## Industrial Corporations,

## Financial Statistics

Canadian industrial corporations recorded estimated after-tax profits of $\$ 2.31$ billion for the third quarter of 1974, an increase of $\$ 498$ million ( $27.5 \%$ ) from the corresponding period last year. Net income rose $39.7 \%$ for manufacturing industries and $19.9 \%$ for mining corporations.

Industrial corporations' sales in the latest quarter were estimated at $\$ 46.86$ billion, up $\$ 9.57$ billion ( $25.6 \%$ ) from the third quarter of 1973.

## Refined Petroleum Products

Canadian refineries produced 48.4 million barrels of refined petroleum products in September, a decrease of $6.5 \%$ from a year carlier.

Net sales of refined petroleum products at 43.5 million barrels in the latest month showed an increase of $2.0 \%$ from September 1973.

## Wholesale Trade

Wholesale merchanis' sales in September were estimated at $\$ 3.85$ billion, up $34.8 \%$ from September 1973.

Significant sales changes from a year earlier included groceries and food specialties, up $27.2 \%$, and iron and steel, up 62.9\%.

Wholesale inventories were valued at $\$ 5.76$ billion in the latest month, an increase of $30.8 \%$ over September of last year.

## Consumer Credit

Consumer credit Qutstanding on the books of selected credit holders reporting monthly totalled $\$ 15.57$ billion at the end of September, an increase of $16.8 \%$ from a year earlier.

Personal cash loans by chartered banks rose to $\$ 10.41$ billion in the latest month, up $20.8 \%$ from September 1973.

Sales finance and consumer loan companies held $\$ 1.24$ billion balances of retail instalment sales paper (an expansion of $10.9 \%$ from a year earlier) and had $\$ 1.51$ billion outstanding of personal cash loans (up 7.9\%).

## Real Domestic Product

(1961=100)
Canada's seasonally-adjusted index of real domestic product dropped $0.3 \%$ in September to 204.6 from 205.2 in August and reached its lowest level since January. Reduced retail trade, manufacturing and transportation output contributed most to the over-all decrease.

Retail trade fell $3.3 \%$, mainly reflecting a $17 \%$ drop in motor vehicle dealers' volume.

Manufacturing production was off $0.9 \%$ in September, mostly due to lower output from the strike-affected motor vehicle manufacturing and rubber industries.

In transportation (down 2.2\%), much of the decrease resulted from the grainhandlers strike which affected railway transport and also reduced grain elevator output

The seasonally-adjusted index of real domestic product declined $0.2 \%$ in the third quarter of 1974 (to 205.2 from 205.7) following an increase of $0.2 \%$ in the preceding quarter. Man-days lost to strikes and lockouts were at a high level during both periods.

In the latest quarter, decreases were widespread in the goods-producing industries. In services, wholesale trade and storage registered declines.

## Department Store Sales

Department store sales rose to $\$ 422.7$ million in September, an increase of $13.5 \%$ from $\$ 372.4$ million in September 1973.

Sales were up in thirty-five of the thirty-nine departments in the latest month with the largest advances recorded by linens and domestics ( $24.3 \%$ ) and toys and games ( $23.9 \%$ ).

All provinces reported increased department stores sales over September 1973 with a high of $80.5 \%$ for Prince Edward Island. Sales rose $17.2 \%$ in Vancouver, $13.2 \%$ in Toronto, $11.0 \%$ in Winnipeg and $8.5 \%$ in Montreal.

Inventories held in September (at selling price) were valued at $\$ 1.28$ billion, up $36.2 \%$ from the corresponding month in 1973.

## Building Permits

Building permits taken out in Canada in September totalled $\$ 741.1$ million, down
$2.1 \%$ from $\$ 756.8$ million a year earlier. Building permits taken out in September, by province:

- Ontario, \$274.7 million (\$297.6 million a year earlier); Quebec, $\$ 172.9$ million ( $\$ 185.4$ million); Alberta, $\$ 100.1$ million ( $\$ 86.0$ ); British Columbia, $\$ 98.0$ million (\$110.1 million); Saskatchewan, $\$ 30.5$ million ( $\$ 14.7$ million); Manitoba, $\$ 21.7$ million ( $\$ 20.4$ million); Nova Scotia, \$19.4 million (\$23.0 million); New Brunswick, $\$ 18.0$ million ( $\$ 6.9$ million); Newfoundland, $\$ 3.1$ million ( $\$ 6.9$ million); and Prince Edward 1sland, $\$ 2.5$ million $(\$ 526,000)$.
Building permits taken out in Canada in the first nine months of 1974 totalled $\$ 7.13$ billion, up $13.8 \%$ from $\$ 6.26$ billion in January-September 1973.

