

Workers With Long Hours (71-518, 75¢)

Patterns of regular hours of work (from 35 per week to over 55), overtime (with and without premium pay) and multiple jobholding are outlined in this comprehensive study. It combines detailed statistics for the week ended June 17, 1967 with more general data for prior and subsequent periods.

Population Totals, 1971 Census - Advance information.

The 1971 Census counted 21,568,311 people living in Canada on June 1, an increase of 7.8% since the previous census in 1966. About half -47.8% - of the increase occurred in Ontario; British Columbia accounted for 20.0%, Quebec 15.9%, and Alberta 10.6%.

Although Canada has grown continually, the national rate of growth has been on a downtrend over the past 20 years. It was 14.8% between the 1951 and 1956 censuses, easing down to 13.4% between 1956 and 1961 and dropping to 9.7% between 1961 and 1966.

With the 1971 census results as a benchmark, and taking into account births, deaths, immigration and estimated emigration since the census, the population of Canada at noon today, April 21, 1972, was estimated at 21,815,978.

Population by Official Language Spoken as Mother Tongue, 1971 Census — Advance information

The language first learned and still understood by 60.2% of Canadian residents counted in the 1971 census was English. This compared to 58.5% in the 1961 census. The population with French as its mother tongue declined to 26.9% from 28.1%, and that with other mother tongues also declined to 13.0% from 13.5%.

Alberta had the largest gain in mother-tongue English (to 77.6% from 72.2%); Nova Scotia had the smallest (to 93.0% from 92.3%). Ontario at 77.5% was unchanged, and in Quebec there was a decrease to 13.1% from 13.3%.

The French percentage declined in all provinces except British Columbia, which had a slight rise to 1.7% from 1.6%, and Newfoundland which remained unchanged at 0.7%. The declines were slight in Quebec (to 80.7% from 81.2%) and in New Brunswick (to 34.0% from 35.2%).

There was a considerable decrease between 1961 and 1971 in "Other" mother tongue percentages in the Prairies. Manitoba showed a decline to 26.8% from 30.0%, Saskatchewan to 22.5% from 27.1%, and Alberta to 19.5% from 24.6%.

Population by Specified Age Groups for Canada and Provinces, 1971 Census — Advance information

Canada's population increased in all age groups over 9 years of age, but decreased in the 9-and-under group between the 1966 Census and that of 1971.

On June 1, 1971, there were 4,070,160 children under ten years old, comprising 18.9% of the total population. Five years earlier there were 4,498,244 accounting for 22.5%.

Canadian residents of working age (15 to 64) increased to 13,443,008 or 62.3% of the total population from 11,883,575 or 59.4%, while those over 65 increased to 1,744,405 or 8.1% from 1,539,548 or 7.7%.

The combination of population expansion and legislation reducing voting age to 18 from 21 produced an increase of 23.2% in the number of Canadian residents of voting age. The total on June 1, 1971 was 13,872,498 or 64.3% of the whole population.

Vital Statistics, February 1972 (84-001, 106/\$1)

There were 27,047 births registered in February down from 27,919 a year earlier. February marriages increased to 9,847 from 8,534. Deaths increased to 15,223 in February from 13,554 a year earlier, increasing the rate to 8.8 per 1,000 population from 8.2.

Prices and Price Indexes, March 1972 - Advance information General Wholesale Index (1935-39=100)

The revised wholesale index moved up 0.8% in March to 304.2 from the revised February index of 301.7. It was 6.0% higher than the March 1971 index of 286.9. The eight major group indexes were higher.

The non-ferrous metal products group index rose 2.4% in March to 265.1 from 258.8 on higher prices for copper and its products, lead and its products, and domestic zinc. An advance of 1.8% to 363.9 from 357.4 in the animal products group index reflected price increases for fishery products, fresh meats, livestock, leather, eggs and hides and skins. Higher prices for fertilizer materials, and soaps and detergents were chiefly responsible for an increase of 1.0% to 243.4 from 240.9 in the chemical products group index. The vegetable products group index moved up 0.7% to 241.7 from 240.1 mainly on higher prices for tea, coffee and cocoa, milled cereal foods, grains, raw sugar, and potatoes. An increase of 0.7% to 273.3 from 271.3 occurred in the textile products group index on price increases for cotton fabrics and cotton yarns. Slight advances were recorded for three major group indexes; non-metallic mineral products to 231.0 from 230.6, wood products to 421.6 from 421.0 and iron products to 322.0 from 321.6

Prices and Price Indexes, March 1972 - Advance information Industry Selling Price Index: Manufacturing (1961=100)

The industry selling price index (total manufacturing) moved 0.6% higher in March to 125.9 from 125.2 in February. Of the 101 industry indexes included in the total, 46 were higher, 12 declined and 43 were unchanged.

The more notable changes in March were increases in the foods and beverages group, mainly in response to higher prices registered in the slaughtering and meat packing, fish products and poultry processors industries. Advances in the primary metals group reflected higher price levels in the smelting and refining industry. More moderate increases were recorded in the wood industries, and in the chemical and chemical products groups. Declines in March were relatively insignificant.

Consumer Credit, February 1972 - Advance information

Selected credit holders reporting monthly showed \$9,879 million outstanding on their books at the end of February - 14.2% more than a year earlier.

Personal cash loans by chartered banks rose 24% to \$5,833 million, and life insurance companies policy loans were up 1.7% to \$777 million but personal cash loans made under the Small Loans Act fell 16.3% to \$421 million. In addition, sales finance and consumer loan companies held \$875 million balances of retail instalment sales paper a decrease of 6.0%, but the \$1,071 million outstandings of personal cash loans represented an expansion of 13.0%.

The outstanding balances of other monthly reporters - Quebec savings banks, department stores and furniture, T.V., radic, and household appliances stores - rose 12.2% to \$970 million

Chain Store Sales and Stocks, February 1972 — Advance information
Chain store organizations reported sales of \$843.9 million during February 1972 an increase of 15.6% from February 1971.

Sales increased in trades except hardware stores which declined by 2.3%. The largest growth occurred in motor vehicle dealers (41.4%) followed closely by fuel dealers (40.9%), and service stations and garages (24.3%).

Stocks (at cost) were valued at \$1,436.1 million, up 11.0% from February 1971. The largest increases were in women's clothing stores (31.4%) and in family clothing stores (21.8%). The sharpest declines occurred in jewellery stores (5.6%) and variety stores (1.5%).

Railway Freight Traffic, 1970 - Advance information

Class 1 and 2 common carrier railways in Canada carried 232.5 million tons of revenue freight during 1970, up 11.6% from 203.3 million in 1969. Major commodity increases were recorded by Food, Feed, Beverages and Tobacco up 23.6% on higher grain traffic, and by Crude Materials, Inedible up 15.5% on heavier shipments of iron ore, copper-nickel ore and coal. Major provincial gains were recorded by Newfoundland, where iron ore loadings increased sharply, and by Saskatchewan reflecting higher grain shipments.

Weekly Railway Carloadings, April 7, 1972 - Advance information
