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Sales and Purchases of Securities between Canada and Other Countries, August 1970 (67-002, 206/\$2.00)

International trading in outstanding securities during August led to net outflows of $\$ 20.2$ million as purchases from non-residents exceeded sales for both Canadian and foreign securities. Increased activity on North American stock markets was most apparent in trading in foreign securities. This reflected the especially marked improvement in stock market conditions in the United States, induced by the resumption of a moderate expansion in both economic activity and in credit conditions. Net outflows of $\$ 20.8$ million, $\$ 2.2$ million, and $\$ 1.8$ million resulted from trading with residents of the United States, the United Kingdom and other European countries, and were partly offset by net inflows of $\$ 4.6$ million from all other countries.

Trading in Canadian securities led to a net outflow of $\$ 12.5$ million. Sales to non-residents increased from the year's low recorded in July, and re-purchases dropped to their lowest level in over $21 / 2$ years, making this the smallest net outflow in the last five months. Changes from the previous month occurred mainly in trading with United States residents, outflows to the United States dropping to $\$ 11.3$ million from $\$ 21.1$ million in July. Relatively large increases in sales of outstanding Canadian securities to residents of countries outside Europe and the United States gave rise to net inflows of $\$ 2.0$ million, compared with $\$ 0.5$ million in July.

Transactions in outstanding foreign securities, resulted in net outflows of $\$ 7.7$ million, the first such outflows since September 1969, and were marked by a sharp decline in the level of sales by Canadians to non-residents. While sales were down, purchases from non-residents increased for the first time since April of this year, both trends consistent with an overall pattern of cautiously "bullish" stock market conditions in the United States. The swing of $\$ 41.5$ million from the previous month's inflow took place mainly in trading in United States equities, where an inflow of $\$ 38.1$ million in July turned into a $\$ 6.0$ million outflow in August. Most of the outflow was attributable to transactions with United States residents, and was partly offset by a relatively large inflow from sales to residents of countries outside the United States and Europe.

In the first eight months of the year, trading in outstanding securities led to net inflows of over $\$ 79$ million. Net inflows of $\$ 104$ million from the United States and $\$ 3$ million from other countries outside Europe were partly offset by smaller net outflows of almost $\$ 5$ million and $\$ 23$ million from the United Kingdom and other European countries respectively. By comparison, in the same period a year earlier total net inflows of $\$ 113$ million consisted of $\$ 37$ million from the United States, $\$ 18$ million from the United Kingdom, $\$ 37$ million from other European countries, and $\$ 22$ million from all other countries.

Summary of Exports, September 1970 - Advance information
The External Trade Division reports that the value of total exports increased to $\$ 1,363,650,000$ in September 1970 from $\$ 1,300,393,000$ and $\$ 1,135,678,000$ in the same months of 1969 and 1968 respectively. January-to-September exports increased to $\$ 12,490,810,000$ in 1970 from $\$ 10,879,021,000$ in 1969 and $\$ 9,910,835,000$ in 1968.

Railway Operating Statistics, July 1970 - Advance information
Twenty four common carrier railways in Canada reported operating revenues of $\$ 142,787,532$ in July 1970, up $11.1 \%$ from July 1969. Net operating income rose $71.9 \%$ to $\$ 6,340,151$ as the effects of the 1969 iron ore strike became apparent.

Revenue freight carried jumped $32.7 \%$ to $21,396,401$ tons, and the number of revenue passengers carried rose $1.6 \%$ to $1,972,390$.

Shipping Statistics, August 1970 (54-002, 20c/\$2.00)
During August, the overall tonnage of cargo handled at Canadian ports increased $30.0 \%$ to $31,487,538$ tons from $23,205,309$ tons in August 1969. This was due almost entirely to increased activity among grains and iron-ore, as was the case in July.

Up to the end of August, $174,716,508$ tons were handled this year, $19 \%$ more than the $147,010,943$ tons in the same period in 1969.

