Government Finance Gross revenue and expenditure of municipal government in Canada continued to increase in 1968 and 1969. Waterworks, which in previous years were reflected only to the extent of their financing by municipalities, are now considered to be part of general government and their total revenue and expenditure is included.

Prices During the week ended December 23, 1969, the investors price index (1956= 100) decreased to 198.8 from November 27, 1969 (201.6).

Cheques The total value of cheques cashed in fifty-one clearing centres in canada during October was $\$ 65,334$ million, an increase of $\mathbf{1 4 . 2 \%}$ over October 1968. The value of cheques cashed during the first ten months of 1969 was $15.7 \%$ higher than for the same months of 1968.

Mining During $1969,2,502,169$ troy ounces of gold were produced, estimated at $\$ 94,331,773$, compared to $2,743,021$ troy ounces produced in $1968(\$ 103,439,321)$.

Construction Construction starts in October in centres of 10,000 population and over amounted to 15,239 units, completions numbered 15,684 units and dwellings under construction came to 119,120 units.

Merchandising During the week ended December 13, department store sales decreased in Canada by $1.2 \%$ from the corresponding week last year.

Manufacturing Steel ingot production for the week ended January 3, 1970 totalled 224,654 tons, an increase of $21.7 \%$ from the preceding week's total of 184,541 tons.

Agriculture and Food Shipments of macro-premixes in October amounted to 4,997 tons and those of supplements to 52,100 tons.

## 1.

Municipal Government Finance Gross revenue and expenditure of municipal governments in Canada continued to increase in 1968 and 1969. The report on which this information is based, "Municipal Government Finance, Preliminary 1968 and Estimates 1969 ", is expected to be published in April.

One important change in concepts will be incorporated in this report. Waterworks, which in previous years were reflected only to the extent of their financing by municipalities, are now considered to be part of general government and their total revenue and expenditure is included. In addition, the availability of better data on the transactions of local school authorities has permitted the incorporation of their total revenue and expenditure in the report.

One other change in the report will be the inclusion of data for Census Metropolitan and Major Urban Areas in the Province of quebec. This will result in complete coverage for the first time of all urban regions in Canada.

## 2. Non-Resident Vehicles Entering Canada An increase of 17,231 vehicles or

 $2.4 \%$ was recorded in the number of non-resident vehicles entering Canada during November 1969. Entries in the long-term category were up some $4.7 \%$ over November of last year. Totals for the period JanuaryNovember show an increase of $1.5 \%$ in the aggregate while long-term traffic increased almost $5 \%$.
## H EALTH

3. Incidence of Tuberculosis During September, 249 cases of tuberculosis were reported of which 224 were new active and 25 were reactivated. During the year to date, a total of 3,444 cases was reported ( 3,712 in 1968 ) of which 3,018 were new active $(3,218)$ and 426 were reactivated (494).

5. Cheques The Lotal value of cheques cashed infifty-one clearing centres in Canada during October was $\$ 65,334$ million, an increase of 14.2\% were October 1968. Cheques cashed in ontario increased by $24.7 \%$, in the Atlantic Provinces by 18.4 , in British Columbia by $16.7 \%$ and in the pratrie provinces by $10.2 \%$. Quebec showed a loser value of cheques cashed.

Forty-fout of the fifty-one centres showed a higher value of checpues cashod. Cheques cashed in Montreal were lower in value while foronto increased by $28.2 \%$. Cheques cashed in Winnipeg increased by $15.6 \%$ and in Vancouver by $19.5 \%$.

The value of cheques cashed during the first ten months of 1969 was $\mathbf{1 5 . 7 \%}$ higher than for the same luonths of 1968. Cheques cahsed in British Columbia increased by $22.5 \%$, in Ontario by $20.7 \%$, in the Allantic Provinces by $17.8 \%$, in the prairie provinces by $9.1 \%$ and in Quebec by $8.9 \%$.

The turnover ratio of current deposits (compiled on an annual basis) was 111.49 compared with 94.38 for october 1968. The turnover ratio of savings accounts was 1.70 in comparison with the October 1968 ratio of 1.63 .

10．Department Store Sales by Regions During the week ended December 13， department store sales decreased in Canada by $1.2 \%$ from the corresponding week last year，with regional changes as follows：Atlantic Provinces，$-5.3 \%$ ；Quebec，$-2.4 \%$ ；Ontario，$-1.8 \%$ ；Manitoba，$-5.5 \%$ ； Saskatchewan，$-10.0 \%$ ；Alberta，$+0.7 \%$ ；and British Columbia，$+4.3 \%$ ．

Wholesale Trade Wholesale sales rose by $5.0 \%$ in October over October
1968 to a value of $\$ 1,684,426,000$ from $\$ 1,603,887,000$ ． Th：largest increase was in iron and steel（21．2\％）．During the year to date，the value of sales rose by $6.3 \%$ to $\$ 15,101,816,000$ from $\$ 14,211,228,000$ in 1968 ，with the largest rise again in iron and steel（18．4\％）．

14. Steel Ingots Steel ingot production for the week ended January 3, 1970 totalled 224,654 tons, an increase of $21.7 \%$ from the preceding week's coral of 184,541 tons. The comparable week's total in 1969 was 205,742 tons. The index of production based on the average weekly output during 1957-1959 of 96,108 equalling 100 was 234 in the current week, 192 a week earlier and 214 one year ago.

Manufacturing Industries Developments in the manufacturing industries of British Columbia in 1966 included a large increase in employment in the paper and allied industries, made possible by expansions in capacity and by demand conditions; a decrease in employment in the wood industries, centred in sawmills and planing mills; employment increases in fruit and vegetable canners and preservers and the fish products industries, as well as a number of socondary manufacturing industries.

The value of shipments of goods of own manufacture by British Columbia manufacturers rose by $9.2 \%$ over the previous year to a record $\$ 3,064$ million. This compares with an average annual rate of increase of $9.6 \%$ for the 1961-1966 period.
16. Asbestos During October, producers' shipments of asbestos (including tonnage for their own use) amounted to 154,791 tons compared to 152,206 in October 1968. Year-to-date shipments came to 1, 247, 483 tons (1, 193, 159 in 1968).

Sales of these products in October amounted to a value of $\$ 17,009,641$ compared to
$\$ 17,089,639$ in October 1968. During the year to date, their value came to $\$ 184,065,878$ ( $\$ 178,356,102$ in 1968).
18. Chemicals Production of hydrochloric acid, as $100 \%$ came to $10,995,385$ pounds in October compared to $9,751,691$ pounds during Octuber 1968. During the year to date production rose to $110,033,244$ pounds from $85,969,977$ in the 1968 period.

Phonograph Records
Phonograph records produced during the month of November 1969 numbered 4,357,867; net sales for the same period amounted to $4,023,802$, valued free on board at the plant at $\$ 5,838,107$. Similar data for the year to date are: production, $43,626,614$; shipments, $37,051,749$, valued at $\$ 44,957,157$.
