Prices The investors price index, with 114 stocks priced, stood at 201.6 on November 27, at 202.9 on November 20 and at 197.2 on October 30.

Transportation During the seven days ended November 14, revenue freight carloadings amounted to 71,449 cars, up 0.6% from the comparable 1968 week.

Labour The number of employees of nine provincial governments and the governments of the Yukon and Northwest Territories reported for the last pay period of September 1969 was 354,057, an increase of 0.5% over the 352,285 reported for the same period in June 1969.

Hospitals In 1967, all reporting public, private and federal general and allied special hospitals accounted for 371,072 live births, a decrease of 3.9% from 1966. Public general hospitals accounted for 93.3 of these live births.

Vital Statistics - The 34,406 births recorded in provincial offices during October brought the total number registered for the first ten months of 1969 to 314,262,an increase of 0.9% from the 311,525 registrations for the corresponding months of 1968.

Cheques The value of cheques cashed in fifty one clearing centres in Canada during September totalled \$60,849 million, 16.4% above the value for the same month last year.

Financial Institutions During the second quarter of 1969, trust companies increased their investments in mortgages by \$125 million bringing total investments in mortgages at mid 1969 to \$2.9 billion.

Energy Coal production in September 1969 amounted to 862,682 tons, an increase of 11.7% from the September 1968 production of 772,518 tons.

Merchandising During the week ended November 15, department store sales rose in Canada by 4.2% over the corresponding week last year.

Manufacturing Steel ingot production for the week ended November 29, totalled 232,768 tons, an increase of 4.0% from the preceding week's total of 223,904 tons.

Agriculture and Food Refined beet and cane sugar manufactured in October came to 435,070,000 pounds compared to 379,237,000 pounds in October 1968.

Carloadings During the seven days ended November 14, revenue freight carloadings amounted to 71,449 cars, up 0.6% from the comparable 1968 week. Commodities contributing most to this increase were iron ore, 11,103 (versus 8,365 in 1968); crude gypsum, 1,399 (936) and woodpulp, 1,901 (1,339). Offsetting these increases were declines in loadings of copper-nickel ores and concentrates which continued at a low level due to strikes in Northern Ontario; as a result only 64 cars were moved in comparison with 967 a year earlier. Other commodities showing significant decreases were: wheat, 2,863 cars (4,604); and coal, 1,715 (2,164). Combined receipts from Canadian and United States rail connections increased 3.5% to 24,223 cars from 23,409 in the 1968 period and piggy-back loadings declined 3.7% to 3,111 cars.

During the year to date, a total of 3,166,851 cars was loaded on lines in Canada, a drop of 3.8% from the like period of 1968. Commodities showing major decreases during the year to date were: iron ore, 342,485 cars (as against 466,126 in 1968) and copper-nickel ores and concentrates, 49,862 (71,483). Included among commodities requiring more cars were: other grain, 82,441 (65,490); and automobiles, auto trucks and parts, 99,103 (81,230). Cars received from connections declined 0.9% to 1,067,051 and piggyback loadings dropped 2.4% to 151,208.

3. Provincial Government Employment

The number of employees of nine provincial governments and the governments of the Yukon and Northwest Territories reported for the last pay period of September 1969 was 354,057, an increase of 0.5% over the 352,285 reported for the same period in June 1969, according to an advance release of data that will be contained in the July-September issue of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics report, "Provincial Government Employment". Data for the province of British Columbia is not available.

Hospital Indicators, 1967 This report, the seventh in an annual series begun in 1961, contains 172 tables of hospital indicators or ratios designed to measure hospital activity in Canada for the reporting year 1967. The report is divided into sections which correspond to the organization of services and departments within hospitals. Table order within sections coincides as closely as possible with the order of data presentation in Volumes I-VI of the Institutions Section's publication series, dealing first with beds and patient movement and then services, followed by personnel, balance sheets, revenues and expenditures. The preface, the glossary of terms and the classification and organization charts also provide supplementary information for the user.

For the most part, the data presented in this volume represent the average (i.e., arithmetic mean) values for the activities being measured. Values for the first and third quartiles and the median (or second quartile) are shown for public general hospitals. For example expenditures on gross salaries and wages by Canadian public general hospitals ranged from a minimum of \$7.83 per patient-day to a maximum of \$83.04 with a mean average expenditure of \$28.83. The inter-quartile range (middle 50%) lay between \$17.37 (Q<sub>1</sub>) and \$25.95 (Q<sub>3</sub>). One half of the hospitals reported salaries and wages per patient-day of less than \$21.49 (Q<sub>2</sub>, or the median value), while the other half reported salaries and wages in excess of \$21.49.

