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1. Preliminary Statement of Canadian Trade, July 1970 - Published only in the DBS Daily and Weekly

Canadian imports reached an estimated \$1,170 million in July 1970, up \$26 million or 2% from \$1,144 million in July 1969. Small decreases in imports from the United Kingdom and Latin America were offset by larger gains from the United States, Japan and other overseas countries. Imports of motor vehicle parts increased considerably, and smaller increases were reported in imports of food, crude petroleum, industrial machinery and apparel. Imports of broad woven fabrics, non-ferrous alloys, aircraft and aircraft parts were somewhat lower than in July 1969.

With July 1970 exports Canada's merchandise surplus expanded to \$312 million for the month and \$1,543 million for the first seven months. The cumulative total for exports was \$9,922 million, and for imports, \$8,379 million.

The seasonally adjusted estimate of Canada's imports for July remained practically unchanged from June at \$1,185, extending the level trend of the first and second quarters. The corresponding estimate of exports also remained stationary through the first two quarters, but rose slightly in July.

PRICES

5. General Wholesale Index, June 1970 - Advance information

The general wholesale index moved down 0.1% in July to 286.7 from the revised June index of 287.0. It was 1.4% higher than the July 1969 index of 282.7. Seven of the eight major group indexes were lower, while one advanced.

The non-ferrous metals products group index declined 1.1% in July to 277.9 from 281.0 in response to lower prices for refined copper (export sales) and lead. The animal products group index eased down 0.5% to 323.9 from 325.5, reflecting price decreases for livestock and fresh meats. Decreases of 0.2% or less occurred in five major group indexes: textile products, to 256.9 from 257.3; chemical products, to 224.9 from 225.3; iron products, to 306.0 from 306.2; wood and paper products to, 383.1 from 383.3 and non-metallic minerals, to 214.4 from 214.5. A rise of 0.7% to 238.8 from 237.2 in the vegetable products group index reflected price increases for potatoes, tea, coffee, cocoa and fresh fruits.

6. Industry Selling Price Indexes, July 1970 - Advance information

Industry selling price indexes (1961=100) were higher in July than in June in 31 manufacturing industries. In 30 industries they were lower; in 38 they were unchanged.

In each of the past three months the most significant price changes were those recorded in the primary metals group, in particular smelting and refining, for which the index now stands at 152.2 compared with 165.0 in April 1970. This decline is a result of lower export prices for copper. Elsewhere, increases in the foods and beverages and paper and allied products groups were offset by decreases in the indexes for textiles and wood products groups. Within the foods and beverages group a continuing decline in the index for slaughtering and meat packing was outweighed by higher levels for fish products, fruit and vegetable canners and preservers and miscellaneous food products industries.

The arithmetic average of the 99 industry indexes moved down slightly in July to 119.7 from the June average of 119.8. The average increase for those industries showing price rises was 1.0%, while the comparable figure for those showing declines was 0.4%.

TRANSPORTATION

9. Weekly Railway Carloadings, Week ended August 14, 1970 - Reported only in DBS Daily and Weekly

A total of 75,403 carloads of revenue freight were loaded during the week ended August 14, up 22.6% from 61,508 in the comparable period of 1969. Loadings in Eastern Canada were up 23.7% to 45,924 cars, while those West of the Lakehead rose 20.9% to 29,479 cars.

Carloadings for the period January 1 to August 14 were up 5.3% to 2,352,644 cars from 2,234,073 cars in the 1969 period. This increase reflects a rise in Western loadings of 6.9% to 909,885, and in Eastern loadings of 4.3% to 1,442,759.

10. Railway Carloadings, July 1970 - Advance information

Loadings of revenue carload freight increased during July 1970 to 322,390 cars, up 13.5% from July 1969. Tonnage rose even more sharply (26.6%) to 18,469,476 tons. The lower 1969 figure was affected by strikes at iron and copper-nickel mines. Non-carload tonnage dipped 10.9% to 117,403 tons, giving a total tonnage loaded of 18,586,879, up 26.3%.

Commodities contributing the most to these increases were iron ore, up 132.4% in carloads and 151.7% in tonnage; "other" grain, up 89.1% in cars and 103.3% in tons; and coal up 38.3% in carloads and 67.4% in tonnage. The largest decline was registered by logs, poles and other forest products which dropped 18.2% in cars and 16.3% in tonnage.

For the first seven months of 1970 total carloads rose 4.8% with tonnage up 12.8% for carload traffic and 12.5% for total traffic including non-carload.

Commodities which increased were iron ore, "other" grain, and wheat while declines were posted by lumber and trailer-on-flatcar piggyback.

