External Trade Preliminary statement of total canadian exports rose to $\$ 1,255.2$ million in February 1970 from $\$ 1,114.0$ million recorded in the same month last year, an increase of $12.7 \%$.

Transportation Revenue freight loaded onto railway cars in Canada during the week ended February 21 totalled 69,270 carloads, down $5.2 \%$ from the total of 73,063 in the comparable February 15-21 period in 1969.

Prices The investors price index $(1956=100)$ increased to 201.0 for the week ended March 5, 1970 from 198.6 for the week ended February 26, 1970.

Census Western metropolitan areas showed the greatest percentage increases in the 12 month period between June 1,1968 and June 1, 1969. The largest numerical increase $(36,000)$ was in the Toronto metropolitan areas.

Education A total of 4,134 children are reported committed for training or retraining in 1968. This represents a $12.1 \%$ increase over the 1967 total of 3,687 .

Merchandising During 1967 , sales of retail stores and restaurants located in shopping centres rose to $\$ 2,605,701,819$, an increase of $39.6 \%$ over the comparable 1965 figure of $\$ 1,865,333,934$.

Manufacturing Steel ingot production for the week ended March 7, 1970 totalled 230,648 tons, an increase of $0.5 \%$ from the preceding week's total of 229,602 tons.

Agriculture and Food Total exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain from Canada, the United States, Australia and Argentina during the August-December period of the current Canadian crop year amounted to 463.7 million bushels, a decrease of $4 \%$ from the total of 484.1 million exported during the same five months in 1968.

## TRANSPORTATION

Revenue freight loaded onto railway cars in Canada during the week ended Febraary 21 totalled 69, 270 carloads, down $5.2 \%$ from the total of 73,063 in the comparable February $15-21$ period in 1969. This decrease may be attributed mainly to an $8.5 \%$ drop in Eastern Canadian loadings to 43,497. Loadings West of the Lakehead rose $1.0 \%$ to 25,773 cars.

Year to date total carloadings were down $1.7 \%$ to 493,679 from 502,179 in the 1969 period. This decrease is entirely attributable to Eastern Canadian traffic where loadings were down $7.5 \%$ to 308,801 which more than offset a $9.9 \%$ increase to 184,878 in Western loadings.

The following tables show carloadings and tonnages for total traffic and for piggyback traffic for the third week of February and for the year to date. Data areshown for 1969 only where comparable figures are available.

Twenty four common carrier railways in Canada reported operating revenues of $\$ 133.1$ million in November 1969, up 3.2 per cent from the November 1968 figure, according to an advance release of data that will be contained in the November issue of the D.B.S. report, "Railway Operating Statistics". Railway operating expenses at $\$ 120.4$ million were 1.7 per cent over those of November 1968 resulting in a net income of $\$ 12,774,207$ compared to one of $\$ 10,617,340$ in the year earlier period.

A total of 19.9 million tons of revenue freight was handled by railways in Canada during November 1969, a decline of 3.5 per cent from the comparable 1968 month. The average haul, however, at 427 miles increased by 37 miles, and ton=miles increased to 8,484 million from 8,025 million in the year earlier period. The average number of miles of road operated (first main track) increased to 44,152 miles from 44,011 in November 1968 . Revenue passengers carried decreased 12.8 per cent to $1,875,276$ with commuter travel dropping 9.7 per cent and nonw commuter travel decreasing 19.4 per cent from the 1968 month. There was a decline in the average passenger journey of 15 miles to 69 miles in November 1969. Employment in the industry dropped to 115,457 persons from 119,738 persons in November 1968.

T R A V EL


A total of 594,543 non-resident vehicles (other than commercial trucks) entered Canada in January, an increase of $10.3 \%$ aver the corresponding figure for 1969 . Of these, 90,067 remained one or more nights in Canada, an increase of $19.7 \%$ over last year. A total of $1,356,305$ persons entered Canada in such vehicles during January, an increase of $11.9 \%$ over the January 1969 total.
5. Weekly Security Price Indexes


Population estimates as of June 1,1969 for 19 census metropolitan areas were teleased today by DBS. For purposes of comparison these population estimates telate to boundaries established for the 1966 Census and the data for the years 1966 , 1967 and 1968 are also shown.

