Prices and Price Indexes (Highway Construction Price Index) Quebec, 1969 - Advance information

The all items, baseoweighted highway construction price index for Quebec ( $1964=100$ ) Jumped to 107.2 in 1969 from 101.1 in 1968 and 101.5 in 1967. The index for surface courses increased to 109.8 from 106.4 (in 1969); for granular base courses to 109.2 from 100.9; for grading to 105.0 from 98.5.

Price indexes of highway construction for Quebec are avallable for the first time. The indexes represent average contractors bids for such items as earth.excavation and gravel in place. Canadian consumer purchased 83.5 billion cubic feet of natural gas in November. This was $10.9 \%$ more than the 76.5 billion cubic feet purchased a year earlier.

Refined Petroleum Products, November 1970 - Advance information
Canadian refineries produced $40,090,817$ barrels of refined petroleum products in November 1970. This was $8.0 \%$ more than in the same month of 1969 .

Coal and Coke Statistics. November 1970 - Advance information
Coal production increased $88.2 \%$ in November to $1,854,499$ tons from 985,350 tons in November 1969. Landed imports declined to 1,787,643 tons from 1,921,799 tons. Industry consumed $1,664,475$ tons of coal and 524,522 of coke, an increase of 244,490 tons of coal and 64,511 tons of coke.

Oil Pipe Line Transport, November 1970 - Advance information
Canadian oll pipe lines received $2,249,500 \mathrm{~B} / \mathrm{D}$ of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum products during November. This was $12.2 \%$ more than the $2,005,200 \mathrm{~B} / \mathrm{D}$ in November 1969; domestic oils increased $14.9 \%$ to $1,788,000 \mathrm{~B} / \mathrm{D}$ and imported oils, $2.7 \%$ to $461,500 \mathrm{~B} / \mathrm{D}$.

A $3.6 \%$ decrease in tonnage of revenue freight loaded was reported by railways in Canada during the period January 8 to January 14, 1971. Actual volume loaded totalled $3,509,389$ tons compared with $3,640,530$ in the same week of January 1970. Carloads decreased $2.1 \%$ to 68,806 . Eastern Canadian tonnage eased $9.2 \%$ to $2,064,615$ tons while volume west of the Lakehead rose $5.7 \%$ to $1,444,774$.

Piggyback traffic rose $5.8 \%$ to 81,526 tons from 77,033 tons a year earlier.

Year-to-date loadings were down $0.5 \%$ to $6,272,183$ tons compared with $6,306,216$ tons last year while carloads increased $1.0 \%$ to 121,674 cars.

Tonnage in Eastern Canada eased $6.6 \%$ to $3,776,430$ while volume west of the Lakehead rose $10.3 \%$ to $2,495,753$ tons.

Piggyback traffic rose $12.1 \%$ to 147,613 tons from 131,703 in the yearearlier period.

TRAVEL

Non-Resident Vehicles Entering Canada, December 1970 (66-002, 10c/\$1.00) A total of 639,725 vehicles registered in other countries entered Canada in December, down 1.5\% from 649, 192 in December 1969. The number of those staying one or more $n$ ights, however increased by $11.1 \%$ to 134,183 from 120,793 in December 1969. For the year 1970 cotal traffic increased by $3.6 \%$ to $12,686,130$ from $12,247,405$ vehicles, and long-term traffic rose by $8.7 \%$ to $4,029,356$ vehicles from $3,708,381$.

Production and Disposition of Tobacco Products (Cigars), December 1970 -Advance Information

Canadian firms produced $47,277,000$ cigars in December, up from 41,107,000 a year earlier. Their opening inventory declined to $59,854,000$ from $60,007,000$; closing inventory increased to $57,885,000$ from $56,612,000$. Domestic sales increased to $49,068,000$ from $43,664,000$; only 37,000 were ex-warehoused for ship's stores compared with 95,000 in December 1969; and only 141,000 were ex-warehoused for export versus 743,000 .

Stocks of Flue Cured Tobacco, Quarter ended December 31, 1970 - Advance information

Preliminary stocks of flue cured (bright) tobacco domestic and imported as at December 31 , 1970 amounted to $172,984,153$ pounds redried weight.

MERCHANDISING

New Motor Vehicle Sales, December 1970 . Advance information
During December, 46,216 new motor vehicles were purchased in Canada. This was $26.6 \%$ fewer than in December of 1969 , and it brought the total sales for 1970 to 773,892 units which was $15.7 \%$ lower than the 1969 total.

Sales of North American passenger cars dropped to 28,902 in December, $33.1 \%$ fewer than a year earlier. Total sales for 1970 were 496,501 units, down $22.2 \%$ from the 1969 total.

Of all new passenger cars sold in December, $23.3 \%(10,123$ units) were manufacturad overseas, an increase of $24.5 \%$ over the December 1969 sales. This brought total sales for the year to 143,239 units $-16.9 \%$ more than in the previous year - or $22.4 \%$ of the market compared with $16.5 \%$ in 1969.

Sales of commercial vehicles of overseas manufacture also increased both in December and over the whole year. December sales reached 632 units, up $11.9 \%$ from a year earlier, representing $8.8 \%$ of the market compared with $5.6 \%$ in December 1969. Total sales for 1970 jumped to 9,223 units which, while only representing $6.9 \%$ of the comercial vehicle market, was $30 \%$ more than the 1969 total.

Department Store Sales by Regions, December 1970 ( $63-004$, $\$ 1.00$ a year)
During December, Canadian department store sales increased by $9.4 \%$ from December 1969, with regional changes as follows: Atlantic Provinces, $+21.7 \%$; Quebec, $+10.5 \%$; Ontario, $+9.1 \%$; Manitoba, $+4.1 \%$; Saskatchewan, $+8.2 \%$; Alberta, $+11.2 \%$ and British Columbia, $+6.0 \%$.

    The estimated wholesale value of farm implements and equipment fell by
11. 1% in the January-through-November period to $348,285,000 from

Stee 1 Ingots, Week ended January 30, 1971 - Advance information
Steel ingot production for the week ended January 30, totalled 208,382 tons, a decrease of $7.7 \%$ from the preceding week's total of 225,707 tons. The comparable week's total in 1970 was 227,640 tons. The index of production based on the average weekly output during 1967 of 183,227 tons equalling 100 was 113.7 in the current week, 123.2 a week earlier and 124.2 one year ago.

Production, Shipments and Stocks on Hand of Sawmills East of the Rockies, November 1970 - Advance information

Production of lumber in sawnills east of the Rockies increased in November to $263,782,000$ feet board measure from $258,633,000$ feet board measure in November 1969.

Canadian egg production rose by $5.4 \%$ to $43,658,000$ dozen in Decenher 1970 from 41,435,000 in December 1969. The average number of layers was up $3.9 \%$ to $30,299,000$ from $29,162,000$ and the number of eggs per 100 layers increased $1.4 \%$ to 1,729 from 1,705. Farm price of eggs sold for market was down $33.8 \%$ to 31.5 cents per dozen compared with 47.6 cents per dozen during the corresponding period in 1969.