TRANSPORTATION (concluded)

11. Railway Freight Traffic, 1969 - Advance information

Total volume of revenue freight handled by railways in Canada during 1969 declined by 4.0% to 206,863,829 tons. Strikes at mines in Quebec, Labrador and Sudbury contributed to a 12.1% drop in shipments of mine products.

Forest products led the list of increases in 1969, rising 5.6% due mainly to much higher shipments of pulpwood.

On a regional basis Newfoundland showed the largest fluctuation with a 25.5% drop reflecting the iron ore strike. The largest increase in 1969 occurred in New Brunswick, up 8.6% mainly on the strength of higher shipments of pulpwood and other forest products.

Receipts from United States rail connections rose to 11,752,035 tons from 10,579,020 tons in 1968. This was mainly a reflection of heavier imports of various manufactures into Ontario.

12. Railway Operating Statistics, April 1970 - Advance information

Railway operating revenues reported by 24 common carrier railways in Canada totalled \$141,299,663 in April 1970, up 5.9% from April 1969. Operating expenses rose 4.0% to \$131,683,861 leaving net operating income up 42.8% at \$9,615,802.

Tons of revenue freight carried rose 4.3% to 19,419,822, while the number of passengers carried eased 0.8% to 1,897,923.

Employment in the railway industry declined 3.9% to 112,915.

TRUSTEED PENSION FUNDS

13. Trusteed Pension Funds, 1969 - Advance information

The book value of assets held by trusteed pension funds in Canada increased to a total of \$10,003,000,000 in 1969 from \$8,972,000,000 in 1968, according to preliminary data compiled in the latest survey. Total income for the 4,072 trusteed funds in existence during 1969 was \$1,494,000,000 of which \$591,000,000 came from the employer, \$370,000,000 from employee contributions and the balance from portfolio earnings, net profit on sales of securities and other miscellaneous sources. This compares with an income of \$1,331,000,000 in 1968.

Asset distribution and details of income and expenditures of trusteed pension funds in recent selected years were as shown in the table on next page.

VITAL STATISTICS

14. Vital Statistics, July 1970 (84-001, 10¢/\$1.00)

During July, 32,540 births were filed, resulting in a birth rate of 17.9 per 1,000 population. The cumulative total of 216,013 for the January-July period was 0.9% lower than last year.

A total of 23,277 marriages were registered during the month giving a rate of 12.8 per 1,000 population. The seven-month total (186,838) exceeded the corresponding 1969 total by 5.3%.

The 12,830 deaths registered in July brought the total for the first seven months of 1970 to 92,503, an increase of 1.2% over 1969. The death rate for the month was 7.1 per 1,000 population.

TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS

15. Motor Vehicle Traffic Accidents, April 1970 - Advance information

Motor vehicle traffic accidents on Canada's streets and highways in April 1970 claimed 328 lives, a decrease of 4.4% from the April 1969 total of 343.

TELEGRAPH AND CABLE STATISTICS

17. Telegraph and Cable Statistics, 1969 - Advance information

The telegraph and cable industry, with nine companies operating in Canada, registered an increase in operating revenue of 8.5% to \$126.6 million in 1969 from \$116.7 million in 1968.

Total operating expenses rose by 7.3% to \$92.8 million from \$86.4 million, resulting in an 11.8% increase in net operating revenue to \$33.8 million in 1969 from \$30.2 million in 1968.

Total cost of property and equipment, before allowing for depreciation, rose by 5.0% during the year to \$545.7 million from \$519.9 million. The companies invested \$36.8 million in new construction during 1969 and spent \$10.3 million on alterations, repairs and maintenance. This was an increase of \$1.0 million from the \$46.1 million expended on construction and repair work in 1968.

LABOUR

18. Estimates of Employees by Province and Industry, June 1970 - Advance information

The preliminary unadjusted estimate of employees in non-agricultural industries for the last week of May 1970 was 6,708.9 thousand, 2.9% higher than the April total of 6,518.7 thousand. All industry divisions contributed to the rise with the largest relative gains recorded in forestry, 22.3% (9,600 employees); in construction, 7.9% (26,800 employees); in trade, 5.3% (57,300 employees); and in community, business and personal services, 2.3% (67,000 employees). All provinces showed higher employment except British Columbia which recorded a decrease.

Compared to May 1969, employment was up 3.2% (234,800 employees). All industry divisions recorded increases except forestry, manufacturing, and transportation, communication and other utilities, which showed declines. Saskatchewan was the only province which recorded a decrease.

Seasonally-adjusted, the May estimate of non-agricultural employment showed little change from April 1970. Increases in trade and community, business and personal services more than offset declines in forestry, manufacturing and construction. Other changes were small. Employment rose in Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Manitoba and Alberta. Quebec and Ontario remained unchanged and the other provinces showed lower employment.

