Prices and Price Index, September 1972 - Advance Information.

The industry selling prices index for total manufacturing ( $1961=100$ ) moved up $0.6 \%$ in September to 128.6 from 127.8 in August. It was $5.0 \%$ higher than the September 1971 index of 122.5 . Of the 101 industry indexes included in the total, 39 were higher, 15 declined and 47 were unchanged.

The more notable changes were increases recorded in the primary metals group. the wood products
group. and the foods and beverages group. The increase in primary metals was due mainly to sharply higher price movements in the smelting and refining industry. The wood products group. continuing the upward irend which began in November of 1971. rose again in September as price increases were registered for all industries in the group. Continuing advances in the foods and beverages group reflected higher prices recorded in the sugar refineries, feed manufacturers. and fish products industries. Declines during the month were relatively insignificant.

The general wholesale index $(1935-39=100)$ moved up $1.1 \%$ in September to 314.0 from the revised August index of 310.6 . It was $7.8 \%$ higher than the September 1971 index of 291.4. Fout of the eight major group indexes were higher, three declined and the remaining one, non-metallic mineral products. was unchanged at 234.8 .

The non-ferrous metal products group index rose $4.8 \%$ in September to 271.6 from the revised August index of 259.2. An advance of $2.7 \%$ to 252.9 from 246.2 in the vegetable products group index reflected
price increases for sugar and its products. livestock and poultry feeds and grains. Higher prices for spruce, cedar and fir were the chief contributors to an increase of $1.2 \%$ in the wood products group index to 443.5 from the revised (August) index of 438 .1. The chemical products group index rose slightly to 245.6 from 245.1.

Three groups declined slightly; and animal products to 376.4 from 377.2 , textile products to 280.9 from 281.7 and iron products to 323.2 from 323.3.

Income Distributions by Size in Canada, 1971 Pre. liminary tistimates (13.20(1,504).
Average family incomes in Canada fall pretax money income ) increased to $\$ 10,112$ in 1971 from $\$ 8.927$ in 1969 and $\$ 7,602$ in 1967 according to preliminary estimates from data collected by a sample survey of 30,000 households conducted in April 1972. The $1969-71$ increase was about $13 \%$ (or a net of $7 \%$ as a result of consumer price increases).

For unattached individuals, the 1969.71 gross increase was about $8 \%$ ( t 0 ) $\$ 4,298$ Irom $\$ 3,980$ ).

Income distribution shifted as family units (both families and unattached individuals) receiving tess than $\$ 5,000$ in 1971 declined to $32.1 \%$ from $35.7 \%$ in 1969 ; the $\$ 10,000$-plus group increased $10.35 .1 \%$ from $26.5 \%$.

cash receipts from the sale of farm products, Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on previous years' grain crops. net cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada, and supplenentary payments to dairy producers. Preliminary Statement of Total Canadian Exports, September 1972 - Published only in the Statistics Canada Daily and Weekly.
Seasonally adjusted exports for the third quarter stood at $\$ 4.634$ million. This exceeded quarterly levels for 1971 and the first quarter of 1972 but was $\$ 340$ million lower than the second quarter level. Shipments to the United States were down \$226
million, and to the United Kingdom $\$ 99$ milion. September exports, at $\$ 1.552$ million, were $\$ 48$ million below the August level, with a sharp decline in overseas shipments other than to the United Kingdom partially offset by improved sales to the United States.

Unadjusted September exports were virfually unchanged from a year carlier, as only the United States market showed any improvement. Declining sales $\mathbf{t o}_{0}$ overseas comntries offset the growth in deliveries io the United States, yielding a net growth of $\$ 10$ million to $\$ 1,495$ milition.

Export gains over September 1971 were recorded for crude petroleum, matural gas, lumber, automotive parts and aircraft, all of which are heavily dependent on United States markets. Export declines were recorded for wheat, mineral ores, metals, motor vehicles and communication equipment

In the nine months to September, exports increased about $8 \%$, with the strongest grow the confined to the United States and Japan. Conmonwealth and the European Economic Community markets were particularly weak. Exports in 1972 were higher for automotive products, lumber, crude petroleum, aircraft and parts, and newsprint but lower for iron ore, aluminum, nickel, and communication equipment.

