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Murders, 1961-1971 - Advance Information.
An average of 222 persons, excluding police and custodial officers, were murdered in each of the seven years 1961 through 1967 when the death penalty was in force for such murders. The average for the following four years, when the death penalty did not apply, was 376 . The actual figure for 1971 was 422.

The death penalty for murder, except for the killing of policemen and prison guards while on duty, was suspended Dec. 29, 1967, for a five-year trial period.

The comparable 11 -year figures for police and custodial officers are 3.6 murdered annually before the trial suspension and 4 per year following. The greatest number in any year were the 11 murdered in 1962. Three such murders were reported for 1971.

A summary of revised statistics on the disposition of murder cases for the ten years 1961-1970 shows that an average of 10 murder cases per year were heard in juvenile court following the death penalty suspension, compared with 3 before 1968.

In adult courts, $72 \%$ of persons convicted of killing non-police persons after the law change, were found guilty of lesser charges than murder, compared with $61 \%$ in the earlier period. Where officers were the victims after 1967. 11 of 14 convictions were on lesser charges compared with 3 of 9 for the previous seven years.

Acquittals, other than for insanity, and charges dropped or dismissed decreased in the suspension period to $18 \%$ of persons charged with non-police murders from $22 \%$.

Only one charge of murdering an officer was dropped in the 10 -year period; no charges were dismissed and the only acquittals were for insanity.

About $9 \%$ of suspects in non-police murders after 1967 were found insane compared with $10 \%$ in the previous seven years; for police and custodial officers, I of 18 suspects (about $6 \%$ ) was found insane for the later period compared with 7 out of $23(30 \%)$ for the first seven years of the survey.

Consumer Price Movements, December 1972 (62-001, $10 \$ / \$ 1$ ).
The Consumer Price Index for Canada $(1961=100)$ rose $0.7 \%$ to 143.3 in December from 142.3 in November. This latest increase was identical to that which occurred between these two months last year but exceeded the November to December advances of other recent years. Food prices rose $1.4 \%$ while the level of prices for all items other than food increased $0.4 \%$ mainly as a result of advances of $0.5 \%$ housing and $1.3 \%$ in the tobacco and alco hol component. The
transportation index rose 0.2 and the clothing, the health and personal care and the recreation and reading components edged up $0.1 \%$. Between December 1971 and December 1972, the all-items index registered a $5.1 \%$ advance.

Indexes of Real Domestic Product (Industrial Produc-
tion), November 1972 - Advance Information.
The seasonally adiusted index of industrial production increased by $0.9 \%$ in November to 201.6 from 199.8 in October. (The index level for October has been revised upwards by $0.3 \%$ ). Mining, manufacturing and utilities all increased for the third consecutive month.

## Inventories, Shipments and Orders in Manufacturing Industries, November 1972 Advance Information.

The preliminary, seasonally adjusted value of manufacturers' shipments was estimated at $\$ 4.707 .1$ million for November 1972. 1.5\% above the October estimate of $\$ 4,637.5$ million. Non-durable goods shipments were estimated at $\$ 2.422 .6$ million, $2.8 \%$ above the revised October estimate of $\$ 2.357 .3$ million, while those of durable goods remained practically unchanged at $\$ 2,284.5$ million.

Seasonally adjusted new orders dropped slightly to $\$ 4.733 .0$ million in November. $0.3 \%$ down from the revised October value of $\$ 4,745.0$ million. Although durable goods new orders, estimated at \$2,324.4 million, decreased $1.5 \%$ from the revised October value of $\$ 2,359.5$ million, this was partially offset by a $1.0 \%$ increase in non-durable new orders to $\$ 2,408.6$ million in November, from the revised October value of $\$ 2,385.5$ million. Seasonally adjusted unfilled orders at the end of November rose to $\$ 5.066 .0$ million, $0.5 \%$ higher than the revised estimate of $\$ 5,040.1$ million in October.

