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During September, Canada's imports increased to a value of \$1,304.0 million from \$1,187.1 million a year earlier and \$1,230.4 million in the same month of 1969. Imports for the nine months increased to \$11,293.8 million in 1971 from \$10,581.3 million in 1970 and \$10,367.3 million in 1969.

Preliminary Statement of Total Canadian Exports, October 1971 - Published only in Statistics Canada Daily and Weekly

October exports, at \$1,543 million were \$87 million or 6% greater than a year earlier. Growth was confined to shipments to the United States, up \$124 million and to "Other Countries", up by \$30 million. Particularly large declines occurred in exports to the EEC (down \$28 million) and to Other Commonwealth countries (\$24 million). Cumulative exports for 10 months reached \$14,643 million, almost 5% greater than last year.

Commodity detail indicates continuing strength in shipments of lumber, petroleum and natural gas, wheat and automotive products.

Iron ore exports continued to decline year-to-year, while growth for nickel and copper ores reversed the weak pattern established earlier in the year. Refined metal shipments showed a moderate decline. Sales of aircraft equipment and of communication equipment dropped sharply.

Among shipments to the United States, those of automotive products increased by some \$93 million from last year's strike-depressed levels. Demand for petroleum and gas and for lumber continued strong; for woodpulp and newsprint showed relatively little change; and for iron ore and nickel remained weak in comparison with last year. Items potentially affected by the U.S. import surcharge showed mixed results, as shipments of aluminum and copper metals increased; those of aircraft and communication equipment declined very sharply; and whisky exports dropped by 10% on the month after showing a moderate gain in the year to date.

Seasonally adjusted exports reached \$1,554 million, an increase of 2% over the August level, with shipments to the U.S. increasing by 3% and to the U.K. by 9%, but declining by 5% to all other countries.

Consumer Price Movements, October 1971 (62-001, 10¢/\$1.00)

The Consumer Price Index for Canada (1961=100) edged up 0.1% to 134.9 in October from 134.7 in September. This rise, which duplicated the increase between these two months in 1970, brought the all-items index to a level 3.5% above that of October 1970. The only major component which declined in the latest month was food, which fell seasonally 0.5%. The housing and the health and personal care indexes each advanced 0.7%, clothing went up 0.5%, recreation and reading rose 0.2%, and the transportation index edged up 0.1%. No change was registered in the alcohol and tobacco index between September and October.

Cheques Cashed in Clearing Centres, August 1971 (61-001, 20¢/\$2).

During August, \$74,265 million worth of cheques were cashed in Canada, 14.1% more than a year earlier. Payments increased 25.2% in British Columbia, 19.3% in Ontario, 11.3% in the Atlantic Provinces, 8.4% in the Prairies, and 5.5% in Quebec.

January-to-September totals were 11.2% higher in 1971 than in 1970 for Canada, 13.4% for British Columbia, 13.1% for Ontario, 11.6% for Quebec, 4.6% for the Atlantic Provinces and 3.4% for the Prairies.

The turnover ratio (compiled on an annual basis) for current accounts edged down to 106.09 in August from 108.94 a year earlier, while that for savings accounts declined to 1.31 from 1.57.

Weekly Railway Carloadings, October 21, 1971 - Advance information.

Canadian railways loaded 4,856,706 tons of revenue freight in the 7-day period ended October 21. This was 0.9% more than in the comparable period of 1970. This brought the year-to-date total up 2.5%.

Passenger Bus Statistics, September 1971 — Advance information

In September, 52 intercity and rural bus companies carried 3,835,150 passengers. This was 7.9% less than the 4,165,168 carried a year earlier. Their busses travelled 10,835,799 vehicle miles (up 3.6%) and consumed 1,445,826 gallons of diesel oil (up from 1,358,340) and 89,104 gallons of gasoline (down from 92,387). Total operating revenue increased 9.5% to 8,130,307.

Preliminary Population Counts, 1971 Census (Preliminary Bulletin No.5, no charge)

Metropolitan Montreal had a preliminary population count of 2,720,413 in the 1971 Census -- an increase of 6% since 1966. Toronto's metro population grew 16% to 2,609,638, and Vancouver's reached 1,071,081, up 15%.

Other metropolitan areas in the top ten were: Ottawa-Hull, 596,176 (up 13%); Winnipeg, 534,685 (5%); Hamilton, 495,864 (10%); Edmonton, 490,811 (16%); Quebec, 476,232 (9%); Calgary, 400,154 (21%); and Niagara-St. Catharines, 301,108 (6%).

The preliminary figures indicate that growth rates have slowed down since 1966, due to lower birth rates and immigration. They also show that most of the growth has occurred in the fringe or suburban parts of the larger metropolitan centres, usually at the expense of "core" cities and smaller towns and rural communities.

Copper and Nickel Production, September 1971 — Advance information

September production of primary copper increased to 61,166 tons from 58,694 tons in September 1970. This brought the nine months output to 525,254 tons from 498,864 tons a year earlier.

September production of primary nickel increased to 23,907 tons from 23,731 tons in September 1970. This brought the nine months output to 218,382 tons from 226,106 tons a year earlier.

Domestic Washing Machines and Clothes Dryers, September 1971 - Advance information

Canadian manufacturers sold 27,853 automatic washing machines domestically in 1971, up from 21,841 in 1970, and their stocks at the end of September were 32,244 units (35,345 a year earlier).

Domestic sales of conventional washing machines rose to 12,144 from 11,784, while exports also rose to 376 from 128, and month-end stocks fell to 12,330 from 17,686. Canadian sales of electric clothes dryers rose to 27,904 units from 20,530, and stocks rose to 38,193 from 31,760. Gas dryers sales on the domestic market fell to 1,964 units from 2,367, but stocks at the end of the month were up at 4,875 units (4,378 in 1970).
