Prices and Price Indexes (Consumer Price Indexes for Regional Cities), May 1971 - Advance information

Between April and May, consumer price indexes rose in all ten regional cities and city-combinations, with increases ranging from $0.2 \%$ in Edmonton-Calgary and Vancouver to 0.7\% in Toronto. Food indexes advanced in all cities with higher quotations registered for fresh produce items and restaurant meals in most centres surveyed. The components for housing and for clothing each moved up in eight cities; the former chiefly due to higher homefurnishing prices and the latter mainly in response to increased prices for men's wear. The tobacco and alcohol index also moved up in eight cities as a change in package weight for cigarette tobacco resulted in an effective price rise in most cities across the country, and higher beer prices were recorded for the Southern Ontario centres of Ottawa and Toronto. The transportation, the health and personal care, and the recreation and reading components registered mixed movements across the country.

## Prices and Price Indexes, Industry Selling Price Indexes, May 1971 Advance information. <br> Industry selling price indexes $(1961=100)$ were higher in May than in April for 40 manufacturing industries, lower for 22 and unchanged for 38. <br> Decreases occurred in the primary metals group, particularly the smelting and refining industry, which reflected lower prices for export sales of refined copper. Although the majority of industries in the foods and beverages group tended to be somewhat higher, they were offset by lower prices registered in the slaughtering and meat packing, fish products, and confectionery manufacturers industries, causing a net decline at the major group level. Moderate advances were recorded for the paper and allied industries, and rubber products groups. <br> The arithmetic average of the 100 industry indexes in May was unchanged from the previous month at 121.9. The average increase for those industries showing higher price movements was $0.6 \%$, while the comparable figure for those showing declines was $0.8 \%$.

The vegetable products group index moved $1.0 \%$ lower to 237.8 from 240.2 reflecting price decreases for grains, fresh fruits, tea, coffee and cocoa and unmanufactured tobacco. A decline of $0.7 \%$ to 261.6 from 263.5 in the non-ferrous metal products group index was chiefly attributable to lower prices for export sales of refined copper. The animal products group index moved down $0.3 \%$ to 318.6 from 319.7 mainly on lower prices for fishery products, and fresh and cured meats. Decreases of $0.2 \%$ or less occurred in two major group indexes; chemical products to 238.4 from 238.9 , and wood products to 386.7 from 386.9.

Slight increases were registered for three major group indexes; textile products to 260.0 from 259.5 , iron products to 314.8 from 314.1 and non-metallic minerals to 225.5 from 225.3.

Canadian Oil Pipe Lines received $2,056,100$ barrels per day of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum products in April. This was $12.6 \%$ more than the $1,825,200 \mathrm{~B} / \mathrm{D}$ received a year earlier. Domestic oils increased $16.6 \%$ to $1,634,600 \mathrm{~B} / \mathrm{D}$, and imported oils decreased $0.6 \%$ to 421,500 .

The Labour Force, Week ended May 22, 1971 - Advance information
The seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate was 6.3 in May. This represented a return to levels more comparable to those of recent months after a rise to 6.7 in April. Total employment in Canada stood at 8,084,000 in May, 347,000 higher than in April. The number of unemployed persons declined by 116,000 to 543,000 . The total labour force in May was $8,627,000$, an increase of 231,000 since April.

Compared to a year earlier, the labour force was up by 162,000 ( $1.9 \%$ ), and employment by $132,000(1.7 \%)$. The number of unemployed persons was up 30,000 over the year.

The seasonallyadjusted employment level for Canada, after declining in April, increased in May. An over-all gain of $1.2 \%$ in Canada compares with gains of $1.3 \%$ in the Atlantic region, $1.1 \%$ in Quebec, $1.0 \%$ in Ontario, and $2.0 \%$ in the Prairies. There was little change in British Columbia.

Statistical Report on the Operation of the Unemployment Insurance Act, April 1971 (73-001, 206/\$2)

During April, 209,000 initial and renewal claims for benefit were filed. This was $6 \%$ fewer than the 222,000 claims filed in March but the same as were filed in April 1970.

The 819,000 claimants on April 30 were $4 \%$ fewer than a month earlier, but $19 \%$ more than a year earlier.

Benefit payments totalled $\$ 100$ million in April, $\$ 114$ million in March and $\$ 81$ million in April 1970. The average weekly benefit payments for these three months were $\$ 36.14, \$ 35.74$ and $\$ 35.08$ respectively.