J. <u>Hospital Services</u>, 1967 This publication presents data related to the volume and types of services provided for inpatients and out-patients of general and allied special hospitals in Canada.

Laboratory workload for patients of 922 reporting public general and allied special hospitals in 1967 amounted to some 191 million units, where 1 unit equals 10 minutes. General hospitals accounted for 97.9% of this total workload. Laboratory work for in-patients per patient-day amounted to 5.3 units in general hospitals, compared with 4.7 in 1966. Laboratory units done in general hospital per paid hour averaged 8.6 in 1967 (8.3 in 1966).

Radiology examinations reported by 899 public hospitals numbered almost 8 million, of which 98.0% were accounted for by 823 reporting general hospitals. Of the total in general hospitals, 86.7% were other radiographic (including fluoroscopic) and 13.3% were routing chest x-rays. In general hospitals, the ratios per 100 admissions of routine chest x-rays, fluoroscopic examinations, and other radiographic examinations were 32.3, 20.3, and 111.7, respectively.

In general hospitals, in-patient operations in the operating room per 100 admissions numbered 47.2 in 1967 (46.6 in 1966). Patients delivered per 100 admissions decreased from 12.9 in 1966 to 12.2 in 1967.

In 1967, all reporting public, private and federal general and allied special hospitals accounted for 371,072 live births, a decrease of 3.9% from 1966. Public general hospitals accounted for 93.3 of these live births.

For every 100 deaths in public general hospitals, there were 36.8 autopsies (36.9 in 1966), while for every 100 stillbirths there were 33.0 autopsies (32.4 in 1966).

6. Vital Statistics The 34,406 births recorded in provincial offices during
October brought the total number registered for the
first ten months of 1969 to 314,262, an increase of 0.9% from the 311,525 registrations
for the corresponding months of 1968. Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward
1sland, Quebec and Alberta reported increases.

There were 19,950 marriages registered in the provincial offices in October compared with 21,147 in the corresponding month of 1968. For the first ten months of 1969 marriages were 7.7% higher than in the corresponding period of last year with increases shown in all provinces except Quebec and Saskatchewan.

Deaths registered in provincial offices in October numbered 13,155, slightly higher than the 12,827 in October 1968. The cumulative total for the first ten months of 1969 was 0.3% higher than during the same period of last year. Increases were reported in all provinces but Prince Edward Island, Quebec, Ontario and Saskatchewan.

### CHEQUES

7. Cheques The value of cheques cashed in fifty one clearing centres in Canada during September totalled \$60,849 million, 16.4% above the value for the same month last year. Payments in the Atlantic Provinces advanced by 35.3%, British Columbia by 23.6%, Ontario by 22.2%, the Prairie Provinces by 18.0% and Quebec by 3.8%.

Forty-eight of the fifty-one centres showed a higher value of cheques cashed. Payments in Montreal increased by 4.0% and in Toronto by 23.1%. Cheques cashed in Winnipeg increased by 12.7% and in Vancouver by 22.4%.

The value of cheques cashed in the first nine months of 1969 was 15.9% above the value for the same months of 1968. Debits in all five economic areas showed an increase in this comparison. British Columbia increased by 23.3%, Ontario by 20.3%, the Atlantic Provinces by 17.7%, Quebec by 10.2% and the Prairie Provinces by 8.9%.

The turnover ratio of current deposits (compiled on an annual basis) was 103.00 compared with 86.40 for September 1968. The turnover ratio of savings accounts was 1.70 in comparison with the September 1968 ratio of 1.60.

#### FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS

Financial Institutions During the second quarter of 1969, trust companies increased their investments in mortgages by \$125 million bringing total investments in mortgages at mid 1969 to \$2.9 billion. Mortgage companies invested an additional \$75 million in mortgages during the same period to bring total mortgage holdings at mid year to \$2.3 billion. Deposits in credit unions during the second quarter of 1969 increased by \$97 million to \$2.2 billion. Members have a further equity of \$1.6 billion invested with credit unions across Canada. Sales finance increased their sales finance paper by \$172 million during the quarter bringing total holdings of sales finance paper to \$4.7 billion. Mutual funds showed sales of shares to investors of \$64 million during the quarter. Total assets at market at \$3.3 billion showed a slight drop from the previous quarter's record \$3.4 billion.

