Public sector employment

First quarter 2001 (preliminary)

Employment in the public sector has rebounded to the levels of the mid-1990s after several years of tight budgetary control and government restructuring.

The public sector employed an average of just under 2.9 million people in the first quarter. This is an increase of 1.1%, or 31,100 people, from the first three months of 2000, and is the eighth straight quarterly increase.

There are now as many people working in the public sector as there were in the first quarter of 1996. However, there are now fewer than 93 public employees per 1,000 inhabitants, compared with more than 98 in the first quarter of 1996.

Ontario and British Columbia registered the largest increases in public sector employment. Ontario had 988,600 public sector employees, up 19,600 (+2.0%); British Columbia had 365,200, up 6,600 (+1.8%). The only provinces reporting declines were Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, where 2,100 jobs (-2.0%) and 800 jobs (-1.5%) were struck off their respective payrolls.

Jobs in government (federal, provincial/territorial and local) account for almost 91% of the total public sector work force. These three levels employed an average of just over 2.6 million people in the first quarter, about 21% of all salaried employees in Canada. The total government work force grew 1.0%, or about 24,600 employees, from the first quarter of 2000.

The biggest increase occurred in the federal government, including the military. Federal employment rose 4.2% from the first quarter of 2000 to 345,800, an increase of 14,000 jobs. A loss of 600 military jobs was more than offset by an increase of 14,600 in general government employment, located mostly in Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia.

Employment in local governments rose 0.7%, or about 6,600 jobs, to 920,500. School boards in Ontario and British Columbia, as well as municipal governments in Ontario, were responsible for most of this gain.

Employment by the provincial and territorial governments rose a slight 0.3%, or 4,100 jobs, to 1.3 million. Increases in the health sector in Ontario and Manitoba, as well as in general government in Quebec and British Columbia, were partly offset by declines in postsecondary education.

Public enterprises, which account for the remaining portion of the public sector, also reported increases. During the first quarter, these enterprises employed an average of 266,300, up 2.5% or 6,500 jobs from the first quarter of 2000.
