Railway Carloadings, March 1971 - Advance information.

Canadian railways loaded 16,216,292 tons of revenue freight in March, up 2.7% from March 1970. Carloads rose 1.0% to 300,669 cars. Receipts from United States connections declined 13.5% to 2,104,795 leaving total traffic up 0.6% at 18,321,087 tons.

Major increases occurred in loadings of coal, other grain, and logs, poles and other forest products, while the largest decrease was in loadings of wheat.

Cumulative loadings for the year to date show total tonnage down 0.8% to 44,741,158 tons with carloads down 1.6% to 833,505 cars.

### Weekly Railway Carloadings, Week ended Δpril 14, 1971 - Δdvance Information.

Canadian railways loaded 3,337,386 tons of revenue freight in the seven-day period (including only four working days) ended April 14. This was 8.6% less than in the corresponding five-working days a year earlier. The number of cars loaded decreased 13.0% to 62,130.

Year to-date tonnage was down 2.9% to 50,812,178 tons and carloadings 3.9% to 983,407 cars.

Weekly Railway Carloadings, Period ended April 21, 1971

Canadian railways loaded 4,134,865 tons of revenue freight during the week ended April 21, up 7.4% from the corresponding week of 1970. The number of cars loaded rose 3.6% to 76,819.

Year-to-date tonnage loaded declined 2.2% to 54,947,023 tons, while the number of cars loaded was down 3.4% to 1,060,226.

Cheques Cashed in Clearing Centres, February 1971 (61-001,20¢/\$2.00)

Canadian Clearing Centres cashed \$65,776 million worth of cheques in February -- 13.1% more than a year earlier. Payments in Quebec advanced 18.4%, Ontario 15.7%, British Columbia 5.2% and the Atlantic Provinces 3.4%.

Vital Statistics, March 1971 (84-001, 10¢/\$1)

Provincial offices registered 31,744 live births in March, up from 29,014 a year earlier. The birth rate increased to 17.3 per 1,000 population from 16.1. Marriages increased to 9,310 (5.1 per 1,000) from 8,706 (4.8 per 1,000): deaths to 13,896 (7.6 per 1,000) from 12,634 (7.0 per 1,000).

Sales and Purchases of Securities Between Canada and Other Countries, December 1970 (67-002, 20¢/\$2.00)

Portfolio transactions in 1970 gave rise to a net inflow of \$661 million, down sharply from the \$1,832 million inflow of 1969. Sales of new Canadian issues abroad of \$1,269 million were the lowest since 1965, and the retirement of Canadian securities of \$474 million the highest since 1966. Trade in outstanding Canadian securities resulted in a net outflow of \$195 million, a change of \$250 million from the previous year's net inflow.

Foreign security transactions also contributed to the reduction with an inflow of \$61 million compared to \$106 million in 1969. Although during the first two quarters Canada experienced a continuation of the large net inflow prevailing in 1969, in the third quarter this changed abruptly to a net ouflow which became more pronounced in the fourth quarter.

Through transactions in both new and outstanding issues, non-residents provided a net addition of \$600 million to Canada's supply of new long-term portfolio capital -- approximately 15% of the total. In 1969, the net foreign contribution was \$1,726 million or 49% of the total. This was due, in part, to easing monetary conditions in Canada in the latter part of the year and response to official requests to limit the placing of issues abroad. Other principal factors may have been: the most protracted slide in stock prices experienced in recent years on North American exchanges causing investors, including institutions, to reevaluate their holdings; a narrowing of interest rate differentials, especially with Europe; uncertainty about pending changes in Canadian tax law; and a growing public debate on the role of foreign capital in Canada.

Transactions in Canadian money market instruments continued to provide large net inflows in 1970. During the year non-residents increased their holdings of Canadian short-term securities by \$236 million. The comparable net inflow for 1969 was \$250 million.

### New Motor Vehicle Sales, 1970 - Advance information.

Retail sales in Canada of new motor vehicles declined to 774,241 units in 1970. This was 15.6% lower than in 1969. The value decreased by \$510.5 million (15.4%).