9. Credit Consumer credit outstanding on the books of selected financial institutions and merchandising establishments which report monthly was \$8,527 million at the end of September. This amount represents an increase of 16.3% in the volume of credit extended by this group of holders over the \$7,335 million reported for the corresponding month last year. Additional credit statistics are obtained at quarterly intervals from certain other holders of credit, such as other retail dealers, oil companies (credit cards) and credit unions and caises populaires. At the close of the second quarter the total of balances outstanding was \$10,256 million.

September month-end balances outstanding reported in millions of dollars, with amounts for the corresponding period last year and percentage change shown in brackets, were as follows: sales finance companies - consumer goods, \$1,271 million (\$1,133,+12.1%); and commercial goods, \$727 (\$675,+7.6%); consumer loan companies - cash loans, \$1,594 (\$1,379,+15.6%) and instalment credit, \$98 (\$88,+11.4%); department stores, \$584 (\$543,+7.6%); furniture, appliance and radio stores, \$203 (\$206,-1.5%); chartered banks - fully secured personal loans, \$605 (\$547,+10.6%); home improvement loans, \$63 (\$69,-8.7%) and other personal loans, \$4,113 (\$3,407,+20.7%). It should be noted that not all these monthly outstanding balances are included in the consumer credit statistical series.

The most recent statistics available of outstanding balances for those holders of credit who report quarterly are as follows: other retail dealers - instalment credit, \$90 (\$84, +7.1%) and charge accounts, \$348 (\$324, +7.4%); oil companies' credit cars, \$138 (\$110, +25.5%); and credit unions and caisses populaires, \$1,292 (\$1,178, +9.7%).

#### UTILITIES

Telephone Statistics The high growth in the demand for telephones is shown by the 459,423 telephones added during 1968 bringing the year-end total up to 8,817,846, an increase of 5.5% over the previous year and an increase of 62% over the 5,439,023 telephones in operation ten years ago.

The estimated number of local and long distance calls completed in Canada in 1968 increased by 7 and 9% respectively over 1967. Of the total calls, 61% originated in the provinces of Quebec and Ontario.

The increasing use by Canadians of improved international telephone communication facilities is reflected in the 24,021,670 calls originated in Canada. Of these, calls to the United States were 23,288,869 or 97% of the total, an increase of 10.9% over the 1967 figure of 21,004,820. Significant increases were also noted in calls to other countries.

#### SERVICES

Hotel Receipts Estimated receipts of hotels in Canada with 50 or more rooms rose by 11.6% during the first six months of 1969 over those recorded for the same period last year, according to an advance report of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. All provinces and regions shared in the rise, with gains ranging from a low of 0.6% in Saskatchewan to a high of 14.2% in Quebec. Other increases were: Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, combined, 3.4%; Nova Scotia, 10.8%; New Brunswick, 5.8%; Ontario, 13.8%; Manitoba, 5.8%; Alberta, 11.8%; and British Columbia including Yukon and Northwest Territories, 9.7%. This comparison of hotel receipts was based on reports submitted by a panel of hotels having 50 rooms or more.

#### ENERGY

- Coal and Coke Statistics Coal production in September 1969 amounted to 862,682 tons, an increase of 11.7% from the September 1968 production of 772,518 tons, while landed imports were 1,545,755 tons compared with 2,332,441 tons for September 1968. Consumption by industrial consumers amounted to 1,172,470 tons of coal and 257,246 tons of coke, an increase of 1,963 tons of coal and a decrease of 180,932 tons of coke from last year.
- 14. Oil Pipe Line Transport Net receipts of crude oil condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum products by Canadian oil pipe lines during September increased by 10.6% to 1,870,900 B/D from 1,691,100 B/D for the same period of the preceding year; domestic oils amounted to 1,467,800 B/D (up 7.1%) and imported oils were 403,100 B/D (up 25.9%).

Detailed information on oil pipe line movements in Canada will be released shortly in DBS publication number 55-001.

