## Business Activity Maintained in February

Business activity in Canada was noarly maintained during February at the high level of the first month of the year. Marked expansion was shown in the export trade and in the operations of the forcstry industry. The new business obtained by the oonstruction industry was at a lower level than in January and a number of other items, even after seasonal adjustment were somewhat below the preoeding month.

The dairy industry showed minor reaction, the output of oheese having been 3.7 million pounds against 4.4 million, the adjusted index reoeding from 300 to 291. The output of oreamery butter was 9.4 million pounds against 10.7 million, the index dropping about 2 points to 112.5. A marked expansion was shown in the outward shipments of canned salmon.

The four faotors indicating the trend of forestry produotion averaged considerably higher in February than in the first month of the year, the index advanoing from 127 to 184. Koweprint production, however, was 278,101 tons against 311,904, the index deolining slightly to 127.5 . The export of planks and boards, indioating oonditions in the sawmilling industry, rose from 103 million feet to 129 million. Inoreases were also shown in the exports of shingles and woodpulp.

The new business obtained by the construotion industry amounted to \$1l.1 million against $\$ 12.9$ million in the first month of the year, the index dropping from 118 to 99. Railway traffic showed recession, tho number of oars loaded having bean 248,549 against 271,946. The index, after seasonal adjustment, dropped from 149.6 to 140.4 . Domestic exports rose to a high level for the month, the total having been $\$ 166.5 \mathrm{million}$ as compared with $\$ 150.5$ million in January and $\$ 99.6$ million in the same month last year.

The index of cold storage holdings at the beginning of the month was 148.1 against 147.2 in the preoeding month. The standing on the same date of last year wes 124.4, a considerable increase in holdings having been indicated. The index of livestook marketings was 100.9 in February against 112.3 in the first month of the year. In February last year the index was 97.8 , a slight inorease having been shown over that month.

Canadian wheat in store on Narch 13 totalled $471,618,195$ bushels compared with $475,07 x_{2} 479$ on March 6 and $486,395,125$ on the oorresponding date last yoar. The stooks in elevators in Canods. on March 13 amounted to $452,411,750$ bushe1s, with $19,206,445$ in store in elevators in the United States.

## Overssan Export Clearances of Wheat

During the weok ending Maroh 13 the oxport clearanoes ovorseas of Candian wheat amounted to $3,195,781$ bushels compared with $4,231,980$ in tho oorresponding woek last year. During tho thirty-two weoks of the orop year olearanoes aggragated 90,293,391 bushels compred with $73,672,646$ in the oorresponding period of the previous orop year.

## Primary Movement of Wroat

Wheat rooeipts in the Prairie Provinoes during tho wook ending Maroh 13 amountod to $2,25 f_{p} 276$ oushels oompared with $1,648,661$ in the previous week and $4,925,196$ in the oorresponding weak last year. Totals follow by provinoes, with figures for 1941 in brackets: Minnitoba, $528,425(623,016)$ bushols; Saskatohewan, 1,026,575(2,272,454); Alberta, 699,276 (2,029,726)。

Marketings in the throe Prairie Provinoes during the thirty-two weeks ending Maroh 13 ageregated 170,102.501 bushels oomparod with $330,299,357$ in the corresponding period of the previous crop year. Reoeipts follow by provinces: Manitoba, 33,062,271(43,212,273) tushels; Saskatohown; $85,489,881(173,657,076)$; AAlberta, $51,550,349(113,430,008)$.

## World Shimarits of What

World shipments of wheat during the week ending March is totalled 5,750,000.bushels compred with $6,092,000$ in the previous weok and $7,760,000$ in the corresponding week last year, During the thirty-two weeks of the orop year world shipments agg:egated $170,461,000$ oushels compared with $3.57,504,000$ in tho corresponding period of the previous orop year.

Stocks of Camaien Grains
Stooks of Canadian grains on March 13 were as follows with figures for the corresponding date in 1941 in brackets: wheat, $471,618,195(486,395,125)$ bushels; oats, $7,581,406$ ( $6,755,531$ ): barloy, 11,800, $357(5,665,324)$; rye, $3,999,251(5,948,988)$; flaxsoed, 1,957,863 $(865,575)$.

## Stocks of United States Grain in Canada

Stocks of United States grain in Canada on March 13 included the following with figares for 1941 in blackets: corn, $2,448,568(68,950)$ bushels; wheat, 214,959(228,289); soya boans, $34,148(6,240)$; rye, $23,548(2,578)$; oats, $5,176($ nil $)$.

