Unit Value Indexes for Exports and Imports, June 1971 — Advance information Monthly export price indexes showed a 2.6% increase in the unit value of end products exported in the first half of 1971 over that of a year earlier. This reflected higher prices for machinery and automotive products and also the strengthening of the Canadian dollar.

The values of exported inadible fabricated materials decreased 4.5% in spite of a 15.4% increase for pig iron and a 27.1% rise for electricity. The decline was particularly noticeable for non-ferrous metals -- with changing conditions of international supply and demand, copper in refinery shapes fell 30.2%; aluminum in primary forms 6.3%; refined nickel 9.6%; and zinc in blocks, pigs and slabs 7.5%.

Crude materials declined 3.4% mainly because of lower prices for cattle hides (down 17.7%) skins (8.8%) and platimum (9.4%).

The food, feed, beverages and tobacco group increased 1.9% largely on price rises in fish and fish products, and the recovery in barley prices.

Among import price indexes, raw sugar for refining advanced 34.1%, fuel oil 28.5%, bituminous coal 26.9%, Indian corn 14.2% and soya beans by 9.8%. But cocoa beans dropped 27.7%, antural rubber 27.3%, raw wool 23.5%, iron ore 17.7%, and tea 8.6%.

GOVERNMENT

Local Government Employment, April-June, 1971 (72-009, 50¢/\$2).

Urban municipalities with over 10,000 population employed 166,313 people in general services at the end of June, 1971 -- up from 157,958 a year earlier. Their payrolls for the second quarter increased to \$303.7 million from \$265.2 million.

BUSINESS FINANCE

Industrial Corporations Financial Statistics, Second Quarter 1971 - Advance information

Seasonally adjusted industrial corporation profit before income taxes was estimated at \$1,704 million for the second quarter of 1971. This was \$187 million or 12.3% more than the first quarter estimate of \$1,517 million. The manufactures sector increased by \$121 million or 15.6%, the mining industries by \$9 million or 3.7%.

Unadjusted net profit (after taxes) was estimated at \$1,121 million, an increase of \$252 million or 29% from the previous quarter. Compared with the second quarter estimate of 1970, profit rose by \$158 million or 16.4%.

Shareholders' equity increased by \$821 million or 1.8% over the first quarter of 1971 and by \$2,146 million or 5% from the second quarter of 1970.

Data on financial position, cash flow, balance sheet and income statement ratios and percentages, and seasonally adjusted data for nineteen items of the balance sheet and the income statement are also contained in Industrial Corporation Financial Statistics (61-003, \$1.00/\$4.00).

Motor Vehicle Traffic Accidents, June 1971 - Advance information

Deaths from motor vehicle traffic accidents increased 10.8% in June compared with June 1970. During the month, accidents on Canada's streets and

highways claimed 512 lives versus 462 in 1970.

Through the first six months of 1971, there were 38 deaths in Newfoundland, (28 in the corresponding period in 1970); Prince Edward Island, 16 (11); Nova Scotia, 86 (85); New Brunswick, 78 (85); Quebec, 681 (699); Ontario, 641 (633); Manitoba, 61 (46); Saskatchewan, 72 (65); Alberta, 162 (183); British Columbia, 244 (248) and the Yukon and Northwest Territories, 8 (7).

PUBLIC HEALTH

Therapeutic Abortions, 1971 - Published only in Statistics Canada Daily and Weekly

Therapeutic abortions performed in Canada in the first six months of 1971 totalled 14,188, according to reports to Statistics Canada by hospital authorities in 10 provinces and the Yukon. This was 3,036 more than the 11,152 therapeutic abortions reported for the full calendar year 1970.

Patients with Canadian residence accounted for all but 20 of the 14,188 abortions reported. In terms of rates per 100 live births, abortions reported for Canadian residents amounted to 7.6% of live births (3% in 1970).

Rates for the 1971 six-month period for the provinces varied from about 19% for British Columbia down through about 11% for Ontario, 10% for Alberta, 4% for Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Nova Scotia, less than 2% for Quebec, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland.

Vital Statistics, August 1971 (84-001, 10¢/\$1).

There were 32,320 births registered in August up from 29,925 a year earlier, bringing the birth rate up to 17.5 per 1,000 population from 16.5. January-through-August births totalled 250,396 down from 245,938 last year.

July marriages increased to 24,561 from 22,866, the rate per 1,000 increasing to 13.3 from 12.6. The year-to-date total decreased to 115,155 from 115,970 marriages.

