**Employment, Earnings and Hours** 

Average weekly earnings in Canadian industry at \$163.33 in September were up 7.1% from \$152.45 a year earlier.

First estimates show that average weekly earnings (by industry division) were highest in construction (\$237.54), followed by mining (\$214.81), forestry (\$200.09), transportation, communication and other utilities (\$184.65), manufacturing (\$169.19), finance, insurance and real estate (\$153.01), trade (\$128.73) and service (\$115.46).

Average weekly earnings were highest in the Yukon (\$218.21), followed by Northwest Territories (\$211.31), British Columbia (\$182.37), Ontario (\$168.49), Quebec (\$156.43), the Prairie Region (\$155.75), and the Atlantic Region (\$140.13).

Hourly earnings in September averaged \$5.72 in construction, \$4.87 in mining and \$3.90 in manufacturing.

# Department Store Sales

Department store sales in September rose to \$364.7 million, an increase of 6.2% from \$343.5 million in September 1972. All provinces reported increases.


Sales rose in thirty-one of the thirtynine departments in the latest month with the largest percentage gains recorded in:

• Furs (26.4%); jewellery (26.1%); furniture (20.5%); and receipts from meals and lunches (20.5%).

Inventories held (at selling price) in September were valued at \$922.8 million, up 6.7% from a year earlier.

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## Wholesale Trade

Wholesale merchants' sales in September were estimated at \$2.86 billion, up 15.7% from the corresponding month in 1972.

The groceries and food specialties component in the consumer goods trades showed an 11% advance from a year earlier.

In the industrial goods trades, the most notable sales change was a 26.0% gain in the other construction materials category.

Wholesale inventories were valued at \$4.41 billion in the latest month, an increase of 17.1% from September of last year.

# Operations of Transcontinental and Regional Air Carriers

Canada's seven major airlines reported combined net income of \$7.1 million for the first six months of 1973 compared to a loss of \$1.3 million for the corresponding period in 1972.

Operating revenues increased 24.0% in the latest period to \$484.1 million; operating expenses advanced 21.2% to \$457.5 million.

For June, the airlines reported net income of \$4.9 million, up from \$4.1 million a year earlier. In the latest month, Air Canada showed a profit of \$1.1 million, CP Air earned \$1.8 million and the five regional carriers had a combined profit of \$1.9 million. (The regional air carriers are Eastern Provincial Airways, Nordair, Pacific Western Airlines, Quebecair and Transair).

Passenger-miles for all services in June were up 12.5% from the same month last year.

# **Motor Vehicle Production**

Canadian production of motor vehicles in October at 162,207 units was up 16.4% from October 1972.

For the first ten months of 1973, motor vehicle production totalled 1,343,216 units, up 10.4% from the corresponding period last year. Passenger car production rose 9.9% to 1,046,184 units in the latest period; production of commercial vehicles increased 12.1% to 297,032 units.

# Consumer Credit


Consumer credit outstanding on the books of selected credit holders reporting monthly totalled \$13.29 billion at the end of September, up 20.0% from a year earlier.

Personal cash loans by chartered banks rose to \$8.62 billion in the latest month, an increase of 26.2% from September 1972

Sales finance and consumer loan companies held \$1.12 billion balances of retail instalment sales paper in September (an increase of 13.3% from a year earlier) and had \$1.40 billion outstanding of personal cash loans (up 17.3%).

Total outstanding balances on the books of credit holders reporting quarterly as well as those reporting monthly reached \$16.23 billion at the end of September, a level 15.1% higher than that of a year earlier.

Provincial Government Employment

Canada's provincial and territorial governments (excluding British Columbia) employed an estimated 322,798 persons in general government services during the last pay period of June 1973. Second-quarter gross payrolls totalled \$588.7 million.

Provincial government enterprises employed an estimated 109,874 persons at the same period. Second-quarter gross payrolls of these enterprises totalled \$297.2 million.

# **Summary of Exports**

Canada's October exports reached \$2.14 billion on a seasonally-adjusted basis, their highest level this year and 7.4% above the third-quarter monthly average of \$2.00 billion.

Unadjusted exports in October increased 19.4% from a year earlier to \$2.35 billion.

Exports to the United States advanced 25% to \$1.62 billion, with shipments of automotive and related products, crude petroleum, pulp, machinery and fabricated steel materials accounting for more than half of the total.

