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## **Farm Product Price Index**

December 2006

Prices farmers received for their commodities rose 4.4% in December 2006 from the same month a year earlier, as surging grain and oilseed prices more that offset the overall declining livestock and animal products prices. This was the largest year-over-year increase since the fall of 2004.

Overall, producers received prices for crops that were 15.1% above those of December 2005, marking the fourth consecutive month of year-over-year increases. Significant gains were recorded for grains, oilseeds and special crops. The autumn of 2006 signified the end of a year-over-year decrease for grain prices which had lasted almost three years.

However, prices for livestock and animal products were 2.4% below the year earlier level. Lower cattle and calf prices were the big contributor while hogs also recorded a decrease, continuing a trend that had started in May 2005. Meanwhile, prices for the supply-managed commodities increased.

On a monthly basis, prices farmers received for their commodities increased 0.5% from November 2006, as the overall crops index rose 1.8% and the livestock and animal products index inched up 0.2%.

The Farm Product Price Index (FPPI) stood at 97.1 (1997=100) in December, up from a revised November index of 96.6.

The overall crops index was higher in December compared to November as all crops except fruits and vegetables recorded increases.

Grain prices were up in December, as a result of dwindling supplies worldwide and the continued expansion of the ethanol industry. Oilseed prices were also up, driven by similar factors to grain, including rising demand from the bio-fuel industry. In addition, canola is also considered a healthy alternative to trans-fat oils. Domestic crush was 50% higher in 2006 compared to 2005.

The overall index for livestock and animal products was virtually unchanged in December from the revised November level, as prices for cattle and calves were down 1.6% while the other commodities either remained the same or rose slightly.

The cattle and calf index dropped to its lowest level since the US border reopened in July 2005 to restricted trade of live animals. Prices for feeder cattle and calves are being pressured by rapidly rising feed grain prices.

Hog prices were up 1.4% in December after falling for five consecutive months. Ample North American supplies and higher feed costs have affected the hog market.

## Farm product prices

January 2007

Prices received by farmers in January for grains, oilseeds, specialty crops, potatoes, cattle, hogs, poultry, eggs and dairy products are now available.

The January hog price for Quebec was \$58.24 per hundredweight, down 0.2% from one month earlier but up 1% from January 2006 when the price was \$57.78.

The January feed barley price for Saskatchewan was \$121.62 per metric tonne, up 5% from one month earlier and up 57% from the January 2006 price of \$77.61.

Farm commodity prices are now available on CANSIM. Over 35 commodities are available by province, some series going back 20 years.
