The Labour Force, Week ended December 11, 1971 — Advance information

The labour force situation showed improvement between November and December on a seasonally-adjusted basis. The adjusted employment level rose and the unemployment rate fell to 6.2 in December from 6.6 in November.

The unadjusted rate, representing actual unemployment as a percent of the labour force, rose to 6.1 from 5.8 in November. The number of unemployed persons increased to 530,000 in December from 503,000. These increases were less than average for this time of year.

The actual number of employed persons declined to 8,125,000 from 8,149,000 in November, a decrease which was much less than average for this time of year. The labour force showed little change where there is usually a decrease between November and December.

Compared to a year earlier, employment in December was up 334,000 (4.3%); the labour force increased by 326,000 (3.9%); and unemployment was down by 8,000.

Statistical Report on the Operation of the Unemployment Insurance Act, August 1971 (73-001, 20c/\$2)

During August, 129,000 initial and renewal claims for benefit were received. This was 25,000 or 16% less than in the previous month, but 23,000 or 22% more than a year earlier.

At the end of August there were 411,000 claimants registered for unemployment insurance, an increase of less than 1% over the 409,000 registered both one month earlier and one year earlier.

Benefit paid in August reached \$46.0 million, up 10% from the \$41.9 million disbursed in July and 11% from the \$41.4 million in August 1970. Analysis of these figures is complicated by the fact that the rates of benefit paid since June 27, 1971 have been revised.

Summary of Imports, November 1971 - Advance Information

During November, Canada's imports increased to a value of \$1,529.4 million from \$1,196.2 million a year earlier and \$1,222.1 million in the same month of 1969. Imports for the eleven months increased to \$14,281.0 million in 1971 from \$12,906.1 million in 1970 and \$12,888.5

Summary of Exports, November 1971 - Advance Information

The External Trade Division reports that the value of total exports increased to \$1,628.5 million in November 1971 from \$1,532.4 million a year earlier and \$1,272.1 in November 1969. January to November exports increased to \$16,273.0 million in 1971 from \$15,512.4 million in 1970 and \$13,496.5 million in 1969.

# New Motor Vehicle Sales, November 1971 - Advance information.

New motor vehicle sales jumped by an unprecedented 48% to 84,932 in November 1971 from 57,240 a year earlier. Sales of commercial units increased by 57.6% to 15,123 units, and of passenger cars by 46.5% to 69,809.

Canadian and U.S. passenger car sales were 53.8% above their sluggish performance of November 1970, but only 1.7% more than in November 1969. Sales of cars from overseas, however, increased 25.3% from November 1970 to November 1971, and 48% from a year earlier. North American car sales for September, October and November accounted for 76.9% of the market in 1971, 76.0% in 1970 and 82.0% in 1969.

Of the total sales increase of 8,327 new vehicles from November 1969 to November 1971, 4,454 were overseas passenger cars, 2,988 were commercial vehicles, and 885 were North American passenger cars.

# Cheques Cashed in Clearing Centres, October 1971 (61-001, 20c/\$2)

During October, \$83.2 billion worth of cheques were cashed in Canada, 14.1% more than a year earlier. Payments increased 19.7% in Ontario, 10.5% in Quebec, 7.7% in British Columbia, 5.1% in the Prairie Provinces and 4.2% in the Atlantic Provinces.

The turnover ratio (compiled on an annual basis) for current accounts reached 116.9 in October up from 124.19 a year earlier, while that for savings accounts rose to 1.86 from 1.48.

# Railway Carloadings, November 1971 - Advance information.

Railways in Canada loaded 18,591,542 tons of revenue freight during November, 5.1% more than in November 1970. Carloads rose 5.6% to 336,136. Receipts from U.S. connections dipped 12.5% to 1,890,774 tons leaving total tons carried up 3.2% at 20,482,316 tons.

Major increases occurred in loadings of wneat, lumber, pulpwood chips, and passenger automobiles while there were significant declines in loadings of coal and of copper-nickel ores.

Year-to-date tonnage loaded increased by 2.5% to 195,793,535 tons while carloads were ahead 1.2% at 3,479,174.

Weekly Railway Carloadings, December 21, 1971 — Advance information.

Railways loaded 3,718,776 tons of revenue freight in Canada during the 7-day period ending December 21. This was 4.0% less than in the comparable period of 1970. Year-to-date loadings increased 2.4%.

Passanger Bus Statistics, November 1971 - Advance information.

In November, 51 intercity and rural bus companies carried 3,515,407 passengers. This was 3.8% more than the 3,386,072 carried a year earlier. Their busses travelled 9,442,389 vehicle miles up 5.3% and consumed 1,241,322 gallons of diesel oil (up from 1,198,338) and 91,221 gallons of gasoline (up from 78,407). Total operation revenue increased 15.7% to \$6,464,490.

Urban Transit, November 1971 - Advance information.

In November, 58 urban transit systems collected 92,146,773 initial passenger fares, excluding transfers. This was 5.1% more than the 87,682,257 collected a year earlier. Their vehicles travelled 21,822,864 vehicle miles (up from 20,766,212), and their operating revenue increased 4.4% to 21,762,564.

# Hospital Statistics, Volume VI- Hospital Expenditures, 1969 - Advance information.

Operating expense for all public hospitals reached \$2,345.6 million in 1969, 13.8% more than a year earlier. That of public general and allied special hospitals, accounting for 83.8% of the total, increased 14.1% to \$1,966.6 million.

In public general and allied special hospitals, expenses per rated bed rose 18.2% to \$14,944, and on the basis of Canada's population, operating expenses per capita increased 12.3% to \$93.37. Total operating expense per average patient stay in these hospitals was \$667.30 in 1969.

# Electric Power Statistics, November 1971 - Advance information.

In November 1971 net generation rose 8.1% to 18,905,681 thousand kwh. from 17,493,432 thousand kwh. in November 1970. There were increases in net generation in most provinces but decreases in New Brunswick, Quebec, Yukon Territory and Northwest Territories; the largest decreases occurred in New Brunswick (7.0%) and Northwest Territories (4.7%). The largest increases were 17.7% in Nova Scotia and 21.7% in Ontario. Hydro generation increased 0.3% while thermal production increased 33.7%.

# Mobile Homes, First Quarter 1971 - Advance information

Manufacturers shipped 2,293 single-wide Canadian mobile homes to destinations in Canada in the first quarter of 1971, and 231 double-wide units. Quebec and the Maritimes received 782 single units; Ontario 222; Manitoba 96; Saskatchewan 106; Alberta 483; and British Columbia, Yukon and Northwest Territories 604. Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba and Saskatchewan combined received 52 "double-wide" units; Alberta 56; and British Columbia 123.

Canadian mines shipped 4,383,759 tons of iron ore in November 1971, compared to 4,651,575 tons a year earlier. This brought the eleven months output to 44,906,594 tons from 49,472,638 tons a year earlier.

Steel Ingots, Week ended January 8, 1972 — Advance information.

Steel Ingot production for the week ended January 8, totalled 237,818 tons, an increase of 10.8% from the preceding week's total of 214,602 tons. The comparable week's total in 1971 was 226,724 tons. The index of production based on the average weekly output during 1967 of 183,227 tons equalling 100 was 130.0 in the current week, 117.1 a week earlier and 123.7 one year ago.
