
Concerned with lower levels of new and unfilled orders, manufacturers expect to decrease production levels in the coming three months. Key factors influencing the manufacturers' intentions this quarter include global uncertainty and the appreciation of the Canadian dollar.

The voluntary survey, to which almost 4,000 responded, requests manufacturers' opinions on production impediments, finished product inventory levels, new and unfilled order levels, production and employment prospects in the coming three months.

Manufacturers expect to decrease production

In April, 31% of manufacturers stated they would decrease production in the second quarter, while only 19% expected to increase production, leaving the balance of opinion at -12. In addition, 12 of the 21 major industry groupings, representing 60% of manufacturing shipments, indicated a negative outlook for the second quarter of 2003.

Note to readers

The Business Conditions Survey is conducted in January, April, July and October; the majority of responses are recorded in the first two weeks of these months. Results are based on replies from about 4,000 manufactures and are weighted by a manufacturer's shipments or employment. Consequently, larger manufacturers have a correspondingly larger impact on the results than smaller manufacturers.

Data in this release, except the data on production difficulties, are seasonally adjusted.

The Business Conditions Survey has adopted the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) for its 2003 reference year; data for previous years have been recalculated to the new classification system back to 1992 to aid users with historical continuity. Detailed NAICS estimates are now available in CANSIM.

Developed by the statistical agencies of Canada, Mexico and the United States, NAICS is designed to provide a common statistical framework and common definitions of the industrial structure of the three countries. The new classification facilitates the analysis and improves the comparability of the three countries' data.

Producers in the transportation equipment, computer and electronic product and primary metal industries were the major contributors to the 21-point drop in the balance of opinion from January. This is the largest balance decrease since a 31-point drop in January 2001.

The balance of opinion is determined by subtracting the proportion of manufacturers that stated production would decrease in the coming three months from the proportion who stated production would be increasing.

Greater concern with the current backlog of unfilled orders

The balance of opinion concerning the current level of unfilled orders was -19 in April, as 26% of manufacturers said their level of unfilled orders was lower than normal and only 7% said it was higher than normal. Of the 21 major industry groupings, 18 contributed to the 13-point drop in the balance, led by the transportation equipment, computer and electronic product, primary metals and fabricated metal product industries.

According to the Monthly Survey of Manufacturing, unfilled orders in February stood at slightly over \$43 billion, down 7.6% from February 2002.

Manufacturers preoccupied with level of orders received


Also dropping was the balance of opinion on the current level of orders received, which fell 18 points to -17, as the number of manufacturers who stated that orders were declining went from 14% in January to 26% in April. Again, producers in the transportation equipment, computer and electronic product, primary metals and fabricated metal product industries were the major contributors to the drop in the balance.

Finished products inventories still not a major concern

In April, 81% of manufacturers reported that the current level of finished products inventory was about right. However, 16% of manufacturers stated that inventories were too high, while 3% said inventories were too low, leaving the balance of opinion at -13, a 4-point decrease from January.

According to February's Monthly Survey of Manufacturing, finished product inventories posted a 1.2% increase to almost \$20 billion, their highest level since July 2001.

Employment prospects drop slightly

The balance of opinion for employment prospects for the next three months decreased 5 points in April to -5. The relatively large decline in production expectations and concerns with lower orders did not fully carry over into the employment prospects. While 82% of manufacturers stated that they would keep or add to their workforce, 18% indicated that they expected to decrease employment in the coming quarter.

According to the latest results of the Labour Force Survey (March), factory jobs have declined in five of the last seven months. In March, there were 37,000 fewer manufacturing jobs, wiping out February's gains (+21,000).

Manufacturers report little change in production impediments

About 83% of manufacturers reported little in the way of production impediments in April, down 2 points from the January survey. The proportion reporting a shortage of skilled labour decreased one point to 5%. A shortage of unskilled labour was reported by 1% of manufacturers.

Crude oil and natural gas

February 2003 (preliminary)

Crude oil production totalled 10 606 500 cubic metres in February, up 0.6% from February 2002. Exports, which accounted for 59.0% of total production, decreased 1.3% from February 2002.

Year-to-date production of crude oil increased 2.6% from the same period of 2002; crude oil exports were also on the rise, up 3.7%.

Marketable natural gas production rose 1.7% from February 2002, while domestic sales grew 12.3% over the same period. Exports of natural gas increased 0.3%.

Year-to-date marketable production of natural gas increased 1.9% from the same period of 2002. Domestic sales rose 11.1%, and exports were up 3.7%.

Aircraft movement statistics 2002

Airports with NAV CANADA air traffic control towers and flight service stations recorded 5.9 million take-offs and landings in 2002, down 5.4% from 2001.

The sector distribution for itinerant movements at these airports was 85% domestic, 13% transborder, and 2% other international. The proportions were similar to 2001.

Statistics for the Canadian airports without air traffic control towers are also available. These 115 airports reported 0.72 million take-offs and landings in 2002.

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