Overseas exports rose 8% overall, with shipments to Japan climbing 69.9% to \$170.6 million. Overseas exports of copper and lumber increased markedly, but wheat exports showed an actual decline.

For the January-October period of 1973, unadjusted exports at \$20.2 billion were up 24.0% from a year earlier. Two-thirds of this rise was accounted for by the United States and one-sixth by Japan.

Exports of automotive and related products, crude petroleum, lumber, newsprint and machinery were responsible for 55% of exports to the United States. Deliveries of wheat, copper, nickel, lumber and oilseeds made up 39% of shipments overseas.

Manufacturers' Shipments, Orders

Manufacturers' new orders in September, seasonally adjusted, were estimated at \$5.64 billion, up 3.1% from \$5.47 billion (revised) in August. New orders for durable goods increased 6.8%; those for non-durable goods showed a decrease of 0.4%.

Unfilled orders were estimated at \$6.91 billion in the latest month, up 3.3% from the month before.

Total inventory owned was 1.7% higher at an estimated \$10.01 billion.

The ratio of total inventory owned-to shipments was 1.85 in September, down from 1.89 (revised) the month before. The finished products-to shipments ratio was 0.63 compared to 0.64 (revised) in August.

Manufacturers' shipments in September were estimated at \$5.42 billion, an increase of 4.0% from the revised August value of \$5.21 billion. Durable goods shipments were 6.8% higher than the previous month's level; shipments of non-durables rose 1.5%.

Not adjusted for seasonal variation, manufacturers' shipments in September were estimated at \$5.57 billion, up 13.6% from a year earlier. Shipments for the first nine months of 1973 at \$47.40 billion were 16.9% higher than in the corresponding period in 1972.

### **Railway Operating Statistics**

Six major railways reported revenues of \$150.8 million from Canadian operations in September, down 2.4% from a year earlier. Expenses rose 1.5% to \$150.1 million, resulting in net income of \$.7 million for the month (versus net income of \$6.6 million in September 1972).

Freight ton-miles declined 0.8% in the latest month and passenger-miles were almost 42% below the September 1972 level.

During the first nine months of 1973, railway revenues rose 5.6% while expenses increased 7.9%. Net income of \$17.1 million was down 61.4% from the corresponding period in 1972.

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# **Unemployment Insurance Claims**


Benefit paid to claimants under the Unemployment Insurance Act declined to \$122 million in September, down 9% from \$135 million in August and 5% less than the \$128 million disbursed in September 1972.

The average weekly payment to claimants rose 1% to \$68.03 in September from the previous month's average of \$67.37 and was 10% more than the year-earlier payment of \$61.93.

Initial and renewal claims for unemployment insurance totalled 161,000 in the latest month, virtually unchanged from the month before but 7% less than the 173,000 received in September 1972.

# Real Domestic Product

Real domestic product decreased 0.5% in the third quarter of 1973 following increases of 0.9% in the second quarter and 3.3% in the first quarter.

The decline in the latest quarter resulted from strikes by railway and pulp and paper workers, and to a lesser extent, a decline in motor vehicle manufacturers' output. The reduced auto output was attributable partly to the rail strike and also to a strike in the motor vehicle manufacturing industry.

Transportation output fell by 6.8% in the third quarter. Rail, water and air transport all registered decreases; interurban and rural bus transport increased sharply as a result of strikes in other transportation industries.

Total trade output fell 1.6%. Wholesale trade dropped 4.8%; retail trade advanced 0.7%. In wholesale trade, a majority of component industries fell, including wholesalers of automotive parts and accessories, grocery and food specialties, household electrical appliances, construction materials and supplies and farm machinery.

Manufacturing output dropped in the third quarter for both non-durables (-2.1%) and durables (-0.7%). The strike-caused decline in pulp and paper was the main contributor to the decreased output.

# Telephone Industry Statistics

Canadian telephone systems earned net operating revenue of \$66.5 million in September, an increase of 19.3% from September 1972.

In the latest month, operating revenues of the thirteen major telephone systems at \$176.8 million were 13.9% higher than a year earlier; operating expenses rose 10.9% to \$110.3 million.

For the first nine months of 1973, net operating revenues of the telephone systems totalled \$535.2 million, up 15.4% from the corresponding period in 1972. Operating revenues during the latest period showed a gain of 13.6% to \$1.53 billion; operating expenses were 12.6% higher at \$989.8 million.

Construction expenditures increased 13.8% this year to \$696.3 million from \$611.8 million recorded in the January-September period of 1972.