TRAVEL

Travel Between Canada, the United States and Other Countries, July 1970 (66-001, 30 $/ \$ 3.00$ )

Canada received 6,579,700 visitors from the United States in July, along with 5,011, 200 Canadian residents returning from the United States. This represented increases of $4.2 \%$ and $3.4 \%$ respectively when compared to July 1969.

Overseas visitors entering Canada rose by $9.7 \%$ to 105,000 , and 86,900 Canadian residents (up 3.3\%) returned direct from overseas countries.

The ten leading countries from which overseas visitors came to Canada during July 1970, were: the United Kingdom, Germany, The Netherlands, France, Japan, Belgium, Italy, Mexico, Australia and Jamaica.

In the January-July period, United States visitors to Canada increased by $4.2 \%$ while Canadian residents returning from trips to the United States were $1.9 \%$ above the same period in 1969. There were $18.3 \%$ more overseas visitors entering Canada while Canadian residents returning direct from overseas countries increased by $30.9 \%$.

Passenger Bus Statistics, September 1970 - Advance information
During September, 4,072,082 passengers were carried by 53 intercity and rural bus companies, an increase of $1.1 \%$ from $4,028,201$ in September 1969.

Vehicle miles increased by $5.1 \%$ to $10,360,175$ from $9,859,189$ in 1969.
The consumption of diesel oil decreased to $1,220,231$ from 1,294,733, but gasoline consumption increased to 97,811 from 77,105 gallons.

Total operating revenue was $\$ 7,441,066,10.1 \%$ more than the $\$ 6,757,051$ received in 1969.

## Urban Transit, September 1970 - Advance information

During September, 84,349:765 passenger fares (excluding transfers) were collected by 62 urban transit systems. This was a decrease of $1.0 \%$ from the $85,179,019$ fares collected in September $196 \%$.

Fares on motor buses increased to $57,891,778$ from $57,458,236$ and on subway cars, to $13,407,697$ from $12,959,474$. Use of street cars dropped to $5,495,112$ fares from 5,595,433 and that of trolley coaches, to $6,784,722$ from 8,346,590.

Urban transit vehicles travelled $20,763,775$ vehicle miles in September 1970 compared with $20,779,828$ a year earlier.

The consumption of diesel oil increased to $2,555,197$ gallons from $2,463,434$, gasoline consumption rose to 300,568 from 237,930 and the consumption of liquified petroleum gases increased to 15,503 from 11,472 gallons.

Total operating revenue was $\$ 19,841,220$, an increase of $1.1 \%$ from $\$ 19,623,592$ in 1969.

LABOUR
Larnings and Hours of Work in Manufacturing, 1969 - Advance information
Females employed by large manufacturing firms received an average of $8.8 \%$ more in earnings during the last week of October of 1969 than they did in the corresponding week of 1968. Males in the same firms (with 20 or more employees) received $7.0 \%$ more. Average female earnings climbed to $\$ 78.58$ from $\$ 72.25$; average male earnings to $\$ 142.36$ from $\$ 133.08$.

The average number of hours worked per week increased among salaried employees to 37.3 from 37.0 for females and to 38.8 hours from 38.5 for males, but decreased among hourly wage earners to 37.8 from 38.1 for females and to 41.4 from 41.7 for males.

Average hourly earnings increased to $\$ 1.92$ from $\$ 1.74$ for females, and to $\$ 3.12$ from $\$ 2.88$ for males, bringing wage-earners' average weekly pay up to $\$ 72.39$ from $\$ 66.26$ for females and $\$ 129.17$ from $\$ 120.34$ for males.

Salaried females drew an average of $\$ 92.86$ per week - up from $\$ 83.56$ a year earlier - while salaried males averaged \$178.60 - up from \$163.56.

Estimates of Labour Income, August 1970 - Advance information
The seasonally-adjusted advance estimate of labour income for August was $\$ 3,928.5 \mathrm{million}, \$ 22.1 \mathrm{million}$ more than the preliminary estimate. of $\$ 3,906.4$ million for July. The revised estimate for June was $\$ 3,899.3$ million.