- 15. Refined Petroleum Products Preliminary figures show that production of refined petroleum products by refineries in Canada amounted to 35,748,521 barrels in September, an increase of 9.1% over the same month last year. Detailed data will be contained in the September issue of "Refined Petroleum Products" catalogue number 45-004.
- 16. Crude Petroleum and Natural Gas Production According to preliminary data, the production of crude petroleum and equivalent hydrocarbons during August 1969 amounted to 39,123,369 barrels (1,262,044 barrels per day) an increase of 6.6% or 77,956 barrels per day from August 1968.

Preliminary figures on natural gas net new production in August indicate an increase of 15.6% to 168,152,694 Mcf. from 145,476,096 Mcf. in August 1968.

- Department Store Sales by Regions During the week ended November 15, department store sales rose in Canada by 4.2% over the corresponding week last year, with regional changes as follows:

  Atlantic Provinces, -10.5%; Quebec, +3.4%; Ontario, +6.4%; Manitoba, +4.8%; Saskatchewan, +19.6%; Alberta, +0.9% and British Columbia, +3.8%.
- Department Store Sales by Regions During October 1969, department store sales rose in Canada by 17.0% over the corresponding month last year, with regional changes as follows: Atlantic Provinces, +15.5%; Quebec, +20.7%; Ontario, +12.2%; Manitoba, +13.4%; Saskatchewan, +31.7%; Alberta, +24.5%; and British Columbia, +19.0%.

### MANUFACTURING

19. Steel Ingots Steel ingot production for the week ended November 29, totalled 232,768 tons, an increase of 4.0% from the preceding week's total of 223,904<sup>r</sup> tons. The comparable week's total in 1968 was 229,465 tons. The index of production based on the average weekly output during 1957-1959 of 96,108 tons equalling 100 was 242 in the current week, 233<sup>r</sup> a week earlier and 239 one year ago.

- 20. Rubber During October, production of rubber fell by 8.0% to 35,004,000 pounds from 38,051,000 in October a year ago. For the year to date, however, production rose by 1.6% to 388,321,000 pounds from 382,295,000 in 1968. October consumption of rubber rose by 6.8% to 38,463,000 pounds from 36,027,000 in the 1968 month and during the ten-month period increased by 17.5% to 349,957,000 pounds from 297,834,000.
- Raw Hides, Skins and Finished Leather Raw hides and skins held by packers, dealers and tanners at October 31, 1969 numbered: cattle hides, 328,719; calf and kip skins, 151,785. October receipts of cattle hides numbered 185,352 and wettings amounted to 179,171. Production of upper leather totalled 6,046,729 square feet.
- 22. Radios and Televisions Manufacturers' domestic sales of made-in-Canada radio receiving sets numbered 195,704 units in September and 900,538 in the cumulative period. Domestic sales of made-in-Canada television receiving sets numbered 71,780 in September and 419,680 during the year to date.

<sup>26.</sup> Sugar Refined beet and cane sugar manufactured in October came to 435,070,000 pounds compared to 379,237,000 pounds in October 1968. During the year to date, production increased to 2,060,975,000 pounds from 1,966,247,000 in the 1968 period.

- Meat and Meat Preparations Net distributive sales of fresh and frozen meats amounted to 157,865,000 pounds in September compared to 140,669,000 pounds in September a year ago. During the cumulative period, sales increased to 1,381,465,000 pounds from 1,310,235,000 pounds in 1968. September shipments of uncanned meat preparations amounted to 35,238,000 pounds (33,170,000 in 1968) and cumulative shipments came to 325,053,000 pounds (310,366,000).
- Margarine, Shortening and Salad Oils Retail sales (20 pounds and less) of these products in September were as follows: margarine, 16,763,000 pounds; shortening, baking and frying oils and fats, 4,828,000 pounds and salad oil, 3,816,000 pounds. Commercial sales (21-450 pounds) were as follows: margarine, 420,000 pounds; shortening, etc., 12,684,000 pounds and salad oils, 1,095,000 pounds.
- 29. Production of Eggs October production of eggs fell by 1.2% to 37,169,000 dozen from 37,621,000 dozen in October 1968. The average number of layers fell by 0.9% to 27,776,000 from 28,032,000 and the number of eggs per 100 layers was 0.2% lower at 1,606 (1,610 in 1968). The farm price of eggs sold for market was 1.4% lower at 42.2¢ per dozen (42.8¢ per dozen in 1968).
