

#### Canadian social trends


Summer 2001

The Summer 2001 issue of *Canadian social trends* includes these articles: "Enjoying work: An effective strategy in the struggle to juggle?" asks whether enjoying paid and unpaid work influences adults' quality of life as measured by the balance between work and family, time pressure and general life satisfaction; "Patterns of volunteering over the life cycle" probes the social factors that affect the likelihood that a person will be a volunteer at different stages of the life cycle; "From sunup to sundown: Work patterns of farming couples" examines how husbands and wives who operate a farm together share the work; and "Evolving family living arrangements of Canada's immigrants" studies the family situation of immigrants, focussing on the way it changes over time.

Each quarter, Canadian social trends integrates data from many sources to examine emerging social trends and issues. It also features the latest social indicators, as well as information about Statistics Canada's products and services.

#### **Dairy statistics**

April and May 2001 (preliminary)

Monthly dairy statistics for April and May are now available.

Consumers purchased almost 2.2 million kilolitres of milk and cream during the first nine months of the current dairy year, up 0.5% from the same period of the previous dairy year. Sales of milk were virtually unchanged, while cream sales rose more than 5%.

#### Oils and fats

April 2001

Production of all types of deodorized oils totalled 77 562 metric tonnes in April, down 17.8% from 94 399 tonnes in March. Year-to date production to the end of April was 354 673 tonnes, down 6.1% compared with 377 605 tonnes in the same period of 2000.

Domestic sales of deodorized margarine oil totalled 9 800 tonnes; deodorized shortening oil sales were 26 902 tonnes; and deodorized salad oil sales were 31 222 tonnes in April.

## Steel pipe and tubing

April 2001

Steel pipe and tubing production totalled 196 075 metric tonnes in April, down 12.7% from 224 508 tonnes in April 2000.

Year-to-date production to the end of April totalled 876 573 tonnes, down 9.2% from 965 339 tonnes during the same period in 2000.

# Problem behaviour and delinquency in children and youth

1996/97

This *Juristat*, released today by the Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics, examines delinquency and offending behaviour as reported by a representative sample of children and youth aged 10 to 13. It uses data from the 1994/95 and 1996/97 National Longitudinal Survey on Children and Youth (NLSCY).

The frequency of self-reported problem behaviour and delinquency against property and individuals was measured indirectly through the NLSCY. Questions related to delinquent acts against property covered a range of activities including stealing, destroying property and vandalizing. Questions relating to delinquency against individuals or aggressive behaviour included threats and fights.

In many instances, delinquent behaviour in childhood did not spill over into adolescence, the results indicate. Of the children aged 10 and 11 who reported committing high frequencies of aggressive behaviours in 1994/95, 45% reported no aggressive behaviours two years later when they were 12 and 13. A further 31% reported reduced frequencies of aggressive behaviours, and 24% self-reported continued high frequencies of aggressive behaviours.

Children who reported they were bullied at school were twice as likely to be involved in aggressive behaviour as those who were not bullied. In addition, children who experienced higher levels of negative parenting practices, such as being physically punished, scolded or yelled at, were more likely to report high frequencies of aggressive behaviours.

Children who reported problems with friendships, poor self-image, higher levels of hyperactivity and depression were also more likely to report involvement in aggressive behavior.


