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Industrial Corporations, Financial Statistics, First Quarter 1971 Advance information.

Seasonally adjusted industrial corporation profit before income taxes was estimated at $\$ 1,517$ million for the first quarter of 1971 , an increase of $\$ 136$ million or $9.9 \%$ from the revised 1970 fourth quarter estimate of $\$ 1,381$ million. The manufacturing sector increased by $\$ 210$ inillion or $37 \%$. The mining industries decreased by $\$ 71$ million or $22.5 \%$.

Unadjusted net profit (after taxes) was estimated at $\$ 869$ million, a decrease of $\$ 124$ million or $12.5 \%$ £rom the previous quarter. Compared with the first quarter estimates of 1970 , profit also decreased by $\$ 50$ million or $5.4 \%$.

Shareholders' equity increased by $\$ 461$ million or $1.1 \%$ from the revised $\$ 44,084$ million in the fourth quarter of 1970 and by $\$ 2,026$ million or $4.8 \%$ from the first quarter of 1970.

Preliminary Statement of Canadian Trade, June 1971 - Published only in the DBS Daily and Weekly.

Canada's merchandise trade surplus dropped in June $16.6 \%$ from June 1970 to $\$ 203$ million, with exports up $6.3 \%$ and imports up $10.4 \%$. Nevertheless, the trade balance for first half 1971 at $\$ 1,197$ million stayed within $3.9 \%$ of the year-ago figure.

Record imports in June totalled $\$ 1,437$ million, up $\$ 135$ million or $10.4 \%$ from a year earlier. Shipments from the United States increased by $\$ 65$ million or $6.9 \%$ to $\$ 1,006$ million. Purchases were up by $\$ 45$ million from Japan together with the European Economic Community, and by $\$ 36$ million from all remaining countries except Other Commonwealth and Preferential, whose shipments dropped by $\$ 11$ million.

Cumulative imports for first half of 1971 reached $\$ 7,535$ million, up $\$ 312$ million, or $4.3 \%$ from 1970. Higher purchases of $\$ 138 \mathrm{milli}$ from the United States, $\$ 58$ million from Japan, $\$ 44$ million from the European Economic Community, and $\$ 97$ million from elsewhere more than offset lower purchases of $\$ 25$ million in Other Commonwealth and Preferential Countries.

June imports of automotive products, crude petroleum, iron and steel fabricated shapes, industrial machinery and tractors accounted for over half of the increase over June 1970. The trend noted for automotive products and crude petroleum held also for cumulative imports for the first six months of 1971.

Seasonally adjusted imports rose by $\$ 53$ million to $\$ 1,332$ million between May and June 1971. Adjusted imports turned upward in first quarter 1971, reversing the down trend from the second quarter 1970 level. They continued to climb by a further $\$ 144$ million in the second quarter to reach a level of $\$ 3,793$ million.

Canada's seasonally adjusted trade surplus amounted to $\$ 611$ million in the second quarter. The trade surplus in the first six months of 1971 totalled $\$ 1,296$ million, compared with $\$ 1,610 \mathrm{million}$ in the second half of 1970 .

## Preliminary Statement of Canadian Trade - June, 1971.




Preliminary Statement of Total Canadian Exports, June 1971 - Published only in the DBS Daily and Weekly.

Record exports in June totalled $\$ 1,641$ million, up $\$ 98$ million or $6.3 \%$ from a year ago. Shipments to the United States increased by $\$ 83$ million, or $8 \%$ to $\$ 1,118$ million. Sales in the United Kingdom, Commonwealth and Preferential Countries, and "other" countries rose by $\$ 19$ million; stayed at about the same level for Latin America and the European Economic Community; and $£ 211$ by $\$ 7$ million in Japanese markets.

Cumulative export shipments for the first half of 1971 totalled $\$ 8,732$ million, up $\$ 264$ million or $3.1 \%$ from 1970. Sales increases of $\$ 355$ million to the United States, and $\$ 21$ million to the European Economic Community, Latin America, and "other" countries exceeded decreases of $\$ 112$ million in United Kingdom, Commonwalth and Preferential Countries, and Japan.

Commodity information for June shows automotive products, crude petroleum, lumber, and wheat accounted for three-quarters of the gain; nickel, and copper fell behind the high levels of 1970. These trends held also for the first half of 1971.

After being adjusted for seasonal influences, total exports rose by $\$ 82$ million to $\$ 1,546$ million between May and June 1971. The surge in exports observed in the first quarter, with a gain of $\$ 130 \mathrm{million}$ to $\$ 4,334$ million, lost momentum in the second quarter with a gain of $\$ 70$ million to a level of $\$ 4,404$ million.