The Supplementary Unemployment Insurance Benefit of $10 \%$, effective January 3, 1971, is not included in the benefit payment data.

Canadian consumers purchased 92.4 billion cubic feet of natural gas in April 1971, up 5.7\% from 87.4 billion a year earlier. Exports rose to 76.7 billion cubic feet from 66.6 billion.

## Electric Power Statistics, Vol. I (Annual Electric Power Survey of Capability and Load) 1970 - Advance information

Total net generating capability of firms which generate over 10 million kwh. per year increased to $41,322,000 \mathrm{kw}$. in 1970. This was $3,770,000 \mathrm{kw}$. or $10.04 \%$ more than in the previous year. This represented both the largest percentage growth and the largest absolute increase in generating capability in Canada's history.

The forecast for the years 1970-1975 indicates an anticipated growth of $15,828,000 \mathrm{kw}$. to $57,150,000 \mathrm{kw}$., a compound growth rate of $6.70 \%$ compared with the 1960-1970 growth rate of 6.34\%. Thermal capability is expected to grow at an annual rate of $9.49 \%$ compared with an actual 1960-1970 annual rate of $13.80 \%$, while hydro-electric capability is expected to increase at $5.16 \%$ compared with $3.99 \%$. Fossil-fuelled steam plants will account for $64 \%$ of thermal capability growth, nuclear-fuelled steam plants $28 \%$, gas turbine plants $7 \%$, and internal combustion plants $1 \%$.

## MERCHANDISING

Consumer Credit, April 1971 - Advance information
Selected credit holders reported $\$ 8,876$ million outstanding on their books at the end of April. Personal loans by chartered banks rose to $\$ 4,871$ million, $15.9 \%$ more than a year earlier, and life insurance policy loans were up $8.2 \%$ to $\$ 752$ million, but personal cash loans under the Small Loans Act fell $14.7 \%$ to $\$ 482$ million.

Consumer loan companies held $\$ 975$ million in outstanding balances at the end of April and sales finance companies held $\$ 938$ million. Since these amounts do not include unearned income, they cannot be compared directly with last year's figures.

Department stores' outstanding balances rose $1.8 \%$ to $\$ 621$ million.
At the end of the first quarter, total consumer credit reached $\$ 10,864$ million. This included balances of $\$ 1,487$ million held by credit unions, \$471 million held by "other" retail stores and \$169 million through ofl company credit cards.

Crime Statistics, 1970 - Advance information
Preliminary figures for 1970 as reported to the DBS under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program increased over 1969 in most Criminal Code offence classifications. Reported offences against the Narcotic Control Act in 1970 rose to 13,966 from 8,179 the previous year - the rate (per 100,000 population age 7 years and over) increasing $67 \%$ to 75.0 . Offences under the Food and Drug Act involving controlled and restricted drugs more than doubled to 4,692 from 2,341 - increasing the rate $95 \%$ to 25.2 .

Reported murders increased to 430 from 342 , raising by $21 \%$ to 2.3 per 100,000 . Almost half the increase resulted from a fire in which 40 persons died in December, 1969. Early in 1970 a coroner's jury found one person to be responsible for these deaths, a charge of non-capital murder was subsequently laid and the incident was reported as murder in the January police report. In accordance with the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, this was recorded as 40 murders reported in 1970.

Thefts $\$ 50$ and under increased to 277,782 from 246,212 the previous year, bringing the rate up $10 \%$ to $1,492.6$. Thefts over $\$ 50$ also increased to 149,677 from 119,742 , raising the rate $22 \%$ to 804.3 per 100,000 .

Production, Shipments and Stocks on Hand of Sawmills in British Columbia, April 1971 - Advance information.

Sawmills in British Columbia in April produced 728.4 million feet board measure of lumber and ties in 1971 compared to 690.2 million feet in 1970. For the four-month period, production increased to $2,789.2$ million feet board measure from $2,644.8$ million feet board measure for the same period last year.

The Textile Industries shipped $\$ 1,688$ million worth of products of own manufacture in 1969. This was $10.6 \%$ more than in 1968 . The total value added by these industries increased $14.9 \%$ to $\$ 760$ million, the number of employees increased $2.9 \%$ to 75,329 , and total salaries and wages increased $9.7 \%$ to $\$ 400$ million.