For June, the advance unadjusted estimate of employees in the non-agricultural sector indicated an increase over May. Most industry divisions contributed to the rise, but small declines were indicated in trade; finance, insurance and real estate; and community, business and personal services. Employment was higher in all provinces except Alberta which showed a decrease.

Seasonally-adjusted, the June advance estimate of non-agricultural employment declined slightly from May. Increases in manufacturing, construction and public administration and defence failed to offset declines in the other industry divisions. June employment in each province showed little change from May.

19. Oil Pipe Line Transport, June 1970 - Advance information

Net receipts of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum products by Canadian oil pipelines during June increased 11.3% to 1,923,300 B/D from 1,728,500 B/D for June 1969. Of this total, 1,515,000 B/D were domestic oils (up 11.0%) and 408,300 B/D were imported oils (up 12.4%).

20. Sales of Natural Gas, June 1970 - Advance information

June sales of natural gas to Canadian consumers by distribution companies amounted to 53.2 billion cubic feet. Detailed information on natural gas movements in Canada will be released shortly in the DBS publication, Gas Utilities (Transportation and Distribution Systems) (55-002, 20¢/\$2.00).

21. Factory Sales of Electric Storage Batteries, June 1970 (43-005, 10¢/\$1.00)

Canadian manufacturers sold 103,905 automotive type electric storage batteries for initial installation in June and 143,482 for replacement. In June 1969, they sold 87,044 for initial installation and 169,040 for replacement. For the first six months of the year, sales decreased to 531,662 units for initial instalation from 627,968 in 1969 and to 868,761 from 953,424 for replacement.

M E R C H A N D I S I N G

22. Department Store Sales by Regions, July 1970 (63-004, \$1.00 a year)

During July, department store sales in Canada increased by 1.9% over July 1969, with the following regional changes: Atlantic Provinces, +16.6%; Quebec, +7.4%; Ontario, +2.1%; Manitoba, -11.5%; Saskatchewan, -6.2%; Alberta, +4.1% and British Columbia, -2.9%.

M A N U F A C T U R I N G

23. Steel Ingots, Week ended August 29, 1970 - Advance information

Steel ingot production for the week ended August 29, 1970 totalled 219,191 tons, an increase of 3.1% from the preceding week's total of 212,530^r tons. The comparable week's total in 1969 was 88,053 tons. The index of production based on the average weekly output during 1957-1959 of 96,108 tons equalling 100 was 228 in the current week, 221^r a week earlier and 92 one year ago.

24. Iron Castings and Cast Iron Pipe and Fittings, June 1970 (41-004, 10¢/\$1.00)

Canadian producers shipped 63,494 tons of castings, pipe and fittings in June 1970, up from 59,576 tons in June 1969, but shipments for the first half of 1970 (350,226 tons) were still slightly below those of the first half of 1969 (351,493 tons). Production, however, decreased to 73,476 tons in June from 92,365 in June 1969, while half-year production dropped to 490,614 tons from 565,484 tons a year earlier.

25. Sales of Paints, Varnishes and Lacquers, June 1970 (46-001, 10¢/\$1.00)

Canadian producers sold \$22,100,743 worth of paints, varnishes and lacquers during June 1970, up from \$21,692,118 in June 1969. This brought the first half-year total to \$108,317,505 in 1970, compared with \$110,345,566 in 1969.

26. Production, Shipments and Stocks on Hand of Sawmills in British Columbia, June 1970 - Advance information

Sawmills in British Columbia produced 582.2 million feet board measure of lumber and ties in June 1970 compared to 678.9 million in June 1969. For the first six months of 1970 production decreased to 3,765.5 million feet board measure from 4,004.2 million feet board measure in the same period last year.

27. Pulpwood and Wood Residue Statistics, June 1970 - Advance information

Roundwood production increased in June 1970 by 6.6% to 1,689,816 cunits from 1,584,512 cunits in June 1969. Consumption of roundwood and wood residue decreased by 7.0% to 1,857,663 cunits from 1,997,545 cunits and the closing inventory of these two products increased by 1.0% to 9,627,513 cunits from 9,511,112. Receipts of wood residue decreased by 6.0% to 531,826 cunits from 565,536 in the 1969 month.

MINING

37. General Review of the Mineral Industries (Mines, Quarries and Oil Wells), 1966 and 1967 (26-201), 75c

Shipments of mineral commodities by Canadian mine operators were valued at \$4,406,356,883 in 1967, an increase of 10.7% over the 1966 value of \$3,980,304,565. The metals group increased 15.1% to \$2,285 million from \$1,985 million. Non-metals increased 11.8% to \$406 million from \$363 million. Mineral or fossil fuels rose 9.4% to \$1,260 million from \$1,152 million. Only structural materials showed a decline in value, decreasing 5.4% to \$455 million from \$481 million.