With a few exceptions, Western Metropolitan areas continued to show the greatest percentage increases in the 12 month period between June 1, 1968 and June 1, 1969. Calgary led with a growth of $3.7 \%$, Edmonton was third with a growth of $3.0 \%$ and both Saskatoon and Vancouver MA's increased by $2.6 \%$. One exception was St. John's, Newfoundland which had the second largest increase of $3.1 \%$, another exception was Kitchener MA at $2.6 \%$. The only other areas with increases of over $2.0 \%$ were Winnipeg, $2.2 \%$ and Regina and Sudbury with increases of $2.0 \%$ each.

The largest numerical increase $(36,000)$ was in the Toronto MA, Montreal MA was second with an increase of 26,000 and Vancouver MA third, with 25,000; Calgary increased by 13,000, Edmonton MA by 13,000, Winnipeg MA by 11,000 and Ottawa MA by 9,000.

As in the preparation of the post-census population estimates for the provinces, births occurring in these areas between June 1, 1966 and June 1, 1969 are added to the population at the census date, deaths are subtracted, immigrants over this period reporting these metropolitan areas as places of destination were also added, while allowance was made for losses in population due to elligration. Finally, the net in- or out-movement due to internal migration was calculated form Family Allowance and other data. These estimates will be revised when data from the 1971 Census become available.

TUBERCULOSIS

Tuberculosis Statistics
Tuberculosis institutions in operation in Canada in 1968 numbered 53, one less than in 1967, and comprised 37 sanatoria and 16 units, usually located in larger hospitals. All told there were 4,565 rated beds in these institutions, of which only 234 were not directly concerned with tuberculosis care. On any given day in 1968, there was an average of 3,278 patients in tuberculosis institutions compared with 3,751 in 1967. At the same time, occupancy dropped from 71 to $68 \%$.

Total personnel employed in sanatoria decreased from 4,868 to 4,414 , or approximately 1.5 for every patient, just slightly higher than in 1967. In 1968, public sanatoria reported total expenditures of $\$ 27.5 \mathrm{million}$, up $2.2 \%$ aver 1967 , as gross salaries and wages climbed by $3.5 \%$ to almost $\$ 19$ miliion. Cost per patientday advanced from $\$ 23.41$ to $\$ 27.10(16.1 \%)$, while cost per capita amounted to $\$ 1.33$ (\$1.32 in 1967).

EDUCATION

Training Schools A total of 4,134 children are reported committed for training or retraining in 1968. This represents a $12.1 \%$ increase over the 1967 total of 3,687 . In $1968,1,030$ ( $24.9 \%$ ) were girls, while in 1967, there were 949 or $25.7 \%$ girls; thus, there is no significant change in the proportion of either sex admitted, but just an overall increase.

Of the total children, $3,153(76.3 \%)$ are reported committed for delinguency, 453 ( $11.0 \%$ ) for protection, 482 ( $11.7 \%$ ), as returns from replacement, and 46 ( $1.1 \%$ ) upon application of the parents or guardians. The only area of increase is in committal for delinquency which had 2,624 or $71.2 \%$ reported admitted in 1967 .

Of the girls, $70.4 \%$ were admitted for delinquencies ( $60.6 \%$ in 1967) and $78.2 \%$ of the boys (72.2\%). Though there has been a rise for both sexes since last year, the gap between them has narrowed.

The percentage of children being returned from placement had diminished since 1967 ; $10.5 \%$ of the girls ( $16.7 \%$ ) and $12.0 \%$ of the boys ( $14.0 \%$ ) were committed for this reason in 1968.

Proportionately more girls than boys were reported committed for protection, and Quebec accounted for $92.3 \%$ of the children thus admitted.

