I ND JSTRIAL PRODUCTION
3. Index of Industrial Production, July 1970-Advance information

The seasonally adjusted index of industrial production (1961=100) declined by $0.6 \%$ in July, falling to 170.2 fron the revised June level of 171.2. All of the decrease was due to the durables-centered drop in manufacturing, as both mining and utilities rose fractionally. The durables' decline was largely caused by sharp drops in the primary metals (where labour disputes were a factor) and metals fabricating components.

4. Summary of Canal Statistics, July 1970 - Advance information

Vessels transported $13,527,117$ tons of merchandise through Canadian canals during July 1970 , a $35.9 \%$ increase over the $9,954,020$ tons in July 1969. Grain and iron ore tonnage increased significantly, while general cargo, notably steel products, declined. This month's traffic boosts the cumulative total for the 1970 canal season to $51,229,297$ tons compared to $39,240,380$ tons in 1969.

TRAVEL
5. Passenger Bus Statistics, July 1970 - Advance information

A total of $4,646,304$ passengers was carried by 55 intercity and rural bus companies during July 1970, representing an increase of $0.1 \%$ over the $4,639,829$ passengers carried by 53 companies in July of 1969.

Vehicle miles totalled $12,893,754$, an increase of $3.1 \%$ from $12,508,212$.
The consumption of diesel ofl increased to $1,634,707$ gallons from $1,605,157$; and gasoline consumption increased to 87,241 gallons from 83,326.

Total operating revenue for July was $\$ 9,531,657$, an increase of $4.5 \%$ from the $\$ 9,210,157$ reported in 1969 .

6. Urban Transit, July 1970 - Advance information

A total of $75,985,373$ initial passenger fares (excluding transfers) was collected by 63 systems during July, representing a decrease of $2.8 \%$ from the $78,141,145$ collected during July 1969. Initial passenger fares on motor buses increased to $51,271,827$ from 50,887,034. Trolley coaches carried $6,159,960$ initial passenger fares $(8,410,018$ in July 1969); street cars, 5,067,731 (5,247,759); and subway cars, $13,089,576$ (12,874,160).

All types of urban transit vehicles travelled $20,706,464$ vehicle miles in July 1970, compared with $21,056,423$ in July 1969.

The consumption of diesel oil increased to $2,444,232$ gallons from $2,390,470$, gasoline to 244,124 from 209,946 and liquified petroleum gases to 13,350 from 12,611 gallons.

Total operating revenue for July was $\$ 18,269,024$, a decrease of $1.8 \%$ from the $\$ 18,593,085$ reported in 1969.

7. Murder Statistics, 1969 (85-209, 50 )

Homicide reports identified 342 murders in Canada in 1969. There were 314 identified in 1968 and 281 in 1967. As of December 31, 1969, 278 or $81.3 \%$ of these murders had been cleared by charge, suicide, or "otherwise".

Of the 277 persons charged with the murders reported in 1969, 156 or $56.5 \%$ were not sent to trial as of December 31, 1969.
of the 156 persons not sent to trial, 151 were pending preliminary hearing.

For murders reported in 1969,121 persons were sent to trial as of December 31, 1969, and of these, 14 were acquitted and 85 were convicted of capital or non-capital murder, manslaughter or a lesser offence.

Of the 85 persons convicted, 61 or $71.8 \%$ were convicted of manslaughter or a lesser offence.

ENERGY
8. Preliminary Electric Power Statistics, July 1970-Advance information

Net generatior for the month of July 1970 rose $8.1 \%$ to 15,679,623 thousand kwh from $14,495,295$ thousand kwh in July 1969. Increases in net generation occurred in all provinces except British Columbia where there was a decrease of $5.1 \%$. The largest increases occurred in Newfoundland and Yukon Territory where they amounted to $88.3 \%$ and $102.6 \%$ respectively. Hydro generation increased $10.8 \%$ in July over the same period last year, while thermal generation decreased 3.0\%.

EDUCATION
9. Training Schools, 1969 (85-208, 75c)

A total of 3,548 children are reported committed for training schools for 1969, down from the 4,134 children reported last year. There were 950 girls ( $26.8 \%$ ) and 2,598 ( $73.2 \%$ ) boys.

CONSTRUCTION
10. New Residential Construction, June 1970 ( $64-002,30 c / \$ 3.00$ )

During June, centres of 10,000 population and over recorded 11,585 construction starts, 8,108 completions and 98,580 dwellings under construction. This brought January-June totals to 49,271 starts and 64,370 completions.

