Weekly Bulletin

Labour Income

Total labour income was estimated at \$5.51 billion in September, up 11.5% from \$4.94 billion a year earlier.

Seasonally adjusted, the September estimate of \$5.38 billion showed an increase of 1.7% from August. Wages and salaries in the goods-producing industries advanced by 0.9%; those in the service-producing industries increased by 2.1%.

During the third quarter of 1973, total labour income, adjusted for seasonal variations, rose by 1.4% as compared to an increase of 2.3% recorded during the preceding quarter. Most of the deceleration in the latest quarter was concentrated in the transportation, communication and other utilities and manufacturing industry divisions.

Residential Building Construction Input Price Index

(1971=100)

The residential building construction input price index for Canada advanced to 125.7 in October, up 0.8% from the month before, and 10.6% higher than in October 1972.

Over the twelve months, October to October, prices of building materials used in residential construction have risen 11.0%; labour costs have advanced 9.7%.



Refined Petroleum Products

Canadian refineries produced 51.6 million barrels of refined petroleum products in September, an increase of 11% from a year earlier.

Consumer Price Indexes for Regional Cities

Between September and October, consumer price indexes rose in eight regional cities (and city combinations) studied and declined in four others. The movements ranged from a decrease of 1.1% in Thunder Bay to an increase of 1.0% in Quebec City.

Food indexes dropped in nine cities, reflecting lower quotations for most beef and pork cuts, fresh fruit, dairy products and eggs.

Clothing and health and personal care components advanced in all twelve cities in the latest month, recreation, education and reading indexes in ten, and the housing elements in eight. Transportation registered mixed movements while the tobacco and alcohol indexes were unchanged.

Food indexes, over the twelve months from October 1972, climbed from 15.7% in Saskatoon-Regina (low) to 20.7% in Vancouver (high).

During the period, the greatest increase in the consumer price index was recorded in Quebec City (10.5%).

Railway Carloadings

Railways operating in Canada reported 24.5 million tons of revenue freight loaded during October, an increase of 14.7% from October 1972. Cars loaded increased 10.3% to 405,918.

Loadings of sand, gravel and crushed stone showed an increase in tonnage of more than 37% in the latest month, iron ore movements were up 34.8%, potash rose 34.6% and fuel oil was higher by 28.0%.

For the first ten months of 1973, carloadings were up 7.2% and relative tonnages increased 14.1% from the corresponding period a year earlier. Cumulatively, the largest percentage increases in tonnage were recorded for: iron ore (up 62.1%); sulphur (37.1%); containerized freight (36.7%); and sand, gravel and crushed stone (32.5%).


International Travel Statistics

Canada recorded a deficit of \$201 million from international travel in the first nine months of 1973, up from \$174 million in the corresponding period last year.

Canadian resident spending abroad increased 14.0% to an estimated \$1.38 billion in the latest period, of which \$868 million was spent in the United States and \$509 million in all other countries. The growth in payments on international travel resulted mainly from increases in the average levels of spending and the increased numbers of residents travelling to countries other than the United States.

Canadian receipts from international travel of \$1.18 billion were up 13.7% from a year earlier. Travellers from the United States spent \$956 million in Canada during the period; visitors from all other countries accounted for \$220 million.

Summary of Imports, October 1973

Canadian imports in October \$2.33 billion were 31.4% higher than in October 1972.

Purchases from the United States increased 32% to \$1.65 billion with deliveries of automotive and related products, food, industrial machinery, communication equipment and nonferrous metals representing 53% of supplies from that country. Overseas imports rose 29% overall, with expansion concentrated in crude petroleum, industrial machinery and tractors, food and clothing.

Cumulatively, Canadian imports rose 24.1% to \$19.1 billion in the January-October period of 1973.

Imports from the United States accounted for almost 80% of the advance this year, with the most notable increases recorded for automotive and related products, industrial machinery, food, aircraft and communication equipment.

Imports from overseas countries were significantly higher for crude petroleum, food, industrial machinery, communication equipment and clothing.

On a seasonally-adjusted basis, imports in October at \$2.1 billion reached their highest level of the year, up 8.9% from the third-quarter average.

Vending Machine Operators, 1972

Vending machine operators' sales reached a record \$178.9 million in 1972, an increase of 10.3% from a year earlier.

Principal products vended through the coin-operated vending machines were: tobacco products (with 1972 sales of \$87.4 million); cold drinks (\$29.0 million); and hot beverages (\$28.2 million).

Domestic Mobile Homes

Factory shipments of 5,579 single mobile homes in the quarter ending September 30, 1973 were up 15.7% from the corresponding period in 1972.

Shipments of double-wide units increased 71.0% to 802 units.

Farm Equipment Sales

Sacs from implements and equipment for the estatine months of 1973 totalled \$406.7 million, up 30.7% from the corresponding period in 1972.

Gains were reported in all regions with the following increases recorded:

 Manitoba, 53.7%; Alberta, 42.1%; the Atlantic Provinces, 36.1%; Saskatchewan, 33.7%; Ontario, 22.2%; British Columbia, 10.5%; Quebec, 9.9%.

Sales of repair parts increased 23.0% to \$88.3 million in the January-September period of this year.

Campus Book Stores

Retail sales of 199 campus book stores totalled \$44.1 million for 1972-73, an increase of 7.8% from the year before.

Employment by these stores of 1,200 full and part-time personnel during the last week of November 1972 was 5.3% higher than a year earlier, and payroll expanded 15.7% to \$5.9 million.

Text books accounted for 67% of total sales in the latest year, trade books 12%, and stationery and supplies 14%.

Travel Between Canada and Other Countries

Preliminary statistics for September show that 6.8 million international travellers entered Canada during the month, an increase of 1.5% from a year earlier.

Included in the latest month's total were 3.7 million non-resident travellers, 2.8 million returning residents and 0.3 million in the "other travellers" category (immigrants, military personnel and crews).

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Non-Residential Building Construction Input Price Index

(1961=100)

The non-residential building construction input price index for Canada moved to 203.3 in October, up 0.7% from the month before, and 8.5% higher than in October 1972.

The materials component of the total index has risen 10.9% over the twelve months since October 1972; the labour component is up 6.7%.

Under the materials grouping, lumber and lumber products have risen 19.1% during the period, electrical equipment 13.0%, plumbing, heating and other equipment 10.4%, steel and metal work 9.2%, concrete products 7.6% and other materials 8.9%.

Quarterly Survey of Trusteed Pension Plans

Financial information showing income, expenditures and assets of trusteed pension plans has been published annually since 1957. In the intervening years, these funds have grown at a phenomenal rate, establishing trusteed pension funds as one of the largest and fastest-growing financial institutions in the country.

Assets which had a book value of \$2.3 billion in 1957 have snowballed to a record level of over \$14 billion in 1973 and cash flows into these funds have increased in a similarly dramatic fashion. Accumulations of this magnitude not only constitute a significant portion of gross personal savings but are one of the key sources for investment capital.


With cash flows of well over one billion dollars annually, and every indication that this will continue to grow over the foreseeable future, there was an obvious need and demand for data on a more frequent basis than annually so as to more adequately measure the impact of these funds on the economy.

This Quarterly Survey of Trusteed Pension Plans (74-001, 25¢/\$1 a year) introduces a new statistical series showing estimates of income, expenditures and total portfolio holdings in broad categories. To provide some historical background on quarterly patterns and trends, included in this report are quarterly data from 1970 onward.
