Estimated Population at April 1, 1972 — Published only in Statistics Canada Daily and Weekly.

The population of Canada as of April 1, 1972 was estimated at 21,788,000. This was an increase of 219,000 or 1% since the June 1, 1971 Census and 57,000 in the first quarter of 1972. Ontario had the largest increase (97,000) since the Census and British Columbia the greatest percentage growth (2.6%). At the present rate of increase the 22,000,000 population level will be reached by January 20th, 1973. The starting point of these estimates is the population count of the Census of June 1, 1971. These estimates are subject to revision as soon as the 1976 Census of Canada is processed.

As of noon, June 2, the estimated population of Canada was 21,810,485. This is based on the growth during the period since the Census of June 1, 1971.

The elements in population change for this period were:

- 1 birth every 1 min. 27 sec. (87 sec.),
- 1 immigrant every 4 min. 29 seconds (269 sec.),
- 1 death every 3 min. 17 seconds (197 sec.),
- 1 emigrant every 9 min. 15 sec. (555 sec.),
- 1 population increase every 2 minutes (120 seconds);
- each day's increase = 720 persons.

Vital Statistics, April 1972 (84-001, 10¢/\$1).

There were 27,051 births registered in April, down from 31,587 a year earlier, bringing the birth rate down to 15.2 per 1,000 population from 17.8.

April marriages decreased to 10,810 from 11,012, the rate per 1,000 decreasing to 6.1 from 6.2.

Deaths decreased to 12,202 in April from 12,810 a year earlier, decreasing the rate to 6.8 per 1,000 population from 7.2.

Real Domestic Product, March 1972 - Advance information

Canada's Real Domestic Product for March increased by 0.4% from its upward-revised level in February. This resumption in growth followed a levelling-off in January and February (January output decreased by 0.2% and February recovered at the same rate).

In March the service-producing industries grew at their fastest pace since 1966. The goods-producing industries, on the other hand, decreased for the second consecutive month.

With the largest percentage increase in recent years, trade dominated the service-producing industries' advance in March. The expansion in wholesale trade was more substantial than the increase in retail trade. A sharp increase in wholesale handling of grain was the principal factor within wholesale trade, but significant gains were also recorded for household electrical supplies (which more than recovered from declines in the previous

month), for auto parts and accessories, and for construction supplies. In retail trade, the most significant change was a recovery in the output of motor vehicle dealers from a low volume of sales during the preceding months.

Transportation, storage and communication advanced strongly, regaining output levels prevalent before the bad weather-- and strike-affected low January level. The two principal features were increases in railway transportation, originating largely with increased transport of coal, and in air transport.

Agricultural output fell sharply in the month to record its third consecutive decrease. All types of production decreased in March, with the most sizeable declines occurring in production of livestock and poultry.

In the first quarter of 1972 the index of Real Domestic Product increased by 0.6%. The agriculture, transportation and storage, and construction industries were major dampening factors on the rate of growth in this quarter.

Trade was the major contributor to the first-quarter increase in RDP. It has continued to grow at almost the same average quarterly rate of increase as in 1971. In the first quarter of 1972, however, wholesale trade grew faster, based on high levels of trade in grain and petroleum products. Retail trade was strengthened by increases reported for department stores and service stations, but weakened by the first quarterly decrease for motor vehicle dealers since the fourth quarter of 1970.

The next largest contribution to the increase in RDP came from manufacturing, which continued to expand, although at a slower pace than in the previous quarter. The most significant changes were increases in the transportation equipment industries, and decreases in the primary metal industries.

The community, business and personal services industries advanced in the quarter. Employment data indicated that a large part of this increase originated in the education industry group. Services to business management were also significantly higher.

Agricultural output decreased in the first quarter, due to a fall-off in the high level of grain sales by the Canadian Wheat Board and to a decrease in the projected value of the 1972 grains crops in relation to 1971.

The transportation, storage and communication industries registered their largest decline in output for several years. Rail and water transport and grain elevator storage were affected by the poor weather in the early part of the quarter, and air transportation was affected by strikes.

Tuberculosis Statistics, 1971 - Advance information

More Canadians (11,504) received prophylactic drug treatment for prevention of tuberculosis in 1971 than were treated for the disease itself (9,610). Per 100,000 population, 52.9 received preventive treatment (up from 47.3 the previous year) and 44.2 were under treatment for active cases (down from 49.7).

New active cases increased to 3,943 from 3,920, and reactivated cases edged up to 622 from 620.

Canada's Foreign Trade in Motor Vehicles and Parts, First Quarter 1972 -
Published only in Statistics Canada Daily and Weekly

Canadian trade in motor vehicles and parts dropped to a \$60-million deficit in the first quarter of 1972 from a \$50-million surplus a year earlier. This resulted from a drop of \$43 million in the surplus in United States trade (mainly from increased imports of parts), and a widening of the deficit with other countries by some \$67 million (mostly from increased imports of vehicles).

