Travel between Canada and other countries, May 2012

Travel both into and out of Canada declined in May compared with April, particularly for Canadians travelling to the United States.

Canadian residents made 5.3 million trips abroad in May, down 1.7% from April. Most of these trips, 4.5 million, were to the United States, a 1.9% decrease.

Overnight travel by Canadians to the United States fell 1.5% to 1.8 million trips in May. Overnight plane travel decreased 1.9% to 620,000 trips, while overnight car travel also fell 1.5% to 1.1 million trips.

Travel by Canadians to overseas countries declined 0.2% to 795,000 trips.

In the opposite direction, travel by residents from abroad to Canada fell 0.6% in May to 2.1 million trips.

Travel from the United States was down 0.5%, while travel from overseas countries declined 0.8%.

Same-day car travel by US residents to Canada increased 1.8% to 673,000 trips, while travel of one or more nights declined 2.2% to 989,000 trips.

Residents of countries other than the United States made 378,000 trips to Canada in May, down 0.8% from April. About 24,000 of those trips were made by residents of China, a 3.4% increase. Travel from China has grown so strongly that it has overtaken Australia as the fourth-largest overseas market for Canada behind the United Kingdom, France and Germany. In the first five months of 2012, residents of China made 115,200 trips to Canada, a 22.9% increase from the same period in 2011, the strongest rate of growth in the top 10 markets.

Job vacancies, three-month average ending in April 2012 (preliminary data)

There was an average of 252,000 job vacancies in the three-month period ending in April, an increase of 17,000 from the same period in 2011. For every job vacancy, there were 5.6 unemployed people, down from 6.3 in April 2011.

The decline in this ratio of unemployment to job vacancies was a result of both the increase in job vacancies and a decline in the number of unemployed people.

The national job vacancy rate was 1.8% in the three-month period ending in April, up slightly from 1.7% a year earlier.

Job vacancy data tables are not currently available on CANSIM, but can be obtained by contacting Statistics Canada's National Contact Centre.

Note to readers

All data are based on three-month moving averages. For example, data for April are based on an average of the data from February, March and April.

Data on job vacancies are not seasonally adjusted and should only be compared on a year-over-year basis. Given this is a new data series, trends are not yet available; therefore, data should be interpreted with caution.

Health Reports, July 2012

The July 2012 online issue of *Health Reports* contains three articles.

The first article, "Informal caregiving for seniors" is based on data from the 2008/2009 Canadian Community Health Survey – Healthy Aging, and examines the characteristics of people aged 45 or older who reported caring for a senior. It also describes the nature of the care provided and the positive and negative aspects of caregiving.

The second article, "Area-based methods to calculate hospitalization rates for the foreign-born population in Canada, 2005/2006" describes an area-based method of calculating standardized, comparable hospitalization rates for areas with varying concentrations of foreign-born people, at national and subnational levels. Data from the 2006 Census were appended to the 2005/2006 Hospital Morbidity Database using postal codes.

The third article, "Mortality rates among children and teenagers living in Inuit Nunangat, 1994 to 2008" uses a geographic approach to examine disparities in mortality between 1- to 19-year-old residents of Inuit Nunangat and the rest of Canada from 1994 to 2008. The Vital Statistics Database and population estimates were used to calculate age-standardized mortality rates by cause of death in five-year intervals around the 1996 and 2006 Census years.
