Employment Gains Continue

Employment increased to an estimated 9.11 million persons in June, up from 8.84 million in May and 8.58 million a year earlier.

The number of unemployed increased to 503,000 last month from 493,000 in May, but was down from 568,000 in June, 1972.

The labour force total was 9.61 million in the lastest month, compared with 9.15 million a year earlier.

The seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate for Canada increased to 5.3 in June from 5.2 in May, after declining for five consecutive months. The rate for married men $25-54$ fell to 3.0 , but the rate for married women $25-54$ increased to 3.9 .

The seasonally-adjusted participation rate (percentage of the population 14 years of age and over counted in the labour force) moved up to 57.9 in June, after remaining stable at 57.7 for the previous three months.

The participation rate for students in June was 37.9 compared with a rate of 33.4 in June 1972. The unemployment rate for students was 11.3 in the latest month, down from 14.3 a year earlier.

## Department Store Sales

Department store sales in May rose to $\$ 336.9$ million, an increase of $12.7 \%$ from $\$ 298.9$ million a year earlier. All provinces reported increases.

Gains ranged from $50.2 \%$ for furs to $0.2 \%$ for girls' and teen-age girls' wear. Sales declines were reported in six of the 39 departments with plumbing, heating and building materials ( $-6.1 \%$ ) showing the largest decrease.

Inventories held (at selling price) in May were valued at $\$ 1.08$ billion, up $14.6 \%$ from a year earlier.

## Chain Store Sales

Chain stores reported May sales of $\$ 1.25$ billion, an increase of $14.1 \%$ from the corresponding month in 1972.

Gains were registered by all trades except variety stores, and ranged from a high of $32.5 \%$ for fuel dealers to a low of $2.4 \%$ for general merchandise stores.

Stock inventories (at cost) stood at $\$ 2.20$ billion on April 30, 1973, up $16.3 \%$ from the previous year.

## Consumer Credit

Consumer credit outstanding on the books of selected credit holders reporting monthly totalled $\$ 12.60$ billion at the end of May, up $21.2 \%$ from a year earlier.

Chartered banks' personal cash loans rose to $\$ 8.04$ billion, an increase of 28.5\% from May 1972.

Sales finance and consumer loan companies held $\$ 1.08$ billion balances of retail instalment sales paper (an increase of $17.1 \%$ ) and $\$ 1.34$ billion outstanding personal cash loans (up $18.3 \%$ ).

Total outstanding balances on books of credit holders reporting quarterly as well as those reporting monthly had reached $\$ 15.08$ billion at the end of March 1973, a level $17.9 \%$ higher than a year earlier.

Manufacturers' Shipments Up.
Manufacturers' shipments in May were estimated at $\$ 5.61$ billion, up $6.9 \%$ from the revised April value of $\$ 5.25$ billion. Shipments for the first five months of 1973 were estimated at $\$ 25.99$ billion, an increase of $17.0 \%$ over the $\$ 22.20$ billion total recorded for the corresponding period in 1972.

Seasonally adjusted, May shipments were estimated at $\$ 5.26$ billion, slightly higher than the revised April figure of $\$ 5.24$ billion. Shipments of non-durable goods were up $1.0 \%$, but durable goods shipments decreased 0.3\%.

New orders, seasonally adjusted, increased $1.7 \%$ in May to an estimated $\$ 5.47$ billion. Unfilled orders were up $3.5 \%$ to an estimated $\$ 6.10$ billion.

Total inventory owned was $0.6 \%$ higher at an estimated $\$ 9.38$ billion in May.

## Retail Sales up

Retail sales in May at $\$ 3.31$ billion were up $10.8 \%$ from the year before with sales increases registered in all provinces.

Year-to-year gains were shown by all trade groups except variety stores, which had a $1.0 \%$ decline. The largest increase was recorded by jewellery stores (up $20.5 \%$ ).

Seasonally adjusted, retail trade in May was $\$ 3.11$ billion, down $3.0 \%$ from the previous month, but $10.4 \%$ higher than in May 1972.

## Major Appliance Sales

Canadian manufacturers of major clectrical appliances enjoyed sales gains in the domestic market again in May.

Appliance sales recorded during the month with percentage increases from May 1972:

- Refrigerators - 53,510 units (up $19.3 \%$ ); home and farm freezers $-28,708$ units (48.4\%).
- Stoves and ranges - 52,467 units (12.6\%).
- Automatic washing machines - 29,808 units ( $10.6 \%$ ); electric clothes dryers - 22,362 units ( $15.4 \%$ ).
- Television sets $-43,687$ units ( $7.4 \%$ ). Colour sets continued to capture a larger share of the total Canadian-made television set market with $67.8 \%$ of manufacturers sales in May compared with $56.7 \%$ in the corresponding month a year earlier.

## Local Government Employment

Canadian municipalities employed an estimated 226,087 persons in general services during the last pay period of March 1973, up $8.1 \%$ from the 209,238 employed a year earlier.

First quarter gross payrolls increased $15.4 \%$ to $\$ 435.5$ million in 1973 from $\$ 377.3$ million in 1972.

Traveller accommodation statistics, 1970 Accommodation establishments operating in Canada had total revenues of $\$ 1.38$ billion in 1970. Data pertaining to the 15,974 establishments operating under this classification-hotels, motels, tourist homes, tourist courts and cabins, tent and trailer campgrounds and outfitters - is presented in the report, Traveller accommodation statistics, 1970 , recently published.

Some of the highlights, as charted here:

- The hotel group accounted for $\$ 1.13$ billion ( $81.8 \%$ ) of the total revenue received by accommodation establishments during 1970. A breakdown shows that hotels received $\$ 504.9$ million ( $44.7 \%$ of their revenue) from the sale of alcoholic beverages, $\$ 303.6$ million ( $26.9 \%$ ) from room rentals, $\$ 239.9$ million ( $21.3 \%$ ) from meals, and $\$ 80.0$ million ( $7.1 \%$ ) from all other sources (chart I).
- The provincial distribution of receipts by source shows considerable fluctuation between provinces. The national average for room receipts is $33.0 \%$ of total revenue, but provincial averages for rooms range from $18.1 \%$ in Manitoba to $63.5 \%$ in Prince Edward Island. Alcoholic sales, expressed as a percentage of total receipts, vary from $5.8 \%$ in Prince Edward 1sland to $60.3 \%$ in Saskatchewan (chart 2).

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## Sales of Alcoholic Beverages.

Sales of alcoholic beverages reached $\$ 2.1$ billion in the year ending March 31, 1972, up $\$ 245$ million ( $13.2 \%$ ) from the year before.

Provincial government revenues from the sales rose $12.5 \%$ to $\$ 631$ million; those of the federal government were up $11.4 \%$ to $\$ 472$ million.

## Rail Freight

Railway revenue freight loadings to June 30 were up $14.6 \%$ from the first half of last year to 117.5 million tons. (Yearearlier loadings were down because of a strike in Quebec iron mines.)

Western volume in the first half of 1973 rose $13.3 \%$ to 53.5 million tons and loadings east of the Lakehead were up $15.8 \%$ to 64 million tons.