Summary of Imports, April 1972 - Advance Information

During April, Canada's imports increased to a value of \$1,510.3 million from \$1,277.7 million a year earlier, and \$1,304.3 million in the same month of 1970. Imports for the four months increased to \$5,727.0 million in 1972 from \$4,707.1 million in 1971, and \$4,641.0 million in 1970.

Summary of Exports, April 1972 - Advance information

The External Trade Division reports that the value of domestic exports increased to \$1,475.2 million in April 1972 from \$1,385.6 million a year earlier and \$1,428.5 million in April 1970. January to April exports increased to \$5,751.7 million in 1972 from \$5,361.0 million in 1971 and \$5,263.8 million in 1970.

Provincial Government Employment, First Quarter 1972 - Advance information

Canada's provincial and territorial governments 'excluding British Columbia) employed 386,072 persons during the last pay period of March 1972. This was 1.6% fewer than the 392,286 reported for the previous quarter. Gross payrolls decreased 1.0% to \$752.7 million, from \$760.7 million.

Motor Carriers - Freight, 1970 - Advance information

Total operating revenue of Class 1 and 2 motor freight carriers was reported as \$981.5 million in 1970, up 3.0% from \$952.5 million in 1969. Operating expenses increased by 4.3% to \$944.1 million from \$905.5 million. Net operating revenue dropped by 20.5% to \$37 million. Salaries were up 6.3% to \$378.1 million while the number of employees decreased by 4.4% to 48,235. Purchased transportation rose 3.4% to \$146.4 million compared to a 15.3% increase in 1969 and 19.1% over the two years 1966 to 1968.

Operating revenue more than tripled during the ten-year period ended in 1970, rising from \$317.5 million to \$981.5 million, and the number of reporting Class 1 and 2 carriers increased to 918 from 501.

Weekly Railway Carloadings, May 21, 1972 — Advance information

Railways in Canada loaded 4,465,976 tons of revenue carload freight during the 7-day period ending May 21. This was 0.8% less than in the comparable period of 1971. Year-to-date loadings increased 4.2%. Much of the decline in Eastern loadings occurred on roads hauling iron ore which were affected by recent labour difficulties in Quebec.

Production of Eggs, April 1972 (23-002, 10¢/\$1)

Canadian egg production declined by 6.6% to 39.8 million dozen in April 1972 from 42.7 million a year earlier. The average number of layers was down 6.4% to 27.0 million from 28.8 million while the number of eggs per 100 layers decreased 0.2% to 1,774 from 1,778. Farm price of eggs sold for market was up 3.3% to 31.4¢ per dozen compared with 30.4¢ per dozen.

Electric Power Statistics, April 1972 — Advance information

In April 1972 net generation rose 9.5% to 18,860 million kwh. from 17,223 million in April 1971. There were increases in most provinces but slight decreases in Quebec (0.2%) and Yukon Territory (0.9%). The largest increases were 50.4% in Newfoundland and 19.1% in Saskatchewan. Hydro generation rose 3.3% while thermal production rose 32.5%.

Iron Ore, April 1972 — Advance information.

Canadian mines shipped 3,145,519 tons of iron ore in April 1972, compared to 3,267,666 tons a year earlier. This brought the four months output to 7,057,879 tons from 8,713,848 tons a year earlier.

Steel Ingots, Week ended June 3, 1972 — Advance information

Preliminary steel ingot production for the week ended June 3, totalled 241,174 tons, a decrease of 1.7% from the preceding week's total of 245,444 tons. The comparable week's total in 1971 was 238,081 tons. The index of production based on the average weekly output during 1967 of 183,227 tons equalling 100 was 131.6 in the current week, 134.0 a week earlier and 130.0 one year ago.

Paper and Allied Industries (Major Group 10), 1970, Census of Manufactures — Advance information.

The paper and allied industries shipped \$3,931 million worth of products of own manufacture in 1970. This was 2.5% more than in 1969. The total value added by these industries increased 3.8% to \$1,815 million, the number of employees decreased 0.7% to 121,080, and total salaries and wages increased 5.6% to \$978 million.

Printing, Publishing and Allied Industries (Major Group 11), 1970, Census of Manufactures - Advance information.

The printing, publishing and allied industries shipped \$1,545 million worth of products of own manufacture in 1970. This was 3.8% more than in 1969. The total value added by these industries increased 2.8% to \$1,039, million, the number of employees decreased 0.7% to 84,045, and total salaries and wages increased 5.2% to \$607 million.

Motion Picture Theatres, 1970 - Advance information

There were 1,435 motion picture theatres in 1970, up from 1,428 in 1969, some 80.6% or 1,156 of these were regular theatres and 279 drive-in theatres. Receipts from admissions (excluding taxes) increased by 9.1% to \$128 million, regular theatres accounting for 86.8% of this amount. Paid admissions increased 2.3% to \$92 million.

Furniture and Fixture Industries (Major Group 9), 1970, Census of Manufactures - Advance information.