Hotel Receipts，First Half of 1970 －Published only in DBS Daily
Total receipts of Canadian hotels with 50 rooms or more were $4.1 \%$ higher during the first half of 1970 than during the same period last year．

All provinces showed increases except Prince Edward Island and New－ foundland，where combined receipts were $2.1 \%$ lower．The largest change was recorded in Alberta where receipts were $9 \%$ higher．

In Nova Scotia，receipts were up $2.9 \%$ in New Brunswick， $4.2 \%$ in Quebec， $4.2 \%$ ；in Ontario， $0.4 \%$ ；in Manitoba， $7.5 \%$ ；in Saskatchewan， $0.2 \%$ ； and in British Columbia，Yukon and the Northwest Territories，6．3\％．

Restaurant Statistics，September 1970 （63－011，10c／\＄1．00）
Canadian restaurant receipts rose to an estimated $\$ 108,080,000$ in September，up $3.6 \%$ from September 1969．Chain restaurants received $\$ 10,149,000$ ，and independent establishments，$\$ 97,931,000$ ．The largest increase in total restaurant receipts occurred in Newfoundland（17．9\％）．

IHE MOIOR VEHICLE

The Motor Vehicle，Part II，Motive Fuel Sales， 1969 （53－218，50ç）
During 1969，5，028 million gallons of gasoline were sold for consumption on Canadian public roads and highways．This was $5.7 \%$ more than the 4,758 million gallons sold in 1968．Corresponding sales of diesel oil also increased by $13.0 \%$ to 388 million gallons from 343 million．

Steel Ingots，Week ended November 7， 1970 －Advance information
Steel ingot production for the week ended November 7，totalled 227，870 tons，a decrease of $2.9 \%$ from the preceding week＇s total of 234,630 tons． The comparable week＇s total in 1969 was $192,230^{r}$ tons．The index of production based on the average weekly output during 1957－1959 of 96，108 tons equalling 100 was 237 in the current week， 244 a week earlier and $200^{r}$ one year ago．

Pulpwood and Wood Residue Statistics, September 1970 - Advance information Roundwood produced in September 1970 decreased by $5.2 \%$ to 1,628,404 cunits from $1,716,660$ cunits in September 1969. Consumption of roundwood and wood residue decreased by $9.1 \%$ to $1,737,177$ cunits from $1,911,514$ cunits and the closing inventory of these two products increased by $4.6 \%$ to $10,925,653$ cunits from $10,443,970$. Receipts of wood residue decreased by $18.0 \%$ to 488,149 cunits from 594,666 in the 1969 month.

Gypsum Products, September 1970 (44-003, 10 c/\$1.00)
Canadian factories shipped $76,304,875$ square feet of gypsum wallboard in September, down from $81,462,501$ square feet in September 1969. Year-to-date shipments were also lower, at $610,649,549$ square feet $(662,269,154$ square feet in the same period of 1969).

Hardboard, September $1970(36-001,10 c / \$ 1.00)$
Canadian firms shipped $52,412,430$ square feet of hardboard ( $1 / 8$ inch basis) in September, up from $49,780,901$ square feet in September 1969. This brought the year-to-date total to $426,762,030$ square feet, a decrease from the $452,965,117$ square feet shipped last year.

Salt, September 1970 (26-009, 10 c/\$1.00)
September production of dry salt and salt content of brine increased to 515,027 tons in 1970 from 456,299 tons in 1969, which brought year-to-date production to $3,956,685$ tons (up from 3,058,403 a year earlier). September shipments increased to 434,179 tons from 394, 404; year-to-date shipments increased to $3,809,640$ tons from $2,976,664$ the previous year.

Sugar Situation, October 1970-Advance (Preliminary) information
Canadian sugar refineries sold $186,690,517$ pounds of all types of sugar, $183,360,395$ pounds in domestic sales and $3,330,122$ in export sales, for October 1970.
