Consumer Price Movements, June 1971 (62-001, 10¢/\$1.00)

The Consumer Price Index for Canada (1961=100) increased 0.2% to 133.0 in June from 132.7 in May. This rise was somewhat less than the average rise recorded between these two months in recent years. At its latest level the index stood 2.5% higher than at December 1970 and was 2.4% above its level of June 1970. All major components recorded small increases in the latest month except Recreation and Reading which declined 0.1%. The Food, Clothing and Transportation components each moved up by 0.2%. The Housing and the Health and Personal Care indexes both edged up 0.1%, while the Tobacco and Alcohol index advanced 0.3%.

In the supplementary classification, the index for non-durable commodities (excluding food) rose 0.1% in the latest month with higher prices for alcoholic beverages, footwear, and various household supply and toiletry items outweighing price decreases for, amongst other items, gasoline. The durables index also edged up 0.1% between May and June as increased quotations for a number of homefurnishing items outweighed reduced new car, and radio and television set prices. The services index advanced 0.3% as a result of higher rental, homeownership and clothing services prices, and inter-city train and bus fares.

Motor Carriers - Freight, Part II - Advance information

A total operating revenue of \$59.2 million in 1969 was reported by 1,312 Class3 motor freight carriers. Representing about 58.2% of all firms in this class (carriers grossing from \$20,000 to \$99,999), they also reported operating expenses of \$51.1 million — for an operating ratio of 86.2%. A year earlier, 1,489 such carriers reported operating revenues of \$66.3 million and expenses of \$57.2 million — for an operating ratio of 86.3%.

Reports received from 1,663 Class 4 carriers — grossing under \$20,000 each — showed operating revenue of \$17.4 million (compared to \$20.2 million from 2,040 carriers in 1968) and operating expenses of \$11.5 million (versus \$13.7 million).

The larger Class 1 and 2 carriers reported total operating revenues of \$952.5 million, up from \$874.6 the previous year.

Urban Transit, May 1971 - Advance information

In May, 59 urban transit systems collected 8,858,284 initial passenger fares, excluding transfers. This was 1.6% less than the 83,189,364 collected a year earlier. Their vehicles travelled 20,715,467 vehicle miles (down from 20,845,028), and their operating revenue decreased 0.2% to \$19,288,261.

Passenger Bus Statistics, May 1971 - Advance information

In May, 52 intercity and rural bus companies carried 4,133,650 passengers. This was 3.6% more than the 3,989,132 carried a year earlier. Their busses travelled 10,467,185 vehicle miles (up 3.9%) and consumed 1,300,826 gallons of diesel oil (up from 1,279,460) and 86,780 gallons of gasoline (down from 88,386). Total operating revenue increased 10.6% to \$7,069,113.

MERCHANDISING

Retail Trade, May 1971 - Advance information

Retail sales increased to \$2,606,440,000 in May, 6.8% more than a year earlier. All trades showed increases ranging from a high of 16.6% for fuel dealers to allow of 1.1% for 'all other" food stores. Similarly all provinces registered increased sales ranging from a high of 10.8% in New Brunswick to a low of 4.0% in Prince Edward Island.

Department Store Sales and Stocks, May 1971 — Advance information

Department stores registered sales of \$253,914,000 during May 1971, an increase of 11.2% from the \$228,382,000 in May 1970.

Sales increased in 26 departments and fell in 11. Highest increases were in sporting goods and luggage (27.4%) followed by men's clothing (27.0%), gasoline, oil, auto accessories, repairs and supplies (26.3%) and infants and children's wear and nursery equipment (26.2%). All provinces registered increases in sales ranging from a high of 32.9% in New Brunswick to a low of 6.1% in Saskatchewan. Sharpest declines were reported in furs (29.1%) and millinery (18.8%).

Selling value of stocks held in May was \$807,703,000, up 4.7% from a year earlier. Inventory increases were led by toiletries, cosmetics and drugs (30.4%) and Men's clothing (25.5%). Sharpest declines were recorded in furs (21.2%) and plumbing heating and building materials (18.6%).

Chain Store Sales and Stocks, May 1971, - Advance information

Chain store organizations reported sales of \$970,091,000 during May, an increase of 7.5% from May 1970. All trades registered increased sales ranging from a high of 22.7% in motor vehicle dealers to a low of 1.1% in variety stores.

In May 1971, stocks stood at a value of \$1,507,160,000, up 1.9% from May 1970. The largest increases were registered in drug stores (7.4%) and in grocery and combination stores (7.0%). The sharpest declines occurred in furniture, T.V., radio and appliance stores (14.9%) and family clothing stores (7.9%).

Silver, Lead and Zinc Production, May 1971 — Advance information.

May production of silver increased to 3,935,026 troy ounces from 3,497,089 troy ounces in May 1970. This brought the January-through-May output to 19,270,116 from 17,919,465 troy ounces a year earlier.

May production of refined lead decreased to 18,757 tons from 20,396 tons a year earlier, bringing the year-to-date output to 83,759 tons from 94,982 tons.

May production of refined zinc decreased to 28,220 tons from 40,658 tons a year earlier. This brought the 5-month output to 151,878 from 196,634 tons.

Steel Ingots, Week ended July 10, 1971 — Advance information

Steel ingot production for the week ended July 10, 1971, totalled
230,153 tons, an increase of 7.6% from the preceding week's total of
213,966 tons. The comparable week's total in 1970 was 231,341 tons. The
index of production based on the average weekly output during 1967 of
183,227 tons equalling 100 was 125.6 in the current week, 116.8 a week
earlier and 126.3 one year ago.

Copper and Nickel Production, May 1971 — Advance information
May production of primary copper, decreased to 59,461 tons from 60,265
tons in May 1970, but January-through-May output still reached 280,388
tons compared with 266,768 tons a year earlier.

May production of primary nickel decreased to 25,042 tons from 26,512 tons a year earlier. This brought the year-to-date output to 118,855 tons from 126,156.

Production, Consumption and Inventories of Rubber, May 1971 - Advance information.

May 1971 production of rubber decreased by 2.0% to 41.9 million pounds from 42.7 million pounds in May 1970. January — May production decreased by 5.1% to 199.6 million pounds from 210.4 million. May consumption of rubber was 1.6% lower in 1971, standing at 36.8 million pounds compared to 37.4 million in 1970. For the year to date, consumption increased by 0.4% to 187.0 million pounds from 136.2 million a year earlier.

The value of gold production was \$6,723,850 in May, calculated at the average price paid by the Royal Canadian Mint. Production declined to 190,413 troy ounces from the revised figure of 201,206 a year earlier. This brought the year-to-date output to 958,674 troy ounces from 991,852.