Seasonally adjusted total inventory owned increase slightly to $\$ 8,488.9$ million in November, from the revised October estimate of $\$ 8,504.4$ million. Total inventory held also eased up, with an increase of $0.6 \%$ in raw materials and decreases of $0.1 \%$ and $1.1 \%$ in goods in process and finished products. The seasonally adjusted ratio of total inventory owned to shipments was 1.80 in November and 1.83 in the previous month. The finished products-to-shipments (continued on next page)

Not adjusted for seasonal variation, Canadian manufacturers' estimated shipments were $\$ 4,927.0$ million for November, $1.3 \%$ more than the revised Oclober estimate of $\$ 4,864.3$ million. Shipments for the first 11 months of 1972 were estimated at $\$ 49,207.7$ million, up $9.5 \%$ from the previous year's corresponding estimate of $\$ 44,953.3$ million.

Mineral Production, November 1972 - Advance Information

The value of gold production was $\$ 5,943,317$ in November 1972, calculated at the average price paid by the Royal Canadian Mint, as compared to $\$ 6,624,599$ in November 1971

Production decreased to 158,446 troy ounces in November 1972 from 188,571 troy ounces a year earlier. This brought the year-to-date outpul to $1.867,566$ troy ounces from $2,039,631$ troy ounces reported last year.

Production of silver increased to 5,105,950 troy ounces from $3,608,672$ troy ounces in November 1971. This hrought the eleven months output to $43,263,972$ from $41,824,585$ troy ounces a year earlier.

Statistical Report on the Operation of the Unemployment Insurance Act. November 1972-Advance Information.
A total of 266,000 initial and renewal claims for unemployment insurance benefit were received in November. This was 67.000 or $34 \%$ more than in the previous month and up 16,000 or $6 \%$ from a year earlier.

At the end of November, 765,000 claimants were registered for unemployment insurance benefit, up 56,000 or $8 \%$ from the October count. On November 30,1971, there were 538,000 claimants.

Benefit paid to claimants in Novenber increased to $\$ 144$ million, $4 \%$ more than the $\$ 138$ million disbursed in October. In November 1971, the expenditure was $\$ 6^{9}$ million.

Household Facilities and Equipment May 1972 (64-202, 50\&).

Possession of colour television sets and F.M. radius by Canadian households increased more than any other household facilities between May 1971 and May 1972. Households with colour T.V. sets increased to $24.2 \%$ of the total from $18.4 \%$ and $62.4 \%$ had F.M. radios compared to $57.6 \%$ a year earlier.

In 1972, data were collected on several new items - adult-size bicycles ( $27.9 \%$ ), pianos ( $13.3 \%$ ), portable humidifiers ( $13.4 \%$ ), snow blowers ( $4.6 \%$ ), and wall-to-wall carpeting ( 1 room-19.7\%, 2 rooms $-11.9 \%, 3$ or more rooms $-15.0 \%$ ).

New Motor Vehicte Sales, Novenbor 1972 - Advance Information.
Nuvember unit sales of new motor vehicles increased $14.8 \%$ to 97,653 from 85,065 units a year earlier. This brought the cumulative sales estimate for the year to date to 992,104 units. Unit sales of passenger cars increased from November 1971 by $12.1 \%$ and of conmercial vehicles by $27.1 \%$. In dollar value, November 1972 sales increased $21.6 \%$ to $\$ 402.1$ million from the $\$ 330.8$ million repartid a year earlier.

Dollar sales of Canadian and U.S. passenger cars increased $17.9 \%$ to ( $\$ 245.9$ million) and commercial vehicles $32.1 \%$ (to $\$ 99.9$ million), while sales of overseas passenger cars were up $17.4 \%$ (to $\$ 50.8$ million) and commercial vehicles $62.2 \%$ (to $\$ 5.5$ million). The average unit price of Canadian and U.S. passenger cars for Novenber was $\$ 3,980$, up $4.5 \%$ from $\$ 3,808$ a year earlier. For overseas manufactured passenger cars, the average unit price rose $7.2 \%$ to $\$ 3,057$.