The quantity index of real domestic product (1961=100) of the mineral industry was 145.2 in 1967 compared to 136.5 in 1966. The volume of ore or rock mined or quarried in 1967 was 379,067,056 tons compared with 349,791,957 tons in 1966. Excluded from these figures were the tonnages of coal mined and the tonnages of sand, gravel, sodium sulphate and similar materials not actually mined or blasted.

AGRICULTURE AND FOOD

38. Dairy Review, July 1970 (23-001, 20¢/\$2.00)

The preliminary estimate of milk produced in July was 1,929 million pounds, 5.0% below production in July 1969. This brought the total estimate of production during the first seven months of the year to 10,901 million pounds or 0.6% below production in the January-July period a year ago.

Slightly over 71% of the milk produced in July, or 1,373 million pounds, was used for dairy factory products, a 7.2% decrease from July 1969. Creamery butter production accounted for 958 million pounds of milk, 7.6% less than in July 1969, and milk used for factory cheese and concentrated whole milk products decreased 8.8% and 10.1% respectively. Approximately 3.1% more milk was used for ice cream mix than in July 1969. During the January-July period, 1.9% less milk was utilized for dairy factory products than in the corresponding period a year ago.

According to indications from the monthly survey of farms keeping milk down, 0.1% more milk and cream were consumed in farm homes than in July 1969, while milk used for livestock feeding increased 1.3%. Reports from farm dairy correspondents indicate 1.8% fewer cows were kept on farms on July 15, and 2.1% fewer cows were being milked than on the same date last year. Milk production per cow, for cows milked on farms decreased 2.3% from the July 15, 1969 level.

39. Report on the Poultry Survey of June 1, 1970 (23-006, 25¢/50¢)

The total number of poultry on farms in Canada on June 1, 1970 was estimated at 102.6 million birds, up 11.0% from the 92.5 million on June 1, 1969. There were 92,517,000 hens and chickens (up 11.1%); 9,358,000 turkeys (up 10.6%); 360,600 geese and 413,600 ducks.

Excluding Newfoundland.

40. Shipments of Prepared Stock and Poultry Feeds, June 1970 (32-004, 20¢/\$2.00)

Canadian producers shipped 3,388 tons of dehydrated alfalfa, clover and grass meals in June compared to 3,892 tons in June 1969. January-to-June shipments totalled 21,415 tons versus 26,706 tons for the 1969 period. End-of-month inventories stood at 12,267 tons compared to 8,153 tons in 1969.

41. Selected Meat and Meat Preparations, June 1970 (32-020, 10¢/\$1.00)

Net distributive sales of fresh and frozen meats during June 1970 increased to 160,203,000 pounds from 141,103,000 pounds in June 1969. From January-through-June, 972,761,000 pounds were sold in 1970 and 926,126,000 pounds in the 1969 period. The shipments of uncanned meat preparations amounted to 41,656,000 pounds in June 1970 compared to 37,784,000 pounds in June 1969. The January-to-June shipments for 1970 totalled 215,454,000 pounds compared to 209,484,000 pounds last year.

AGRICULTURE AND FOOD (concluded)

42. Jams, Jellies and Marmalades, First Quarter 1970 - Advance information
Canadian factories sold 7,707,959 pounds of pure jams, 8,992,274 pounds of pectin jams, 2,094,784 pounds of compound jams and 4,670,018 pounds of marmalades on the domestic market in the first quarter of 1970. They sold 2,693,761 pounds of jellies domestically, and exported 1,092 pounds.

43. The Sugar Situation, July 1970 (32-013, \$1.00 a year)
A total of 432,524,000 pounds of refined beet and cane sugar was produced in July, up from the 411,576,000 pounds in July 1969. The seven-month totals were 1,462,232,000 pounds in 1970 and 1,414,858,000 pounds in 1969.

44. Cattle-on-Feed Estimates, Alberta, July 15, 1970 - Published only in DBS Daily and Weekly
The July 15, 1970 estimate of the number of cattle (600 pounds and over), being fattened for slaughter in Alberta, in feedlot and on pasture, was 729,000 head, up 12% from 650,000 on July 15, 1969 and 32% from July 15, 1968. Steer numbers increased in all weight categories, but the number of heifers was lower in all weight levels; steers were up 29% in total but heifer numbers declined by 21%. The estimated number of bulls being readied for slaughter was 6,000 and cows (culls), 66,500. Of the total number of cattle on feed being finished for slaughter (including culls), 409,000 are estimated to be in feedlots, 184,000 on pasture plus supplementary feed, and 208,500 on pasture only.