Deaths increased to 12,936 in August from 12,124 a year earlier, increasing the rate to 7.0 per 1,000 population from 6.7. This brought the year-to-date total to 105,531 — up 0.9%.

New Motor Vehicle Sales, August 1971 - Advance information

In August 1971, 60,704 new motor vehicles were sold in Canada, 13.3% more than in August 1970. Passenger car sales of 50,500 were 15.0% above those of a year ago; commercial vehicle sales of 10,204 showed a 5.7% increase. Of the total increase in unit sales of new motor vehicles (7,142), over 94% (6,745) was due to overseasimports, while Canadian and U.S. vehicles accounted for less than 6% (397). Most of this spectacular increase in sales was due to overseas passenger cars, which showed a unit increase of 48.8%, while North American manufactured passenger cars showed a modest 1.4% increase. This resulted in a 37.0% market share for overseas manufactured passenger cars in August 1971, compared with a share of 28.6% a year earlier. From January to August 1971, one in four passenger cars sold in Canada was an overseas import.

The increase in unit sales of overseas manufactured commercial vehicles was even sharper than that of passenger cars, though the market share was still at a much lower (13%) level. Thus, in August 1971, their unit sales were 85.4% above those of August 1970, and their sales from January to August were 47.3% above those of the same period in 1970.

UTILITY

Electric Power Statistics, August 1971 - Advance information

In August 1971 net generation rose 6.6% to 16.8 billion thousand kwh. from 15.7 billion in August 1970. There were increases in net generation in most provinces but decreases occurred in Newfoundland, Quebec and Northwest Territories. The largest increases occurred in New Brunswick (24.7%) and British Columbia (28.3%). Hydro generation increased 3.2% while thermal production increased 18.7%.

MANUFACTURING

Oils and Fats, August 1971 - Advance information

August retail sales (20 pounds and less) of margarine increased to 15,532,969 pounds in 1971 from 12,916,169 pounds a year earlier; those of shortening, baking and frying oils and fats rose to 3,422,224 pounds from 3,138,657; and those of salad oil increased to 3,646,691 pounds from 2,872,806.

Commercial (21-450 pounds) of margarine were 565,525 pounds (versus 533,810); of shortening, baking and frying oils and and fats, 14,360,128 pounds (up from 13,431,637); and of salad oil, 1,733,323 pounds (compared with 1,356,260).

Steel Ingots, Week ended October 2, 1971 — Advance information

Steel Ingot production for the week ended October 2, totalled 234,043 tons, an increase of 6.0% from the preceding week's total of 220,722 (R) tons. The comparable week's total in 1970 was 224,771 tons. The index of production based on the average weekly output during 1967 of 183,227 tons equalling 100 was 122.7 in the current week, 120.5 (R) a week earlier and 122.7 one year ago.

AGRICULTURE

Production of Eggs, August 1971 (23-003, 10¢/\$1).

Canadian egg production rose by 0.5% to 40,668,000 dozen in August 1971 from 40,468,000 in August 1970. The average number of layers was down 1.1% to 27,318,000 from 27,628,000 and the number of eggs per 100 layers increased 1.6% to 1,786 from 1,758. Farm price of eggs sold for market was down 8.0% to 30.1 cents per dozen compared with 32.7 cents per dozen a year earlier.

Production and Value Estimate of Honey, 1971 — Advance information
On August 15, large beekeepers' hives were producing an average yield of
66 pounds per colony in Ontario, down from 71 pounds a year earlier. In
Manitoba the yield decreased to 146 pounds per colony from 188, in Saskatchewan to 176 from 182, and in Alberta to 187 from 194. In British Columbia
the yield increased to 133 pounds per colony from 127.

Report on Livestock Surveys, Pigs, September 1, 1971 (23-005, \$1 a year)
There were an estimated 7,386,000 pigs in Canada (excluding Newfoundland)
on September 1, 1971, up 1% from 7,326,000 a year earlier. Numbers increased
by 2% in the East and remained unchanged in the West.

Sows farrowed in the third quarter were estimated at 353,300, down 2% from the corresponding quarter of 1970. Farrowings were unchanged in the East, but but down 4% in the West.

Farmer's reports indicated that fourth quarter farrowings could be 373,600, down 4% from a year earlier, and farrowings from June to December were estimated at 725,900, down 3%.
