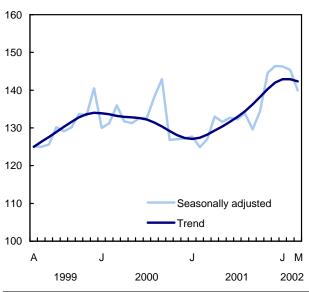
### New motor vehicle sales

March and first quarter 2002

New motor vehicle sales reached an all-time high in the first quarter, despite declines in both March (-3.8%) and February (-0.6%). Sales in the first quarter of 2002 were 1.5% higher than in the fourth quarter of 2001, when a sizable increase was observed (+7.5%). Compared with the first quarter of 2001, sales in the first three months of 2002 were up 13.7%.

#### New motor vehicle sales remain high

In all, 139,936 new motor vehicles were sold in March, down 5,458 units from February. March's decline was mainly attributable to a steep drop in truck sales.

After moving upward throughout 2001, new motor vehicle sales have levelled off in recent months. Sales were generally stable for most of 2000, except for significant declines in the fall.

Preliminary figures from the auto industry indicate that new motor vehicle sales rose in April, recovering some of the ground lost in March. Both passenger cars and trucks contributed to the increase.

#### Note to readers

All data in this release are seasonally adjusted unless otherwise indicated. Seasonally adjusted provincial data from January 1991 are available on CANSIM.

Passenger cars include those used for personal and commercial purposes, such as taxis or rental cars. Trucks include minivans, sport-utility vehicles, light and heavy trucks, vans and buses

North American-built new motor vehicles include vehicles manufactured or assembled in Canada, the United States or Mexico. All other new motor vehicles are considered to have been manufactured overseas.

For reasons of confidentiality, Yukon, the Northwest Territories and Nunavut are included in British Columbia.

#### Truck sales down sharply

In March, truck sales fell more sharply than sales of passenger cars. In all, 63,038 new trucks were sold, down 6.9% from February. This was the largest drop since October 2000.

Of all the trucks sold in March (excluding heavy trucks and buses), roughly 40% were light trucks, 30% were sport-utility vehicles and another 30% were minivans. These proportions, calculated from data unadjusted for seasonality, were basically unchanged from March 2001.

After moving upward since the summer of 2001, new truck sales have stalled in recent months. In the first part of 2001, truck sales were generally stable, following declines in the fall of 2000. Previously, sales had remained stable for a year.

Sales of new passenger cars declined for a second straight month. In March, 76,898 vehicles were sold, down 1.0% from February. Most of this decline was attributable to overseas-built cars, which were down 3.1% from February. Nevertheless, March's sales for these cars were 22.2% higher than in March 2001. Sales of North American-built passenger cars showed almost no change in March (-0.1%) compared with February.

After moving upward since the start of 2001, sales of new passenger cars have slowed in recent months. Previously, sales had been generally stable since the start of 2000, following an upward movement that began at the end of 1998.

#### The Maritime provinces post the only gains

New motor vehicle sales declined in all provinces in March except Prince Edward Island (+2.1%), New

Brunswick (+1.1%) and Nova Scotia (+0.6%). New motor vehicle sales in the Maritime provinces have maintained an upward movement since the start of 2001. In recent months, this movement has been more pronounced in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick but fairly stable in Nova Scotia.

In March, the other provinces all registered losses greater than the national average (-3.8%) except Ontario (-1.2%) and Quebec (-3.3%). This was the third straight decline for both of these provinces. The upward movement sustained by new motor vehicle sales in these two provinces since the start of 2001 has stalled owing to the losses registered in the first three months of 2002. Even so, quarterly sales were still at least 10.0% higher than a year earlier for each of these provinces.

## **Dairy statistics**

March and April 2002 (preliminary)

Cheddar cheese production during the first eight months of the 2001/02 dairy year totalled 79 000 metric tonnes, down 3.6% from the same period of the 2000/01 dairy year. A dairy year runs from August to July.

# Pipeline transportation of crude oil and refined petroleum products

December 2001

Net receipts of crude oil and equivalent hydrocarbons totalled 14 071 220 cubic metres in December, down 1.0% from December 2000. Year-to-date receipts to the end of December were 164 001 821 cubic metres, up 2.2% over the same period in 2000. Net receipts of liquefied petroleum gases and refined petroleum products totalled 6 907 513 cubic metres in December, down 1.0% from December 2000. Year-to-date receipts were 78 424 969 cubic metres, down 4.9% from the same period in 2000.

Pipeline exports of crude oil totalled 6 357 566 cubic metres, down 4.3% from December 2000. Pipeline imports were also down (-15.5% to 1 850 727 cubic metres). Year-to-date exports totalled 75 843 023 cubic metres, up 3.1% from the same period in 2000. Year-to-date imports stood at 23 596 196 cubic metres, a decrease of 7.0%.

December deliveries of crude oil by pipeline to Canadian refineries totalled 5 718 834 cubic metres, down 5.4% from December 2000. Deliveries of liquefied petroleum gases and refined petroleum products fell 42.2% to 301 857 cubic metres. Year-to-date deliveries of crude oil to refineries totalled 69 747 404 cubic metres, down 1.8% from the same period in 2000.

# Technical report on the analysis of small groups in the General Social Survey

The Technical report on the analysis of small groups in the 1999 General Social Survey (GSS) describes the technical and methodological challenges involved in analysing small groups, such as Aboriginal people, immigrants and visible minorities.

It contains a general description of these challenges, including over-sampling, response rates, non-response due to language, sampling variability and whether the data can be released.

In addition, it discusses the findings from the 1999 GSS with respect to the victimization, perceptions and fear of these small groups.

The study found that while the overall Canadian rate of personal victimization including personal theft, robbery, and non-spousal physical and sexual assault was 157 incidents per 1,000 population aged 15 and older, the rate for the immigrant population was substantially lower at 110. For the visible minority population, the rate was consistent with that of the Canadian population, and for the Aboriginal population, the rate was almost twice the national average.

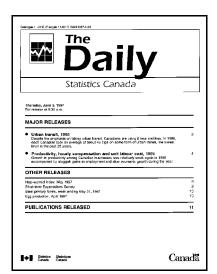
