Prices and Price Indexes -- Price Trends in 1970 - Special Statement
A special statement analysing major price movements in 1970 has been released by the DBS Prices Division.

The study notes, for example, that in the first quarter of 1970 the all-items Consumer Price Index was $4.7 \%$ higher than it had been in the first quarter of 1969. By the fourth quarter it was only $2.1 \%$ higher than its year-earlier level. Food prices were the main factor in the slowdown, being $5.1 \%$ higher in the first quarter than a year earlier, $3.9 \%$ in the second and $1.5 \%$ in the third - but $1.2 \%$ below the corresponding 1969 figure in the fourth quarter.

The gross weighted industry selling price index was $3.7 \%$ higher in the first quarter of 1970 than it had been in the same quarter of 1969 . By the fourth quarter of 1970 it was only $1.2 \%$ higher than it had been a year earlier. The December increase of $0.6 \%$ was the smallest year-toyear change of any month since April 1965. The average gross weighted industry selling price index for 1970 was $2.3 \%$ higher than the 1969 average -- a much smaller gain than the $3.8 \%$ increase experienced in 1969, but only slightly less than the $2.4 \%$-per-year average increase which took place from 1964 to 1969.

Railway Carloadings, December 1970 Advance Information
Railways in Canada loaded $16,101,412$ tons of revenue freight in December, up 2.7\% from December 1969. Carloads edged up $0.3 \%$ to 291,050 cars from 290,095. Tonnage received from United States connections eased 3.0\% to $2,238,810$ tons, leaving total traffic carried ahead $2.0 \%$ at $18,340,222$ tons.
loadings of coal, wheat, and other grains led the increases while those of potash and passenger automobiles declined significantly.

For the year 1970 , total loadings rose $13.1 \%$ to $207,193,895$ tons with the number of carlods ahead $6.5 \%$ at $3,729,775$ cars. Receipts from United States connections rose $1.7 \%$ to $28,671,128$ tons yielding a total tonnage carried figure of $235,865,023$ tons, $11.5 \%$ ahead of the 1969 total.

Outstanding commodity increases during the year were recorded by iron ore, wheat, other grain, and coal.

Shipping Statistics, November 1970 - Advance information
Canadian ports handled $28,732,577$ tons of cargo in November, up $5.8 \%$ from the $27,145,140$ tons in November 1969.

The January-November total for Canadian ports stood at $265,696,865$ tons, up $17.4 \%$ from $226,369,534$ tons in 1969 , and $10.6 \%$ more than the 231,191,552 tons reported in 1968.

Weekly Railway Carloadings, Week ended January 21, 1971 - Published only in the DBS Daily and Weekly

Canadian railways reported a $2.6 \%$ decrease in tonnage of revenue freight loaded during the period ending January 21. Actual volume was 3,445,296 tons compared with $3,536,706$ in the same week of January 1970. Carloads decreased $0.5 \%$ to 67,811 cars.

This decrease occurred entirely in Eastern Canada where tonnage eased $15.1 \%$ to $1,966,886$ tons while volume West of the Lakehead rose $21.2 \%$ to 1,478,410.

Piggyback traffic rose $10.6 \%$ to 78,805 tons from 71,233 tons a year earlier.

Year to date loadings were down $1.3 \%$ to $9,717,479$ tons as compared with 9,842,922 tons in the same period of January 1970. Carloads increased $0.4 \%$ to 189,485 cars.

Tonnage in eastern Canada declined $9.7 \%$ to $5,743,316$ tons while volume west of the Lakehead rose $14.1 \%$ to $3,974,163$ tons.

Piggyback traffic rose $11.6 \%$ to 226,418 tons from 202,936 tons in the year earlier period.

Motor Carriers - Freight, Third Quarter 1970 - Advance information
During the third quarter of 1970,304 Class I and II motor carriers reported an operating revenue of $\$ 150.8$ million, an increase of $3.6 \%$ from $\$ 145.6$ million in the corresponding quarter of 1969 . Total operating expenses rose $5.0 \%$ to $\$ 140.5$ million ( $\$ 133.7$ million in 1969) to give net operating revenues of $\$ 10.3$ million. The operating ratio was $93.2 \%$ compared to $91.9 \%$ in the third quarter of 1969.

Operating revenues increased from 1969 in every region of Canada except the Prairie Provinces which decreased $3.3 \%$. The largest increase ( $18.6 \%$ ) occurred in the Atlantic provinces.

Travel Between Canada, the United States and Other Countries, October 1970 ( $66-001,30 c / \$ 3.00)$

During the January-October period of $1970,33.6$ million United States residents visited Canada while 31.5 million Canadian residents returned from visits to the United States. This was $4.7 \%$ more U.S. visitors and $1.4 \%$ more Canadian's than in the corresponding period of 1969.

The number of overseas visitors entering Canada increased $16 \%$ to 484,800 .