## Prices and Price Indexes (Consumer Price Indexes for Regional

 Cities), June 1971 - Advance informationBetween May and June, increases were recorded for consumer price indexes for all regional cities and city combinations except Edmonton-Calgary whose index was unchanged. Food indexes with the exception of those for Halifax and Edmonton-Calgary advanced in all cities with higher quotations recorded for fresh produce among other items. The housing components, for all cities except St. John's, moved up as increased prices were registered for furniture, hardware, kitchen utensils and a number of appliances and cleaning supplies. Tobacco and alcohol indexes were unchanged, except that for Vancouver which increased reflecting changes in alcoholic beverage prices. The cluthing, the transportation, the health and personal care and the recreation and reading indexes registered mixed movements across the country.

Railway Operating Statistics, February 1971 - Advance information
Twenty-four common carrier railways in Canada reported operating revenues of $\$ 128,066,933$ in February 1971, up 2.5\% from February 1970. Net operating income however dropped to a loss of $\$ 7,561,338$ compared with a profit of $\$ 5,048,519$ a year earlier.

Revenue freight carried declined $1.6 \%$ to $18,008,193$ tons, but revenue passengers carried increased $12.1 \%$ to $2,038,366$.

Motor Carriers - Freight, First Quarter, 1971 - Advance information
During the first quarter of $1971,317 \mathrm{Class} I$ and 11 motor carriers reported a total operating revenue of $\$ 145.3 \mathrm{million}$ compared to $\$ 133.0$ million reported by the same carriers during the first quarter of 1970 (an increase of $9.3 \%$ ). Total operating expenses of these fims increased $8.6 \%$ to $\$ 141.3$ million from $\$ 130.1$ million.

Oil Pipe Line Transport, May 1971 - Advance information
Canadian oil pipe lines received $1,960,200$ barrels per day of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum products in May. This was $9.8 \%$ more than $1,786,000 \mathrm{D} / \mathrm{B}$ received a year earlier. Domestic oils increased $10.7 \%$ to $1,555,500 \mathrm{~B} / \mathrm{D}$, and imported oils $6.4 \%$ to 404,700 .

The Labour Fonce, Week ended June 19, 1971 - Advance information
Total employment at $8,308,000$ showed an above-average May-June gain of 224,000 , most of which was accounted for by young persons entering the labour force at the end of the school year. The number of unemployed persong at 551,000 was not much different from the number in May. The Labour force in June was $8,859,000$, an above-average increase of 232,000 since May. The seasonally-adjusted enemployment rate for Canada edged up to $6.4 \%$ in June, from $6.3 \%$ in May.

The seasonally-adjusted employment level for Canada increased to 8,049,000 in June, from 8,025,000 in May. The seasonally-adjusted level rose in all regions except Quebec. The rise in British Columbia was particularly marked and occurred mainly among young persons. All of the rise in seasonallyadjusted employment in Canada was among part-time workers.

[^0]Inventories, Shipments and Orders in Manufacturing Industries, May 1971 -
Advance information.
The seasonally adjusted estimate of manufacturers' shipments reached $\$ 3,933.0$ million in May. This was $0.9 \%$ more than the revised April figure ( $\$ 3,897.3$ million). The estimate for industries producing durable goods increased $1.0 \%$; non-durable goods $0.8 \%$.

The estimate, seasonally adjusted, of the value of new orders received declined $2.8 \%$ to $\$ 3,864.9$ million from $\$ 3,975.4$ million. Among durable goods the drop was $5.5 \%$ to $\$ 1,791.0$ million from $\$ 1,895.7$ million; among non-durable goods there was only a slight easing to $\$ 2,073.9$ million from \$2,079.7 million.

Seasonally adjusted unfilled orders decreased for the first time since December - by $1.5 \%$ to $\$ 4,495.5$ million from $\$ 4,563.6$ million the previous month.

Total inventory owned, seasonally adjusted, was estimated at \$7,829.5 million - slightly less than the revised April figure of $\$ 7,842.2$ million. Inventories held declined $0.2 \%$ as those of goods in process decreased by $1.0 \%$ and finished products by $0.3 \%$, while those of raw materials were virtually unchanged.

The ratio of total inventory owned to shipments, seasonally adjusted, decreased to 1.99 from 2.01 while that of finished products stayed at 0.73 in both April and May.

Not adjusted for seasonal variation, the estimated values of shipments showed increases in seven provinces, led by Saskatchewan with $11.2 \%$, and decreases only in Newfoundland and Nova Scotia. Estimated shipments for the first five months of 1971 reached $\$ 19,053.0$ million, 2.27 more than the $\$ 18,644.9$ million estimated for the same period of 1970: six provinces showed increases, led by New Brunswick with 5.7\%.