12. Campus Book Stores, 1966-67, 1968-69 (63-219, 50c)

The total net retall sales of campus book stores increased $53.8 \%$ to $\$ 30.1$ million in 1968-69 from $\$ 19.6$ million in 1966-67. Text books account for $67 \%$ of the total, while trade books comprised $12 \%$ and stationery and supplies $14 \%$; other miscellaneous items comprised the remaining 7\%.

MANUEACIURING
13. Pulpwood and Wood Residue Statistics, July 1970-Advance information

Production of roundwood in July 1970 increased by $8.5 \%$ to $1,852,406$ cunits from $1,707,392$ cunits in July 1969. Consumption of roundwood and wood residue increased by $47.4 \%$ to $1,910,528$ cunits from $1,295,818$ cunits and the closing inventory of these two products increased by $2.6 \%$ to $9,482,805$ cunits from $9,244,878$. Receipts of wood residue increased by $9.9 \%$ to 576,631 cunits from 524,579 in the 1969 month.

14. Raw Hides, Skins and Finished Leather, July 1970-Advance information

Canadian packers, dealers and tanners held 270,016 cattle hides and 170,008 calf and kip skins on July 31, 1970, compared with 278, 291 and 152,137 one year earlier. July receipts of cattle hides rose to 150,651 from 146,845 in July 1969, while wettings jumped to 135,922 from 123,257. Production of upper leather increased to $4,900,683$ square feet from 4,442,026 square feet in July 1969.

15. Iron Ore, July $1970(26-005,10 ¢ / \$ 1.00)$

Canadian mines shipped $5,794,559$ tons of iron ore during July, up from $2,564,779$ tons in July of 1969. This brought the January-through-July cumulative totals to $27,850,211$ tons in 1970 and $15,495,130$ in 1969 . Stocks held on July 31 were $12,348,746$ tons in 1970 versus $14,516,551$ in 1969.
16. Asbestos, July $1970(26-001,10 c / \$ 1.00)$

Canadian producers shipped 164,799 tons of all grades of asbestos in July 1970 ( 126,370 in July 1969), bringing the January-through-July totals to 864,181 tons in 1970 and 806,160 in 1969.
17. Gypsum Products, July $1970(44-003,10</ \$ 1.00)$

Canadian firms produced $70,523,547$ square feet of wallboard in July 1970 ( $71,668,839$ in July 1969) and shipped $70,422,355$ square feet ( $79,295,043$ a year earlier). This brought January-through-July cumulative totals to $472,445,954$ square feet produced in 1970 (494,072,832 in 1969) and 461,832,715 shipped ( $498,420,954$ in 1969).
18. Footwear Statistics, July 1970 - Advance information

July 1970 production of footwear of all types declined to 3,443,726 pairs from 3,821,542 pairs in July 1969. January-through-July production decreased to $30,106,919$ pairs in 1970 from 34,331,905 in 1969.

19. Steel Ingot Production, Week ended September 12, 1970 - Advance

Steel ingot production for the week ended September 12, 1970 totalled 196,834 tons, a decrease of $9.5 \%$ from the preceding week's total of 217,366 tons. The comparable week's total in 1969 was 89,908 tons. The index of production based on the average weekly output during 1957 1969 of 96,108 tons equalling 100 was 205 in the current week, 226 a week earlier and 94 one year ago.

AGRICULTUREAND FOOD
20. Sugar Situation, August 1970 Sales - Advance information

Canadian sugar refineries sold $212,280,175$ pounds of all types of sugar in August, slightly less than the $213,351,012$ pounds sold in July. Domestic sales accounted for $210,214,089$ pounds ( $211,999,852$ in July) and exports for $2,066,086$ pounds ( $1,351,160$ in July).

21. Salt, July $1970(26-009,10</ \$ 1.00)$

During July, production of salt (dry and in brine) reached 400,577 tons in 1970, up from 347,531 tons in July 1969, and 416,433 tons were shipped (up from 323,550 in 1969). This brought January-through-July cumulative totals to $2,900,466$ tons produced ( $2,264,696$ in 1969) and 2,877,724 tons shipped ( $2,267,739$ in 1969). On July 31, producers held 452,621 tons in stock, compared with 493,434 tons on the same day of 1969 .

