Statistics Canada weekly

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics changed its name this week and became Statistics Canada, continuing a longestablished Federal Government service under a new title. Concurrently, DBS Weekly has become Statistics Canada Weekly.

The changes stem from Parliament's enactment of a new statute - The Statistics Act, 1971 - which was passed early last Spring and proclaimed law on May 1. Among other things, the Act changed the name of Canada's central statistical agency from "Dominion Bureau of Statistics" to "Statistics Canada" and the title of its chief officer from "Dominion Statistician" to "Chief Statistician of Canada".

Recognizing the magnitude of the task involved in developing a new identity for the national statistical agency, Parliament allowed a period of transition in which to complete the change-over. During the transition period, the press and users of statistics can expect to receive some Statistics Canada publications under the old name.

Covers and mastheads for some 1,200 statistical publications are being re-designed as quickly as possible as new issues go to press. Statistics Canada Daily, and Statistics Canada Weekly, are the first to bear the new identification.

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In addition to changing the name of the organization, the new Statistics Act provides for a number of changes which will benefit both users of statistics and respondents to statistical surveys.

For the benefit of users, secrecy provisions have been modified to remove unnecessarily restrictive elements and permit the publication of data not previously available. The main changes here are to permit publication of lists of companies or other organizations by broad employment size ranges or by specific goods and services provided.

In the case of respondents to statistical surveys, the Act allows Statistics Canada greater access to and use of information available elsewhere, including income tax information. In addition it places more emphasis on co-ordination with various provincial departments and agencies, especially in the use of joint collection arrangements.

Thus, Statistics Canada has been given a somewhat broader authority and greater flexibility. Under its new name, the bureau intends to continue to improve the scope, timeliness and efficiency of its operations, to meet the growing need for statistical information on social, economic and financial developments in Canada.

Indexes of Real Dougstic Product by Industry, May 1971 — Advance information
The seasonally adjusted Index of Real Domestic Product rose by 0.5% in May.
This followed increases (revised) of 0.1% in February, 1.1% in March and 0.2% in April. The first quarter increase was 0.9%.

In May a strong increase in the transportation, storage and communication industries was the dominant factor. Recovery from the late opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway had a significant effect on water transport and indirectly on rail transport and grain elevator storage. Output of all three industries increased in May to exceed their March levels. Increased carriage of grain, logs, and miscellaneous manufactured articles accounted for the rail trans-

port increase.

Trade and manufacturing contributed equally to the increase in RDP. Manufacturing output increased on the strength of gains in both durables and non-durables, with the larger contribution coming from non-durables. Wholesale trade, with a sizeable increase, accounted for most of the advance in trade. Retail trade registered its fourth consecutive increase, although only a fractional one. Gains in department and clothing stores more than offset a decline in food stores and the first decrease this year in the output of motor vehicle dealers.

Mining output rose in May, with all components contributing. Public administration and defence recorded its largest increase of the year, based on an advance in provincial administration. Finance, insurance and real estate, and community business and personal services continued their steady growth. Agricultural output dropped in May, due to a reduction in cattle and hog production, and utilities decreased for the second month.

It should be noted that the data for 1971 have been revised and are not continuous with previously published data for 1968, 1969, and 1970. Revised indexes and additional detail will be published in the May issue of "Indexes of Real Domestic Product by Industry" (61-005, 20¢/\$2.00) and in the supplement attached to the May issue.

TRANSPORTATION

Railway Carloadings, June 1971 - Advance information

In Canada, railwaysloaded 20,028,125 tons of revenue treight during June, up 8.9% from the June 1970 total. Carloads rose 5.2% to 346,759. Receipts from United States connections declined 13.5% to 2,215,986 tons, leaving total traffic carried up 6.3% at 22,154,111 tons.

Major increases occurred in loadings of wheat, lumber and logs while news print was down significantly.

Cumulative loadings show total tonnage up 1.6% at 99,848,447 tons while carloads eased down 0.4% to 1,798,567.

Vital Statistics, June 1971 (84-001, 10c/\$1.00)

The 32,477 births recorded in provincial offices during June brought the total for the first six months of 1971 to 186,930, an increase of 1.9% from the 183,473 registrations for the same months of last year. The birth rate for June was 18.3 per 1,000 population.

There were 17,343 marriages filed in June giving a rate of 9.7 per 1,000 population. The cumulative total for the first six months of 1971 was 1.4%

lower than the corresponding period of last year.

During June there were 13,242 deaths giving a rate of 7.4 per 1,000 population. The total for the first six months was 0.8% higher than in the same months of 1970.

MERCHANDISING

Department Store Sales by Regions, June 1971 (63-304, \$1.00)

During June, department store sales cose in Canada by 11.6% over the corresponding month last year, with regional changes as follows: Atlantic Provinces, 20.1%; Quebec, 12.0%; Oncario, 12.4%; Manitoba, 1.0%; Saskatchewan, 3.4%; Alberta, 12.4%; and British Columbia, 11.9%.

Consumer Credit, May 1971 - Advance information

Selected credit holders reported \$8,953 million outstanding on their books at the end of May.

Personal cash loans by chartered banks rose to \$5,006 million, 18.0% more than a year earlier, and life insurance policy loans were up 7.1% to \$755 million, but personal cash loans under the Small Loans Act fell 15.2% to \$476 million.

In addition, sales finance and consumer loan companies held \$896 million balances of sales paper and \$960 million outstandings of unregulated personal cash loans. Since these amounts do not include unearned income, they cannot be compared directly with last year's figures of \$1,213 million and \$1,170 million, respectively.

The outstanding balances of other monthly reporters - Department stores and Motor Vehicle dealers - rose 2.1% to \$639 million.

At the end of the first quarter, total consumer credit reached \$10,864 million. This included balances of \$1,487 million held by credit unions, \$471 million held by "other" retail stores and \$169 million through oil company credit cards for which data is only available quarterly.

Steel Ingots, Week ended July 31, 1971 — Advance information

Steel ingots production for the week ended July 31, totalled 210,517

tons, a decrease of 4.6% from the preceding week's total of 220,656 tons.

The comparable week's total in 1970 was 211,748 tons. The index of production based on the average weekly output during 1967 of 183,227 tons equalling 100 was 114.9 in the current week, 120.4 a week earlier and 115.6 one year ago.

Production of Eggs, June 1971 (23-003, 10c/\$1.00)

Canadian egg production rose by 3.8% to 41,957,000 dozen in June 1971 from 40,422,000 in June 1970. The average number of layers was up 3.8% to 28,378,000 from 27,347,000 while the number of eggs per 100 layers remained unchanged. The farm price of eggs sold for market was down 13.7% to 29.0 cents per dozen compared with 33.6 cents per dozen during the corresponding period in 1970.