## Pracuction of futowowilos in February

Froduction of motor vehioles in February totalled 20,181 units oompared with 21,751 in January and 23,710 in February, 1941. This month's output 1noluded 3,989 passenger cars and 16,192 truckse of the passenger oars, 2,395 were 4 -door sodans, 1,071 were 2door sedans and 523 woro coupes.

Traffic on Railways in December
Reverue froicht loadod at Canadian stations and recoived from foreign oonneotions durine Docember amounted to $10,078,779$ tons as compared with $10,870,811$ in November and 8,484, 883 in Dooember, 1940. The total for the oalendar year 1941 was 117,199,499 tons as oompared with $97,531,134$ in 1940.

## Character of Canada's Domostic Exports in Fobmary

Hore are some further details regarding Canada's damestio exports in Fobruary. The impressive increase of $\$ 67,000,000$ recorded over the corresponding month last year was foatured by partioularly heavy shipments abroad of automobiles and parts, wheat flour, wool fishery products, wood pulp, newsprint papor, ohemicals, oheese, eggs and leather. The total value of domestio exports in February, oxoluding gold, was $\$ 166,519,000$ as oompared with $999,596,000$ in February, 1941.

Leeding exports in February were as follows, with figures for February 1941 in brackets: automobiles and parts, $\$ 20,866,000(\$ 7,281,000)$; newsprint papor, $\$ 14,248,000$ ( $\$ 10,324,000$ ); chemioals, $\$ 7,894,000(\$ 2,935,000)$; meats, $\$ 6,675,000(\$ 10,050,000)$; wood rulp, $\$ 7,600,000(\$ 5,436,000)$; wheat, $\$ 4,809,000(\$ 7,857,000)$; wheat flour, $\$ 4,252,000$ $(\$ 2,000,000)$; fishery produots, $35,456,000(\hat{\$} 2,930,000)$ 。

Civil Aviation in November
The number of rovemue passengers transported by oivil aircraft in November decined to 11,202 from the previous month's total of 17,027 , or by 34 per cent. Revenue freight doclined from 2,452,085 pounds in October to 460,364 pounds and mail from 307,103 to 243,002 pounds. Revenue passenger milos flown deolined from 5,252,064 in October to $3,690,239$ or by 30 per oont. Airoraft hours flown in all servioos dropped from 9,124 in Octcber to 5,549 or by 39 por cent.

## Sales of Radio Reooiving Sots

For the entire year 1941, the producers' sales of radio rocoiving sets in Canada totalled 399,556 oompared witb 438,976 sets in 1940 and 370,568 in 1939. Ontario salos in 1941 amounted to 182,505 or 45.6 per cent of the total; Quebeo, 75,895 sets or 19 per oent; the Maritimes, 37,015 or 9.3 per oent; British Columbis, 35,017 or 8.7 per oent; Manitoba, 32, $£ 21$ or 8.1 per cent, and Alborta and Saskatchewan, 36,703 sets or 9.3 p.0.

## Fur Farms in Ontario

The number of fur farms in operation in the provinoe of Ontario in 1940 was 1,408 a reduotion of 109 from the preceding year. Revenues in 1940 totalled $\$ 1,248,237$, to whioh the sale of silver fox pelts contributed $\$ 653,015$ or 58 per oent of the total; mink pults accounted for $\$ 468,108$ or $41 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. In 1939 revenues totalled $\$ 1,041,821$.

Stocks of Carrod Pmits and Vogotablos
Stooks of canned fruits and vegetables held by aanners, wholesalo dealers and ohain sturo warehouses at the beginning of 1942 were somewhat higher then on the corresponding dato in 1941. Canned iruits on hand totalled 4,450,736 dozen oans compared with 3,869,263 on the oorresponding date in 1941, while the oanned vegetables amounted to $10,100,299$ dozon cans ocmpared with $9,117,939$.

A substantial gain was reoordod in the gross value of products made by establishments included in the furniture industry in 1940 , when the total was $32,294,385$, or 26 per oent more than in 1039. The furniture manufactured by these firms consisted chiefly of household furniture whion in 1940 was valued at $822,492,987$ and was made up of upholstered living-room furniture valuon at $37,855,516$, bedroom furniture valued at $\$ 7,003,809$, dining roam furniture valued at $\hat{\psi} 2,695,755$, kitchen furniture valued at $\hat{\beta} 2,365,421$. Offico and store furniture and fixtures totollod $\$ 2,947,326$; furniture frames $\widehat{\$ 8} 9,855$; and radio oabinets $\$ 978,620$.