Passenger Bus Statistics, December 1970 - Advance Information.
In December 53 intercity and rural passenger bus companies carried $3,829,755$ passengers. This was $1.4 \%$ fewer than the $3,882,674$ carried a year earlier. Vehicle miles increased $3.7 \%$ to $9,936,686$, and total operating revenue was up $4.7 \%$ to $\$ 6,878,493$.

Research and Development Expenditures in Canada, 1969* - Published only in the DBS Daily and Weekly

An estimated $\$ 1,057$ million was spent on research and development in Canada during 1969. About $80 \%$ or $\$ 841 \mathrm{million}$ was for current expenditures and $20 \%$ for capital. Some 53,000 man-years were devoted to research and development, 21,000 contributed by scientists and engineers.

Estimated research and development expenditures had grown only $18 \%$ since 1967 - a period in which gross national product had increased $20 \%$. Between 1965 and 1967, research and development had risen $33 \%$ and gross national product $20 \%$, and in the previous two years, research and development had jumped $51 \%$ compared with gross national product's increase of only $21 \%$.

Higher education and private non-profit organizations had increased their share of the total research and development performed. In 1963, they accounted for about $17 \%$ of total expenditures, but by 1969 they handled $29 \%$.

Governments were the most important sources of research and development funds throughout the 6 -year period, usually providing about $54 \%$ - or about $60 \%$ if university general revenues were allocated to their original sources.

In December 1970, net generation rose $8.3 \%$ to $19,470,319,000 \mathrm{kwh}$. from $17,972,142,000 \mathrm{kwh}$. in December 1969. Increases occurred in all provinces, led by Nova Scotia, $30.9 \%$, Yukon Territory, $29.4 \%$, and Prince Edward Islapd $28.2 \%$

Hydro generation increased $4.5 \%$ while thermal generation increased 20.7\%

CHEQUES

Cheques Cashed in Clearing Centres, November 1970 (61-001, 20c/\$2.00)
The value of cheques cashed in Canada's 50 clearing centres during November totalled $\$ 72,661$ million, $14.8 \%$ more than during November 1969. All five economic areas showed advances over last November. Debits in October rose by $20.7 \%$, Quebec by $17.0 \%$, the Atlantic Provinces by $1.6 \%$, the Prairie Provinces by $1.3 \%$ and British Columbia by $1.1 \%$.

SERVICES

Restaurant Statistics, December 1970, (63-011, 106/\$1.00)
Estimated December restaurant receipts fell by $0.2 \%$ from Lecember 1969 to $\$ 96,933,000$. Chain restaurants received $\$ 11,038,000$, while independent establishments took in $\$ 85,895,000$. The highest rise in total restaurant receipts was $7.3 \%$ in New Brunswick, and the largest decrease was $8.9 \%$ in Saskatchewan.

MERCHANDISING

Sales of Toilet Preparations in Canada, 1969 (46-221; 25c)
Canadian firms sold $\$ 418,334,023$ worth of toilet preparations in Canada during 1969, compared with $\$ 375,207,126$ in 1968. They exported $\$ 1,106,158$ worth ( $\$ 986,716$ in 1968 ).

Steel Ingots, Week ended February 6, 1971 - Advance information
Steel ingot production for the week ended February 6, totalled 208,189 tons, a decrease of $0.1 \%$ from the preceding week's total of 208,382 tons. The comparable week's total in 1970 was 237,069 tons. The index of production based on the average weekly output during 1967 of 183,227 tons equalling 100 was 113.6 in the current week, 113.7 a week earlier and 129.4 one year ago.

Hardboard, December 1970, (36-001, $10 ¢ / \$ 1.00)$
December shipments of hardboard ( $1 / 8$ inch basis) rose to $39,358,019$ square feet in 1970, from 36,571,309 square feet in December 1969. This brought the annual total to $578,084,591$ square feet, compared with $578,566,471$ in 1969 .

Asbestos, December 1970 (26-001, 10c/\$1.00)
Canadian producers shipped 166,606 tons of asbestos in December 1970, down from 169,260 tons in December 1969. This brought the 1970 total to $1,663,355$ tons, compared with $1,576,876$ for the year 1969 .

Salt, December 1970 (26-009, 10c/\$1.00)
Canadian producers shipped 487,684 tons of dry salt and salt content of brine in December 1970, compared with 501,392 tons in December 1969. The annual total was $5,508,973$ tons in 1970 and $4,563,617$ in 1969 .

Report on Livestock Surveys: Cattle, Sheep, Horses, December 1, 1970 (23-004, 25c/50c)

A December record high of $12,217,000$ head of cattle and calves was estimated, $0.7 \%$ more than the previous record of $12,128,000$ in December 1964. This was $3 \%$ more than both the December 1969 total ( $11,828,000$ ) and the 1964-68 average.

The 652,000 sheef and lambs estimated on December 1 were $9 \%$ more than the 598,000 a year earlier, but $5 \%$ less than the $1964-68$ average. This is the first December-December increase in sheep numbers since 1957.

The estimated number of horses declined to $324,600,5 \%$ less than the 341,100 on December 1, 1969.