Unit sales of passenger cars declined 15.8% and of commercial vehicles 14.6%. All regions reported lower sales — the most severe in Saskatchewan (21.4%) and Alberta (21.0%).

In total, 640,360 passenger cars were sold in 1970 for \$2,158.5 million and 133,881 commercial vehicles for \$653.8 million. Of the passenger cars, 497,185 were manufactured in Canada and the U.S. and 143,175 were manufactured overseas. Thus, the market share of North-American manufactured passenger cars dropped to 77.6% from 83.9%, while the share of overseas imports increased correspondingly to 22.4% from 16.1%.

Unit sales of North-American passenger cars dropped 22.1%, while the sale of overseas imports increased by 16.8%. At the same time, North-American manufactured commercial vehicle sales declined 16.7%, while their overseas competitors increased unit sales by 29.7% to account for 6.9% of the market.

The average price paid by the consumer for Canadian and U.S. manufactured passenger cars in 1970 was \$3,612, compared with \$2,534 paid for overseas imports.

Steel ingot production for the ended May 1, totalled 238,201 tons,
an increase of 5.3% from the preceding week's total of 226,271 tons. The
comparable week's total in 1970 was 214,379 tons. The index of production
based on the average weekly output during 1967 of 183,227 tons equalling
100 was 130.0 in the current week, 123.5 a week earlier and 117.0 one year
ago.

### EDUCATION

Survey of Higher Education, Part 11 (Degrees) 1969-70 - Advance Information Canadian Universities awarded 24.0% more doctorates (1,375), 23.3% more Masters' Degrees (8,461) and 10.1% more Bachelors' and first professional degrees in 1969-70 than in the previous academic year. New statistics, available for the first time, show that they also awarded 1,007 graduate diplomas, 2,847 undergraduate diplomas, ans 2,282 undergraduate certificates.

### AGRICULTURE

Farm Net Income, Advance Statement, 1970 (21-204, 25¢)

Realized net income from farming operations dropped to an estimated \$1,155.5 million in 1970, about 10.4% less than in 1969. The decrease resulted largely from substantial repayments of cash advances on farmstored grains in Western Canada, a considerable decrease in Canadian Wheat Board payments and declines in dairy supplementary payments and sales 3.1% to \$3,528.0 million as a variety of expenses increased, especially those for feed and the operation of farm machinery.

Total farm net income dropped 23.9% to \$1,198.4 million in 1970 from \$1,575.0 million in 1969. The drop resulted from lower cash receipts combined with a continued rise in farmers' outlays for goods and services and smaller additions to farm-held inventories of crops and livestock.

Farm net income increased in Prince Edward Island (to \$11.9 million from \$8.6 million) and in British Columbia (to \$81.2 million from \$80.5 million), but decreased in Nova Scotia (\$21.3 million from \$23.9), New Brunswick (\$13.3 million from \$10.8), Quebec (\$174.6 million from \$218.2), Ontario (\$388.5 million from \$429.6), Manitoba (\$78.6 million from \$117.1), Saskatchewan (\$202.7 million from \$402.9), and Alberta (\$226.2 million from \$283.4).

Production of Eggs, March 1971 (23-003, 10¢/\$1.00)

Canadian egg production rose by 2.7% to 43,781,000 dozen in March 1971 from 42,639,000 a year earlier. The average number of layers was up 4.2% to 29,245,000 and the number of eggs per 100 layers decreased 1.5% to 1,796. Farm price of eggs sold for market was down 25.2% to 29.1 cents per dozen compared with 38.9 cents per dozen in March 1970.

Intentions to Contract Acreages of Processing Vegetable Crops, 1971 22=003, \$1.00 for 1971 series)

Licensed vegetable processors intend to contract 22,640 acres of beans in 1971 -- slightly less than the 23,750 acres actually contracted in 1970. They intend to contract 46,220 acres of corn (up from 45,860), 51.850 acres of peas (up from 50,040) and 21,021 acres of tomatoes (down from 21,500).