11. Restaurants Estimated restaurant receipts in January rose by $2.9 \%$ to a value of $\$ 87,862,000$, with chain businesses receiving $\$ 86,438,000$ and independent establishments, $\$ 1,424,000$. The highest increase in cosal restaurant recelpts was in Alberta (9,4\%).

Silver, Lead and Zinc
December production of silver came to $3,540,674$ troy ounces ( $3,251,024$ in 1968), bringing year-end totals to $41,928,692$ in 1969 and $45,389,141$ in 1968.

Lead production in December was 19,068 tons (17,987 in 1968), and the year-end total was 187,143 tons compared to 202,100 in 1968.

December zinc production rose to 43,963 tons from 37,692 in 1968, bringing the year-end total to 466,350 in 1969, up from 426,933 in 1968.

CONSTRUCTION
14. Residential Construction

Construction starts, by type of dwelling, in December, with the year 1969 figures in brackets, Were 15 follows: single detached, $3,492(46,787)$; two-family, 596 (8,636); row, $665(9,694)$; apartment and other, $6,864(104,622)$. This brought the total starts to 11,617 in December and 169,739 during the year 1969 .

During 1967, sales of retail stores and restaurants located in shopping centres rose co $\$ 2,605,701,819$, an increase of $39.6 \%$ over the comparable 1965 f gure of $\$ 1,865,333,934$, according to an advance release of data to be published shortly in Gine Dominion Bureau of statistics report "Shopping Centres in Canada, 1966-67" i Catalogue number 63-214).

Over the $1965-67$ period, the number of shopping centres in operation fumped Erom 386 to 461 , while the number of stores doing business in a shopping centre locale rose from 5,349 to 6,747 .

This report will include, for the first time, a supplement on service trades $1 n$ shopping centres. In 1967 , such trades recorded total recedpts of $\$ 111,823,9321 \pi$ a total of 1,942 locations. Principal service trades were barber shops and beauty salons, which together accounted for 715 locations, and restaurants with 442 locations.

## 17. Wholesale Trade

Preliminary estimates of wholesale sales for December were $\$ 1,483,290,000$, up $8.5 \%$ from December 1968,
bringing total estimated sales for the year up to $\$ 18,046,138,000$ (an increase of $5.9 \%$ over the 1968 total of $\$ 17,037,974,000$ ).

Warehousing The net operating revenues of 146 firms warehousing general merchandise and refrigerated goods in 1968 were $\$ 3,953,418$ compared to $\$ 4,971,841$ reported by 143 firms in 1967 . The average number of employees was 4,929 in 1968 and 5,069 in. 1967.

New Motor Vehicle Sales Sales of new motor vehicles declined in January for the second successive month: The 49,465 cars and trucks bold during January represented a drop of $20.8 \%$ below the comparable 1969 figure of 62,469 units. The dollar value of sales was $\$ 183,066,000,19.3 \%$ below the January 2969 value of $\$ 226,767,000$.

As in previous months, the decline was restricted to Canadian and U.S. made models, sales of which fell by $26.7 \%$ in number and $23.1 \%$ in value. In strong contrast, sales of overseas-manufactured vehicles rose by $38.4 \%$ in units sold and $42.3 \%$ in value of sales.

Sales in January were lower for both passenger cars and commercial vehicles. with the former showing a decline of $20.9 \%$ in number of units and $21.8 \%$ in value. In comparison, sales of commercial vehicles fell by $20.4 \%$ in units sold and $10.2 \%$ in dollar value (higher average prices offsetting, to some extent, the drop in number of units sold).

Steel Ingots Steel ingot production for the week ended March 7, 1970 totalled 230,648 tons, an increase of $0.5 \%$ from the preceding week's total of 229,602 tons. The comparable week's total in 1960 was 225,134 tons. The index of production based on the average weekly output during 1957-1959 of 96,108 equalling 100 was 240 in the current week, 239 a week earlier and 234 one year ago. those which will appear later in regular publications of the Manufacturing and Primary Industries Division.