Preliminary Statement of Canadian Trade, September 1972 - Published only in Statistics Canada Daily and Weekly.
Seasonally adjusted imports for the third quarter stood at $\$ 4,632$ million, a marginal $\$ 30$ million increase over the second quarter level. The thirdquarter drop in exports to $\$ 4,634$ million from $\$ 4,974$ left merchandise trade in approximate balance, following surpluses of $\$ 155$ and $\$ 373$ million in the first and second quarters of this year. The trade deficit in the first three guarters of this year with overseas countries other than the United Kingdom constrasted with a surplus during much of 1971. A sharp fall in the third quarter 1972 trade surplus with United States resulted from a weakening in exports and stable imports.

Unadjusted September imports increased $12 \%$ or $\$ 156$ million over the sme month of 1971 , with some $\$ 55$ million attributable to purchases from the United States. Smaller increases of some $\$ 25$ and $\$ 20$ million were recorded in purchases from the

European Economic Community and Japan.
Import gains over September 1971 were recorded for ertede petroleum, communication equipment, food, industrial machinery, clothing and textiles. Purchases of automotive products in aggregate were practically unchanged with increases for velicles offsetting dectires for parts. Purchases of metal ores dropped sharply.

In the nine months to September innports in. creased by almost $20 \%$ reaching $\$ 13,535$ million compared with an $8 \%$ gain in exports to $\$ 14,140$ million. The United States contributed $\$ 1,260$ and Japan $\$ 265$ million to the overall rise of some $\$ 2.240$ million in imports. Larger imports of autonotive products accounted for about $\$ 520$ million of this rise; industrial machinery contributed some $\$ 200$ million; food, communication equipment and crude petroleuns each udded about $\$ 150$ million.

Selected credit holders reporting monthly showed $\$ 10.900$ million outstanding on their books at the end of August 16.9 more than a year carlier．

Persemal cash loans by chartered banks tose to $\$ 6.058$ million．up $23.7 \%$ fron a year carlier：and life insurance companies＂policy loans were up 2.1 ；to $\$ 792$ million，but personal cash loans made under the Simall Loans Act fell $14.4 \%$ to $\$ 393$ million．In addition，sales finance and constmer loan companies held $\$ 1,003$ million balances of retail instament sates paper，an increase of 11 ． 2 ：since a year carlier； and the $\$ 1.179$ million outstandings of personal cash loans represented an expansion of $15.8 \%$ ．

The cunstanding balances of other monthly reporters（Quebee satvings banks，department stures and furniture．TV．．radio and household appliances stores rose 11 ， 6 ？ 68876 million．over the year．

Credit holders reporting quarterly－other retail sootes．ahber credit－card issuers．credit unions and caisses populaires．and publicutilities－reported out－ standing balances of $\$ 2.937$ million for the dune quarter． $12.8 \%$ higher than a year carlier．

Tohal outstanding balanes hat icached 513．000 million at mid－year alevel 15.3 \％of higher than that attaned last year．

Transactions in all long－term pontfolio securities between Canada and other countries resulted in an overall net inflow of $\$ 608$ mitlion in the second quarter of 1971．up substantially from net inflows of $\$ 258$ million in the first quarter and $\$ 19$ million in the corresponding quarter of the previous year．While trading with residents of the United Kingdonn resulted in a net outflow of $\$ 34$ millions，net inflews of $\$ 400$ million were received from the United States and $\$ 242$ million from all other countries．

International transactions in the Camadian money market during the second quarter gave rise to a mel outfow of $\$ 248$ million compared to an intlow of \＄263 million in the previous quarter．The reduction followed a substantial build－up in non－resident invest－ ment in these instruments．

Trading in outslanding securities between Canada and other countries during Jome led to a sales balance or net capital inflow of $\$ 50$ million，an increase of $\$ 29$ million over the net inflow recorded in the previous month．While transactions with continental Luropean countries were in balance，there were net inflows of $\$ 45$ million from Uading with the United States．$\$ 2$ million from the（Inited Kingdon and $\$ 3$ million tesulted from all other countries．

Urban Transit, August 1972 Advance Information.
In August, 57 urban transit systems collected $81,646,959$ initial passenger fares, excluding transfers. This was $7.9 \%$ more than the $75,685,952$ collected a year earlier. Their vehicles travelled $21,917,525$ vehicle miles (up from 20,814,907), and their operating revenue increased $8.2 \%$ to 19,996,917.

In August, 1,972 intercity and rural bus companies carried 4,110.476 passengers. This was $17.4 \%$ less than the $4,976,425$ carried a year earlier. Their busses travelled $13,422,631$ vehicle miles (down $2.5 \%$ ) and consumed $1,761,555$ gallons of diesel oil (down from $1,769,684$ ) and 91,569 gallons of gasoline (down from 91,792). Total operating revenue increased 3.8\% to II,233,204.
