, low Chinese demand and record South American plantings also contributed to lower soybean prices. Similarly, corn futures prices fell following the higher production estimates and historical trends suggesting the official U.S. November production estimates will be again increased.

Civil aviation operating statistics

October 2001

Air Canada reported that total passenger-kilometres flown were unchanged in October, after dropping

substantially in September. The number of passenger-kilometres flown is a measure of demand. In October, Air Canada also reported a decrease of 7% in seat-kilometres flown, which is a measure of capacity offered. So capacity continued to decline after September. Air Canada's passenger load factor (a measure of the fullness of their aircraft) returned to 71% in October, as it was in August. It had dropped to 66% in September. The above data are seasonally adjusted.

Pipeline transportation of crude oil and refined petroleum products

July 2001

Net receipts of crude oil and equivalent hydrocarbons totalled 14 043 763 cubic metres in July, up 2.9% from July 2000. Year-to-date receipts to the end of July 2001 were 95 971 019 cubic metres, up 4.5% over the same period in 2000. Net receipts of liquefied petroleum gases and refined petroleum products totalled 6 806 801 cubic metres in July, down 1.5% from July 2000. Year-to-date receipts to the end of July were 45 053 225 cubic metres, down 5.2% from the same period in 2000.

Pipeline exports of crude oil totalled 6 329 077 cubic metres, an increase of 1.8% from July 2000, and pipeline imports were 2 526 635 cubic metres, an increase of 7.8%. Year-to-date exports were 44 761 183 cubic metres, up 5.3% from the same period of 2000. Year-to-date imports stood at 16 362 196 cubic metres, a rise of 10.6%.

July deliveries of crude oil by pipeline to Canadian refineries totalled 6 551 415 cubic metres, an increase of 5.7% from July 2000. Deliveries of liquefied petroleum gases and refined petroleum products were 521 311 cubic metres in July, down 17.0% from July 2000. Year-to-date deliveries of crude oil to refineries at the end of July totalled 40 915 834 cubic metres, up 0.4% from the same period in 2000.

Farming operating revenues and expenses 2000 (preliminary estimates)

Average operating revenues per farm rose 9.0% in 2000 to \$172,796, according to taxation records. In the same period, average operating expenses rose at a similar rate (+8.6%) to \$148,395. Operating margins were 14.1 cents per dollar of revenue, up from 13.8 cents in 1999. In current dollars, average operating revenues in 2000 were 18% above the five-year average for 1995 to 1999, but operating margins were lower by 1.4 cents per dollar of revenue.

Strong growth in livestock revenues (+10.9%) largely explained the overall rise in average operating revenues. In particular, higher revenues from the sale of hogs (+30.5%) and cattle (+16.7%) contributed significantly to the increase of the livestock sector. Crop revenues were also up slightly (+2.1%).

Average operating expenses climbed, mainly because of higher livestock expenses (+12.8%) and machinery expenses (+10.8%). Heating fuel costs were also up significantly (+37.3%).

In 2000, the average operating revenues of greenhouse and nursery farms ranked first at \$618,916, followed by those of potato farms (\$541,316). Hog farms posted the largest percentage increase over 1999 among all farm types, earning 23.7% more in average operating revenues.

Dairy farms had the highest average operating margins, 25.4 cents per dollar of revenue, down 0.3 cents from 1999. Tobacco farms ranked second at 21.7 cents. Only these two farm types had operating margins higher than 20 cents per dollar of revenue. Six of the eleven major farm types posted higher operating margins in 2000; hog farms had the largest increase, 7.1 cents, from 4.8 cents in 1999 to 11.9 cents in 2000.

Note: These estimates cover unincorporated farms with gross operating revenues of \$10,000 and over, and corporations with total farm sales of \$25,000 and over for which 51% or more of sales come from agricultural activities. Estimates in this release exclude communal organizations. Operating margin is defined as one dollar minus operating expenses (before depreciation) per dollar of revenue. These estimates represent over 90% of all filed tax returns of farming operations for 2000. Final 2000 estimates will be released in March 2002.

Measuring student's skills and knowledge: The performance of Canada's youth in reading, mathematics and science 2000

Two major publications that assess the achievement of 15-year-old boys and girls in reading, mathematical and scientific literacy in Canada and 31 other countries will be available December 4.

The first is an international report prepared by the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development, which will be available at 5 am eastern time on the OECD's Web site (www.pisa.oecd.org). This report, *Knowledge and skills for life: First results from the OECD Programme for International Student*

Assessment, compares the performance of students in Canada with those in other nations.

The second is a pan-Canadian report, *Measuring up: The performance of Canada's youth in reading, mathematics and science* (81-590-XIE), which includes data on all 10 provinces. It is to be released at 11:30 am eastern time December 4 during a news conference at the Toronto offices of the Council of Ministers of Education, Canada (CMEC).

The Canadian report will be available at 11:30 am December 4 at www.statcan.ca, www.pisa.gc.ca, and www.cmec.ca. Tomorrow's Daily will include an assessment of the performance of Canadian students compared with their counterparts in other countries; this will be available at 8.30 am eastern time.

Data for this project came from the Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA), a collaborative effort among member OECD countries. In Canada, PISA is administered through a partnership of CMEC, Human Resources Development Canada and Statistics Canada. About 30,000 Canadian boys and girls 15 years of age from more than 1,000 schools participated during the spring of 2000.

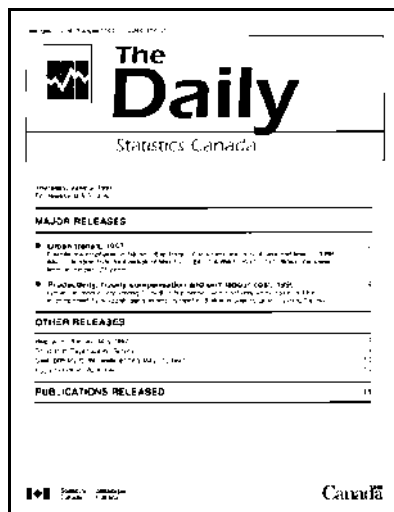
