Prices and Price Indexes (Consumer Price Indexes for Regional Cities), November 1971 - Advance information

Note: A consumer price index for a particular regional city measures the movement in prices, faced by consumers, within the specified city. Thus, consumer price indexes for regional cities cannot be used to compare levels of prices between cities.

Between October and November, consumer price indexes increased in ten regional cities and city combinations, declined in one and remained unchanged in one other. The movements ranged from an increase of 0.9% in Quebec City to a decline of 0.1% in Saint John, N.B. Food indexes registered increases in all cities except St. John's, Nfld., and Saint John, N.B. The housing components rose in ten cities reflecting slightly higher rents and increased prices for many home furnishing items. The clothing indexes recorded increases in nine cities mainly as a result of price advances associated with the introduction of new winter lines. The remaining components registered mixed movements across the country.

Employment, Earnings and Hours, September 1971 — Advance information
The advance estimates of the industrial composite index of employment,
not adjusted for seasonal variations, declined slightly in September, but
the seasonally-adjusted index rose. Among the industry divisions, the only
appreciable seasonally-adjusted changes were increases in transportation,
communication and other utilities and service and a decline in mining. New
Brunswick and British Columbia recorded seasonally-adjusted increases while
Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island and Saskatchewan had declines and the
remaining provinces showed little change.

Average weekly earnings rose in September at the composite level, and in all industry divisions except finance, insurance and real estate and service, which had slight declines. Soins occurred in all provinces except Prince Edward Island.

Both average weekly hours and average hourly earnings rose in September at the Canada level for the three industries shown - mining, manufacturing and construction.

The August preliminary index of employment for the industrial composite (1961=100), not adjusted for seasonal variations, was 132.5, 2.0% higher than in July. Small declines occurred in forestry and finance, insurance and real estate, but all other divisions reported increases. Among the provinces, only New Brunswick declined.

Government Finance - Revenue and Expenditure, Fiscal 1970 - Advance information

Preliminary data indicated that both the federal government and (as a group) provincial and territorial governments moved to surplus financing in their 1970 fiscal years from deficites the previous year. The federal government swung to a \$441-million surplus from a \$613-million deficite and the provincial and territorial governments to a \$24-million surplus from a \$201-million deficite. Local governments' deficites, however, increased substantially to \$1,397 million from \$589 million.

Sales financing, 1970 - Advance information

Sales financing companies purchased 6.8% less retail sales paper in 1970 than in 1969 — \$1,801.6 million compared with \$1,933.5 million. Contributing to this decline in business was a 13% reduction in the financing of new and used passenger cars and commercial vehicles — \$1,101.3 million in 1970 compared with \$1,265.2 million in 1969.

Total outstanding balances of retail instalment paper held by sales financing companies at the end of 1970 reached \$2,249.1 million. These balances however included the holdings of some consumer loan companies which are engaged in this activity also, as well as some companies not covered in earlier years so a comparaison with 1969 outstandings is not appropriate.

Weekly Railway Carloadings, December 7, 1971 — Advance information

Canadian railways loaded 34,274,407 tons of revenue freight in the 7day period ended December 7. This was 9.5% more than in the comparable period of 1970. This brought the year-to-date total up 2.6%.

Industrial Corporations Financial Statistics, Third Quarter 1971 - Advance information.

Seasonally adjusted industrial corporation profit before income taxes was estimated at \$1,817 million for the third quarter of 1971. This was \$113 million or 6.6% more than the second quarter estimate of \$1,704 million. The manufacturing profit increased by \$48 million or 5.3% while that of mining industries decreased by \$3 million or 1.2%.

Unadjusted net profit (after taxes) was estimated at \$1,072 million, a decrease of \$49 million or 4.4% from the previous quarter. Compared with the third quarter estimates of 1970, profit rose by \$208 million or 24.1%.

Shareholders' equity increased by \$890 million or 2.0% over the second quarter of 1971 and by \$2,662 million or 6.1% from the third quarter of 1970.

Data on financial position, cash flow, balance sheet and income statement ratios and percentages, and seasonally adjusted data for nineteen items of the balance sheet and the income statement are also contained in Industrial Corporation Financial Statistics (61-003, \$1/\$4).

Inventories, Shipments and Orders in Manufacturing Industries, October 1971 - Advance information

The preliminary estimate of manufacturers' shipments, seasonally adjusted, edged up to \$4,242.6 million in October. This was slightly more than the revised figure of \$4,203.8 million for September. (It should by noted that these figures, along with all newly republished figures back to December 1968, have just been revised relative to benchmarks established in the 1969 Census of Manufactures.)

The adjusted estimate of new orders declined to \$4,264.4 million from \$4,334.7 million; unfilled orders increased to \$4,814.6 million from \$4,792.8 million; inventory owned edged up to \$8,067.4 million from \$8,044.8 million; and inventory held reached \$8,546.1 million from \$8,468.5 million.
