Employment, Earnings and Hours, June 1972 - Advance information.

Seasonally-adjusted, the advance industrial composite index of employment for Canada declined in June. The largest relative changes were an increase in construction and declines in transportation, communication and other utilities, and trade. All regions had decreases except Ontario, where a marginal gain was recorded, and British Columbia, which remained unchanged.

(Industrial composite is the sum of all industries with the exception of agriculture, fishing and trapping, education and related services, health and welfare services, religious organizations, private households and public administration and defence. All statistics are based on returns received from employers having 20 or more employees in any month of the year.)

Average weekly earnings, not adjusted for seasonal variations, rose in June at the Canada industrial composite level. All regions and industry divisions except forestry contributed to this advance.

Average weekly hours of hourly-rated wage-earners rose in manufacturing and construction and declined in mining. Average hourly earnings rose in mining and manufacturing and decreased in construction.

Preliminary May 1972 data indicated almost no change in the seasonally-adjusted industrial composite index of employment for Canada (1961=100). The largest relative changes were increases in construction (1.2%) and service (1.7%) and a 0.9% decline in mining. Among the provinces, the largest percentage changes were increases in Nova Scotia (2.5%) and Newfoundland (2.0%) and declines of 4.1% in Prince Edward Island and 2.9% in British Columbia.

Not adjusted for seasonal variations, the Canada composite index of employment rose 2.7% in May. All industry divisions and all provinces except British Columbia contributed to the gain.

Average weekly earnings, not adjusted for seasonal variations, declined slightly in May to \$147.70 at the Canada industrial composite level. The largest changes were declines in forestry (\$15.68) and construction (\$7.60)

Among the provinces, the largest month-to-month changes were the declines in New Brunswick (\$4.38) and Nova Scotia (\$1.86).

In mining, average weekly hours dropped to 39.9 in May, from 40.4 in April while average hourly earnings gained 2¢ to \$4.24. Compared to a year ago, hours were down 0.6 hours and earnings were up 23¢.

Average weekly hours in manufacturing declined 0.6 hours to 39.8 (0.3 hours more than a year earlier). Average hourly earnings gained 1¢ to \$3.51 (a year-over-year gain of 24¢).

In construction, average weekly hours declined to 39.8 in May from 41.2 in April and average hourly earnings dropped 6¢ to \$5.04. The May 1971 levels were 37.9 hours and \$4.68.

Population by Mother Tongue, 1971 Census - Advance information.

The 1971 Census showed that English was the mother tongue of 13 million residents of Canada, French of 5.8 million, and other languages of 2.8 million. Of this 2.8 million, 561,085 listed German (down 0.5% from 1961), 538,360 Italian (up 58.5% from 339,626), 309,855 Ukrainian (down 14.5%), 144,920 Netherlands (down 0.1%) and 134,680 Polish (down 16.7%).

More than 60% of the German-speaking population were located in the West 33% in Ontario and only 6% in Quebec and the Atlantic Provinces. The Italian population was more concentrated (63.9%) in Ontario, with 25% in Quebec and barely 10% in the four Western provinces.

Railway Carloadings, July 1972 - Advance information

Railways loaded 16,242,479 tons of revenue freight in Canada during July 1972, 13.2% less than a year earlier. Carloads decreased 8.7% to 295,659. Receipts from United States connections edged up 0.3% to 1,826,199 tons, leaving total traffic carried down 12.0% at 18,068,678 tons.

The decrease of 2.5 million tons in total loadings was more than accounted for by a drop of 3.2 million tons in loadings of iron ore. Significant decreases were also recorded in loadings of copper-nickel ore and salt, while wheat and other grains showed substantial increases.

Year-to-date tonnage loaded rose 0.1% to 119,404,919 tons while total traffic carried was ahead 0.2% at 133,600,557 tons.

Weekly Railway Carloadings, August 14, 1972 - Advance information.

Railways in Canada loaded 3,381,693 tons of revenue carload freight during the 7-day period ending August 14. This was 24.6% less than in the comparable period of 1971. Year-to-date loadings decreased 1.3%. Eastern loadings continue to show the effects of the iron mine strike in Quebec and Labrador.

Rubber Footwear Manufactures (S.I.C. 1624) 1971 (Census of Manufactures) - Advance information.

The rubber footwear manufacturers shipped \$37 million worth of products of own manufacture in 1971. This was 1.2% more than in 1970. The total value added by the industry decreased 4.6% to \$24 million, the number of employees decreased 0.6% to 3,111, and total salaries and wages increased 0.6% to \$16 million.

Steel Ingots, Week ended August 26, 1972 - Advance information

Preliminary steel ingot production for the week ended August 26, totalled 252,049 tons, an increase of 0.7% from the preceding week's total of 250,279. The comparable week's total in 1971 was 223,580. The index of production based on the average weekly output during 1967 of 183,227 tons equalling 100 was 137.6 in the current week, 136.6 a week earlier and 122.0 one year ago.