[^0]23. The Wheat Review, August 1970 - Advance information

Canada has been joined by the four other major wheat exporting countries =- the United States, France, Australia and Argentina -in cutting back on wheat production. In addition, the coming harvests in Australia and Argentina are threatened by severe drought conditions.

The total decline in production ( 1970 vs .1969 ) for the five major exporting countries (Canada included) could reach between 650 million and 775 million bushels.

The DBS estimate for the Canadian crop, produced on half the acreage sown to wheat in 1969, is placed at 338 million bushels, a decline of some 346 million from the 1969 yield of 684 million .

Estimates of production and wheat acreages provided by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and reported to DBS by the Canadian Trade Comissioner service in the other three countries were:

The U.S.: A harvest of 1,358 million bushels ( 101 million less than in 1969) resulting from an $8 \%$ decrease in acreage which was, however, offset slightly by increased per-acre yields.

France: A crop (including durum, but mostly soft wheat) of 485 million bushels, down about 50 million from 1969.

Australia: An early forecast of 200-225 million bushels as against 400 million in 1969 on acreage reduced by about $24 \%$. A severe drought in Queensland and New South Wales -- the premium-wheat producing states -- is a major factor in reduced crop expectations. Rains could raise the currently forecast yield; continued drought could bring a lower final figure.

Argentina: Acreage down $24 \%$ in 1969. The crop outlook is described as "very pessimistic" in light of very dry conditions in the Buenos Aires growing areas and barely adequate moisture conditions in southeastern regions. Production could be down by $50-75 \mathrm{million}$ bushels from the 1969 outturn of 258 million bushels.

On stocks on hand (as of July 31, the end of the Canadian crop year), DBS reports an estimated 2,917 million bushels as being held by Canada, the U.S., Australia and Argentina combined (no figures are available from France). This is some $9 \%$ above the 1969 level but much lower than the increase between 1968 and 1969 of some $24 \%$.

24. Dairy Factory Production, August $1970(32-002,10 ¢ / \$ 1.00)$

Production of creamery butter fell by $9 \%$ in August to. $36,200,000$ pounds from 39,737,000 pounds in August 1969. Cheddar cheese production declined by $5 \%$ to $18,294,000$ pounds from $19,214,000$ and production of ice cream mix rose by $2 \%$ to $3,451,000$ gallons from $3,380,000$.

A GRICULTURE AND FOOD (concluded)
25. Grain liilling Statistics, July 1970 (32-003, \$1.00 per yoar)

Canadian flour mills during the crop year ended July 31, 1970 ground $90,555,000$ bushels of wheat and produced $39,640,000$ hundredweight of flour and 704,000 tons of millfeeds. In the previous crop year, they ground $85,409,000$ bushels of wheat and produced $37,621,000$ hundredweight of flour and 649,000 tons of millfeeds. The percentage of milling capacity utilized for the crop year $1969-70$ averaged $77.7 \%$ compared with $73.9 \%$ for the previous crop year.

The output of wheat flour in Canada during July 1970 declined to $3,212,000$ hundredweight, $2 \%$ below the June 1970 total of $3,268,000$ hundredweight. This was $3 \%$ more than the July 1969 figure of $3,127,000$ hundredweight but $3 \%$ less than the ten-year (1960-69) average July production of 3,306,000 hundredweight. Mill operations during July 1970 averaged $73.4 \%$ of capacity when computed on a 26 -day working period in the month and a daily capacity of 168,000 hundredweight. Mills reporting for June operated at $74.8 \%$ of their combined rated capacity for the same number of days.
26. Bread and Other Bakery Products, Quarter ended June 30, 1970 (32-015, 25c/\$1.00)

The value of shipments of bread in the quarter ended June 30,1970 was $\$ 84,152,000$ compared to $\$ 75,875,000$ in the 1969 second quarter. The value of shipments of other bakery products was $\$ 57,534,000$ ( $\$ 47,492,000$ in 1969).
27. Stocks of Dairy and Poultry Products, September 1, 1970 (32-009, 20¢/\$2.00) Cold storage holdings of creamery butter increased $24.6 \%$ on September 1 to $115,978,000$ pounds from $93,101,000$ pounds at September 1, 1969. Stocks of cheddar cheese were down $19.5 \%$ to $74,465,000$ pounds this year from 92,509,000 pounds while skim milk powder stocks decreased $26.0 \%$ to $155,432,000$ pounds from 209,914,000 pounds on September 1, 1969. Evaporated whole milk stocks were down $19.5 \%$ to $41,406,000$ pounds from 51,460,000.