## AGRICULTURE AND FOOD

29. The Wheat Review Total exports of wheat and wheat flour in terms of grain from Canada, the United States, Australia and Argentina during the August-December period of the current Canadian crop year amounted to 463.7 million bushels, a decrease of $4 \%$ from the total of 484.1 million exported during the same five months in 1968 and $19 \%$ below the ten-year (1958-67) average shipments for the same period of the crop year, of some 570.6 million bushels. Based on the Canadian crop year, Australia was the only country registering an increase.

Supplies of wheat held by the above four exporters at January 1,1970 for export and carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to $3,148.8$ million bushels, $18 \%$ above the $2,674.7 \mathrm{million}$ at the same time a year ago. The newly harvested 1969-70 wheat crops in the Argentine and Australia are taken into consideration in these totals. Supplies in United States, Canada, Argentina and Australia were larger than those of the previous year.

According to the January 31, 1970 edition of World Agiicultural production and Trade published by the United States Department of Agriculture the second estimate for world production of wheat and rye during 1969 totals 322 million metric tons, on the basis of the latest information available to the Foreign Agricultural Service. A harvest at this level would by $5.4 \%$ below the record 341 million tons for 1968. World wheat production in 1969 is currently estimated at 293 million metric tons, $5.1 \%$ below the record 308 million tons of 1968 , but $5.7 \%$ above the 277 million-ton crop of 1967.

Total grain shipments from country elevators will reach near-record levels, during the remaining months of the present crop year, according to a statement by W.C. McNamara, chief commissioner of the Canadian Wheat Board on January 22, 1970. Sr. McNamara said a substantial increase in wheat and barley exports is expected during the last seven months of the 1969-70 crop year. Total wheat and barley exports for the entire crop year are expected to be more than a 100 million bushels higher than in 1968-69.

Total estimated supplies of wheat in Canada, for the 1969-70 crop year reached a new high of $1,536.1$ million bushels, $17 \%$ greater than last year's previous peak of $1,315,4 \mathrm{million}$.

During August-December 1969, exports of wheat and Elour, in terms of wheat amounted to 107.6 million bushels, $22 \%$ smaller than the 137.8 million exported during the same five months of 1968. On January 1, 1970 the balance remaining for export and for carryover amounted to $1,263.5 \mathrm{million}$ bushels, $24 \%$ above the January 1. 1969 total of $1,019.8$ million.
30. Sugar Refined beet and cane sugar manufactured during January amounted to $152,835,000$ pounds compared to $161,270,000$ pounds in January 1969. Sales for the month were up to $153,247,000$ pounds from $141,894,000$ pounds in January 1969.
31. Biscuits and Confectionary During the final quarter of 1969, production of sweetened biscuits came to $79,309,617$ pounds compared to $73,235,554$ pounds in the 1968 fourth quarter. Production of solid chocolate confectionery came to $10,773,187$ pounds compared to $14,194,062$ in 1968 .
32. Soft Drinks January production of soft drinks totalled 22,615,860 gallons (18,994, 266 in January 1969 and $17,595,765$ in 1968).

Canadian egg production rose by $5.3 \%$ to $42,556,000$ dozen in January 1970 from 40,431,000 in January 1969. The average number of layers was up $4.0 \%$ to $29,037,000$ from $27,907,000$ and the number of eggs per 100 layers increased $1.2 \%$ to 1,759 in January this year from 1,739 in January 1969. Farm price of eggs sold for market was up $6.3 \%$ to 45.6 cents per dozen compared with 42.9 cents per dozen during the corresponding period in 1969.

During January, retail sales (20 pounds and less) of these products were as follows: margarine, $14,548,000$ pounds; shortening, baking and frying oils and fats, 2,781,000 pounds; and salad oil, 3,467,000 pounds. Commercial sales (21450 pounds) were as follows: margarine, 324,000 pounds; shortening, baking and frying 011 s and fats, $9,848,000$ pounds and salad 011, 1,036,000 pounds.
35. Honey Revised figures for stocks of honey held by producers were as follows: at December 31, 1969, 28,061,983 pounds compared to
$20,835,647$ pounds at December 31,1968 , an increase of $34.7 \%$.