## Index of Industrial Production <br> (1961=100)

The seasonally-adjusted index of industrial production decreased $0.4 \%$ in Sep. tember to 219.5 from a downwardrevised 220.4 in August. However, it stood $2.6 \%$ above the September 1973 level of 214.0 .

Manufacturing output was down $0.9 \%$ in the latest month. Mining showed a $2.4 \%$ increase and utilities output edged up $0.1 \%$.

## Travel Between Canada and Other Countries

Preliminary statistics for September show 3.1 million United States visitors entered Canada, down $13.8 \%$ from a year earlier. Canadian resident travellers returning from visits to the U.S. decreased $1.0 \%$ to 2.7 million.

Visitors entering Canada from countries other than the U.S. rose $16.1 \%$ to 143,700 while residents of Canada returning from abroad numbered 138,200 , down 2.5\% from September 1973.

## Farm Implement Sales

Farm implement and equipment sales for January to September 1974 were valued at $\$ 490.4$ million, up $18.1 \%$ from $\$ 415.3$ million in the corresponding period in 1973.

Sales of repair parts for farm equipment showed a $29.5 \%$ rise to $\$ 111.9$ million in the latest period.

## Gold Production

Production of gold declined to 127,068 troy ounces in September from 150,612 troy ounces a year earlier.

Gold production for the first nine months of 1974 at 1.24 million troy ounces showed a drop of $14.4 \%$ from 1.45 million troy ounces in JanuarySeptember 1973.

## Consumer Price Indexes <br> for Regional Cities

Consumer price indexes rose in all regional cities and city-combinations in Octuber, with increases ranging from $0.4 \%$ in Ottawa and Halifax to $1.5 \%$ in St. John's.

Food indexes increased in all centres except Ottawa. Quotations were generally higher for dairy, bakery and cereal products, pork cuts, eggs, processed fruits and vegetables, beverages and restaurant food. But in most cities prices were lower for beef products and fresh produce.

Clothing indexes rose in all cities; prices were generally higher for most apparel items including footwear. Housing components were up in all centres except Halifax in response to increased shelter costs and higher prices for furniture, floor coverings and household supplies.

Between October 1973 and October 1974, consumer price indexes rose in all regional cities, with increases as follows: St. John's, 13.9\%; Vancouver, 12.7\%; Thunder Bay, $11.9 \%$; Winnipeg, $11.8 \%$; Toronto, 11.8\%; Montreal, 11.5\%; Quebec City, 11.2\%; Saskatoon-Regina, 11.2\%; Edmonton-Calgary, $11.2 \%$; Saint John, $10.8 \%$; Ottawa, $10.1 \%$, and Halifax, 9.5\%.

## Radio Time Sales

Sales of advertising to national advertisers on AM and FM stations totalled $\$ 4.43$ million in August, down $21.6 \%$ from July. Sales to local advertisers were up $1.2 \%$ to $\$ 11.11$ million.

## Oil Pipe Line Transport

Canadian oil pipe lines received 2.68 million barrels per day of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum products in August, a decrease of $10.3 \%$ from a year earlier.

Receipts of domestic oils were down $6.9 \%$ to 2.27 million B/D while imported oils dropped $25.2 \%$ to $405,600 \mathrm{~B} / \mathrm{D}$.

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## Inventories, Shipments and Orders in Manufacturing Industries

Manufacturers' seasonally-adjusted new orders in September were estimated at $\$ 6.92$ billion, down $1.8 \%$ from the revised August level of $\$ 7.05$ billion. Durable goods new orders dropped $6.0 \%$, while those for non-durable goods rose $2.2 \%$.

Total unfilled orders were estimated at $\$ 9.98$ billion in September, up $1.4 \%$ from the previous month.

Total inventory owned, seasonally adjusted, was $1.7 \%$ higher at $\$ 13.34$ billion.

The seasonally-adjusted ratio of total inventory owned - to shipments increased to $1.97: 1$ in September from 1.94:1 in August, while the finished products - to shipments ratio moved to $0.63: 1$ from 0.62:1.

Manufacturers' shipments in the latest month, seasonally adjusted, were estimated at $\$ 6.78$ billion, an increase of $0.2 \%$ from the revised August value of $\$ 6.76$ billion.

Unadjusted for seasonal variation, manufacturers' shipments in September at an estimated $\$ 6.98$ billion were up $\mathbf{2 3 . 4 \%}$ from a year earlier. Shipments for the first nine months of 1974 totalled $\$ 57.91$ billion, up $21.9 \%$ from $\$ 50.93$ billion in January-September 1973.