Seasonally adjusted, November 1972 unit sales of new motor vehicles decreased $0.3 \%$ from the previous month's sales but increased $14.0 \%$ over the sales of November 1971. The decrease from the previous month was attributable to a dectine in seasonally adjusted unit sales of passenger cars as Camadian and U.S. car sales dropped $1.3 \%$ while overseas car sales dropped $2.6 \%$.

Canada's farm buildings were valued at $\$ 6.5$ billion in July 1971. This was about one-third of the total farm real estate value. Farmers' 1970 expenditures on new residential construction were estimated at $\$ 298$ (continued)
million, and on non-residential construction $\$ 216$ million. In addition, $\$ 51$ million were spent on repairs to farm houses, and $\$ 68$ million on repairs to other farm buildings.

For farm equipment and machinery, $\$ 478$ million were spent on purchases in 1970, and $\$ 209$ million on repairs and maintenance.

Other major operating expenses included purchase of feed ( $\$ 526$ million), diesel fuel ( $\$ 92$ million), seed ( $\$ 86$ million) and insurance premiums ( $\$ 62$ million).

In July 1971, there were 283,000 diesel tractors on Canadian farms, 180,000 grain combines, and 62,000 upright silos $(95 \%$ of which were in Quebec and Ontario).

Summary of Exports, November 1972 - Advance Information.
The value of total exports increased to $\$ 2,021$ million in November 1972 from $\$ 1,623$ million a year earlier. January-to-November total exports rose to $\$ 18,163$ million from $\$ 16,202$ million.

Fertilizer Use, 1971 Census of Agriculture (96-726, 75 ().
Canadian farmers spent $\$ 131$ million on commercial lertilizer in 1970. Only $39 \%$ of all Canadian farms reported using fertilizer in 1971, and they covered 17 million acres - $22 \%$ of the total area devoted to crops and improved pasture.

Of the \$131 million, Ontario spent $41 \%$, Alberta $18 \%$, Quebec $17 \%$, Manitoba $8 \%$, Saskatchewan $5 \%$ and British Columbia 4\%.

Of the 17 million commercially fertilized acres, Alberta had 5.6 million, Saskatchewan 3.7 million, Ontario 3.1 million, Manitoba 2.9 million and Quebec 1.2 million.

Hospital Statistics, Preliminary Annual Report, 1971 - Advance Information.
There were 1,271 general and allied special hospitals in operation in 1971, 9 more than in 1970. As a result, rated bed capacity increased I.5\% to 151,185 from 148,920 , or to 8.0 per 1,000 population.

Public general hospitals, the single largest group, experienced an occupancy rate of $80.0 \%$, only slightly above the $79.6 \%$ rate reported in 1970. Average length of stay decreased to 9.9 from 10.1 days. These hospitals employed (excluding medical staff) 265.575 persons, a $2.7 \%$ increase over 1970. Paid hours of work per patient-day remained unchanged at 14.1.

In 1971, total operating expense for public general and allied special hospitals increased to $\$ 2,517,754,000$, up $12.0 \%$ from 1970.

The cost per patient-day of public general hospitals increased $9.8 \%$ to $\$ 65.57$ from $\$ 59.74$,
somewhat less than the $11.2 \%$ increase experienced between 1969 and 1970. Gross salaries and wages represented $70.3 \%$ of these costs.

Summary of Imports, November 1972 - Advance Information.
During November Canada's imports increased to a value of $\$ 1,812$ million from $\$ 1,532$ million a year earlier and $\$ 1,196$ million in the same month of 1970 . Imports for the eleven months increased to $\$ 17,167$ million in 1972 versus $\$ 14,284$ million in 1971 and $\$ 12,906$ million in 1970.
